

# Dutch Continue Drive Into Indonesia

## AIRBORNE TROOPS TAKE JOGJAKARTA

BATAVIA, Java — (AP) — Dutch forces continued to roll unchecked through Indonesia today in what so far has been an almost bloodless occupation.

In Java the Dutch raced ahead of their own time table yesterday when airborne troops took the Republican capital of Jogjakarta in the first hours of fighting.

Netherlands Army headquarters said so far six Dutch soldiers have been killed and eight wounded, in both Java and Sumatra. Three Dutch were wounded in the Jogjakarta siege, the report said.

A Dutch communiqué said virtually all the high Republican leaders were in Netherlands custody. Among those taken were Dr. Soekarno, president of the republic, Premier Mohamad Hatta, Foreign Minister Agus Salim, former Premier Sutan Sjahrir, and Gen. Soedirman, commander of the Republican Army.

The Dutch also announced that their forces had broken through old Java lines at several points in Java and Sumatra.

The Indonesian government, before Jogjakarta's fall, branded the Dutch land, sea and air offensive as a "dastardly" attack, comparable to the Japanese assault on Pearl Harbor.

American and Australian members of the U. N. Good Offices Committee notified the Security Council that the committee as a whole has not yet been apprised of the Dutch repudiation of the Renville Truce Agreement.

They said the Dutch suspended communications between Batavia and Kalleorang Saturday night, a half hour after the committee had been notified of the military action.

Eighteen members of the committee are at Kalleorang. The committee told the Security Council that "in repudiation of the Renville Truce Agreement, the Netherlands have not fulfilled the requirements of article 10 of the truce agreement."

Dutch authorities have described their offensive as "police action" against Indonesian terrorists. Dutch paratroopers paved the way for capture of Jogjakarta by (See AIRBORNE, Page 10)

## New Yorkers Dig Out From Under Near-Record Snowfall

NEW YORK — (AP) — Millions struggled to work today through 19.5 inches of snow that blanketed the metropolitan area.

The snow — only an inch and a half less than the great blizzard in 1888 — left some people snowbound in the suburban areas.

Many commuter buses and some railroad service were tied up by snow-clogged roads and rails. However, surface transportation in the center of the city kept moving, although slowed.

The Long Island Railroad, which was paralyzed by the record snowfall of 25.8 inches last Dec. 26 and 27, announced at 4:30 a. m. (EST) the cancellation of 24 regular morning rush-hour trains to allow operation of snow-removal trains.

The snow, which started falling in the city at 6:20 a. m. yesterday, began to abate at 8 p. m. and ended at 2:10 a. m. today.

The storm which roared up the Atlantic Coast with high winds, was moving farther out to sea today after sweeping much of the Northeast and giving many sections their heaviest snowfall of the season.

Areas hit included large parts of New York state, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, New England, Maryland, Virginia, the District of Columbia, and West Virginia.

The storm closed the metropolitan area's three major airports

—La Guardia Field, New York International Airport and Newark (N.J.) Airport.

Schools were closed today in some metropolitan area suburbs and in other states.

A number of deaths here and elsewhere were blamed on the storm, most of them from ever-exhaustion.

A forecast of clearing weather and above-freezing temperatures today gave hope that the city's force of almost 20,000 snow re-

moval men with their thousands of trucks, plows and other apparatus would make quick work of the third heaviest fall in New York's history.

Mayor William O'Dwyer, who held an emergency meeting with key officials yesterday, marshaled all the city's facilities to cope with the storm.

## Investigators Seek Chance To Quiz Eight

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Racing against time, Congressional spy investigators hope to find out today whether the Justice Department will give them a chance to quiz eight key witnesses before the year ends.

The House Un-American Activities Committee wants to add testimony of these witnesses to its espionage inquiry report over on before the new Congress takes Jan. 3.

First, it wants to question the eight, or as many of them as the Justice Department says aren't needed in prosecuting indictments returned by a New York grand jury.

These indictments are against (a) 12 Communist Party leaders on grounds they conspired to overturn the U. S. government; and (b) Alger Hiss, former State Department official, on grounds he lied in saving he never turned government secrets over to Whitaker Chambers, former courier for a Communist spy ring.

