



Turkish Women Sing Western Songs Now







The Associated Press.) CHICAGO, April 6 .- Chicago has et out another hole in its belt, by annexing Mount Greenwood, a southwest suburb of two square miles and 5,000 persons.

The population of the 24-Itp city proper is about 3,600,000 but a million more live in the 200 suburbs which extend in a half moon South 24-Stp about the metropolis.
