## California Has Severe Earthquake

LOS ANGELES (AP)—All Southern California was rocked yesterday by a severe earthquake which apparently concentrated much of its force near Palm Springs and towering Mt. San Jacinto, 70 miles east of here.

California Institute of Technology, Pasadena, Dr. Charles F. Richter, timed the quake's official onset at 4:43.2 p. m. (PDT) and said its magnitude was 6.3-6.4 on a seismological scale which rates the world's most severe quakes at 8-12. The disastrous Long Beach quake of 1933 was 6.1-6.4 but occurred in a much more populous area.

The CalTech scientist put the apparent center at 100 miles southeast of Pasadena, roughly between the desert cities of Indio and Twenty-Nine Palms. Indio reported no damage.

Palm Springs police reported the rear of a furniture store collapsed in the first of three quakes at 4:45 p. m., 5 p. m. and 5:15 p. m. (See EARTHQUAKE, Page 8).

## Germans Are To Cast Vote 'For Freedom'

BERLIN (AP)—Nearly two million Germans, blockaded 100 miles behind the iron curtain, were urged last night to vote "for freedom and against communism" in today's city election.

What ordinarily would be a local contest between rival political parties has been magnified by the East-West struggle into a giant straggly in the wind to indicate which conqueror the Germans prefer.

Communists are boycotting the election and are not on the ballot. The result, therefore, will be judged on the relative size of the vote and the stay-at-home element.

If more than 80 percent of the eligible voters come out, the Western powers will hail it as a vindication of their fight to stay and prevent the sovietization of Berlin.

If voting is relatively light, the Communists will claim German endorsement of their efforts to drive out the Western powers.

Clear weather favored a heavy vote, and also the airlift which flew in 4,754 tons of food and fuel yesterday.

"Anyone who stays at home tomorrow is giving a vote for communism against freedom," declared Ferdinand Friedensburg, deputy mayor of the legally elected government which rules two-thirds of the divided city.

The Americans and British punctured a last-minute scare campaign of Communist rumors that the Western powers are getting ready to abandon the city in January or February. The campaign was calculated to show their colors tomorrow.

"The United States will not be forced out of Berlin," said Gen. Lucius D. Clay, American military governor.

"The British are not going out by their own will," by any other means," said a British Foreign Office spokesman. (See GERMAN, Page 8).

## Two Suspects Held In Hijacking Here

From the shadows of an oak dock at the old ice plant on S. Cuyler, two men, one armed, last night jumped and grabbed an elderly man, hijacking him of \$3 as he walked from Six's Pig Stand to his room in the General Supply Co.

Louis B. Elvea, 75, employed in the tool room of the company, police said, told them the two leaped on him, took his money and keys to the supply company store.

They grabbed him and dragged him for several yards on his face down a nearby alley, tearing his clothes and scratching both knees.

Three police cars converged on the area a few minutes after Elvea called the station and surrounded a junk yard where the men were believed hiding. Later two of the cars headed toward the Fiat. Turning into Ford from 900 S. Cuyler, they spotted two men hiding in the weeds. The men jumped to run when police spotlights flushed them from the field.

Patrolmen F. D. Roan and J. H. Nichols nabbed the fleeing men, together with Chief of Police Louis Allen and Homer Doggett.

The two men were being held by police for questioning and further checking. Identification of the two was incomplete last night at press time.

When caught, neither had a pistol, police said, and advanced the theory it was probably discarded in the weeds. Elvea told police the one man pulled a gun on him.

This was the first reported hijacking here since the Simmons Grocery robbery early this year. Three out-of-state youths were sent to the Huntsville Penitentiary on that job.

## Army's Fund Is \$5,103

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## Nativity Scene Is Enlarged

The scene of Christ's nativity, constructed each year on the south lawn of the Courthouse, will be enlarged this year, Charles Thomas, chairman of the Nativity Scenes Committee, said.

Reproduction in miniature of paintings by famous artists will depict the Three Wise Men being attracted by the Star of Bethlehem, and of the angels making the joyous announcement to the shepherds as they watched their flocks on the still desert night.

The wise men will be taken from a section of Chambers' "Nativity," now on display at the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York. The angels will be copied from one of Michelangelo's many Biblical paintings.

A crew of local artists, consisting of Mrs. Nancy Davis, Miss Florence Jackson, Harry and Jim Garrett, Mrs. Doris Rinehart, and M. V. Ward, besides Thomas, are constructing the figures.

The tableau is expected to be completed by Dec. 15. Next year, hopes to construct a dozen scenes from the life of Christ in the city park.

## Pampa Library Surpasses Definition by Webster

Webster says a library is "an apartment or a building, devoted to a collection of books, manuscripts, kept for the use but not for sale." But then we guess he figured out this definition before there was a Pampa Library.

True enough, there are plenty of books at the local library, but that isn't all. We were in the other day looking for a book on the history of the mole on Cleopatra's left cheek when our eyes fell upon an object that is more than 100,000 years old.

Upon close observation, we realized it was a dinosaur's footprint taken from the Connecticut Valley, Holyoke, Mass. It was presented to the library years ago by Godfrey L. Cabot.

Looking around we observed there are several things at the library that people other than book lovers would enjoy. There are three pictures on the east wall of the library that tell the history of the origin of Chinese eye glasses. Mrs. Russell Snow, head librarian, said these pictures have been at the library for years—and we are just getting around to noticing them.

Mrs. Snow, pointing to paintings on the north wall, said several Pampa art students display oil paintings at the library from time to time. At present there are oil paintings by Derrel Ramsey and Roger Long. One of Long's pictures was purchased by Mrs. B. E. Finley and presented to the library.

One painting of Abraham Lincoln caught our eye. Mrs. Snow said it was painted by a former Pampa boy, Woodie Guthrie. This versatile fellow, she said, also has his autobiography in book form at the library. "Bound for Glory." At present Guthrie is a cowboy singer in New York.

In a display case near the front desk, we discovered a personal display of Mrs. Snow's. She said her son, Charles, who is a Marine stationed in China, sent her many Chinese relics that are worthy of observation. Also, we noticed a rare book on Chinese jades. Its title is "An Illustrated Record of Stanley Charles Nott's Collection of Chinese Jades."

Yes, the Pampa library is out of Webster's definition and may better be called the Pampa Public Museum-Library.

## Evidence Is Found At Chambers' Farm

WASHINGTON (AP)—New hearings to dig into fresh reports of a pre-war Red spy ring were ordered yesterday by the House un-American Activities Committee. The hearings will begin Tuesday afternoon.

The committee said it now knows who slipped out the national secrets which were found in a hollowed-out pumpkin on the Maryland farm of an admitted former Communist courier.

Evidence identifying the person who took the documents will be brought out at the hearings, Robert E. Stripling, the committee's chief investigator, promised.

Before announcing reopening of the investigation, which produced sensational evidence last summer, Stripling said that some "very important" new documents have been turned up.

He said these were separate from the microfilmed copies of secret government material chiefly from the State Department which were found Thursday in a pumpkin on Whittaker Chambers' farm near Westminster, Md. Chambers has testified that he was a pre-war member of the Communist underground, but since has renounced communism. At present he is a senior editor on Time Magazine.

Stripling said Chambers will be one of the witnesses at the new series of hearings. Subpoenas have been issued for the appearance of an unspecified number of other witnesses, including some handwriting experts and other technicians.

Also, the committee gave permission to two federal law enforcement agents to study the new documentary evidence, including enlarged prints of the microfilmed documents found on Chambers' farm. George Morris Fay, U.S. attorney for the District of Columbia, and R. E. Wharty, an official of the Department of Justice's criminal division, were authorized to look them over.

Stripling made it clear that the No. 1 aim of the committee would be to present evidence on showing who gave the secrets to Chambers, who said he quit the feeds in 1938.

Stripling told reporters: "The purpose is to bring to a conclusion the hearings the committee has had in progress several months on the Hiss-Chambers matters and on espionage in the federal government."

The man to whom he referred is Alger Hiss, former State Department official who now is president of the Carnegie Endowment for World Peace.