Acting Chairman Mundt (R-S-D) got out a statement — on pink paper last night saying the committee would appreciate it if the Justice Department would let it quiz.

Donald Hiss, brother of Alger; Mrs. Alger Hiss; Miss Elizabeth T. Bentley, who admits she was a messenger for a pre-war Red network in Washington; Chambers; Henry Julian Wadleigh; William Ward Piggan; Franklin Victor Reno; and Hedda Comper.

U. S. Delegate Philip C. Jessup had asked the emergency session be called for today following an air, land and sea attack by Dutch troops on the Indonesian republic. Australia associated herself with the request.

Although merely coincidental in time, the revolts all stem from the same causes: (1) Lack of popular support for existing governments by the politically apprehensive people, which leaves the military as the real power in most countries and (2) bad economic conditions that make the people easy dupes for royal promises.

## Fighting Centers Around Tientsin

NANKING — (AP) — Heavy fighting was reported today on the flatlands around Tientsin, teeming metropolis of North China. Red forces served rail and telegraph communications between Tientsin and its port city of Tangku, 27 miles down the Hai River, pro-government newspapers said.

The stepped up North China fighting left both Tientsin and Tangku, 90 miles north and west of Tientsin, isolated. The Tientsin airport, 10 miles from town, was under Communist artillery fire. Ships, the newspapers said, were not permitted to leave Tangku, although the town itself still was in Nationalist hands.

At least two divisions of Nationalist troops were said to be trying to retake Peiping's south airport which the Communists had wrested from government forces.

Spencer Moosa, Associated Press correspondent in Peiping, said a battle for the southern suburbs was shaping. He added, however, that Peiping's future probably would be determined around the conference table rather than on the battlefield.

Coolies worked inside the old walled city, to open Peiping's only airfield available to the Nationalists.

Canton newspapers, far to the south, reported Red guerrillas in a surprise raid had struck Kanchowwan. Some street fighting was reported in the southern city.

Nanking's approaches were quiet. Sporadic fighting on the Peiping front was reported. Nationalist commanders, already forced to draw in their major defense line, reported they may have to face a new maneuver threatening the heart of Chiang Kai-shek's regime.

Unofficial reports said Red Gen. Chen Yi was swinging his forces east from the Pengpu-Suhai sector, the only one of Mr. and Mrs. Leo Bow of this city, was born April 17, 1924, in Stephens Co. He graduated from Caddo High School in 1940, went to John Tarleton College in Stephenville in 1940-41 and 1941-42. He entered the University of Texas in 1942, and with hundreds of other students, was sworn into service that fall. He went into active service the following spring.

Flames were shooting through the roof when a passerby, John Fulmer, minister of the McLean Church, noticed them about 11:30 p. m. By the time firemen arrived, the whole building was ablaze.

Fire Chief Boyd Meador called Shamrock for additional equipment to help save adjoining buildings from possible damage, but by the time the extra engine arrived the blaze was under control.

The fire was believed to have started in the projection room. Estimated loss of building and contents is \$15,000, a portion of which is covered by insurance.

An adjoining building, occupied by the Vogue Beauty Shop, suffered some water damage.

The theater was owned by W. J. Howard, who lived in an apartment over the beauty shop. Hall McCurry, and Mr. Powell, both of Dallas. The three also own the Avalon, McLean's other theater.

Howard's apartment also suffered some water damage. There were no casualties since the theater has been closed for the night.

Chief Meador reported it is McLean's most disastrous fire since the Smith Brothers gin burned about 12 years ago.

## Murder Trial Revives Event Here in 1934

A murder trial in Dallas brought back sharp memories of yesteryear in the sheriff's office today when Sheriff G. H. "Skinner" Kyle served a witness subpoena on Grover Seitz, manager of the Pampa Oilers.

Seitz has been subpoenaed as a character witness for Art "The Grease" Shires, who will go on trial soon in Dallas, charged with murder without malice in the death of Hi Erwin, an old friend of the accused man.

