## Ruling upholds PHS grad policy

#### Students failing TAAS test can't participate in ceremony

By DAN FROMM and CHERYL BERZANSKIS

Six Pampa High School seniors will not be allowed to participate in graduation ceremonies Saturday evening, ruled 223rd District Court Judge Lee Waters today.

The ruling answered the question whether the students, all of whom have not passed the Texas Assesscommencement exercises, in view of the fact that all other requirements for graduation had been met. Waters said that no constitutional PISD should be lifted. right existed to attend a specific graduation ceremony.

"While I am sympathetic to the students, I do not believe it is within my power to order the district to allow them to attend the ceremonies," he said.

Presenting arguments before Waters were attorney Richard Todd of Borger, who represented plaintiffs Alisha Henson, Anna Belt, Dennisa Taylor, Amy Alexander, Valeria Albear and Kelly Haines.

Representing Pampa Independent School District and Dawson Orr was Pampa attorney Ken Fields.

Waters issued the restraining order Monday against PISD ordering them to allow the plaintiffs participation in Saturday's commencement exercises.

Waters' decision came after the first stage, which ended the hearing. Because the decision determined the students had no constitutionally-protected right to participate in a specific graduation exercise, the second two stages were not addressed.

Todd based arguments on the 14th amendment to the U.S. Constitution which says that individuals may not be deprived of their right to life, liberty or property without due process of law. 



Corpus Christi Caller-Times on Texas school finance: Up in Austin, House and Senate conferees last week agreed on a \$70 billion state budget for the coming biennium. It's balanced ... and that's virtually the only good thing that can be said about it.

Certainly some kind of budget is better than no budget at all but the product of the House and Senate conferees is an embarrassment. It is woefully inadequate to the state's existing needs, let alone the demands that must be met if the state is to grow and flourish in an increasingly competitive environment ...

If it goes through, the great state of Texas will be skimping on public school students and on its neediest citizens — again. It will also, not incidentally, be sowing the seeds of future problems which will eventually require expensive remedies.

**Houston Chronicle on Proposed Energy Tax:** 

Getting rid of the onerous Btu tax is absolutely critical to the economic health of Texas and other energy-producing states. The tax, based on the heat content of energy sources, as measured in British thermal units, would be more than twice as high on oil as on other fuels.

This would figure to be little short of a disaster for Houston and Texas. It would eliminate several hundred thousand energy-sector jobs, while costing the nation an estimated \$35 billion in industrial output and hitting the average family with an estimated \$475 in additional costs per year. Former Energy Secretary James Schlesinger says that the oil industry alone would pay about \$20

The Senate proposal spells it out for the (Clinton) administration: Besides shifting the tax burden unfairly on Sun Belt and energyproducing states, the proposed Btu tax is a guaranteed job killer and recovery buster. The way to shrink the federal budget deficit is by cutting government spending

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
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## Gramm's an early starter


I told my guest I thought his keynote address last year a great speech. He replied, "You know, the media hated it, just hated it."

Why? Because, said Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas, who is running for president, his talk was conceived to help George Bush. It was aimed at rednecks ("I am one") and ethnics. It might have worked if it had been delivered by President Bush, seeking renomination, because it was wholly Bush-oriented.

"Besides, there was the problem of the Texas delegation, which was seated directly in front of me," Gramm continued. Why was that a problem? "Because every word I uttered got them laughing or applauding. I got the idea the speech was great!" But he learned that he didn't come through as "likable."

Gramm does not smile, non-stop, like Bill Clinton - i.e., from the moment be brushes his teeth in the morning until the moment he brushes his teeth at night. That much is true. But the smile, for its rarity, is the more engaging. Gramm is helped by the lilt of a Texas twang. The cadences are those of John Wayne, with a touch of the self-effacement of Jimmy Stewart. And his opinions, coming through in that folkloric mode, burn deeper in the memory, as if one were to hear a lecture by Lord Keynes speaking with a Southern accent. It isn't the kind of thing one expects from a Ph.D. in economics who was a full professor (Texas A&M) when he went into politics.

What are the chances of beating Clinton's tax package? Answer: A lot depends on whether Kay Hutchinson (the Republican candidate for Lloyd Bentsen's Senate seat) wins in Texas, especially if she wins big, in which case a very clear signal is sent to Southern Democrats and moderates everywhere. 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

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#### Jury gets racially charged shooting case

of Miami waited as a jury 230 miles ing crash. to the north deliberated in the manslaughter retrial of a police officer who shot a speeding black motorcyclist, igniting a 1989 race riot.

In closing arguments Thursday, Officer William Lozano's defense attorney claimed he acted in selfdefense when he fired the fatal shot - an assertion dismissed by prosecutor Jerald Bagley.

"He points, he aims, he tracks, and he fires one shot," Bagley said, standing before the six-member jury with his hands together and arms outstretched. "That's an intentional act."

Lozano lawyer Roy Black appealed to the jurors' emotions about the dangers to police officers in high-crime areas' such as the predominantly black Overtown neighborhood where the shooting took place.

"Today, it seems the criminal is right and the police officer is wrong," Black said. "That's the 'Alice in Wonderland' world that our police officers operate in. If the demagogues and politicians succeed in making this a crime, God help us all."