In last summer's hearings, Chambers swore that Hiss was a pre-war member of a "Communist apparatus" which operated in Washington. Hiss said Chambers lied. Chambers, however, repeated his accusation in a radio broadcast, where he did not have the immunity granted witnesses in Congressional hearings, and Hiss sued him for \$75,000 damages. **Berlin Votes In Spite of Red Threats**

Despite strong-arm efforts of Russian-inspired German Communists to disrupt the municipal election in Western Berlin today, the American, French and British occupation forces are going straight ahead with the project of establishing a city government.

Meantime the Russians have formally recognized the new Communist rump government in the Eastern sector of the capital as the "only legal organ of the city administration." The Muscovites will have no truck with the Western government, and have given every indication that they intend to use all possible means—including the brutal food blockade—to drive the Western powers out. In short, Berlin is to have two wholly separate and hostile governments.

The question rather naturally arises as to why the Western Allies don't abandon this island of trouble and let the Reds move in. Berlin of course lies wholly within the Russian Zone and the latter are taking advantage of this to make life tough for the democracies.

After the war, the Western Allies moved in, much to the disgust of Russia. Then followed the campaign of skulduggery to drive them out. This naturally put a wholly different aspect on the matter, for it became impossible for America, Britain and France to withdraw without loss of face. They had hold of a hot poker and couldn't let go.

The way things are going it looks as though there will be two Germanys, one comprising the Soviet Zone of occupation and the other constructed from the three Allied zones. In that case the Western Reich presumably will have a new capital of its own, since Berlin will remain isolated within the Russian sector.

However, even if and when that takes place, one would expect the Western powers to remain in occupation of their section of Berlin. That city which once was the hub of Central Europe has become the fulcrum which may give the Western Allies leverage to pry Eastern Germany loose and make it a part of the new Reich.

### Crippled Child Victims of Cerebral Palsy Get a 'Free Lift' in Dallas

DALLAS — (AP) — The man drove up in a black limousine and a maid got out with a small boy, his legs encased in braces.

Down the street came a wiry little Mexican pulling a red wagon on holding his two-year-old daughter, her helpless legs cradled on a bright flowered pillow.

Both men were on the same errand at the little pink house which is the cerebral palsy treatment center of the Dallas Society for Crippled Children. The treatment is the same for all children, at no cost whatsoever to their families.

Not only from Dallas, but from all over Texas and a few neighboring states parents have come with their knotted, twisted and

stumbling children. Some brain injury—before, during or after birth—made them that way.

The doctors in Dallas, with years of study and treatment of cerebral palsy, have volunteered their medical counsel and services, free of charge, to help pull these children out of the shadows.

"That is the significance of this center—everything is absolutely free," said its director, Mrs. Juliette Gratie. "At no other place like this in the country is there no cost whatsoever."

A little more than 300 children came in on appointed days each week for rhythmic exercises, for supervised group play (so they'll learn to get along with other children), for adjustments on their braces, for expert guidance in learning to do things that normal children do naturally.

"No other place has a larger daily program," Mrs. Gratie claims.

The parents come too. They have to continue the same treatment at home.

"You get mighty tired of singing the same old rhymes," said one mother as she paused in her low chanting to rest her small son's legs, "but it's sure helping my boy to learn to walk."

"And see," said the Mexican father, "last month my Juanita could not stand alone. Now I give her the exercises and get her this red wagon and she hangs on to it and scrambles all over the place."

Roughly there are 300,000 cerebral palsied children and adults in the United States. Seven of every 100,000 babies born are crippled by cerebral palsy. One of the seven will die before he is five years old.

Because they cannot speak plainly and often can make only grunting sounds, cerebral palsied children more often than not are thought to be of inferior mentality, even half-witted.

There was 12-year-old Jimmy, for instance. He was big, but his mother had to lift him when she wanted him moved. He could talk, but only she could understand his queer noises. It hadn't occurred to her that Jimmy ever could go to school.

Jimmy came to the little pink house in Dallas from his neighboring home town and got braces on his legs first of all. Then the correction teacher got hold of him and, teaching him how to pronounce words, taught him also to read. Now Jimmy is in the first grade and comes home with shining eyes.

"We're mighty proud of Jimmy," said Dr. Margaret Watkins, chairman of the medical board of the center. "His IQ is far, far above average; in fact in the genius category. Someday he'll be a fine man."

"But there's no cure for them," Mrs. Gratie cautioned. "These children never will be normal. All we can hope to do is bring them closer to normalcy."

The Dallas center prefers to get the children before they are a year old. The center now has more very young children coming in for daily treatment than any other. Their youngest patient is six months old; their oldest, 30 years.

The medical staff is composed of 12 Dallas doctors. Two of them are members of the American Academy for Crippled Children. The doctors give a course for parents, a series of 15 lectures in which they explain just what made their crippled child the way he is, and what the medical profession knows about treating him.

There are three main types of cerebral palsy and the treatments vary. The spastic is tense and rigid and his fingers refuse to bend. The ataxic is in constant motion; he over responds to any stimulation. The ataxia has no sense of balance and walks with a swaggering gait because he plants his feet far apart.

Three nurses training schools in Dallas, Southwestern Medical School and the Psychology, Speech, Physical Education and Special Education Departments of Southern Methodist University, send their students to the little pink house to work.

Operating funds? Part of them come from the sale of Easter seals. The Dallas Junior League pays the salary of one of the three physical therapists. And the rest—

"It just comes in," said Miss Champe Phillips, a physical therapist. "One farm woman who thought her boy was hopeless sent in \$5 from her egg money. I know, just out of gratitude."

NEW YORK — (AP) — The idea that Guy Lombardo has a "sweet" band is gently ridiculed by the man himself with the comment: "The music my band plays is never sweet unless it was written that way."

You owe a composer the same fidelity that a producer gives a playwright, Lombardo suggested.

The bandleader, who holds a three speed boat records and is helping build a boys' town on Long Island, has some definite ideas about music and the way it should be played.

"Many swing bands were war babies," he said. "I'm not talking about the Dorseys and the Artie Shaws. They're standard. But the others, they were synthetic attractions, made for the moment."

Lombardo started young and got in on the flapper era. Since the young things today get the same boot out of a Lombardo tune that their flapper mothers got, he was asked about changes, if any, and about variations in style.

"Actually, the formula for our success is so simple that it is hard to put into words. We just play the way people want us to."

A man of many interests, Lombardo has to "clear a space" when he wants to scratch his head and think.

Currently in the midst of his 19th consecutive winter engagement at the same New York hotel (Roosevelt), he also is managing a sea food house on Long Island in addition to racing speed boats and appearing on radio and television shows.

But he really is high on that boys' town project. With political and church leaders he is a member of the advisory board that recently brought Mayor Nicholas H. Wegner, director of Boys' Town, Nebraska, to New York to outline the operation of that great institution.

"We're going to do it," Lombardo enthused. "We've already raised \$100,000. It's the real thing—a place not just for boys in trouble with the law, but also those from broken homes."

### Doctors Collect Opposition Fund

ST. LOUIS — (AP) — The American Medical Association is collecting \$3,500,000 from American doctors as a fund to oppose any government controlled health program.

The AMA announced it was assessing \$25 against each of its 140,000 members.

The action was taken after the AMA stand against socialized medicine and any form of compulsory sickness insurance was re-affirmed.

"The fund," the medical association said Thursday, "is for a nationwide plan of education on the progress of American medicine, the importance of the conservation of health and the advantage of the American system in securing a wide distribution of a high quality medical care."

"The American Medical Association re-affirms its belief and the application of the principle of medical care insurance on a voluntary basis."

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wealth decides size of family, Professor Says

BALTIMORE — (AP) — Which is a more effective influence on populations, birth control or automobiles?

"Autos, any day," answers a man who should know, Dr. Lowell J. Reed of Johns Hopkins University.

It's just another way of saying that demographers—scientists who study population trends—are convinced a nation's material wealth is an ultimate factor in deciding how many people it will have, Dr. Reed reports.

That's where the flippers come in, as an index of people's wealth.

