## First Assembly Schedules Film Sunday Night

"The Jesus Factor," a film detailing the success story of the most successful drug-treatment program in the United States, will be shown at First Assembly of God Church, 512 South First Street, at 6:30 p.m. (today) November 20.

The pastor, Joe Stone, said the showing of the film is free to the public and he encouraged all interested persons to attend.

He said the 45-minute documentary film is introduced by Charles Colson, convicted former advisor to President Richard M. Nixon, and tells the story of a government sponsored research project into the effectiveness of the Teen Challenge program for drug addicts and alcoholics. Dr. Catherine Hess, who relates to the research, tells of her own skepticism of Teen Challenge up until the time that the study showed what she called "Startling" results.

"The Jesus Factor" was filmed at the Teen College Training Center in Rehersburg and shows the young men going through the program, in their classrooms, work areas, the chapel and during a graduation exercise.

In addition, some of the students share on film how Teen Challenge's Christ-centered focus has made the difference in their lives.

The government study spoken of in the film was conducted by National Opinion Research Center in 1975 under the direction of Dr. Hess. The movie contrasts the two to five percent success rates of government sponsored projects with the 70 percent success rate of Teen Challenge as disclosed by the study.

Emphasis of the service will be on "What Thanksgiving Means." The choir will perform during the service.

