Pampa City Commission approved ordinances up for adoption in a spe- cents per \$100 valuation. cial meeting Tuesday evening.


The first ordinance adopted was the annual operating budget and program of services for the city of Pampa for the 1992-93 fiscal year.

The second ordinance adopted was the levying of ad valorem taxes for the use and support of the municipal government of the city of Pampa for the 1992-93 fiscal year.

The 1992-93 operating budget has a net decrease in city property taxes, resulting from the one-half cent sales tax for property tax reduction and the \$4 million street improvement bond issue.

Congresswoman Millicent Fenwick dead at 82

BERNARDSVILLE, N.J. (AP) -Millicent Fenwick, who left her comfortable home for the halls of Congress at an age when most people retire, died today, her son said. She was 82.

She died at her home here, said Hugh Fenwick Jr.

Mrs. Fenwick gained fame in the 1970s for her independence and outspoken insistence on high ethical standards and prudent spending. The former model, editor and author of an etiquette book also was known as a pipe smoker, and as the inspiration for Garry Trudeau's Doonesbury cartoon character, Lacey Davenport.

'I was so hurt when I got to Congress. All the media would say was 'pipe-smoking grandmother.' And I would say, 'For God's sake, hard-working grandmother, same number of syllables.' But I couldn't persuade them," Mrs. Fenwick said in 1987, when she retired as U.S. ambassador to the U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization.

She said she took up the pipe when her doctor told her to give up cigarettes. Mrs. Fenwick was 64 when she was elected Republican representative from New Jersey's 5th Congres-

sional District in 1974. Her opponent in the primary was Thomas H. Kean, who went on to serve two terms as governor in the 1980s.

During her two terms in the House, Mrs. Fenwick fought for civil rights and curbs on campaign spending, often outraging her fellow representatives.

The liberal Americans for Democratic Action gave her a 58 rating in 1975 and a 65 in 1976. The conservative Americans for Constitutional Action gave her a 35 both years.

However, Mrs. Fenwick maintained that her voting record reflected traditional American values - that fighting for justice and the equal protection guarantees of the Constitution actually is a conservative position."

She was more often than not at odds with Republican President Gerald Ford. She voted to override Ford's veto of strip mining regulations, and opposed him on funding the B-1 bomber and aid to anti-Soviet forces in Angola.

Three years ago this week, President Bush announced his commitment on the War on Drugs. Three years later, despite efforts during the GOP convention to see a bright side, the results are overwhelmingly underwhelming. Now, some Democrats might claim that the Bush administration's effort has been only half-hearted. But in light of a new report from the Washington D.C.-based Drug Policy Foundation, it's difficult to fault the Bush Leaguers for not putting enough of the taxpayers' money behind the war.

Relying on data from the federal government, the foundation notes that President Bush spent twice as much money on this particular holy war in four years than the Reagan administration did in eight years. In fact, President Bush spent more, in four years, than all the presidents combined since President Nixon declared the first modern War on Drugs in 1971.

The Bushies, in four years, poured \$45.2 billion of our money into various aspects of the anti-drug effort. The Reaganauts spent \$22.3 billion over eight years. All the pre-Bush presidents since Nixon spent a total of about \$30 billion.

At the Republican National Convention, President Bush tried to validate such enormous spending by noting that "cocaine use has fallen by 60 percent among young people." That's true, but hardly the whole picture. Adolescents aged 12 to 17 were never heavily into cocaine. The National Institute on Drug Abuse reported a decline from 1.1 percent of young respondents to a survey reporting regular cocaine use in 1988 to 0.4 percent in 1991.

Looking at the larger picture, use of almost all illicit drugs had been declining during the decade before Bush took office. Despite the vast increase in resources for the Drug War, the rates of decline actually slowed down or leveled off. For example, so called "current" (in the last month) use of any illegal drug declined 39 percent between 1985 and 1988; the rate slowed to 15 percent between 1988 and 1991. Use of marijuana among 15-18 -year-olds had been declining by 6.6 percent per year since 1979. The decline leveled off to 2.5 percent per year between 1988 and 1991. Meanwhile, violent crimes and homicides increased every year. In Washington, D.C., authorities claim one of every three murders is related to the drug trade, meaning it can be traced to the policy of attempted prohibition. Even if the figure is only of in four nationwide, between, 5,000 and 6,000 people per year are murdered because the government insists on waging a War on Drugs.