"It appears that if people are given the choice between material comforts and pleasures and children, they take the material things," Dr. Reed declared.

There's nothing simple about it. Take India. The current plan for that teeming sub-continent, recently graduated to independence, is for industrialization.

Would the resulting increase in wealth cut into the heavy overpopulation regarded as one of India's ills?

Not necessarily right away. In fact, the reverse might happen. India's population may shoot up with the first gain in material goods—and gobble up that additional production before newly increased wealth could act as a reducing factor, he said.

Contrary to some popular beliefs, Dr. Reed observed incidentally, wars make very little impression on the upward curve of populations.

He said charts of various nations show only a very slight deviation in the upward trend of population and birth rate curves even where there were huge war losses.

"I drove down past the explosion, stopped, and ran back. Buchanan's truck was on fire, and his sweater was burning. I put the fire on his clothes out," Crepsinger said.  
"Where the truck blew up there wasn't much left."  
Crepsinger was coming from Woodson. The trailer truck and the explosives truck came off the Albany road just ahead of him. Crepsinger said he thought the explosives truck was "going 45 to 50 miles an hour" when it ran off the pavement.  
He said he couldn't tell whether the driver was having tire trouble. "He seemed to run off without a bobble," Crepsinger said.  
One of the tire rims of the truck was found on the power line a quarter of a mile away from the blast.

damaged. Mr. and Mrs. Bird and Barbara, their seven-year-old daughter, were in the house. Barbara was slightly cut by flying glass. The others were unharmed.

4,000 persons had clambered aboard.  
They conservatively estimated 3,000 missing, plus 200 bodies recovered.

No non-Chinese were known to have been aboard.  
The steamship office had to close during the day as thousands of relatives of passengers sought admittance. Extra police sought vainly to break up the milling horde that jammed traffic in nearby streets.

One of the survivors, who were brought ashore in small numbers throughout the day, said two junks passed nearby just before the explosion. He expressed belief they had cast loose a mine, but this was only speculation.

Survivors said many persons were trapped below decks by the explosion and sudden sinking. The radio was knocked out instantly, so no distress call was sent.

The Kiangya's Captain Sun was last seen directing lifeboat launching.

Company officials said that even if he survived he probably could not tell how many passengers he carried.

Small coastal vessels, black with humanity clinging to every available inch, have been a common sight out of Shanghai for weeks past.

Safety limits have been impossible to maintain. War-fearful travelers either have rushed the gangways without tickets or have passed tickets back from ship to shore, using the same one many times.

### Dewar Named Head Of Bankers' Group

DALLAS, (AP)—Hal H. Dewar of San Antonio has been recommended as the next president of the Investment Bankers Association of America.  
R. B. Smith, executive secretary of the Texas division of the association, said Dewar's name would be presented to the 32nd annual convention that gets underway in Hollywood, Fla., today.

### Firemen Answer Three Alarms

Firemen answered three alarms within 30 minutes last night. The first alarm, at the beginning of the dust storm, was at 900 N. Somerville. Fire Chief Ernest Winborne said.

5:07 p.m. in Arlington, on the western side of Mt. San Jacinto, near Riverside, a drug store window was broken, paint spilled on the floor in another shop. In Ontario, a newspaper's windows were shattered.

In Los Angeles, where the quake was timed at 4:43 p.m., a crowd of more than 100,000 was just filing out of giant Memorial Coliseum where Southern California and Notre Dame played to a 14-14 tie.

From Santa Barbara on the north to San Diego on the south, and inland to the Colorado, the tremor was reported varying in light to heavy. Palm Springs police called it the most severe in 15 years.

In downtown Los Angeles, police said a water tank collapsed and a building at downtown Seventh and Hill Streets developed a crack. There were wide reports of cracked windows, broken crockery and stopped clocks.

Mt. San Jacinto, which geologists believe may once have been a volcano, is fringed by San Andreas fault—California's longest and largest. It is on this fault that severe San Francisco, Santa Barbara and El Centro earthquakes have been reported since the turn of the century.

A San Bernardino radio operator reported he heard an operator in the Moreno Valley, east of Riverside, say he saw dust for a distance of nine miles along the fault. Hemet, where a severe quake shook down buildings in 1921, reported a sharp quake but no serious damage.

Meanwhile, he radioed Rep. Nixon (R-Calif.), who is enroute to Pampa, requesting him to hurry back to Washington as soon as possible. Nixon replied that he would fly back as soon as his ship docks Tuesday, if he cannot arrange earlier accommodations.

Nixon handled most of the details of the earlier investigations into reported Communist spying.

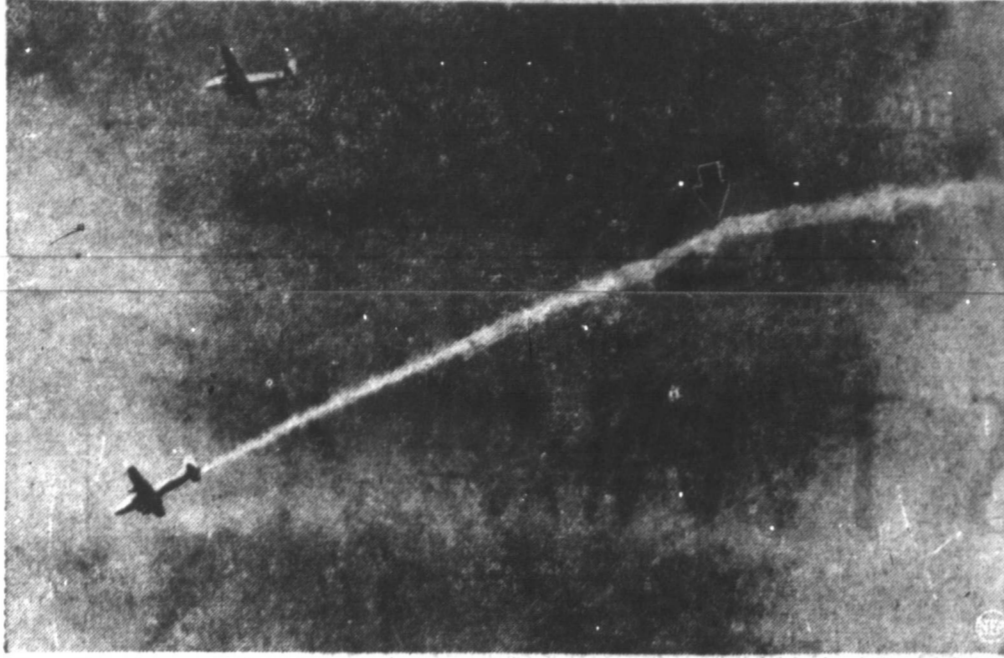

# New Pact on Wheat to Be Considered

WASHINGTON (AP)—A new attempt to negotiate an international wheat agreement will be made here next January 25. The State Department announced this Friday night following a meeting of an 11-nation Preparatory Committee. All countries belonging to the United Nations Food and Agricultural Organization are expected to participate. The proposed pact would replace the agreement negotiated early this year which did not become effective because of the failure of the United States Con-

gress to act on it. That agreement, which had the backing of President Truman, would have covered a five-year period. It would have set up a system of maximum and minimum prices to protect growers and consumers, and would have divided the world wheat market among most of the major exporting nations. Under the plan the United States would have been assured of an annual market of 168,000,000 bushels, with a guaranteed price of \$1.85 a bushel for the first year. There have been reports that some countries want lower prices set in any new agreement because of the big 1949 wheat yields throughout the world. Such a move probably would meet with considerable opposition.

# Congress to Probe Profits

WASHINGTON (AP)—The record-breaking profits of business go under a Congressional X-ray next week. A joint committee composed of Senate and House members will undertake the study. Their analysis of the business picture is expected to have important bearing on what the Congress does in the fields of taxation, money controls, price fixing and rationing. Economists, accountants, labor leaders and industrial heads will begin testifying Monday at public hearings by a subcommittee of the joint committee on the President's economic report. The subcommittee is headed by Senator Flanders (R-Vt.). Another member of the economic committee, Sen. O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.) is urging an excess profits tax on corporations to provide added federal revenue "essential to wage the struggle for peace."