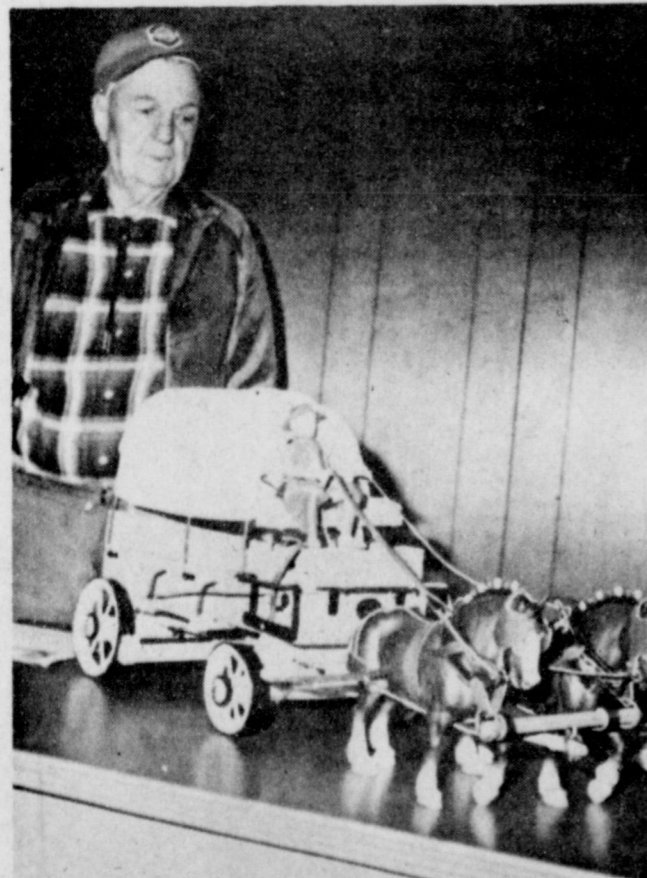
## P-TA Changes Meet Time To Evening

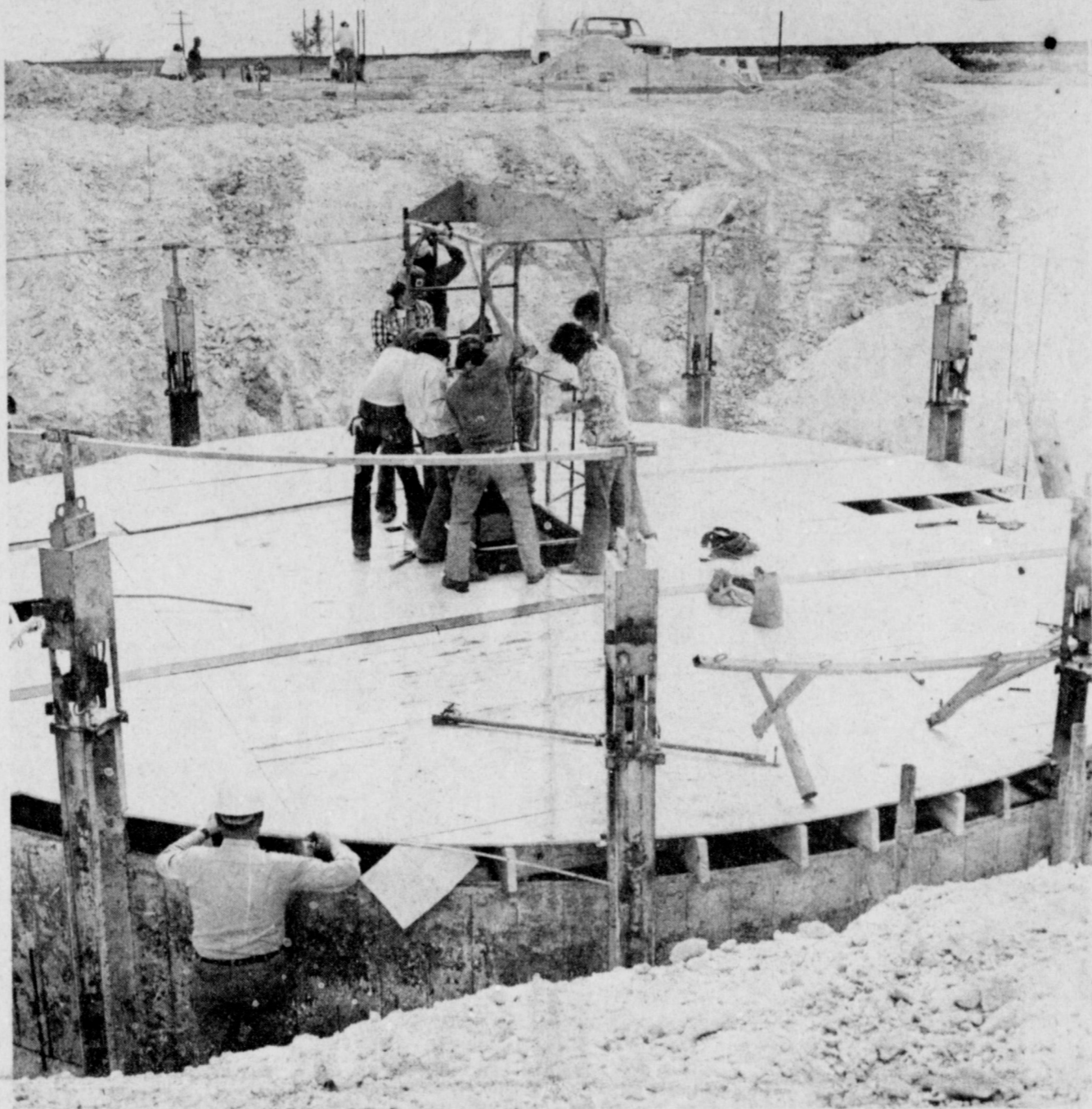
Changing from a regular after school meeting time, the PTA said they hoped to make it more convenient for interested parents to attend. The meeting is scheduled to begin at 7 p.m.

## Local Officers Join Search, Chase For Parmer Escapees

Shortly before 9 p.m. Tuesday, the dispatcher on duty at the Bailey County Law Enforcement Center received a telephone call from the Deaf Smith County Sheriff's office in Hereford. The officer asked for the help of city, county and state officers in the apprehension of two escapees from the Deaf Smith County jail.

He told the dispatcher that the duo had stolen a car and would possibly be enroute to Muleshoe where the father of one of the escapes resides.

City, county and state officers immediately set up roadblocks in the Muleshoe area, then later joined the chase and search for the escapees east of Clovis.

