High-ranking Egyptian and Israeli military officials met in a tent for 412 hours Thursday during a raging sandstorm along the Cairo-Suez highway. 60 miles from Egypt's capital.

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The government is preparing to mail in early January the first checks providing a guaranteed minimum income to 3.2 million aged, blind and disabled Americans. But that is only half the number earlier expect-

Officials said a program to locate eligible recipients was behind schedule but that the planned level of 6.2 million Americans still could be brought into the program during 1974

The program, called Supple mental Security Income (SSI) involves a federal takeover of 1.152 differing state and local welfare programs for needy persons who are 65 years or older, blind or disabled

About half the states provide higher welfare payments than the new federal amounts, but the law passed by Congress last year guarantees that no recipient transferred to SSI rolls will suffer any cutbacks.

In place of state and local Dixon said acting attorneys benefits will be a minimum federal cash payment of \$130 a 30 days six times since 1881 month for individuals and \$195 for couples. These are scheduled to rise to \$140 and \$210 each next July

This is our \$6.500 monkey. Lipton said, releasing the small monkey's head. "It really cost about \$55, but it's worth 100 times that in research we've conducted with it.

Lipton, assistant professor in the Department of Physiology at the University of Texas ure Southwestern Medical School, is conducting research into a particular body mechanism that controls fever in squirrel monkeys-and humans.

He believes he has found not only one, but two, thermo regulatory centers in the brain.

The primary thermostat is in the temperature sensitive cells in the preoptic anterior hypothalamic region at the base or floor of the brain." Lipton said. That part of the brain seems to play a great part in temperature control.

Lipton said if the preoptic region is heated, body temperature decreases and if

Kohoutek Comet Nearing Earth

By United Press International Kohoutek the "comet of the century," isn't putting on much. of a show yet but as it gets closer to the sun in the next few weeks, astronomers expect most folks will be able to see a

dazzling display of lights. Donald Ehlers, director of the Southern Connecticut State College's planetarium and observatory, says the comet could turn out to be only a blurry white haze to the human eye.

Some experts have said Kohoutek, discovered last spring, will be even more brilliant than Halley's comet. which streaked across the sky in 1910

However, Ehlers said, "Comets are unpredictable. It's difficult to forecast with certainty how the comet will appear until it actually hap-

As the comet draws closer to Earth during the next few days. it will be visible nearer and nearer to dawn. Ehlers said. The contrast will be less as the

The comet is scheduled to be at its closest point to the sun Dec. 28

In the weeks following when Kohoutek enters the evening Ehlers said, the tail which is the comet's most exciting characteristic, will be pointed generally away from

Ehlers said that in succeeding weeks the tail's length will begin to diminish as the comet

draws away from the sun. The astronomer said the comet should become visible about 4:30 a m. late this month in the southeastern horizon.

Lipton said he believes the medulla oblongatta is the secondary thermostat. He said when this particular region is heated or cooled, the same effects occur in body temperat-

"It's not the quite same as the preoptic region." Lipton said. 'It behaves as though it's a secondary mechanism-probably left over from evolutionary ancestors who had poor regula-

Lipton said early man depended almost solely on behavioral thermo regulation. or the conscious experience of heat and cold.

'That is, they didn't have sweating or panting," he said. "They moved from a hot to a cold place and so on. The desert animals are an example of

Therefore, Lipton said, early men had a broad band of thermo regulation rather than the fine physiological thermo regulation, such as sweating, as modern man possesses.



Communists Shoot **Rockets Into Base**

SAIGON (UPI) - Communist troops fired 25 Soviet-made rockets into the Pleiku air base in the Central Highlands late today, the second rocket attack against a government air base this month, military sources

In Cambodia, government troops launched major attacks early today against insurgent positions around a 12-mile stretch of strategic Highway 4 in an attempt to break a twoweek rebel hold on the road.

Military sources in Saigon said 21 people-13 soldiers and eight civilians-were wounded in the four-hour attack on the Pleiku base 230 miles northeast of Saigon

One aircraft of unspecified type was destroyed along with two fire trucks and a warenouse, the sources said

There was no immediate confirmation of the attack from. either the South Vietnamese command or the Viet Cong. However, another independent source confirmed that there was "some kind of shelling attack at Pleiku today.