Such invocations are traditional in the South, but the tradition may not survive. The state School Boards Association is suggesting that the practice be abandoned lest the high schools be sued.

Well, lawsuits can be fearfully expensive, and school funds are limited. Even so, perhaps funds could be raised to pursue the constitutional issue. It strikes me as absurd to contend that Dr. Turner's prayer threatened to lead to an "establishment of religion" in South Carolina. The idea is patent nonsense.

The leading case in this area arose in Douglas County, Ga., in the fall of 1985. Young Douglas Jager and his father, members of an American Indibeen delivered for nearly 40 years at high school football games.

In practice, the school would ask a local minister to deliver a pregame invocation. The games were played in school-owned stadiums, and public funds were used to pay for lights, maintenance and a public address system.

When the Jager family objected, school officials



attempted to find an acceptable compromise. They proposed an "equal access" plan. Student clubs would designate one of their members, or a local layman, to deliver an invocation. 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





Collider backers gear up

WASHINGTON (AP) - Backers of the superconducting super collider don't plan to rest on their laurels, now that Congress has all but assured the future of the giant atom smasher.

House and Senate conferees Tuesday earmarked \$517 million for the Texas-based project next year in a turnaround for an \$8.25 billion project that a few months ago was in danger of being scrapped.

All that's left for Congress to do this session is give final approval to the \$22 billion energy and water development package that includes the collider money.

Although the \$517 million falls short of the \$650 million requested by the Bush administration, it's a far cry from the House's vote in June to kill the project.

"I am hoping that this is the turning point, but I'm not relaxing," said Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas.

Collider enthusiasts are keenly aware that well over 100 new House members will take office next year - lawmakers who aren't beholden one way or the other, who aren't familiar with the collider and may be more deficit-conscious than their predecessors.

"My sense would be the crowd that's coming in January is going to be more fiscally conservative," said Rep. Jim Chapman, D-Texas.

In hopes of learning the answers, collider backers plan to invite new members of Congress to the Dallas area to get a firsthand look at the collider construction site.

In the project, scientists hope to learn more about the fundamentals of matter by crashing proton beams into each other at near-light speeds in the collider's 54-mile underground tunnel.

Chapman and Republican Rep. Joe Barton, whose district spans the collider site, predicted that the reduced spending will swell the eventual price tag and push back the completion date. "I think this eliminates any reasonable hope to build the project for \$8.2 billion," said Barton, predicting the project would come in under \$9 billion. Energy Secretary James Watkins said his agency was 'evaluating the impact of this reduced funding level on the cost and schedule of the project, and expect to make that information available soon.' To date, almost \$1 billion in federal money and \$227 million in Texas funds have been spent on the super collider, which is due to be completed in 1999.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Now that violent carjackings have escalated around the nation's capitol, the FBI is launching a national campaign to combat the alarming crime.

We consider carjacking a violent crime that deserves the full attention of the FBI," FBI Director William S. Sessions said Tuesday. "We have the mechanism in place to deal aggressively with this problem."

FBI officials said more federal manpower, decoys, gang infiltration and undercover sting operations are some of the moves under consideration.

"People treat their car like their home," said FBI official John Collingwood. "They have a sense of security there. Now that's being shaken.

Sessions said the fight against carjacking will be a top priority of the FBI's Operation Safe Streets in which 300 federal agents have helped form task forces with state and local police in 42 cities to combat gang and drug-related violence.

A computer study by The Washington Post showed at least 245 carjackings in the area between Jan. 1 and Aug. 16. Seven people have died in carjackings here this year.

But violent carjacking has been a problem for years in New York, Los Angeles and Detroit.

Carjacking in the Washington, D.C., area became highly publicized last week after a woman in a Maryland suburb was dragged to her death behind her car after it was stolen, and her daughter, a toddler, was tossed onto the street, still strapped in her baby seat.

A few days later, a teen-ager in another Maryland town was shot to death by an off-duty FBI agent in what police said was an attempted carjacking outside the agent's home.