Included were Bailey County Deputy Sheriffs James Williams and Monty Phipps; city officers Leroy Sandefur and Chief Buddy Black; city officer Garry Burkhardt and THP officers Louis Cardinal, Larry King and Lyndon Huckaby.

Several of the officers worked through most of the night in the search centered in the Clovis area.

Jerry Lee Person, 24 of Naples, Fla., was apprehended following the chase but Raymundo Estraca, 26, of Bovina remains at large.

They had been incarcerated in Deaf Smith County jail awaiting trial in connection with the assault and terrorizing of a rural family north of Farwell last summer.

The escaped prisoners reportedly robbed the Carlile Truck Wash near Hereford and stole a 1977 Oldsmobile Tuesday. En route through Friona the two men were recognized and Parmer County Deputy Sheriff Bill Morgan was notified.

After a general alarm was issued, Texas DPS Trooper Glenn Fant intercepted the car east of Farwell on Highway 84. Fant, who was en route to Muleshoe, turned around when he spotted the vehicle and the high speed chase began-sometimes at speeds of between 80-115 miles per hour.

Farwell City Marshal Ronnie

Mitchell, who had also been alerted, was waiting for Estraca and Persons at the railroad tracks. They whipped around Mitchell's car and proceeded

toward Clovis. Fant said the escaped prisoners passed through two road blocks before eventually stopping their vehicle. He added that

the officers at the road blocks fired at Estraca and Persons as they passed. The Texas trooper said another road block had been set up at the Clovis city limits.

Fant also said that a Curry County sheriff's deputy was waiting for the escapees halfway between Texico and Clovis and the deputy fired at the fleeing car in an attempt to stop it, but the car sped on.

During the chase to this point, Fant said, "I was driving so fast I could not free my hand from the steering wheel to roll down the window in order to shoot at the fleeing escapees."

As the chase continued, Fant was riding almost bumper to bumper with the fleeing car, and Texico City Marshal Mickey Fenn who also had been alerted was following behind. Fant rammied the fleeing car two times from the rear and as it fishtailed, Fenn was able to pass Fant and swung his car horizontally in front of the escapees' car. Fant closed in from behind, attempting to "sandwich" Persons and Estraca between them.

## Local Administrator Asks For Assistance

"If the situation gets bad enough, we could lose doctors, however, I am not going so far as to say it would close us," said West Plains Medical Center Administrator Marshall Cook. Cook was speaking of new and stringent Department of Health and Welfare proposed "guidelines," which will close many small hospitals.

He asks for citizens to start a letter campaign to George Mahon, President Carter and to Senators to stop the proposed guidelines before they seriously harm the hospitals in the area, including the new facility at Muleshoe.

"We need action, and the need it now," reiterated Cook. He said that if the guidelines are imposed, such routine matters as childbirth would be eliminat-

## Electrocution Claims Lives At Circleback

At 5:39 Wednesday, J.E. Layton, a southern Bailey County farmer, called the Bailey County Law Enforcement Center to report the apparent electrocution of two men.

Bailey County Sheriff Dee Clements and Justice of the Peace Frank Ellis drove to the scene of the electrocution three miles south of Circleback. They found the bodies of two men lying in a wheat field.

According to Pablo Soliz, he was driving a pickup in the field as the two dead men, Mereljido Jasso, 26 and Rafael Davila, 45, were picking up aluminum irrigation pipe.

He told the sheriff that a rabbit had run into a 30 foot length of pipe and the duo picked up the pipe to attempt to shake the rabbit out when they touched an overhead power line. The line, which carried 7,200 volts, electrocuted the men. They were found by the sheriff with one man lying to the north and the other to the south of the pipe and beneath the power line. Sheriff Clements said the men's feet were approximately two feet apart.

Sheriff Clements said the men had been catching rabbits as they picked up the pipe and two rabbits were reported to already be in the pickup.

Both bodies were returned to Mexico and a list of survivors of the two men was not available.

## PEACE Justice Report

ed and obstreptical patients would have to go to Lubbock or Amarillo to have their children. Also, children could not be treated in the hospital here, as one of the new guidelines calls for a minimum 20-bed pediatric ward.

