# Attack Brest, Other Ports

English Deny Nazi Claims Of Success In Shipping War

LONDON, Feb. 25 (P)-Droves of fighter-protected RAF bombers returned to the assault on the Gernan-held French coast today following an overnight attack on Brest where the air ministry said "an enemy cruiser of the Hipper class is known to be lying."

At least 60 planes were counted in the formations roaring out over the channel today and ground observers said there probably were many more above the clouds, indicating that a large-scale attack was

The RAF squadrons kept in perfect formation until well out at sea, then they spread fanwise. over the Strait of Dover in the direction of Calais and Boulogne. In last night's raid on Brest, the air ministry announced, the heaviest bombs loosed were among the most powerful ever used "for a

This blow in the British counter offensive aimed at smashing Adolf Hitler's threatened spring sea as sault and invasion plans was said to have straddled the berth of a German surface raider which may have been the one that tore up British convoy off the Azores Feb

The fact that a German cruise was said to be lying at Brest for several days and the reports of survivors that raider of the Hipper class carried out the convoy attack lent weight to the belief that it was the same ship.

The admiralty announced to-day that five ships, instead of the 14 claimed by the Germans, are known to have been sunk in the raid on the convoy off the Agores, contributing 23,986 tons of shipping to the total of 12 vessels aggregating 37,636 tons lost in the week ending eb. 16.

"The facts are that, of 19 ships in the convoy, 10 are known to be safe and four others (three British and one allied) totalling 19,698 tons aren't yet overdue," the admiralty announcement said. The Germans had reported 82,000 tons the house bill for the so-called senate scientific load limitation





# TES Franchise Grant In Order

City commissioners have a fairly weighty matter up for consideration this evening in passing on a proposed 35-year extension of the Texas Electric rvice franchise

Yet, there are mitigating circumstances which removes from it the status of a long time warrant. In the first place it is poorly called when referred to as a franchise, for in fact it is little more than a permit to do business. It carries with it no guarantees of monopoly, for if the commission willed it could grant to others or to the city the right to compete against TES at anytime it so desired. Yet it must be admitted that as a practical matter the permit is somewhat exclusive.

The franchise has nothing to do with rates, except as might be applied through indirect pressure. Rates are handled as individual matters from time to time and are governed by the company or public opinion through its various means of expression.

As for the two per cent payment as results on streets, alleys, etc., there is one important consideration. The ordinance specifically states it is not to be passed on to the consumer, who usually pays all taxes. In the final analysis he will pay for this one unless history is in the making. The point is, that two per cent, or some fraction thereof, is not to be added on to present bills,

This can or cannot be considered as an unexpected gift. City fathers realize that it is revenue to the city not heretofore available. They realize that it is on a point which has not been fully decided by the courts. And so does the company, for as interested as the company is in the city, it must first be interested in the company.

This two percent might be applied to rate reductions, but possibly there is not much point, for two per cent likely would make little difference to the majority of consumers. To the city it is in a sum large enough to do some good.

The percentage is admittedly an arbitrary one It approaches an average on the spread for such matters. It might be too much, it might be too little, but nothing but the future can determine that

The company's point is that by extending the franchise, it will have a good bargaining base for refunding bonds in a currently favorable market, thus effecting considerable savings, Spokesmen have indicated this would come back to the consumer in better rates, as it should, and as long as corporation income and surplus taxes are in force and effect, there is reason to believe that the company would prefer to build good will with the money rather than pay it out in taxes,

It is possible, yes probable, that the franchise will be extended and the two per cent rental levy adopted. We can see nothing wrong with that course of acction, for although this is an important matter, it is not all-important.

"Foreign revenues will be Long keyed to a high emotional pitch by the sheer drama of its all, Hollywood broke down and wept — and then, its big scene nicely played out, turned immediately to a more practical

But it has been spending with a difference—not for spending's sake, but for results. One executive puts it this way: "Holly-wood used to condone its own extravagance by laying it to 'this crasy business.' Making movies was not like any other business, they said. They were partly -but making movies, like any other job, can be done two ways. Efficiently, or inefficient-Hollywood has been trying to do it the first way-and it is succeeding."

Just how much the films have lost in foreign revenue is presently unclear, estimates ranging from as high as 47 per cent (in rare instances) to as low as 10 per cent. How much of this loss consists of war-frozen or po-litically-impounded profits, with a chance to retrieve them later, also uncertain, a factor to be determined by some financial wizard familiar with all the ramifications of foreign quota laws and restrictions and their efforts on the individual

However, most of Hollywood's major concerns showed greater net profits for 1940, a full war year, than for 1939. The big exception was 20th Century-Fox (1939 profits over \$4,000,000) which showed a deficit - due

partly to foreign losses. me of the new profits in cluded foreign revenues the companies cannot take from countries of origin, but all the lots including 20th are optimistic over 1941 prospects,



# Senate Committee Favors Improvements

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25 (P)-Acting at top speed the senate naval affairs committee approved today a \$242,373,500 authorization for improvements at the islands of Guam and Samoa, Pacific ocean outposts near Japan.
