Safety Urged For Spooks And Goblins

Halloween Will Be Observed On Tuesday

Soon little ghosts and goblins will bring their happy challenges of "trick or treat" to the doors of homes in many communities and cities throughout the state. Halloween is a time when children enjoy a general carefree spirit, but it is also a time when accidents are more likely to occur.

For a happier and safer Halloween, the Texas Safety Association urges all parents of "Trick or Treaters" to remember and use these basic Halloween safety rules:

- 1) Young children should be accompanied by parents or other responsible adults on their "trick-or-treat" rounds.
- 2) "Trick-or-Treat" visits should be confined to the immediate neighborhood and limited to the residents of known neighbors.
- 3) "Trick-or-Treat" visits should be made during daylight hours, if possible.
- 4) Householders should be encouraged to give, and children to accept, only wrapped or sealed candy or other treats.

- 5) Children should bring all treats home for inspection before eating.
- 6) Residents who wish to welcome "treat - or - treaters" should light their porch or exterior lights as a sign of their hospitality.
- 7) Children should call only at homes with porch or other outside light glowing.
- 8) Halloween masks should not be worn. (Masks restrict vision.) Colorful facial makeup may be used instead.
- 9) Halloween costumes should be light in color, short enough to prevent tripping, and non-flammable. For greater visibility in dusk or darkness, costumes may be decorated with reflective tape so that they "glow" in the beam of a car's headlights.
- 10) Follow these basic pedestrian safety rules:
 - Cross only at corners, never between cars, never diagonally across an intersection.
 - Cross only at corners, never between parked cars, never

Mr. and Mrs. Ross Goodwin of Muleshoe recently returned from a trip to Dallas and Houston in an attempt to study and search out methods of water conservation.

The Texas Water Development Board, Oklahoma State Department of Agriculture and the Texas Water Conservation Association conducted a Cloudtap Conference October 16 at the Royal Coach Inn in Dallas. The meeting was for the purpose of presenting to those interested the basic principles behind the technique of cloud seeding.

Goodwin, President of the Board of Directors of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1, said he considered the conference an enlightening experience and an idea that can be used as

an effective method of water conservation in water-short areas of the United States.

The couple went on to Houston with other members of the Board of Directors to attend the Thirty-Second Annual State Meeting of the District Directors of the Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts. The

meeting, held October 17, 18 and 19 at the Astroworld Hotel, was entitled "Natural Resources -- Meeting the Needs of Peoples."

Hunters Converge On Area This Weekend

The Muleshoe Jaycees are expecting a large number of hunters from all over the area to participate in their annual Sandhill Crane Hunt which started early Saturday morning.

The hunt has been publicized over the area this year and should attract a large number of hunters.

The hunter who kills the largest bird this year will be presented with 12 gauge Browning automatic shotgun.

The hunt will be held this weekend, and the following two weekends, November 4 and 5 and November 11 and 12.

Hunt headquarters will be at the Dinner Bell Restaurant, 2100 West American Blvd. Guides will leave the restaurant each day one and half hours before sunrise. Shells and licenses will be available at the restaurant

also.

The Jaycees have arranged again for land adjacent to the Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge. This refuge is the oldest in the state of Texas, and during the winter months, there are as many as 100,000 sandhill crane wintering away from their arctic breeding grounds. The Muleshoe population represents the largest concentration of this species in the United States.

The Jaycees will also provide transportation to and from the hunting area.

The costs for the hunt will be \$5.00 per day; \$7.50 per weekend; and \$15.00 for all three weekends.

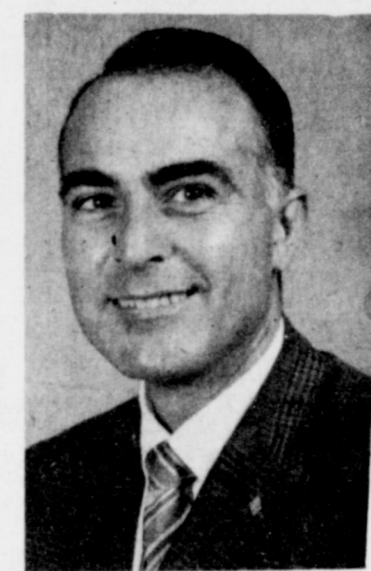

SPAG Will Discuss Area Medical Service

Emergency Medical Services will be the topic of discussion for an areawide meeting of health officials Tuesday, October 31 at 7:00 p.m., in the Flame Room of the First National - Pioneer Building, 1500 Broadway, Lubbock. The purpose of the meeting, sponsored by the South Plains Association of Governments, in coordination with the West Texas Health Systems, Inc., is to study and discuss improvement of emergency medical care in the 15-county South Plains Region.
 According to the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, 60,000 persons died last year, who possibly could have lived if given proper emergency

care. Less than 7% of the Nation's ambulances can communicate with hospitals. The American Hospital Association found in a study that only 17% of the hospital with emergency rooms are staffed by a doctor on duty 24 hours a day.
 Experts on the various aspects of an emergency medical system will be on hand to present information on successful solutions in handling emergency medical problems. Dr. Fred Vogt, M.D., University of Texas School of Medicine at Houston, Consultant to the President on Emergency Medical Care will speak on "What is a good Emergency Medical System?" Mr. Gene Pipkin