# Thomas to Lead Fight For Farmers

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senator Elmer Thomas (D-Okla.) said yesterday he will lead a fight in the next Congress to keep farmers prosperous and farm prices near "Votes of farmers and farm states provided the biggest surprises in the recent election," he told a reporter. "I have a four-point program that will have support of friends of the farmer in Congress who can remember the election results." Thomas will be chairman of the Senate Agriculture Committee when Democrats take over control in January. The silver-haired Oklahoma veteran says some of his federal farm proposals collide with those of Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan and other administration leaders. "There are a lot of people who merely want to get the cheapest bread and meat possible," he added. "They have not thought these things through. If low prices and depression hit our farm areas then the whole nation will suffer again as it always has in the past."

Thomas' program:  
1. A high rate of government price-supporting loans and purchases at or near 90 percent of parity prices. (A parity price is one computed to give a fair product the same relative purchasing power it had in a past favorable period.)  
2. Government construction and ownership of a nationwide chain of storage elevators for corn and wheat and warehouses for cotton and other crops. These would be used to store crops under the price-support program.  
3. Revision of the parity-price formula to cover increases in wages paid to hired farm labor and to give credit for labor of the farmer and his family. This would boost the level of government price-supports under present conditions.  
4. Defeat of any international wheat marketing agreement that might force down grain prices in this country or result in subsidizing exports to foreign buyers.

## Marines Land in China—It's Their 30th Beachhead There Since 1820

**WASHINGTON**—(NEA)—The Marines have landed in China again.  
 The crisis is a new one—the Communist-sweep through northern China, but the operation is an old story.  
 It's the 30th time since 1820 the Leathernecks have gone ashore in China for their traditional mission of safeguarding American lives and property on foreign soil.  
 The 1280 Marines from the First Provisional Marine Brigade at Guam who landed from the USS Bayfield at Tsingtao this month augment 3600 others already there in evacuating American nationals. They followed in the footsteps of Marines who have helped maintain order in the midst of two revolutions, the Sino-Japanese war, and countless minor rebellions and riots during the Corps' long service in the Orient.  
 In all that time the Marines were drawn into actual field operations in only one disorder—the bitter Boxer Rebellion of 1900.  
 China's long record of internal disorders has been marked by frequent waves of anti-foreign sentiment, particularly under the Manchurian dynasty which preceded the present government.  
 In 1820 the United States opened trade with China, and Marines, wearing the leather neck guards of that time, were attached to the East India Squadron based at Hong Kong. During the next 100 years it was necessary to land Marines more than 30 times to perform the Corps' traditional function of safeguarding American lives and property threatened on foreign soil.  
 By 1898 anti-foreign sentiment had increased to such an extent that a Marine guard was established at the Imperial City of Peking (now called Peiping) to protect the American Legation there. This guard was withdrawn in 1899. The following year the Boxer Rebellion began and Peiping was surrounded by aroused Boxer forces, bearing banners which read, "Exterminate the foreigners and save the dynasty!" Marines helped the Allied Relief Expedition capture Tientsin and rescue an American naval force surrounded there, and the Marine unit led the successful attack on the ancient walls of Peiping, capturing the main gate

from Boxer forces which vastly outnumbered the Allied expedition.  
 Marines were assigned to the Legation Guard in Peiping again in 1905, and remained on duty there until the start of World War II. Beginning in 1925 Marines were stationed at Shanghai to protect the Americans in the International Settlement. Allied troops also were placed in the Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's campaign against the war lords in Northern China in 1927.  
 At the beginning of World War II the Fourth Regiment, known as the "China Marines," was withdrawn from the International Settlement at Shanghai and took part in the defense of Bataan and Corregidor. The 500-man guard at Peiping was captured.  
 In 1945 the Marines returned to China to enforce the surrender of large Japanese elements there. Several hundred thousand Japanese were disarmed and repatriated during the following year.  
 Marine forces were gradually demobilized and returned to the United States, but growing hostilities between Nationalist and Communist forces led to the retention of Marine units.  
 These units were employed to guard railways and mines essential to providing food and fuel to the starving cities of North China and to form "cease-fire" teams during the unsuccessful truce between Nationalists and Reds.

## Wright Brothers' Plane? He Seen It Onct; It Flew

**COLLINGTON, N. C.**—(NEA)—Johnny Moore may break down this year and go to the 40th anniversary celebration of the Wright brothers' first airplane flight.  
 He isn't sure whether he'll go left him terrified. I don't blame him.  
 Nevertheless, there were many dazzling and wonderful toys, and the kids were transported.  
 The accent this year is on mechanical toys—gadgets that move. Educators say the closer toys come to reality the better for children as they mature. The big-wheeled monsters of contemporary adult life won't come as so much of a surprise.

to the celebration in Washington, where the Wright brothers' plane has at last come home to the Smithsonian Institute, or to the ceremonies at Kill Devil Hill on Kitty Hawk Bay. In any case, he isn't particularly interested in seeing the plane.  
 "I seen it onct," he says.  
 That "onct" was on the morning of Dec. 17, 1903, and today Johnny is the only person still living who saw the historic first flight. In aviation history, he has suddenly become a very important person, but he'd rather go fishing.  
 Johnny isn't sure how he happened to be at the base of Kill Devil dune 40 years ago. He might have been tending a musk-