With one of the regulations calling for four beds per 1,000 residents, hospitals area wide would be competing with each other said Cook, in an effort to keep the required 80 percent year round occupancy.

He said the local hospital does not maintain an 80 percent occupancy year round, even though it was nearly full Friday morning. "We will have a definite problem with the distance involved to other hospitals if we are forced to even curtail our services," added the hospital administrator.

"The government itself is to blame for the increased cost of hospital care," he added. "They keep increasing the minimum wage requirements and require so many registered nurses per patient bed, along with technicians and consultants. We have to offer wages and benefits in order to keep operating."

The proposed guidelines would affect even the larger hospitals such as Methodist Hospital in Lubbock. According to the president of Methodist Hospital, even they fail to meet the criteria as proposed in the new guidelines and would have to go out of the obstetric business.

In a metropolitan area, 2,000 babies would be required to be born each year in a hospital in order for them to maintain an obstetric operation. The Methodist Hospital spokesman said they would be forced to close that area of operation as

During their regular meeting Friday, the Muleshoe Kiwanis Club voted to contribute money to help with prize money for the floats in the Christmas parade on December 3.

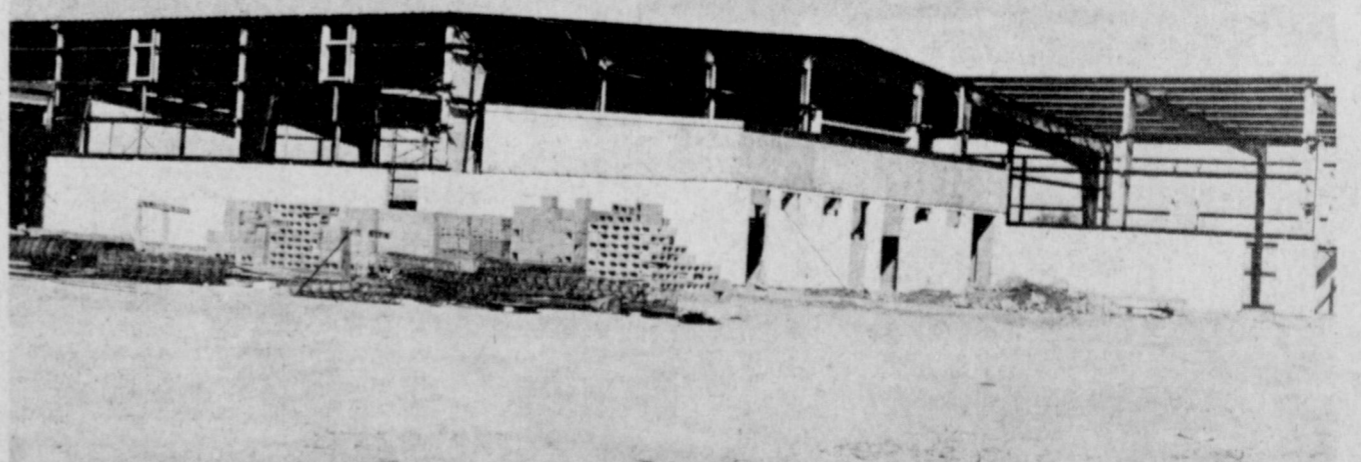
The also said they would like to encourage everyone who would like to enter floats in the Christmas Parade to make it "the best ever."

begins to take shape and will be completed during the winter. It is expected to be ready for use sometime after the first of the year, in time for shows and banquets to start off 1978.



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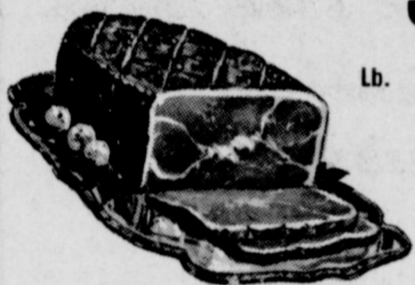

another two blocks before Estraca and Persons stopped their car near the Caravan Club and proceeded to flee on foot. Several shots were again fired. Persons sought refuge in the dumpster behind the Club, where Fant found and arrested him and turned him over to Curry County officials. Pending extradition, Persons will be transferred to Parmer County jail.