Kyle said Shires, a Dallas cafe owner, got into the fight around Oct. 20 in Dallas, and was killed in early December, allegedly from results of the fracas.

Then memory revived. It was in 1934 when Seitz was playing with the Danciger Road-runners at Shires and the latter, Dupey, Erwin, Jordan and Louis Holmes came up.

Jordan and Kyle grabbed Downard, removed the pistol from his pocket and took Downard to jail. 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## Bloody Warfare Likely in Indonesia, Analyst Says

As the cards lie we are likely to see another session of bloody warfare in Indonesia.

The armies of the Indonesian republic and the Netherlands government are girded for a showdown.

Indeed the Dutch, declaring that the republic had embarked on the preliminaries of large scale hostilities, already have begun "police action" to "reestablish law and order." The republicans charge the Dutch with being the aggressors.

So the fight is on. Dutch troops captured Jogjakarta, the republic's capital, and took into custody Premier Mohamad Hatta, President Soekarno and other republican leaders.

Quick intervention by the United Nations might avert this new horror, but there is nothing else in sight to turn the trick.

The trouble between the Republic of Indonesia and the Dutch government is to try to put it on (thumb) is this:

The republic demands absolute independence, short of any sort of bond with the Netherlands. Holland is trying to turn its empire into a commonwealth in which the members acknowledge the crown as the tie. This commonwealth would be similar to the British structure.

The Indonesian situation is complicated by the fact that there are six other native governments in the Dutch East Indies besides that of the republic. The latter claims to represent the rich islands of Java, Sumatra and Madoera.

The Netherlands had aimed at the establishment of an interim federal government comprising all seven native states. This would be the forerunner of the Dutch commonwealth. Premier Hatta of the republic agreed to this arrangement but he had strong opposition.

Hatta hasn't been presiding over a unified government. The Communists are a powerful influence, though curiously they are divided against themselves. There are two groups—the Trotskyites, which support the government, and the Stalinists which are in opposition.

Negotiations between the Dutch and the republic alternated on the rocks and off the rocks until last weekend, when the collapsed altogether. Then Sunday the Netherlands proclaimed the establishment of the interim government of Indonesia—without the Indonesian republic.

## WARREN'S WARM UP

QUESTION: What team sport requires the least amount of equipment?

DISASTER: Did disaster strike the Golden Sandies Saturday when they stormed past the Denison Yellow Jackets? The answer lies with the doctor, medicine and God.

### BETTER BOWLING

CONSTANT SWING: Yesterday I talked you out of trying to put a love of unnatural wrist action into the delivery of creating added hook-spin or a widely curving ball. It's just pointless. Even the big-time stars, who certainly have mastered footwork and arm swing-through, very rarely roll a whopping curve for two important reasons. The first one we talked about yesterday: A big hook is much harder to control consistently. A big curve puts tremendous pressure on the fingers by quick turning the ball, or snapping it.

Keep in mind that what you are trying to do is get a grooved arm swing back and forth in a straight line, and to finish with a full swing through for accuracy. To keep these delivery arcs as nearly as possible the same, there should be absolutely no wrist action at the start, and even in the most advanced bowling it should always be restricted as much as possible.

Besides all the other reasons for not trying to get a big hook, when too much wrist is applied the action causes the arm to lose its groove at the all-important point of releasing the ball. The arm (see illustration) moves to the left, and the ball drives high on the head pin, or even across it.

To get consistent direction, and to hold that grooved swing, I advised doing away with wrist-turning entirely. You can do this by gripping the ball like a "suit case" with the thumb turned to the left, toward the body, and the fingers on the right outside of the ball. Keep THAT GRIP throughout the swing, and do not give it any wrist turn.

The fingers on the outside of the ball apply a natural adequate and consistent spin as the ball is released.

The Texas Schoolboy Football campaign reaches its weary close this week with every champion due to be defeated.

Two titles will be determined Christmas Day to round out the 1948 picture of three state pennants for the first time in the 29-year history of the Interscholastic League.

Arlington Heights of Fort Worth wound up unbeaten but once tied with the City Conference championship Saturday. Amarillo and Waco settle the Class AA title at Fort Worth and New Braunfels and Monahans battle for the Class A crown at Odessa.

