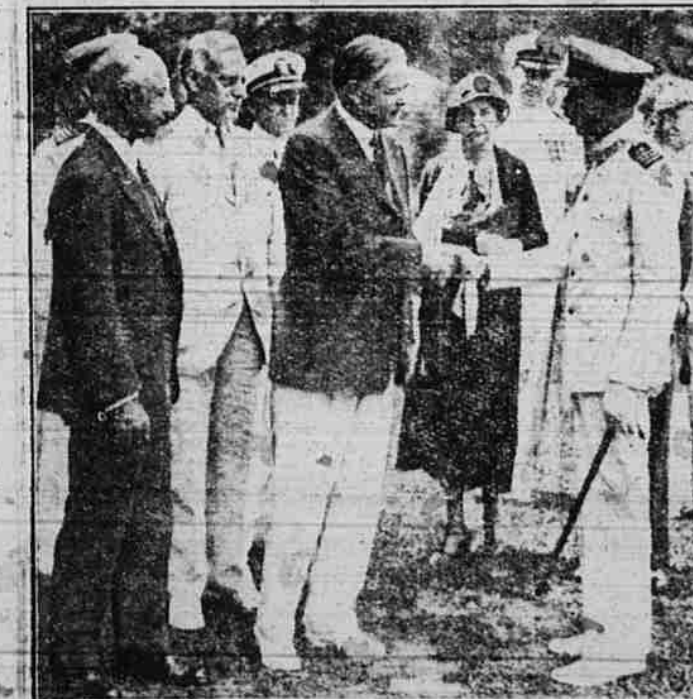

NEW YORK (UP)—The recent increase of 7 barrels a day per well in the East Texas area might have caused serious trouble to the oil industry had not major oil companies taken steps to curb the extra output. T. S. Hoke, petroleum engineer, declared today. "The price structure would have collapsed," Hoke said, "operators in every field in the country would have disregarded proration, and the result would have been receiver-ships and the loss of billions of dollars to the American investor had not the same executives who are responsible for the price of oil..."

It was unjustified. Operators who wanted it without thought of the good of the industry, worked for the protection in the primary of two members of the railroad commission.

HOUSTON (UP)—W. S. Parish, president of the Humble Oil & Refining company which has effected a 50 per cent reduction of its oil takings from three Texas fields, declared the state's resulting injunction suit "an interruption to an orderly program."

Allred and Assistant Attorney General Fred Parrish have in a Humble Oil injunction suit which would reduce purchases of crude oil as a move to override orders of the Texas Railroad Commission. Humble's order was announced last Friday and became effective Monday, affecting Danbath, North and East Texas fields.

Parish's statement follows: "The company was starting considerable oil which was necessary as the production from wells which it was conducting in excess of its own consumption, for sales to other. Rather than adopt another policy, and in order to avoid inconvenience or injury to its customers and to treat their oil the same as its own oil, the company arranged through the Humble Pipe Line company to ship its own excess production and to share the excess production of its customers over and above the amount that it should consume and sell."

This program has been interrupted by the injunction granted. We think, although we have not seen the court papers and are relying on telegraphic information from the clerk of the court. "Before the passage of the injunction, the Humble Pipe Line company had adopted and has since uniformly followed the policy of sharing its market outlet with its crude customers. We can not and will not purchase any more crude than we can consume. We regret that the interruption of an orderly program causes any inconvenience to our customers and will make every effort to dispose of the question raised by the injunction as soon as possible."