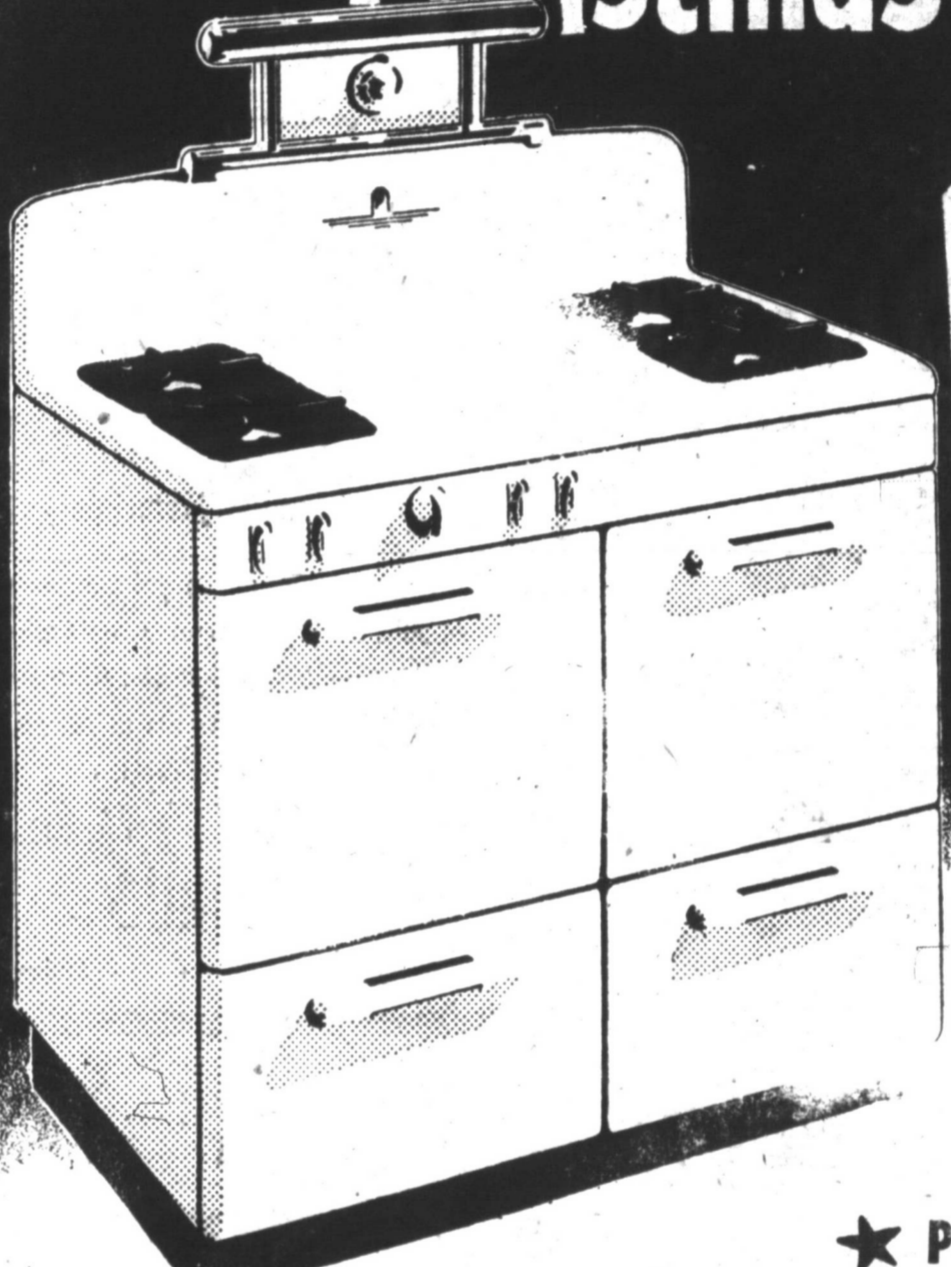


JOHNNY MOORE: After four flights, he forgot about it.

rat line, or going home to Collington Island after beach fishing. But he was there, a husky 16-year-old, and the Wrights needed another hand to help get their plane on the rail.  
 So he helped, and later watched the plane sputter incredibly into the air for a few seconds. The four flights that day didn't make much of an impression on Johnny however, for he had seen the Wrights practicing with gliders before that.  
 After the plane was wrecked in a gust of wind, Johnny went back to his trap line, or home, and forgot about the Wrights until others began to collect the souvenirs of Kitty Hawk aviation history and found Johnny belonged right in the middle.  
 He remained unimpressed. He never bothered to go to the annual celebrations at Kill Devil; the other fellows were always there, anyway. After a while, nobody expected him to show up.

But this year there is nobody left—who can fill the witness role except Johnny. So he thinks he'll turn up, one place or the other, on Dec. 17.  
 The rest of the time he's happy as a fishing guide. His fame has spread, and it's not unusual for people to knock on his door and ask if he's the Johnny Moore who saw the first flight.  
 Johnny gets up, reaches for his hat, and replies:  
 "Yup; that's me. Wants go fish-ing?"

Lohrey's arm is stiff and tired from signing proclamations urging citizens to eat rutabagas, be kind to tax collectors, or other assorted ideas. After signing as many as 14 such proclamations in one week, he wants the National Conference of Mayors to help him holler "uncle."

He would let the President of the U. S. and the 48 governors in the west for the glorification of an individual, or the promotion of some county's pet pumpkin, plus the hour or so it takes to greet the official delegation, pose for photographers, and shoot the breeze.

Lohrey isn't sure how far his idea will get. He was elected on a non-partisan ballot, and when he isn't mayoring, has a full-time job as personnel director in an auto plant. He's willing to concede that other mayors may not want to lose the parsnip vote, for instance.

But 14 proclamations in a week is getting out of hand, Lohrey thinks. At that rate there would be 728 proclamations a year (and 728 proclamations to sign.)

He'd be happy if the National Conference of Mayors would settle for 52.

### Third Smallpox Case Reported

AUSTIN (AP)—Texas' third case of smallpox this year was reported from Palo Pinto County last week, State Health Officer Dr. George W. Cox reported.

Dr. Cox said smallpox is now considered a "rare" disease in Texas, but warned that it "may again become a menace if continued vaccination of everyone is not practiced."

"Parents should see that their children are vaccinated by their family physician or by an official

public health department. Vaccination should be given early in infancy and again when the child enters school," Dr. Cox said in his department's weekly health report.

The report showed 221 new cases of chickenpox for the week ending Nov. 27. Other diseases for which a higher than average number of cases for this period of year were reported: measles, 458; poliomyelitis, 16; tuberculosis, 80.

**BETTER BOWLING**  
By BILLY SIXTY

SCORING: Keeping score in bowling might seem complicated and a little mysterious at first, but when it is all layed out in front of you you can't hardly see it.

There are two key facts to remember. First, a strike, marked in the little box with an X counts 10 just as a spare does, which is marked in the box with a slant line (/). Second important thing to remember is, besides the 10 you get for a strike, you add to the total the next TWO balls. And, besides the 10 for the spare, you add the total number of pins accounted for by the next ONE ball.

A strike is scored when you knock all the pins down with one ball and a spare, when it takes two balls to flatten them. When a strike is made, the pins knocked down with the next TWO balls in the next frame are added. If a spare is made, the score in the strike frame totals 10 plus 10 or 20 (see illustration). And if nine pins are removed with two shots, the score is marked 19 plus 9-29, the second frame box (see illustration B).

The pins knocked down with the succeeding FIRST ball are counted on a spare (see illustration C), and in case of a second by made to the first frame total, frame error the addition is mere as you can see.

Illustration D shows that in the case of three straight strikes, each strike counts and the score is 30 in the first frame. Here you may be confused: What to do with the two strikes still on the board. All you do is add to the "double" (two strikes) the pins knocked down—let us say you spilled nine on the first succeeding ball (fourth frame) giving you 10 plus 10 plus 9-29 (see second frame of illustration D) and you have a count of 99 in the SECOND frame.

With a single strike then remaining in the third frame, scoring reverts again to the marking shown in illustration A and B. To complete scoring, these markings are used: Split (s); split made to with slant superimposed on it; cherry chop (c); and a foul (F). In the case of a foul all pins is nullified and the pins are respotted.

## SPORTS AFIELD By TED KESTING

Behind the exodus of thousands of hunters to the fields and woods each fall there is a tradition established by such men as Daniel Boone, Davy Crockett and Kit Carson. They set a mighty example for American sportsmen that is alive today. But did Dan?

Where Boone walked and hunted later following a nation. A hunter's instinct sent him over the mountains where he hacked out the Wilderness Road so that others might come and hunt too. It comes almost as a surprise to realize that Boone was not a legend but a living man. Generations of American sportsmen have retold around the campfire the exploits of Boone of Kentucky exactly as Englishmen used to tell of the deeds of Robin Hood.

And first and last he was a hunter for game preservation. In the dying days Boone hated a hunter who killed more than he took away.

The habits of the Great Hunter changed little as he grew older, according to Moran Tudury, noted historical writer. Beaver trapping was always a special pleasure. Deer hunting, when he waited by the salt lick at moonrise, was something he never tired of.

His rifle, the historic, revolutionary "Long Rifle," which was fired by a flintlock, is said to have weighed all of 11 pounds, and the barrel alone measured over four feet in length.

The last days of Daniel Boone make a picture to warm the heart of every sportsman. An early rizer, he would sniff the air and take down the rifle. Then, in the company of his aged brown hound, he was off for the woods. Even a short time before his death, at 86, there was little hising them into the quarterfinal round of the Class A Schoolboy grid race.

Probably the outstanding player on the field was the Panthers' great back, Orval Davis, whose defensive and offensive work left little to be desired.