Sr. Col. Vo Dong Giang. deputy chief of the Viet Cong delegation to the Joint Military Commission, told a news conference early this month that the Viet Cong would strike against any government air base used to bomb Communistheld territory

A few days later, on Nov. 6, 35 rockets hit the big Bien Hoa Air Base 14 miles northeast of

The youth was bitten when his hand slipped from the rubber cup while milking the snake in his home, police said. For almost four hours, police and other officials searched for the antivenin serum for the youth. It was administered by 8 p.m.

Authorities said the youth previously had had non-poisonous snakes and lizards in his home, but his parents made him get rid of the snakes. The parents were not at home at the time of the incident.



Arthur Jensen feels misunderstood



Jensen's studies in the Berkeley school system ideal for him because 40 per cent of the students were black - convinced him that intelligence was 80 per cent due to heredity and since blacks consistently scored 15 points lower in IQ tests, there was a strong genetic factor in that difference.

At Stanford, another renowned scientist, Nobel Laureate William Shockley has been saying virtually the same thing.

But I've been interested only in the educational implications of genetic difference. notes. Jensen. "He approaches it with something he calls creation of a woman's auxiliary dysgenics, or downbreeding. try to avoid being flamboyant and provocative. He likes to

shock Shockley would encourage limiting the birth rate of the genetically disadvantaged (i.e., blacks) because their 'disproportionate reproduction" threatens "genetic en-

Hé also practices an arrogant intellectualism in which any prospective interviewer must prove to him (Shockley) that he's intelligent enough to merit an audience. And every phone conversation is punctuated with a beeper to signify all is being recorded.

Jensen, in the face of attacks on his 'credibility from within the academic community, is simply eager to make himself understood.

"I'm not a racist or a far right-winger," he stresses. I'm a registered Democrat. But I'm not a party-line type. I favor desegregation. I'm against treating people on the basis of race. I keep empha-

people, any color, are unique. If people make a big thing of group identity, they pay an emotional price. A person is not the average of the group he belongs to

But I feel I had to say what I had to say because the price of maintaining a myth that there is not a difference is too big a price to pay. You have to maintain other myths to support it and it makes bad guys out of society at large.'

When he was a graduate student at Columbia University. Jensen remembers hearing about Henry Garrett, a psychologist who espoused genete inferiority of blacks, and thinking. "He's probably not a good guy.

Then at a faculty party in Berkeley, he adds, his name came up and I said, 'Yes, but isn't Garrett crazy and senile?' It reflected my attitude about people who believed Negroes were genetically inferior.

Now I've had a chance to go back and read his writings again and I don't think he was far off. Yet I don't like to be associated with his image.

Jensen claims half a dozen Nobel laureates in genetics have written him lauding his work in this area but he won't name for fear of embarrassing them. "I haven't thought the notoriety I've received is good for the image of a scien-

tist," he muses. As a footnote, he was not paid for the original 1969 artiele which created all the furor. In fact, he had to pay for reprints. But from his studies have come two books. One,

'Genetics and Education,' was published this spring and is a basic review of his position as an educational psychologist and notes the storm of Coming out in

to teaching, is the blockbuster Educability and Group Differences" - which concentrates almost entirely on the race issue (and for which he received a \$15,000 advance against royalties).

Life and death and a president's grave

ARLINGTON, VA - (NEA)
I visited the President Kennedy gravesite recently, on a late fall day that was soft and beautiful, a day similar to the one in Chicago on November 22, 10 years ago, when I learned of the assassination.

It was now late afternoon of a sunny, shirtsleeve day. The small white headstones rolled over the Arlington National Cemetery hills. Each headstone had a shadow. They looked like two sets of pearls, one white, one black, strung endlessly.

I saw one young squirrel scratchingly chase another up, down and around a tree; suddenly, playfully, they reversed the chase. On the winding walk up the hill to where President Kennedy is buried, a couple walked in front of me, sometimes crunching underfoot fallen leaves that scampered, like the squirrels, in the mellow

I overheard the girl say absently, "What a great day. It's so good to be alive - not many more days like it, before the snows come.

I had never been to the Kennedy gravesite before, even though I had been to Washington many times in the past several years. Tombs and their equivalent hold little fascination for me. And I did not need to visit the cemetery to recall the monstrous day when the President of the United States had his head blown open by a bullet.