"What we've seen here in the Washington area has certainly come to the attention of everybody," said FBI spokesman Mike Kortan. "We've had cases over the years in New York, Los Angeles and elsewhere, but the director felt the time



Top chef mulls retirement Hybrids result of nutritional improvement

PARIS (AP) - Is any restaurant worth waiting two months to get into?

Absolutely, say ardent gastronomes, who sometimes book at least that far ahead for a table at Jamin, chef Joel Robuchon's restaurant near the Eiffel Tower.

Now they're examining calendars for the next three years. Robuchon hints he may retire at 50.

"Yes, I'd like to," he said, adding modestly: "And I'm not necessarily the No. 1 chef.'

His credentials belie that: three stars in the Michelin guide; the highest grade, 19.5 out of 20, in the Gault-Millau; the Pierre Taittinger Prize, and the gold medal in what Frankfurt calls the cooking Olympics.

Food critics are dazzled by his talent and virtuosity. They describe his truffle salad as "breathtaking" and sigh with joy over his buttery mashed potatoes, an old favorite Robuchon brought back to restaurant fashion.

New dishes like cream of morels with Norway lobster inspire shivers of delight. One French gourmet claimed that tasting Robuchon's chocolate pie was the nearest she had come to heaven.

Fans say his set menus are worth every penny of their price - \$200 without wine. Eating a la carte can cost slightly less at Jamin.

Robuchon, slim and energetic, believes respect for food is essential to preparing it well. He treats lowly vegetables as fastidiously as caviar or truffles.

"I do love truffles," he said. "They're called the black diamonds of cooking, and you don't fool around with them."

The most important thing about the rare, fragrant underground mushroom is to fix its taste in the dish.

"But that's true of all foods, right down to cabbage or carrots," Robuchon said. "Making the most of flavor is what distinguishes a great

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

A native of Poitiers, where his father was a stonemason, Robuchon was training for the priesthood as a teen-ager when his parents divorced and his mother encountered financial troubles.

"I'd been cooking with the nuns at seminary since age 12 and found it was more like a game than work," he said, "so I went into it full time."

He began working at a roadside restaurant in Poitiers at age 15, then became a Compagnon of the Tour de France, an apprenticeship that takes young cooks all over the country to peel, chop, mop floors and learn.

In the 1960s, Robuchon worked at the Berkeley restaurant, a gastronomic hot spot in Paris. In 1976, he earned the title Meilleur Ouvrier de France, the most coveted award in culinary competition.

After stints at the Concorde-Lafayette and Nikko hotels, Robuchon bought Jamin in 1980. He quickly made the small, traditional

His wife, Janine, often greets guests in the restaurant. His grown son and daughter, however, have no interest in succeeding him.

Being a chef is a difficult life, Robuchon said, "but it's also a passion.

Like other leading chefs, he has a sideline. For Rubuchon it is working with Fleury-Michon, a big foodprocessing company, on its vacuumpacked dishes.

We practically have to do a side business just to run our restaurants," said the chef, who pays a staff of 40 to serve a nightly clientele of 45.

"And don't forget produce, the basis of good cuisine, which costs money," he said. "Any good chef spends 50 percent of his time hunting down the best raw materials. When suppliers start working in quantity rather than quality, you have to find new ones.

Robuchon sees a trend away from the so-called nouvelle cuisine toward simpler dishes made from flavorful natural ingredients, "the

LUBBOCK (AP) - A school committee is reviewing a collision between Texas Tech's horse-and-rider mascot and a referee during last Saturday's game against Wyoming.

Spence could not be reached for comment at his residence Tuesday night. After a touchdown, Spence rides the horse in a full gallop around a track circling the field at Jones Stadium.



Penn State receiver sentenced



Abrams and Ferraro battle to photo finish

Robert Abrams, New York's attorney general, claimed victory today in a too-close-to-call battle with Geraldine Ferraro for the Democratic nomination to oppose Sen. Alfonse D'Amato. Two congressmen lost, bringing to a record 19 the number of House incumbents ousted in this season of voter discontent.

Democratic state Sen. Patty Murray of Washington set a record of a different sort; becoming the 11th woman nominated this year for a U.S. Senate seat.
