By 5 p.m. the wind-driven snow

had so cut visibility and made driving so hazardous that the Highway Patrol had begun issuing road warnings and soon after ordered Highway 152 closed.

Less than an hour later, visibility had been cut to zero, and KPDN had begun broadcasting urgent appeals for rooms for those stranded nere and for heavy trucks to assist stalled cars.

By 10 p.m. the violence of the snow had lessened somewhat but there was no slackening noticeable in the wind velocity.

The violent storm in Pampa was brought on by a general cold front that rolled southward across the Panhandle. By mid-afternoon the edge of the front had reached the latitude of Fort Worth and covered the remainder of the state before

Benny Switches Radio Networks

NEW YORK -(AP)- The Sunday night Jack Benny show switches from the National Broad-casting Company to the Columbia Broadcasting System next Jan. 2.


Date for the move, which had been expected, was set Friday. NBC and CBS had been struggling for the comedian's show, and trade circles quoted figures as high as \$4 million involved in the deal.

It was not revealed in the CBS announcement whether the move involved a "capital gains" lifetime transaction under which Benny would get a big lump sum payment for sale of his services and his Amusement Enterprises, Inc., as a business. A CBS spokes-man declined to say whether it was a "capital gains" deal.

There has been recent criticism n Congress of such performer "capital gains" transactions, which make the payment subject to a 25 percent tax instead of the higher personal income taxes from programs sold on a weekly of seasonal basis. Benny's show has been getting \$25,000 a week on NBC.