I think the day scarred all of us who can remember it, regardless of our personal houghts of the man himself. (I do wonder, though, about the after-effects on people like those cheerleaders at the

There is no headstone at President Kennedy's grave. There is a flame set in broad stones; there are also three plaques on the stones. The plaques give the dates for the birth and death of the President, 1917-1963, and for his unnamed still-born daughter (August 23, 1956), and for a son, Patrick, who lived for one month in the summer of

Patrick's grave had been moved here from a site in Boston. Only a month before his own death, President Kennedy quietly visited Patrick's grave. He said to an accompanying friend, Ken O'Donnell, "The boy seems so alone here.

There was a chill in the air now. Perhaps it was the growing coolness of the day dying in shadows. Perhaps it was the bleak knowledge that I, too, will die and be buried coldly in cold ground.

In the end, when one visits the gravesite, the over-riding thought is not that of the death of a President, nor the death of a rich, graceful, youthful John Fitzgerald Kennedy, nor the death of what might have been The thought is simply of death, the vulnerability and mortality of man. One thinks not so much of the cruelty of mankind - in the symbol of

- but of the cruelty and indifference of the gods that permit death. I had similar thoughts looking at other headstones here, headstones that bore the names of the

had ambivalent feelings about President Kennedy when he was alive. I liked his vig-ah, as he pronounced it in his Harvard brogue. I liked his ability to laugh at himself (in front of friends he asked himself during the 1960 Presidential campaign, impersonating a reporter, "All right, Horatio Alger, just what makes you think you ought to be President?"). He could publicly admit he was wrong, as he did after the Bay of Pigs fiasco.

I did not like his response to Army reservists - I was one - who had been called to active duty, in the 1962 Berlin crisis. We were not sent home as soon as the crisis was resolved. The reservists complained it was unfair. President Kennedy replied, "Life is unfair." How terribly, awfully true, as it turned out for him, too.

And I thought it silly heman stuff for him to run around in the rain, as photos showed, without wearing a hat. My ideal president was one who had enough sense to come in out of the rain - or at least strike up an umbrella. And he was supposed to be man with a sense. Keith Show

of William Henry Harrison, ninth president of the United States? Harrison read his inaugural address for one hour and forty-five minutes in a downpour. He too was hatless. He caught cold and died

30 days later. Some thought President Kennedy brought a new ebullience to the nation and that, as James Reston of the New York Times wrote, a promise of better things was

killed with him. Despite the broodings and despair from more assassinations, from racial battles and warfare and political corruptions in the past 10 years. there remains a lambent flame within us: Could anyone doubt on that recent soft beautiful fall day, now growing shadowy and chill, that it surely was a great day to be

STITCHIN' TIME Real suede goes washable

By Joanne Schreiber

How would you like to make a real suede pants suit this fall? And keep it looking fresh forever with never a single dry-cleaning bill?

It sounds too good to be true - but washable skins of lush, lightweight New Zealand lambskin suede are now ready to be stitched into slacks, coats, vests, belts, hats and even pillows and footstool covers.

You don't have to live in a big metropolitan center to buy these skins, either. They are available through the good old J.C. Penney fall catalog. Each irregularly shaped skin averages six square feet, and is available in brown, chamois, rust, powder blue and dusty pink. The cost is very reasonable, at a little over \$10 a skin, and a downright steal compared with the price of some of the imitation suede fabrics which can run as high as \$20 per 36-

A pair of pants will require five skins, a long shirt needs four skins, a hip-length vest can be made of two skins.

Is it difficult to sew with real suede? Alan Weinstein. Penney's catalog piece goods merchandiser, says that 'sewing with suede is no more difficult than sewing with other traditional fabrics. But we do recommend a few simple accessories for best results."

Among these are the wedge-shaped sewing machine needle, a bottle of rubber cement to hold back hems, seam allowances and facings, a mallet for flattening seams and darts (you can't iron suede), an awl or eyelet punch for lacing seams, and a roll of masking tape to hold the pattern in place (you can't pin suede. and cellophane tape will damage the nap.)



Here's the fabric breakthrough of the season real washable suede. She is wearing a pants-andvest outfit she sewed herself, as she prepares to tackle her next project. Note that the pattern is being held to the skin with masking tape, not pins. The New Zealand lambskins average six square feet, and are available by catalog order.

It is important to take your time laying out the pattern. Because this is real suede, it's not absolutely perfect like a synthetic. It may have imperfections which you will have to work around, or thin places which can be reinforced with mending tape.

Leather has a grain that runs along the backbone of the animal. Major pattern pieces should be laid along the grain. Pieces cut on the cross grain may stretch.