Accidents Investigated This Month

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated five accidents on rural highways in Bailey County during the month of September, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.
 These crashes resulted in no persons killed and one person injured.
 The rural traffic summary for this county during the first nine months of 1972 shows a total of 40 accidents resulting in two persons killed and 25 persons injured.
 Region 5 of the Texas Department of Public Safety shows a total in September, 1972 of 561 accidents resulting in 21 persons killed and 335 persons injured as compared

to the same month in 1971 with 499 accidents resulting in 33 persons killed and 268 persons injured. This was 62 more accidents, 12 less fatalities and 67 more injured in 1972 at the same period of time.
 The Highway Patrol supervisor reminds you that speed is one of the main factors in accidents on the highway. Slow down a little and live a lot. Drive friendly the Texas way! CASES FILED IN COUNTY COURT

Guillermo B. Linares vs. Araceli Linares, divorce, filed Oct. 27.

DEATH PENALTY RESTORED—A bill to restore the death penalty for certain cases of murder started too late to get through the Legislature in special session.

It was knocked out in both the House and Senate because it had not emerged from committees until the last 72 hours of the session.

The legislation sought to permit the death penalty (outlawed by the U.S. Supreme Court) in cases of atrocity murder, murder by hired assassins, murder of prison guards, intentional homicide during kidnapping.

ALLOWABLE MAINTAINED—For the eighth straight month, the statewide oil allowable will be retained at 100 per cent for November.

Production is expected to be slightly more than 3,500,000 barrels a day.

Major oil buyers requested 3,753,055 barrels of crude daily next month, a decrease of 23,538 from the October record.

SPAG Will Discuss

The Third Court of Civil Appeals at Austin affirmed the State Savings and Loan Commissioner's order permitting creation of savings and loan associations in Bay City and Hallettsville.

BUILDING SHIFT ORDERED—The State Highway Commission received firm advice from the Legislature to move the proposed site of its controversial new 11-story, \$20 million building.

Lawmakers said they don't want the building on the block across the street from the state capitol and governor's mansion. They indicated they prefer an underground parking garage topped by a park on the choice site in downtown Austin.

The legislative resolution recognizes the Highway Department should be compensated for the \$1.5 million it spent on the site and plans. Funds will not be appropriated until next year.

Since the Highway Department is pressing for a two-cents-per-gallon gasoline tax increase, it is expected to go along with the Legislature's directive without further argument.

COURTS SPEAK—The Texas Supreme Court upheld lower court verdicts that a Bowie County couple should collect damages due to an explosion at Lone Star Ordnance Plant which damaged their home.

In another opinion, Martin concluded election code provisions are applicable to water district elections where they are not inconsistent with special statutes controlling the district or the water code.

COMMON CAUSE OPENS SHOP—Common Cause, the national lobby for citizens, announced opening of its first state organizational headquarters in Austin.

Randal Wood of Austin, former head of the Texas Secretary of State Department of Health, will describe the development of an Emergency Communications System.

Wood said Common Cause will seek four legislative objectives next year: wider disclosure of campaign finances, better public access to information, a code of ethics requiring full financial disclosure by public officials and a strict law requiring lobbyists to tell who hires them and pays them.

APPOINTMENTS—Clyde C. McCollough Jr., of San Antonio was named by the Governor to the board of trustees, Texas Municipal Retirement System.

Smith appointed Robert Joseph Pease, Erwin Joseph Bueck, Leon Louis Kahane Jr., and Alfred Neumeyer Jr., all of Hallettsville, to the Lavaca County Flood Control District No. 3 board of directors.

McGovern received an exceptionally warm welcome to the Texas capitol during his last visit to Texas.

Efforts to raise hunting and fishing license fees failed in the House of Representatives. Another try will be made next year.

Farm Bureau Requests Govt. To Buy Cotton

WACO—The Texas Farm Bureau is requesting the government to purchase cotton to relieve "critically depressed" prices for cotton.

In a telegram sent Oct. 20 to Senator John Tower, President J. T. (Red) Woodson said, "Texas Farm Bureau cotton producers respectfully request your personal assistance in expediting USDA purchases of cotton for current and future export sales."

