

#### Electrocution **Claims** Lives At Circleback

At 5:39 Wednesday, J.E. Layton, a southern Bailey County farmer, called the Bailey County Law Enforcement Center to report the apparent electrocution of two men.

Bailey County Sheriff Dee Clements and Justice of the Peach Frank Ellis drove to the scene of the electrocution three miles south of Circleback. They found the bodies of two men lying in a wheat field. According to Pablo Soliz, he

ed and obstreptcal patients would have to go to Lubbock or Amarillo to have their children. Also, children could not be treated in the hospital here, as one of the new guidelines calls for a minimum 20-bed pediatric ward.

With one of the regulations calling for four beds per 1,000 residents, hospitals area wide would be competing with each other said Cook, in an effort to keep the required 80 percent year round occupancy.

He said the local hospital does not maintain an 80 percent occupancy year round, even though it was nearly full Friday morning. "We will have a definite problem with the distance involved to other hospitals if we are forced to even curtail our survices," added the hospi-

tal administrator. "The government itself is to blame for the increased cost of hospital care," he added. "They keep increasing the minimum wage requirements and require so many registered nurses per patient bed, along with technicians and consultants. We have to offer wages and benefits in order to keep operating."

The proposed guidelines would affect even the larger hospitals such as Methodist Hospital in Lubbock. According to the president of Methodist Hospital, even they fail to meet the criteria as proposed in the new guidelines and would have to go out of the obstretic business. In a metropolitan area, 2,000 babies would be required to be born each year in a hospital in order for them to maintain an obstreptic operation. The Methodist Hospital spokesman said they would be foreced to close that area of operation as Con't. on page 3 col 2



another two blocks before Estraca and Persons stopped their car near the Caravan Club and proceeded to flee on foot. Several shots were again fired. Persons sought refuge in the dumpster behind the Club, where Fant found and arrested him and turned hom over to Curry County officials. Pending extradition, Persons will be transferred to Parmer County jail.

Fant said he did not know which man was driving, adding ' that the passenger in the car was hunched down on the floor. "It was impossible to see clearly into the car last night because of

the back windshield of the car was tinted." he said.

Approximately 40-60 area law enforcement officers were involved with the chase and subsequent search for Estraca; but even though they searched the surrounding area for hours they were unable to find Estraca. Fant said the search would continue until the suspect is apprehended. Following Persons' arrest sev-

Fenn Said he did not know for sure who they were chasing, but that car had ran one of the roadblocks set up for Estraca and Persons. He was not sure if Estraca was the man

they had 1,034 live births at their hospital last year.

Also, the cost factor involved traveling to the distant hospitals would greatly increase. One hospital administrator suggested that from their small city alone, to the south of Lubbock, patients would spend one quarter a million a year in just traveling expenses to get to a hospital in Lubbock.

The South Plains Health System says that only four hospitals of the area's 27 hospitals would meet the 80 percent occupancy rate. Also, a regulation that hospitals must not exceed 1,000

patient days per 1,000 population is not feasible. They said, "That is, if a community served by a hospital has a population of 1,000, the hospital can only have 1,000 patient days in the hospital per year. This could mean that hospitals and doctors would be told by the government when to send their patients home form the hospital, resulting in the rationing of health care without regard to need." Also, to be exempt from all the proposed government regula-tions would be federal hospitals. Cook asked that everyone interested in keeping adequate medical care to contact a senator, representative and the

## Comptroller **Tax Experts Visit State**

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Thursday that tax experts from his office paid personal calls on more than 65,000 Texas businesses during the first two months of his taxpayer canvassing program.

Some 11,400 of those businesses visited to date--roughly one in six--required assistance with their accounts, Bullock said. Most of the problems, however, have been minor.

"But by catching these problems now and correcting them on the spot -- before they become big ones--we are doing the taxpayer a service, as well as ourselves," Bullock explained

He said that most of the businessmen and women contacted have been pleasantly surprised by the visits.

"We've had people who have been in business for years tell us that this has been the first opportunity they've had to visit face-to-face with a representative of the Comptroller's Office, president and speak against the the Comptroller's Office," Bullock said.

"Some of them, quite frankly, were somewhat surprised to find out that we don't have horns and carry pitchforks." The visits are being conducted by employees of the 40 Comptroller's field offices across the state. Bullock launched the program last September with the goal of visiting every business in