Pattern pieces should be taped to the wrong side of the leather, and all pattern pieces should run the same way because of the nap. You can make markings on the wrong side with a ball point pen. Since you should cut only

one thickness of suede, make a duplicate pattern piece for all pieces intended to be cut

There's natural elasticity to suede, so use silk, polyester or cotton-wrapped polyester thread, rather than plain mercerized. Sew with a longer stitch (7-10 stitches to the inch), and loosen the pressure on the presser foot. Never backstitch by machine take the time to tie the thread ends.

The skins are packed with complete washing instructions, plus a brochure with complete stitching instructions. If you've never sewed with suede, this is the time to



Stender, head of the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), said the new poster "summarizes the provisions of the Act in easily understandable language so that both employer and employe will understand their rights and responsibilities under the law

The revised, two-color notice includes a summary of the general responsibilities of employers and employes for creating OSHA inspection, and summaries the employe complaint procedures under the Act.

The poster also describes the citation provisions of the Act and details the various penalties that can be imposed. It also describes OSHA's commitments to voluntary compliance as an integral part of its efforts.

The poster is available without charge, at the OSHA Regional and Area Offices in Dallas and at Area Offices in Houston, Lubbock, New Orleans

Everyone knows that certain wines are served at room temperature. Over the years we have become accustomed to drinking these wines at 72 degrees or higher.


Can we adjust to wines served at 68 degrees? Or will the shock to the palate be too great. sending us into nervous rigors?





Q. Is it true that a person who furnished employees and keeps is eligible to exclude sick pay from his income must always attach to his return a supporting statement showing computation of sick pay, nature of the illness, etc.?

A. No. A taxpayer excluding sick pay is not required to attach a supporting statement to his return as long as the employer reports the employee's excludible sick pay in a separate block on a W-2 form, keeps appropriate records, assumes full responsibility for the accuracy of sick pay figures





door to space exploration in 1957, men have placed more than 6,800 objects in earth orbit. Of these, 3,891 had "decayed"

- fallen from orbit - as of mid October, reports the North American Defense Command's (NORAD) Space Defense Center in Colorado Springs. They're coming down at the rate of about one a day.

Fortunately, most of them are burned up by atmospheric friction. Of those that do survive re-entry, the majority land in the oceans and seas which cover three - fourths of the earth's surface.

The chances of any object from space - a nose cone, spent rocket body or other miscellaneous junk - actually hitting someone are "very slight - about a billion - to - one shot," says the Center.

As far as is known, space - age debris claimed its first and only victim nearly 13 years ago when a 40 - pound chunk of white - hot metal from a U.S. probe slammed to earth near a sleepy Cuban village and snuffed out

But with sturdier materials and the increasing frequency of space launches, more fragments are expected to impact on land. Thus the Space Defense Center, using a world wide network of radar and optical sensors, some of which can photograph an object the size of a basketball at 20,000 miles, conducts a 24-hour surveillance and computer analysis on decaying space

It predicts the "geographic area envelope" of earth impact and issues warnings of potential re-entry object damage in much the same way as the weather bureau issues hazardous storm warnings - whatever good it does - for people, or cows.

We don't need to worry about some of the objects. For example, Explorer I, launched December, 1962, is expected to stay up until the year 4207. Telstar I, in space since 1961, will orbit for 56 centuries, or

ALL THAT GLITTERS Waiting For Backlash

WASHINGTON - One of the more belabored cliches on the Georgetown circuit in recent years has been that President Nixon is "paranoid" in his attitude toward the national media. In this cliche expert's opinion, however, the charge is spurious. Paranoid, no: but draws a line somewhere schizoid, maybe. Let me between hell and hysteria. Fair

That the President has adversaries among the media is hardly arguable. Far from being figments of his imagination, they can be seen in living color at every presidential news conference. Most, of course, are adversary in the purely professional sense of newsmen doing a job. But there are those in the crowds who, as independent observer Howard K. Smith pointed out several years back, are genuine flesh - and - bloodthirsty

Nixonphobes. So the accusation that Nixon simply imagines he has enemies among the media is contradicted by solid evidence. They are there, some with oak leaf clusters and hashmarks going all the way back to his early campaigns in California.

But there remains a question regarding his dealings with newsmen, conscientious professionals and deep - dyed adversaries alike, during the most recent round of hostilities between his administration and the media. And here, as I say, a case can be made that the man superficially at least, as

something of a split personality

For example, does he really mean what he says when he discusses the media's role in covering - or as the case may be, uncovering - the Watergate scandals? If so, on what occasion? Which Richard Nixon do we took to for guidance in determining whether the media have been responsible or sensational in Watergate

reporting? Do we believe the jovial chief executive who, all bonhomie, suddenly appeared in the White House press room a while back to encourage everyone present to "keep giving me hell?" Did he mean that? Or was it only a mood of the moment, to be dissipated by the first reading of his White House news summary the next morning?