The leader of the 135,000-member Texas Farm Bureau said export sales in the volume are "urgently needed to relieve critically depressed prices for all grades and staples, and particularly for the shorter staples which predominate in Texas."

"Your positive response to this request," Woodson continued, "should prove extremely beneficial to Texas cotton producers and will be deeply appreciated."

AUSTIN -- Competitive auto and home owners insurance rating legislation failed to clear the special session, but Gov. Preston Smith claimed the gathering served a purpose.

Smith, disappointed at a logjam in conference committee on the session's windup night, declined to call lawmakers back to work as he had hinted he might. He said he and legislative leaders decided another session now would be fruitless.

The Governor announced he will make recommendations for "through reform" of the insurance regulatory system before he leaves office in January.

"I am hopeful," he said, "that, because of the exposure and public attention that this issue has received during the past 30 days, competitive rates and other insurance reforms can and will be approved."

He cited these accomplishments of the session in addition to those which had been wrapped up earlier:

*Establishment of a Texas Offshore Terminal Commission to define the role and responsibility of State government in developing a deep draft offshore port for supertankers.

*Relaxing of trailer and brake lighting requirements for trailers.

*An increase in funds by \$1 million for the Anderson County junior college occupational extension center.

*Defining the legal age at which both male and female youth offenders can be tried as adults.

*Appropriation of \$211,372 for a citrus and vegetable training center and improved beef production programs at Texas A&M University.

The Legislature also passed a bill to lower rates in the hurricane windstorm insurance pool for coastal areas. It petitioned Congress for a constitutional convention on an anti-busing amendment.

TRAILER BILL PASSED

The Texas Legislature completed action on the modification of the brake and lighting requirements for trailers when the Senate, on October 13, accepted the House version of the Bill.

The final legislative action ended three weeks of intensive and sometimes frustrating discussions among representatives of interested groups and legislators. The modification procedure proved to be unusually complex in that it was difficult to arrive at solutions and compromises which would give trailer users practical relief and at the same time maintain reasonable safety features to protect the general public from traffic accidents. It must be remembered that farm trailer users were not the only group vitally interested in the final results. Also included were the boat, fertilizer, pole, mobile home and other miscellaneous groups. It was a difficult task to rewrite the Bill in order to be fair and practical and prevent any group from vigorously opposing the final Bill.

In brief, the principal features of the new Bill as they affect farm trailers are:

A. Registration - It will no longer be a requirement under certain conditions to operate a farm trailer at thirty (30) miles per hour or less in order to register for the \$5.00 green tag license. This will permit farm trailers under certain conditions to be operated in excess of thirty (30) miles per hour.

B. Electric Lighting Requirements:

1. Farm and fertilizer trailers registered as such are not required to have any fixed electric lights (this includes stop lights and turn signal indicators) during daylight hours (one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset).

2. Boat trailers with a gross weight of 3,000 pounds or less are exempt during daylight hours from all fixed electric lights.

3. Boat trailers with a gross weight of 3,000 to 4,500 pounds are exempt during daylight hours from all fixed electric lights except stop lights and turn signal indicators.

C. Brake Requirements:

1. Every vehicle and trailer shall be equipped with brakes acting on all wheels except:

a. If the gross weight of the trailer, semitrailer, or pole trailer does not exceed four thousand, five hundred (4,500) pounds, it is not required to have brakes. This means this classification of trailers are exempt from the thirty (30) miles per hour limit and may travel at the posted speed limits for trailers.

b. If the gross weight of the trailer, semitrailer, or pole trailer exceeds four thousand, five hundred (4,500) pounds but does not exceed fifteen thousand (15,000) pounds, and the vehicle is drawn at a speed in excess of thirty (30) miles per hour, it must have brakes acting on both wheels of the rear axle.

d. If the situation requires brakes on trailers, then a surge or inertia system of brakes may be used if the gross weight does not exceed fifteen thousand (15,000) pounds.

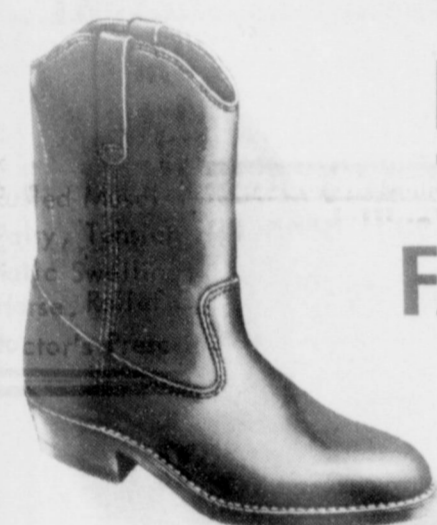