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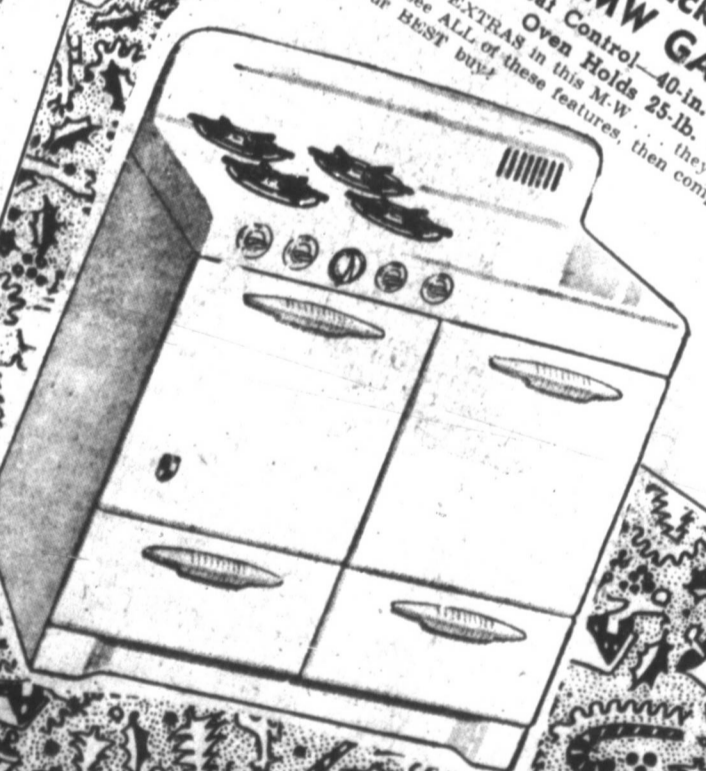

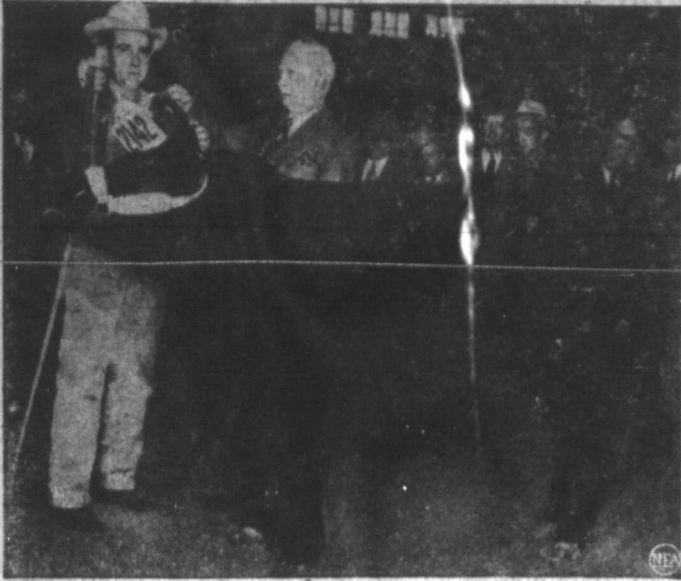

An acting governor after Gov. Beauford H. Jester leaves the state to attend a meeting at Wichita, Kans., Shivers would have gubernatorial authority to call the Legislature into session.

Kansas Oil Company To Be Dissolved

HOUSTON —(AP)— C.E. Wrightman, president of Standard Oil Company of Kansas, said assets of the firm will be disposed of as rapidly as possible.

Directors earlier this week voted at Wilmington, Del., to liquidate and dissolve the company and distribute assets on a pro rata basis to stockholders.

Wrightman said he holds 92 percent of the stock.

"We are a small firm operating primarily in Texas, Louisiana and Oklahoma and with a few scattered leases and royalties in Kansas he explained.

He said all properties, including leases and real estate, will be sold.

Day of 'King Cotton' Said Passed in South

CENTRE, Ala. —(AP)— The day when cotton was "complete king" of Southern agriculture is past, says Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan.

The result is a movement by Southern farmers toward "more prosperity and greater security," he said.

Gov. James E. Folsom introduced the secretary at a meeting of the Alabama Farmers Union here Friday night.

BOND ISSUE VOTED

ORANGE, Tex. —(AP)— Voters of Orange County yesterday balloted on a \$1,200,000 highway development bond issue. It would provide, among other things, a four-lane inter-regional military super-highway to be constructed under supervision of and partially financed by the U.S. Bureau of Public Roads.

Congressman-Elect To Fill West's Term

LAREDO, Tex. —(AP)— Congressman-elect Lloyd M. Bentsen, Jr., of McAllen was the only candidate on yesterday's ballot in a special election in the 18th Congressional district to fill the unexpired term of the late Milton H. West of Brownsville.

Bentsen was elected to a full term in the November general election. Philip A. Kazen of Laredo, who was defeated by Bentsen in the Democratic primaries, urged the election of Bentsen to the unexpired term following West's death.

The special election was called by Gov. Beauford H. Jester.

The district is made up of Cameron, Dimmit, Frio, Hidalgo, Jim Hogg, Maverick, La Salle, Medina, Starr, Webb, Willacy, Zapata and Zavalla counties.

Cotton Export Drop Threatens Surplus

NEW ORLEANS —(AP)— A dwindling export market threatens a cotton surplus and cotton is now selling about four cents a pound less than last year, says Ransom Aldrich of Michigan City, Miss.

Aldrich, chairman of a U.S. Department of Agriculture advisory committee, said that "cotton is the best fiber the world has ever known, and we must do everything we can to protect it."

The committee, meeting at the Southern Regional Research Laboratory here, is expected to recommend that some \$3 million in federal funds for cotton research be appropriated by the next Congress.

College Girls May Swing Brooms, Mops

NEW YORK —(AP)— Girls at Barnard College may have to start swinging brooms and dust mops in their spare time, or else pay increased rents.

Officials at the school said they had two ideas in mind:

One is to add \$50 to \$100 to the annual \$350 room rent at Brooks and Foyt halls. The other would be to cut service costs, by letting students help clean their own rooms and perform other duties.

### He Goes All the Way—8,400 Miles—to School



WAYNE WILKIN: Up in the air, he does his homework.

KENT, O. —(NEA)—Wayne Wendell Wilkin's big problem in getting his post-war college degree is distance. He has to travel 8,400 miles each week to attend classes.

Anxious to become an airlines pilot in 1940, Wilkin left Kent State University during his senior year to attend an aeronautical school. He got his pilot's

license but then came the war, transport duty and later a job as skipper with the KLM Dutch Airlines.

His first opportunity to return to Kent for his degree came this year when he was able to sandwich in classes between his regular overseas runs, a change to any other school would have meant the loss of credits and another year.

Here's the way Wilkin works it:

His airline flight is from New York to the Netherlands. On Saturday his Constellation leaves New York at 9:30 a. m. for the 17 1-2 hour hop to Amsterdam. Monday night he begins the return trip, landing at LaGuardia Field Tuesday at 11 a. m. After a little rest and a change of clothing he's back in a plane but this time as a passenger heading for Akron.

A good night's rest and he's ready for his first class Wednesday morning. His school week ends on Friday and that same night he is back in New York and briefed for his airlines flight to Amsterdam the next day.

"This may seem like a grueling schedule," says the 30-year-old bachelor, "but I find it the simplest way to get my degree. It actually has its advantages."

The advantages Wilkin refers to are the hours in the air he is able to devote to studying.

"There is a four-hour run between New York and Gander, Newfoundland, when I don't have to navigate. I study then and turn the ship over to the copilot."

Wilkin also gets in more book time as a passenger between Akron and New York and on Wednesday and Thursday nights at Kent.

Wilkin is preparing for the day when his flying career is over. He will receive a degree in business administration and then plans to attend Columbia next fall for a masters degree in international economics, rail and air transportation, and business organization.

Wilkin's flights for the Army and the airlines have piled up an enviable 1,300,000 miles in the air as pilot. He has crossed the Atlantic 160 times.

He doesn't count the time in the air as a commuter, but he qualifies as the champion.

### Department Store Business Drops

### Inaugural Preparations Have Capital Hopping, Writer Says

By JAMES MARLOW  
WASHINGTON —(AP)—Getting ready for President Truman's inauguration Jan. 20 has Washington hopping around like a man with firecrackers in his ears.

Those running the show figure about 750,000 people will see the inauguration itself or the parade that follows, either from grandstand seats or standing on the curb. The cost probably will hit around \$300,000.

Other millions of people around the country will follow it on their radios or over television. It will be the first inauguration ever televised. And the whole place will swarm with newspaper reporters.

Around noon on Jan. 20, Mr. Truman will be sworn in for his first full term in office by Chief Justice Vinson of the U.S. Supreme Court. The President's term begins that day.

Then Senator Alben W. Barkley of Kentucky will take the oath as vice president. It's not known at this point who'll administer the oath to him.