Or is the real Nixon - on Watergate not the ingratiating visitor to the press room but the smoldering figure who during his most recent news conference excoriated 'hysterical.' not to mention 'vicious, distorted' reportage? Presumably, the President enough. Such distinctions, as he would say, are his perfect right.

But the suspicion is - or am I being "paranoid?" — that such session isn't likely to take place. For in recent weeks, since the reopening of White House - media hostilities, all evidence points to the administration's having drawn back to its original Ziegler Line with regard to Watergate.

To refresh your recollection, the Ziegler Line on Watergate. then and now, runs as follows: That the entire case is, if not a third - rate burglary, then a third - rate story deserving no more than a column on the back pages and a one - line mention at the tail end of the evening news - in other words, mere 'foolishness' which the media alone are keeping alive in the public mind.

The cat with nine lives is a perishable beast compared to the school prayer amendment. Year after year, Congress

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shunts it aside or votes it down. But it's always back the next Its latest reincarnation is now

proposed amendment are before the committee. All would authorize "voluntary" or "nondenominational" prayer in public schools, under official auspices, conducted or supervised by teachers.

A muscular lobby, led by the Rev. Robert G. Howes, a Roman Catholic priest, and including members of many denominations, is whipping up support for the amendment by suggesting that congressmen who vote against it may be accused in their home districts of being opposed to prayer. No congressman wants to be depicted as being against home.

Priests Oppose Franco Policy

UPI Foreign News Analyst Barcelona, Spain's second largest city, was the last major stronghold to hold out against Generalissimo Francisco Franco in the Spanish civil war. Today, it is the center of opposition to his plans for a continuation of his authoritarian rule after his passing.

Prominent in the opposition are priests of the Roman Catholic Church.

Among those speaking out strongly in defense of freedoms denied under Franco's concept of "organic democracy" has been the archbishop of Barcelona, Cardinal Narciso Jubany Arnaux

The archbishop of Madrid, Cardinal Vicente Enrique y Terancon, has joined in demands for a complete revision of the concordat of 1953 defining the relationship between church and state and giving Franco the right of veto over the appointment of bishops.



All the same, quite a lot of water is drunk in this country according to statistics and some even enjoy it. One of the quaint scenes

still to be seen today is people, men and women, who line us every day with empty bottles and containers to draw water from the three an artesian well in this upper-class Parisian district.

There is a parish-pump atmosphere surrounding the well in the tiny flower-lined square. There are the nursemaids and the prim old ladies in their prewar hats who occupy the square's benches and there are the water-fetchers. They come from early morning until nightfall. They are an heterogenous group, ranging from neighborhood countesses to down-and-outers who come not to drink but, especially in the spring and summer, to dip their feet in Passy well was dug in 1855, and is over 180 feet deep. The names of several surrounding streets recall the 18thcentury days when Passy and neighbouring Auteuil were popular country spas. When in 1719 a sample of Passy water was submitted to the Sorbonne's Faculty of Medicine, it was agreed that it would cure "visceral inclemencies.'

Benjamin Franklin and Jean Jacques Rousseau were among many notables, who took the water regularly. In 1878, a Paris businessman created a proper spa and arranged to have the water distributed to the apothecaries throughout Paris. Later it became the property of the sculptor Bartholdi, of Statue of Liberty fame. He converted it into a charity and gave the mineral water away free. 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Classical records

By WILBUR G. LANDREY NEW YORK (UPI) - The most monumental tour de force in opera is Richard Wagner's great cycle of four operas - in English called The Ring of the Nibelung" - written to occupy four long successive evenings rich with Wagnerian harmony and heavy with Germanic myth and

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With the issuance by Philips of a complete set conducted Karl Bohm leading a splendid and traditional cast and the chorus and orchestra of the Bayreuth Festival, there are now five complete Rings on records in this country.

This is Bohm's music to Wieland Wagner's 1966-67 production of the Ring. At around \$100 for the complete set, however, there naturally comes the question if it is one too many in the modest and competitive market for classical records.

For one thing, it is a recording of a live performance rather than the studio productions of Sir Georg Solti and Herbert von Karajan already on records for London and DGG respectively.