Fant said he did not know which man was driving, adding that the passenger in the car was hunched down on the floor. "It was impossible to see clearly into the car last night because of the back windshield of the car was tinted," he said.

Approximately 40-60 area law enforcement officers were involved with the chase and subsequent search for Estraca; but even though they searched the surrounding area for hours they were unable to find Estraca. Fant said the search would continue until the suspect is apprehended.

Following Persons' arrest sev-

eral area officers including Fenn and Mitchell were involved in another chase—this time over 160 miles of dirt roads and fields. Fenn and Mitchell were riding in Fenn's car throughout the chase which began near Clovis and proceeded to Broadway, Bootleg, Friona, the Rhea Community and to the north of Clovis area before they lost the suspect. Fenn said he did not know for sure who they were chasing, but that car had ran one of the roadblocks set up for Estraca and Persons. He was not sure if Estraca was the man or not.

Fenn said he totaled his car in a bar ditch during the chase.

they had 1,034 live births at their hospital last year.

Also, the cost factor involved traveling to the distant hospitals would greatly increase. One hospital administrator suggested that from their small city alone, to the south of Lubbock, patients would spend one quarter a million a year in just traveling expenses to get to a hospital in Lubbock.

The South Plains Health System says that only four hospitals of the area's 27 hospitals would meet the 80 percent occupancy rate. Also, a regulation that hospitals must not exceed 1,000 patient days per 1,000 population is not feasible. They said, "That is, if a community served by a hospital has a population of 1,000, the hospital can only have 1,000 patient days in the hospital per year. This could mean that hospitals and doctors would be told by the government when to send their patients home from the hospital, resulting in the rationing of health care without regard to need."

Also, to be exempt from all the proposed government regulations would be federal hospitals. Cook asked that everyone interested in keeping adequate medical care to contact a senator, representative and the president and speak against the proposed regulations.

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Persons and Estraca were to stand trial December 12 on five charges each, including two counts of felony assault, two counts burglary and one count of aggravated assault.

Parmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace said the two men had been transferred to the Deaf Smith County jail in Hereford September 22 after damaging the cell in which they were incarcerated here. He said they were apparently trying to escape when the damage occurred.

"I thought they would be safer in Deaf Smith County jail while the damage to the cell was being repaired because they have a better security system," Lovelace said. He explained that Deaf Smith County jail has a

night jailer while Farwell does not. "We have a woman dispatcher at night," Lovelace said.

Estraca, Persons and six other prisoners were cleaning out the Deaf Smith County jail's garage Monday night when the two men walked out a side door which had been left unlocked," Lovelace said.

The Parmer County Sheriff said the other six prisoners in the Deaf Smith County jail made no attempt to escape Monday night. "Instead," he said, "one of them notified the jailer that the two men had left the facility."

The jailer did not even know of the existence of the side door, reported Sheriff Lovelace. It was an exit for a small room in a garage. He said the mixup probably occurred because the Deaf Smith County jail was being rebuilt and remodeled.

Lovelace said the garage door itself was locked and could be operated only by a special electronic control which the dispatcher usually operated. According to Sheriff Lovelace, the jailer thought all the prisoners

were secure because the garage door was locked. Lovelace added that he did not feel that the escape was "planned," but rather a "spur of the moment decision."

The charges against Estraca and Persons stem from an incident which occurred in June at a farm house north of town. The two men allegedly entered the house, vandalized its contents, stole money and assaulted and terrorized the family.

A community-wide reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the men involved was started, and within a few weeks the suspects were taken into custody. Both were arraigned before Parmer County Judge Paul Fortenberry and were awaiting trial.

### Sunken treasure

**AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.)** -- Encrusted globs from the bottom of the sea are being "reborn" as valuable treasures from sunken Spanish galleons, thanks to a University of Texas laboratory working under a project of the Texas Antiquities Commission.