All this will take place on the east side of the Capitol, where for months carpenters have been building about 14,000 wooden seats in the open air.

The people who get those seats—free—will be diplomats, members of the Supreme Court, congressmen and senators, members of the President's cabinet, and others, all by invitation.

After he takes the oath, the President will deliver his inaugural address.

So much for what happens at the Capitol.

Then an inaugural committee—not connected with Congress—takes over. A parade will start at the Capitol and wind down through Pennsylvania Avenue until it passes the White House a mile away.

This parade will last two or three hours and will be full of soldiers, sailors, marines, West Point and Annapolis cadets, Army bands, Navy bands, college bands, the governors of states, and floats representing the various states.

In front of the White House, in a block-long grandstand, President Truman will review the parade, surrounded by friends and guests.

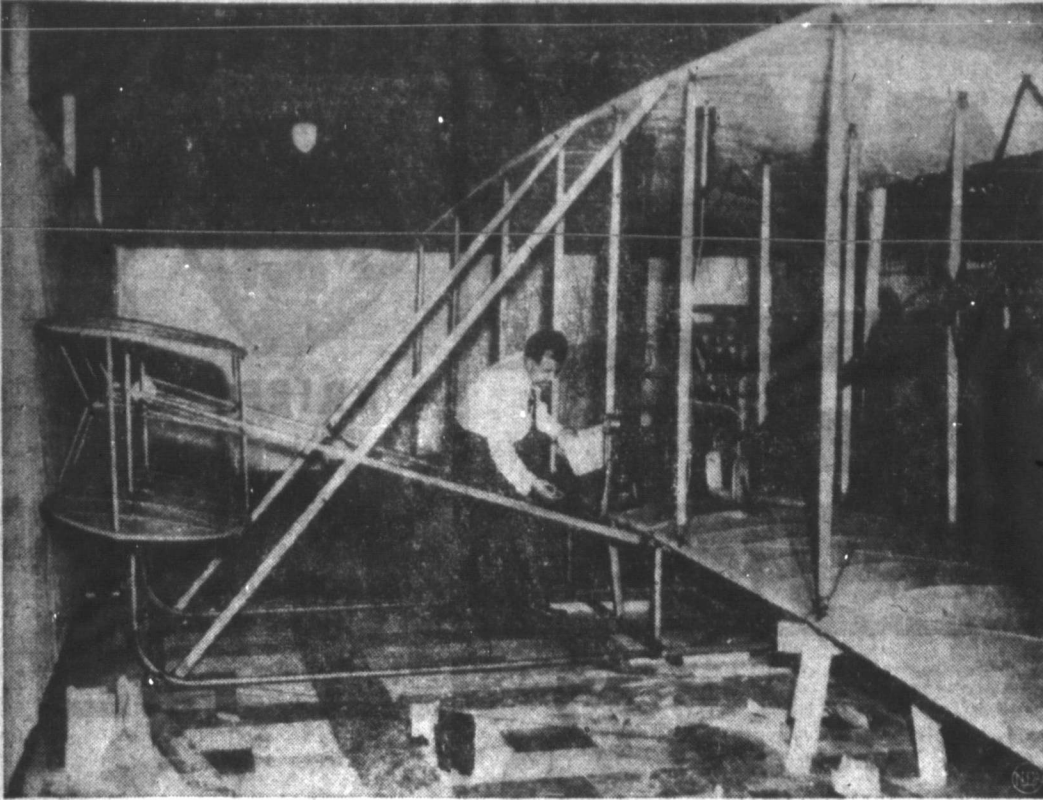

She hasn't had a garden since 1946 when she fell and broke her hip. But until then she would lay aside the crutch she used and plow her garden by holding the handles of the plow for support.

As for Atkinson, an old ex-Indian fighter, he remembers when he plowed with oxen, used wooden pitchforks and made harrows out of tree limbs. He came here with his father when Texas was still a republic.

The Atkinsons have one son, J. N. Atkinson of Shamrock, eight grandchildren and 16 great-grandchildren. They will hold open house Wednesday.

Mrs. Atkinson remembers her wedding dress—grey, striped wool alpaca, buttoned down the side with silk buttons. And when she met her husband, he was "packed in" two guns.

"We didn't take a wedding trip like they do now," she says. "We went to church in a two-horse buggy right after our wedding." Their first home, she said, was a one-room log cabin.

NEW YORK—(AP)—The Associated Press wholesale price index of 36 important commodities declined this week to 179.89 from 179.97 a week ago.

The base year of the index, 1926, equals 100. The current figure of 179.89 compares with 204.98 for the corresponding week of last year.

The food component of the index this week reached a new low for the year at 138.82, as compared with 140.83 the preceding week and 172.86 a year ago.

The industrial and livestock parts of the index also declined this week, while grains and cotton and textiles climbed slightly.

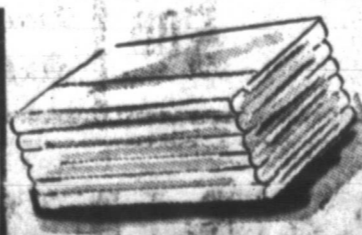

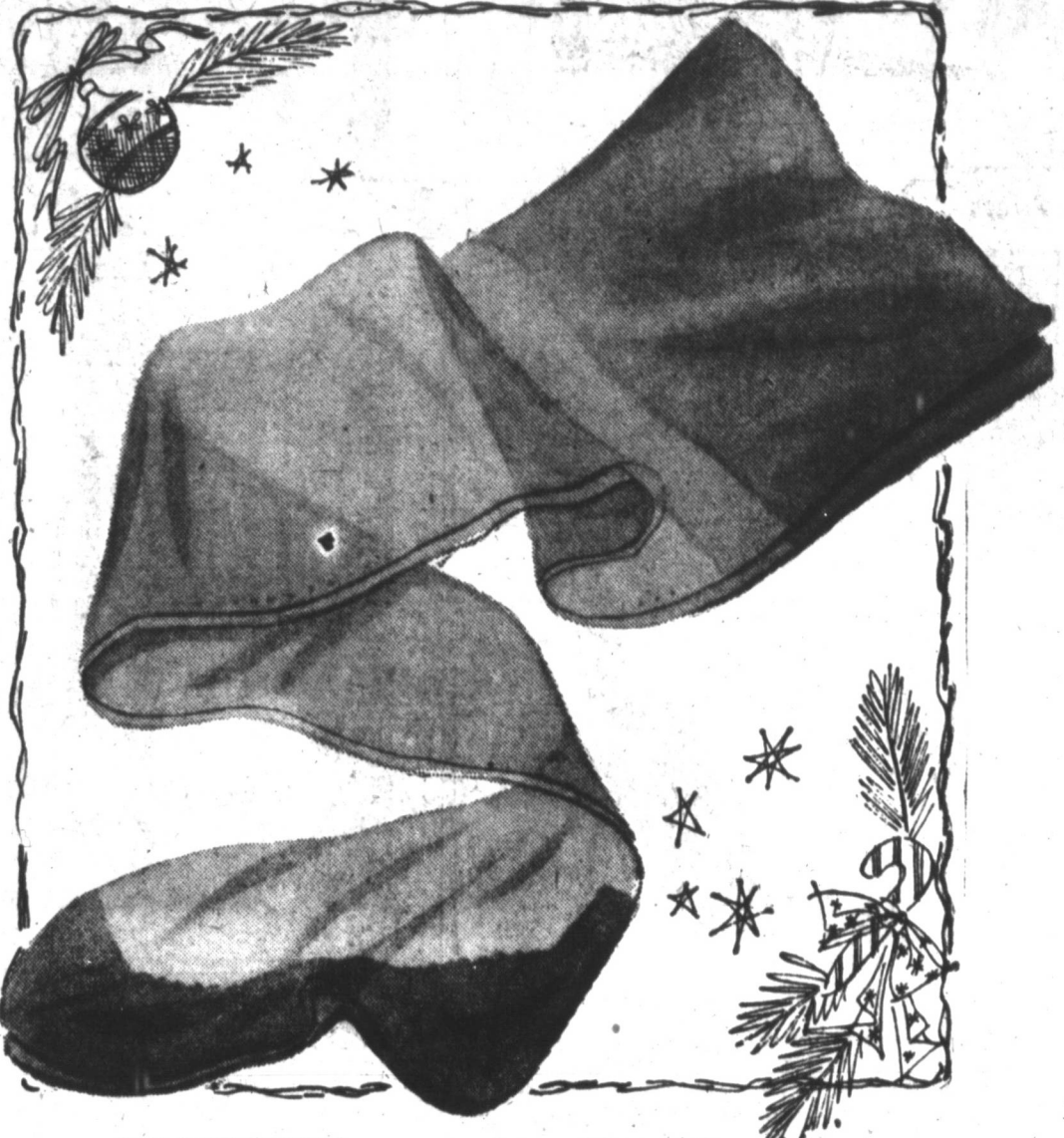

# Oil Boom Towns Just Aren't Like They Used to Be—Not by Several Jugful

RANKIN, Tex. (AP)—This is what passes today for an oil boom town. It's as quiet as your backyard.