Thus, it has the strength and weaknesses of a live performance - the artistic tension that only a live performance can bring and the many little mistakes, mostly unimportant in actual performance, that all up on repeated hearing.

Well, Philips, which naturally wants to make money, and Bohm, now 79 and still a great conductor, after some thought, obviously

considered that another Ring could and should make it. I do, too, if only for the choice it gives, but there is more to this latest Ring on records than that.

It is already controversial. The conception of the Ring by Wieland Wagner, the composer's grandson who died in 1966, was different in the first place.

There was a difference in interpretation of the story itself and in the music a quickening of the tempi which gives Ring 16 record sides in place of 19 for the Solti and von Karajan versions. This one lops something like an hour and a half from the playing

Last fall, we had another full Ring, that by the already lengendary Wilhelm Furtwangler, conducting an imperfect orchestra with an inferior recording back in 1953. Nevertheless. Furtwangler showed through in the recordings issued by Seraphim. Then there has been the budget Westminster version which I haven't heard.

Something about the cast: As usual, Birgit Nilsson as Brunnhilde stands out, soprano, head and shoulders. Theo Adam is good, if not an imposing Wotan; James King a very fine Siegfried; Gustav Niedlinger a convincing Alberich; Leonie Rysanek an appealing Sieglinde.

By United Press International Solo, a Self-Portrait of an Undercover Cop, By Anthony Schiano, with Anthony

Besides the ever-present risk of exposure as "the man," the undercover cop on the street operates in a world where desperate junkies prey on other junkies, pushers or anyone suspected of having

money or dope. Det. Anthony Schiano, who describes his adventures as a on New York City streets in Solo; Self-Portrait of an Undercover Dop, has been

mugged repeatedly. Schiano was mugged because he insisted on working alone and because he walked into buildings known to be full of muggers ready to jump junkies looking for their connections. Solo, written with New York Daily News reporter

Anthony Burton, is a curious tale about a man who in his earlier years was very close to falling on the wrong side of the law. Yet, he not only opted for the police, but once on the job he threw himself into the action with an aggressiveness bordering on the compulsive.

Schiano kept asking for more after being wounded, even after he began to "smell' like a junkie and his fellow officers began to shun him, and even when his appearance and long hours began to take their toll on his family.

Schiano's aggression also led him to adopt the standards of his adversaries. He tells of using an illegal gun to ambush and wound men who had mugged him or who had stood in his way. He dismisses the shootings with the reasoning

that all is fair on that level. Probably the question of what makes a man like Schiano continually seek danger can only be answered by psychologists. Solo takes a stab at it and it is absorbing

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Bad kid may be an ill child

NEW YORK (UPI) - One of the first "child specialists" to spot "the troubled and troublesome child" is the classroom teacher, says Dr. Sam. D. Clements, a clinical psychologist. He is a professor, department of psychiatry, University of Arkansas Medical

Center.

Addressing a postgraduate course for physicians on management of the child with MBD - "minimal brain disfunction," Dr. Clements said that at least five to ten per cent of American school children are likely to have a specific learning disability and/or hyperactivity and other neurodevelopmental irregularities of sufficient severity as to require special

These are children of normal intelligence, he said, and yet, their parents often fear they are retarded because they do not develop reading, writing, spelling and other language skills at the same rate as

others. These children must be recognized and treated at an early age or they are likely to develop some form of maladjustment in later life, the doctors were told.

The two-days of seminars on MBD were sponsored by the Child Guidance Clinic in Jacksonville, Fla., the Division of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, University of Arkansas School of Medicine; and CIBA Pharmaceutical Company, Summit, N.J. as part of its Medical Horizons Postgraduate Medical Education Series.

The course was designed to give practical guidelines to the physician in private practice who is most likely to be consulted about the child with

MBD symptoms. Dr. John E. Peters, course director, and director of the Division of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry at the Arkansas School, said that less than one per cent of those afflicted are diagnosed and treated. "This is particularly discouraging," he said, because the MBD is nearly always salvageable.

The child psychiatrist said that a child who is not helped early in his elementary school years may fall years behind in reading and writing skills and never catch up.

Discouraged, he may become a dropout, a juvenile delinquent, or even a drug abuser - an individual who doesn't fit in with others.

Dr. Peters said medication. used under supervision, helps MBD children to concentrate for longer periods of time and to focus their attention on completing specific tasks without being easily distracted by outside stimuli.






