- 3 level tsp. Baking jowder. 1-2 level tsp. salt.

Melt the butter and said to the molses and milk. Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and spices, and add with dates. Put into a buttered mold and steam two and one-half hours. Serve with hard or creamy

SIMPLE CAKES FOR EVERYDAY Cakes for everyday in the week! Well, who would not be pleased to chew that this was to become a part of the daily menu planning.

Too many homemakers appear to consider that the meal proper consists of the savory dishes, the meats and vegetables, looking upon the desarts more or less as an extra-a food adjunct. A pleasing finish to top off a substantial meal—not fully eckoning as a part of the meal the calories contained in the slice of cake, the cookies, or the tart. If we stop to think of the food elements which go into these good things, especially the fats and carbo hydrates, we shall realize at once that there s a very distinct food value in this last course, and if a cake with its butter and sugar and eggs and hour is served, these must be taken into consideration and counted definitely as a part of the nutriment of the meal; or if that dessert be a starchy one, cut down a little on the starchy vegetables; if it is a pie with a rich crust, that in turn presupposes a proportionate reduction of the fat in the meat course.

Good homemade cakes are not dificult to make; having once mastered general proportions and methods of manipulation, it is easy to have all the variety we desire, for this variety is attained very much more by the varying of frostings and fillings, than by the difference in the cake itself.

Cake making has been defined as the art of combining flour, sugar, butter eggs, milk, etc., in such a way as to produce a palatable, delicious, yet nourishing article of food. A lack of knowledge of the "art of combining" has been the cause of many cake failures, even when the proper ingredients have been used.

Some pointers to remember when making a cake are:

1. Sift your flour first then measure it and sift it at least three times. with the baking powder and salt. 2) Cream your butter thoroughly, and then add sugar gradually, creaming the mixture meanwhile.

23. Add the sifted dry ingredients and the liquid gradually. Beat the batter hard after each addition.

4. Add the stiffly beaten egg whites last, and be sure that your cake is thoroughly mixed before they are added. The egg whites should be folded in very carefully.

Bartelome Martinez, as president on August 3, 1925. of Nicaragua in 1923, made the first request that the United States mar-1912, when they were assigned here. Martinez, a native of Muy Muy, an Interior Inrian village, as a conservative and vice president, became president upon the death in October 1923 of President Diego Manuel Chamorro, uncle of Emilano Chamorro. Martinez remained president until 1925, when a coalition ticket as elected.