The jury of three whites, two Hispanics and one black recessed after deliberating three hours without reaching a verdict. Jurors were to resume deliberations this morning.

Circuit Judge W. Thomas Spencer has ordered a four-hour delay in the reading of the verdict. But if it is reached after 5 p.m. on any day, it won't be announced until the next morning. The jury will deliberate through the Memorial Day weekend if needed, court officials said.

Lozano was charged with two counts of manslaughter in the deaths of the motorcyclist and his passenger, with each count punishable by five years in prison.

He was convicted by a Miami jury in December 1989, but an appeals court ordered a new trial, ruling the panel was influenced by the possi-

The retrial ultimately was moved to Orlando in hopes of getting a more impartial jury.

In Miami, torn by riots four times in the 1980s, televisions in offices, schoots and restaurants have been tuned to live coverage of Lozano's retrial.

National Guard troops, activated late Wednesday by Gov. Lawton Chiles as the case headed to closing arguments, trickled into a downtown armory to pick up riot gear.

A National Guard commander would not say how many troops were sent to Miami.

## Check-out stand charms appeal to supernatural

**By DAVID BRIGGS Associated Press Writer** 

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NEW YORK (AP) - Elvis sightings, alien spaceships and bizarre prophecies are some of the staples of supermarket tabloids, but forays into supernatural realms are not limited to the news pages.

Don't like that voodoo that you do? A display ad for the "7 Voodoo Mojo Bag selling for \$100. Magic Dolls" claims they offer power "so great ... it is not to be

Unlucky in love, the charms of both the "Love Wanga No. 302" and the "Breakup Wanga No. 314" problems? There is a "Wanga" doll to meet nearly every need: "Success Wanga No. 301," "Money Wanga No. 303," "Jinx Remover Wanga No. 308" and the "Exorcist Wanga No. 311."

To learn more about the supernat- Angel" ignore the ads in tabloids lining supermarket check-out stands, say scholars who are exploring areas that have often been considered beneath academic inquiry.

"They (the tabloids) speak for a large number of people," said Elizabeth Bird, a sociologist at the University of Minnesota.

"At the ground level, a lot of people are sort of groping and trying for anything," she said.

But the eclectic natures of the products and the fact advertisers pend up to tens of thousands of dollars pitching them to a national audience indicates a willingness on the part of many Americans to dolls are offered for sale. Other believe in a variety of supernatural means to bring instant success.

Only a third of the ads refer to a specific religious or cultural heritage, and those that did were divided across a variety of traditions ranging from popular "Guardian pins to "Amazing ural beliefs of Americans, don't Aladdin's Magic Lamp," Ciraolo found.

The most frequently occurring claim in the ads is that the product will make the person rich, whether by providing luck in the lottery or less specific means that will enable them to pay off debts, buy a new car and jewelry or acquire a boat.

Providing love and affection is the next most frequent claim made by the advertised products, Ciraolo said. While consumers often are motivated by "fairy tale" desires, scholars say, the ads offer some lessons for organized religion.

"The more established churches probably are underestimating people's need," Ciraolo said in an interview. "The biggest need is the need to hope, to focus on the

But denominational leaders should not fear that the interest in magical talismans and amulets indicates a massive turn to New Age spirituality, said-Bird, author of "For Enquiring Minds: A Cultural Study of Supermarket Tabloids.'

The tabloid reader in general would view New Age activities as more for trendy, middle-class liberals, Bird said. She said they would feel closer to older elements of folk religion such as astrology, voodoo and witchcraft.

In an age when there are increasing reports of phenomenon such as apparitions of Mary, she said perhaps some traditional churches may be underestimating "the need for hands-on experience" in spirituality through objects and rituals.

The tabloid ads promising wealth by supernatural means also are a sign of the vulnerability many people have to religious claims of quick riches, scholars said.

Among the more obvious examples are products such as the 'Lucky U.S. Jesus Dollar Bill" and the "Money Drawing Buddha."

"There's a lot of desire to become rich, to become famous, to become beautiful," Bird said. "People perceive that religion and wealth and money are tied up a lot in American culture.'





#### First Lady gets first-rate coif

NEW YORK (AP) — There's news behind the photograph of Hillary Rodham Clinton on the cover of Family Circle magazine: The publication spent \$2,000 to fly Beverly Hills hair stylist Cristophe and a makeup artist to Washington to groom the first lady before the photo session.

The two have traveled to the White House at least twice to coif and colorize Mrs. Clinton for magazine covers, The New York Times reported today.

For the May issue of Family Circle, the magazine paid fees and air-plane travel costs for the hair and makeup stylists amounting to \$2,000, the editor in chief, Jacqueline Leo, told The Times.

And the Los Angeles Times Magazine paid \$750 to cover some of the costs of flying in the California duo for the portrait of Mrs. Clinton that adorned a cover last Sunday, the newspaper reported.

In both cases, the publications paid for the hair and makeup at the suggestion of Mrs. Clinton's press secretary, Lisa Caputo, or Neel Lattimore, a deputy press secretary, The Times said.

The practice is common among magazines, although the \$2,000 paid by Family Circle, "exceeded the industry average for editorial photographs," Leo said.