Within the past decade, UT's Texas Archaeological Research Laboratory has cleaned and preserved hundreds of artifacts (from cannons to crucifixes) found in three Spanish ships that sank in the mid-1500's off the Texas Gulf Coast.

Through complex conservation techniques it has devised, particularly in the use of electrolysis to preserve metal artifacts, the UT lab has acquired an international reputation for underwater archeology.

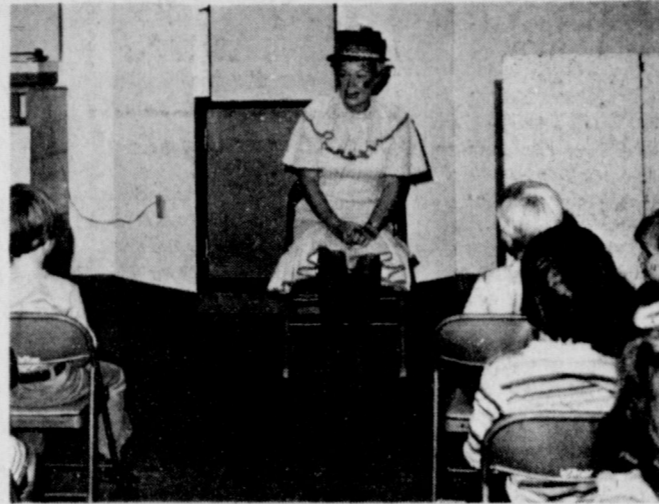

### Remote sensing

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.) — Whether they are mapping the habitat of Texas wildlife or studying forest resources in East Texas, at least 16 state agencies are using remote sensing techniques developed from research at The University of Texas.



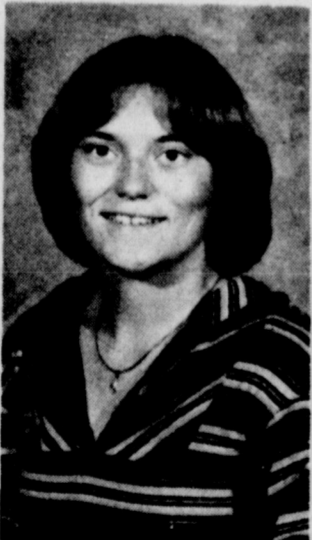
### Speech Group Hosts Tourney In Muleshoe

# Wild Birds Can Be Your Gourmet Fare

## SUGGESTIONS FOR COOKING WILD BIRDS

To cook fish-eating ducks, marinate in vinegar, wine or buttermilk. Older duck or goose

may be marinated in a mixture of 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1 tablespoon vinegar per quart of cold water for 4 to 12 hours in the refrigerator to improve flav-

or and tenderness.

Duck meat is at its best when served rare.

Meat of wild duck is darker and drier than domestic duck. Roasting with strips of bacon or in a covered roaster helps retain moisture and reduces dryness of less tender and larger ducks. In roasting or broiling duck, use a rack to keep them free from their own fat and do not baste

with fat.

Young goose is a delicacy and very little meat is wasted. The meat is rich, dark and lean. Old birds are tough and not easily tenderized by cooking with moist heat.

### ROAST WILD DUCK

3- to 5-pound duck  
Salt and pepper  
1 medium apple, sliced  
1 small onion, sliced

Wine or orange juice

Season duck inside and out with salt and pepper. Put onion and apple into cavity of duck. Place on rack of roasting pan. Do not cover. (If it is an old bird, cover for the last half of the cooking time.) Do not add water. Cook at 325 degrees F. for 2 to 3 hours or until tender. Baste occasionally with wine or orange juice. Remove apple and onion before serving. Serves 6.

### DUCK BARBECUE SAUCE

2 tablespoons chili sauce  
1 teaspoon lemon juice  
1 teaspoon hot sauce  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce  
Blend well. Baste duck with sauce while baking.

