Dozen Others Are Very Low From Tornado Injuries

RELIEF WELL UNDER WAY

Oklahoma Dead Now Number 22, With **Damage Huge**

(By The Associated Press.)

SAN ANTONIO, April 14. - A nado disaster was increased to 61 today as five of 93 injured brought here in emergency relief work yesterday, succumbed during the night.

TWO MILLION DOLLAR BLAZE LEVELS BIG BUSINESS BLOCK

MORGANTOWN, W. Va., April 14 .- An entire business block, located in the heart of this city, was wiped out by fire here today despite the efforts of scores of fire departments which were assembled to fight the flames.

The block, richly loaded with seasonable merchandise, was a severe loss to the big business located there, and the damage is variously estimated from \$1,500,000 to \$2,000,000.

It was one of the largest fires of a decade, and notable because of its narrow proportions.