Gone are the brawling boom days when poor men struck it rich overnight, when roughnecks drank bootleg whisky like water and fought in muddy streets for the sake of fighting.

That happened until the late 1920s wherever new oil fields were found, from Pennsylvania to California. It's still happening in Canada, oil men say, but in the United States the boom town

has grown stolid. Changes in machines and men and laws are behind the boom town's new respectability.

Workers used to have to crowd into an undersized hamlet near the field, or live in tents and bunkhouses on the job because their rattle-trap cars bogged down in narrow roads 'hub deep in mud. Now they can spread out, as far away from the field as they feel like driving over paved highways.

In the old times, hardly a day passed that a man wasn't hurt on a rickety rig. Now equipment

is safe, and tested to make sure it stays that way. Among today's roughnecks you'll find college men—petroleum engineers and geologists. They're getting ready to be executives by learning the horn-handled end of the business.

Wildcatters who drilled wells with barely enough money, do with that kind of money are going to find a place to spend it and people who don't care how they take it away from 'em. That's what made it rough. Ed (Kid) Wheeler, who claims he was "sort of the papa" of

in her lap, is still a peaceful town of ranchers and storekeepers.

If you are a little too young to remember what happened at towns like Ranger, Tex., and Ragtown, Okla., just after World War I, you can get a fair idea from the old timers.

"Mostly mud streets and dives, and plenty rough," says Tom Workman.

"Drillers used to buy room and board for two dollars a day. But they made 16 dollars a day. Men with that kind of money are going to find a place to spend it and people who don't care how they take it away from 'em. That's what made it rough."

Ed (Kid) Wheeler, who claims he was "sort of the papa" of

West Texas, says it was "gunmen and gamblers 'n bootleggers 'n women. Gittin' drunk and fightin'—why, it was just like goin' to the post office, just as regular. There'll never be another boom town like them—old ones."

Rankin's brand new oil field, the Benedum, is only 14 miles to the northeast. Oilmen agree it's a big discovery. A. D. Zachary, who has been a roughneck and tool pusher for 20 years, says it will take at least five years to drill wells in all the spots that have been proven since the discovery well was brought in last December. New test wells are being drilled north and west.

Yet there are few signs of a boom in Rankin.

on corrugated iron store buildings, a few businesses that weren't here a year ago. But in the middle of town stand vacant buildings—relics of an earlier boom that Rankin fended off in 1927 when a shallow oil pool was tapped nearby.

Rankin, a sheep and cattle ranchers' town since 1912, had 672 people according to the 1940 census. Now Sheriff Gene Eckols figures there are 1,800 living in town. Many newcomers live in trailer courts. County Attorney John Menefee says some \$15-a-month houses are renting for as much as \$100 because Upton County has never had rent controls.

But almost any farm town draws bigger crowds on Satur-

day night than Rankin does. You may see a few cowboys ambling along Main Street, which still has bits of boardwalk splicing its strips of concrete sidewalk together. Along about supper time, oil workers in hard-toed boots give the cafes a brief rush.

But the dust, blowing endlessly off the West Texas Plains, is all that stirs much of the time. Different men see different reasons for the change in booms.

Roy L. Bell, the Santa Fe station agent, watched the Burnett boom of 1918 from the vantage point of Wichita Falls, 14 miles away.

"The oil fields are getting a better type of worker now," he

says. "College men, ex-GI's, more family men."

"Then there's living conditions. Most workers live in towns now and drive to the field. They used to live on the job for maybe months at a time. When they got to town, the lid blew off."

"I don't know that the men we get now are higher type," Zachary says. "But they're better educated, and they're used to better things."

And, says Kid Wheeler, there's "too much law." "There was a couple of towns in Oklahoma—Ketter and Ragtown. They was the toughest towns there ever was. Why, they used to shoot men just to see 'em fall."

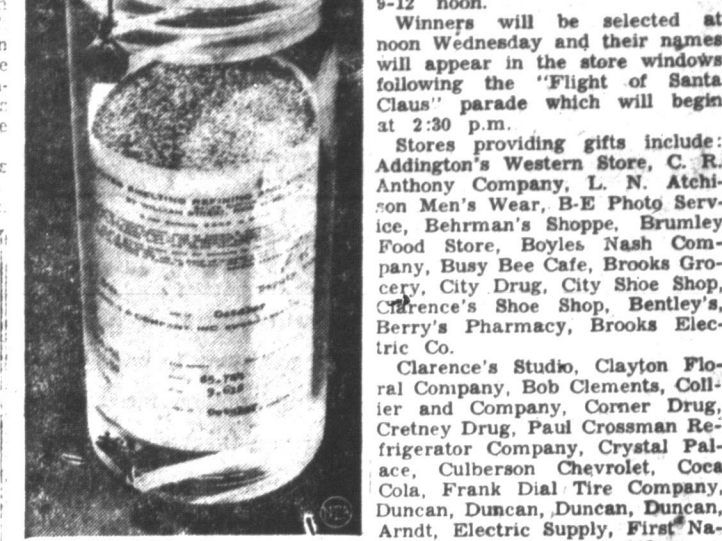

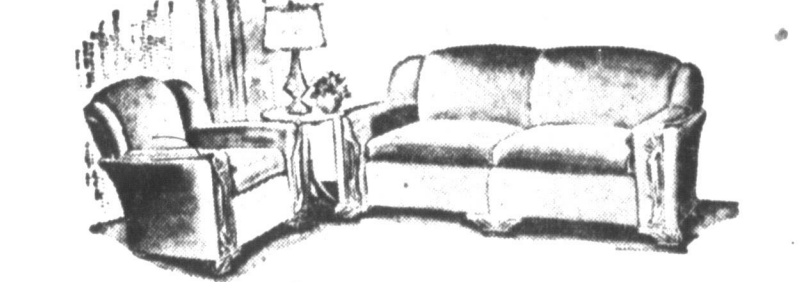

But most of the people of Iqir are content to be able to go to their fields with their camels again and enjoy the peace Father Andreas brought to their village.

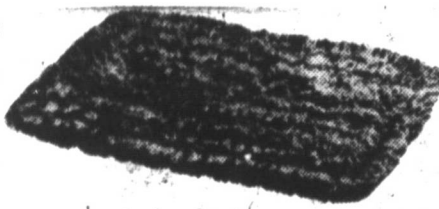

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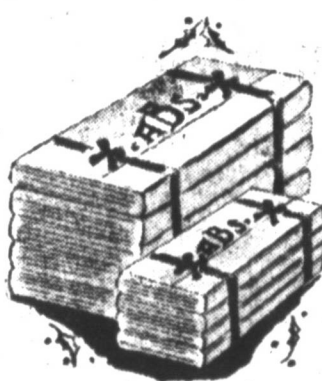

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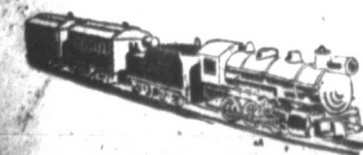