### STUFFED WILD GOOSE

1 young goose, 6 to 8 months, ready-to-cook  
juice of 1 lemon  
Salt and pepper  
1/4 cup butter or margarine  
1/4 cup chopped onion  
1 cup chopped tart apple  
1 cup chopped dried apricots  
3 cups soft bread crumbs  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/8 teaspoon pepper  
4 to 6 slices bacon  
Melted bacon fat

Sprinkle goose inside and out with lemon juice, salt and pepper. Melt butter or margarine in a large saucepan. Add onion and cook until tender. Stir in apple, apricots, bread

crumbs, salt and pepper. Spoon stuffing lightly into cavity. Truss bird, cover breast with bacon slices and cheesecloth soaked in melted bacon fat. Place goose, breast up, on rack in roasting pan. Roast at 325 degrees F. 20 to 25 minutes per pound or until tender, basting frequently with bacon fat and drippings in pan. If age of goose is uncertain, pour 1 cup water into pan and cover last hour of cooking. Remove cheesecloth, skewers and string. Serves 6 to 8.

### ROASTED QUAIL WITH MUSHROOMS

4 quail  
4 slices bacon  
1 tablespoon butter or margarine  
juice of half a lemon  
1/2 cup hot water  
1 3-ounce can broiled mushrooms, drained  
Wipe quail inside and out. Bind each bird with a slice of bacon. Put birds into a buttered pan and roast at 350 degrees F., basting occasionally, about 30

minutes or until tender. Remove birds and add butter or margarine, water and lemon juice to drippings in pan, stirring to make a gravy. Add mushrooms. Serve the birds on toast with gravy poured over them. Serves 4.

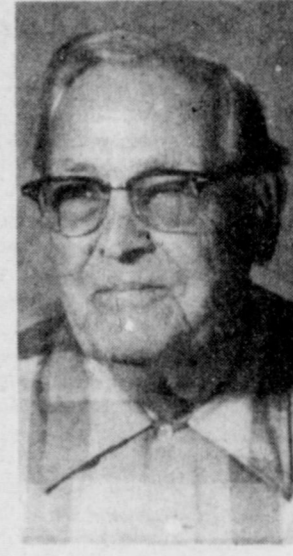
### FRIED QUAIL

4 quail  
1/4 cup flour  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/8 teaspoon pepper  
Dredge quail with mixture of flour, salt and pepper. Have deep frying-pan half filled with hot fat. Brown quail on both sides. Cover skillet and reduce heat. Cook slowly until tender, about 20 minutes once to brown evenly. Serves 4

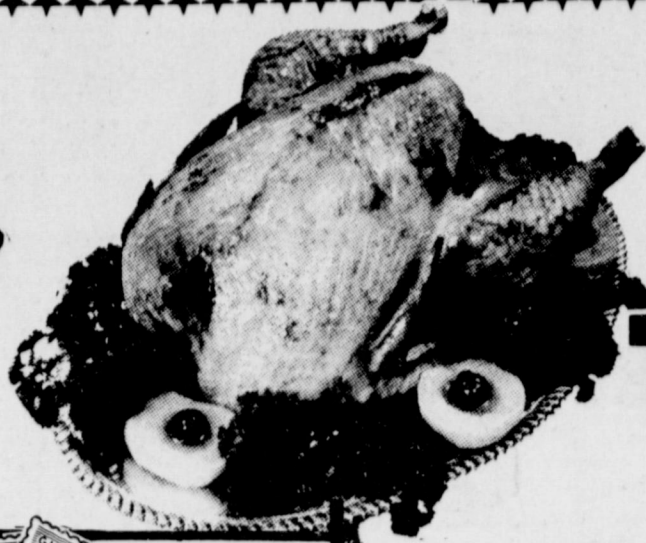

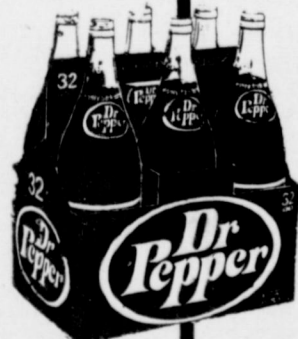