Waco reached the final round in the Class AA race last week by upsetting mighty Port Arthur 13-6 and Amarillo plowed over Denison 20-8. Defeat of Port Arthur, rated the No. 1 team in the state since the start of the season, was accomplished by the great passing of Claud Kinnannon, the Gil Johnson of schoolboy football. He completed 27 passes for 287 yards.

Amarillo leaped to three touchdowns in the first period, then was from there on in telling the most amazing team of the year. Denison's battling Yellow Jackets who were even supposed to be in the semi-finals.

New Braunfels, one of the high-scoring teams of Texas High School gridiron history—it has averaged 40.5 points per game—crushed Ft. Worth 41-6, while Monahans staged an upset comparable to Waco's triumph over Port Arthur to beat New London, 12-0.

New Braunfels' great back, Jerome Bindas, blasted across three touchdowns in the contest, one-sided victory over Ft. Worth. Waco Young paced Monahans in its great day against New London. He carried the ball 28 times for 160 yards, scoring one touchdown.

The meeting of Waco and Amarillo sets the stage for the real Texas "championship." These schools have won more titles than any others, each with four. In addition, Waco gained one championship tie. Thus Amarillo must win to take the lead. A tie, which under rules worked out in the two schools will mean a co-championship (the penetration rule will not be used), would keep Waco ahead.

Waco also has another distinction of being in the state finals more than any other school. Nine times have Tiger teams reached the last game. Amarillo has been up there five times. Well-matched in size are the Golden Sandies and Tigers. Waco averages 167 pounds to the man and Amarillo 165. Waco has a line averaging 174.8 pounds. Amarillo's average is 172.

Amarillo's prospects suffered heavily when James Garner, end, was badly injured. He is on crutches with a torn ligament in his left knee. Reports from Amarillo were that he definitely is out of the championship game.

It's the first time in the finals for Carl Price, Waco coach who was an athlete at Baylor. It's twice for Howard Lynch of Amarillo as a head coach. Lynch, a product of Centre College, was an assistant coach in the days of Amarillo's great championship streak three titles in a row. He was head coach in 1940 when Amarillo took the championship. Price was an assistant at Waco until this year.

Waco will be the favorite but there is little comparison between the two teams. They did not play a mutual opponent. Amarillo beat Woodrow Wilson of Dallas 28-12 and Woodrow Wilson lost to Highland Park of Dallas 12-7. Waco beat Highland Park 27-7. The comparison is so indirect as to be meaningless.

New Braunfels undoubtedly will be the choice over Monahans but here, too, there is no basis for comparison and Monahans has twice been the under dog yet came through.

The Waco-Amarillo game will be in the Texas Christian University Stadium at Fort Worth where 24,000 fans can be accommodated. Monahans and New Braunfels will clash in the new stadium at Odessa which handles 18,000. Both games start at 2 p. m.

## Stan Musial Dominates NL Batting

NEW YORK (AP)—Stan Musial, the priceless batting star of the St. Louis Cardinals, is being hailed today as the official Batting Champion of the National League for the third time in his illustrious career.

Musial posted a lofty .376 mark to win the batting derby in a breeze. He also paced the circuit in runs batted in, 131; runs scored, 135; hits, 230; total bases, 429; doubles, 46; and triples, 18 according to final official averages.

Musial's .376 average is the highest since Arky Vaughan posted .385 for Pittsburgh in 1935. The Card star also hammered 39 homers, but Pittsburgh's Ralph Kiner and New York's Johnny Mize beat Musial for home runs by clouting 40 apiece.

Not since Ducky Medwick, another Cardinal, led the league in batting in 1937 with a .374 mark has a player so dominated batting laurels as Musial. Medwick also showed the way in runs batted in, runs scored, hits, total bases and tied Mel Ott for the home run crown 11 years ago.

Musial became the fourth player in the league's history to capture the title three or more times. He has won batting honors in 1937, 1942, 1944 and 1946.

The Card star, who finished 43 points ahead of Rookie Richie Ashburn of Philadelphia in the batting race, also tied a major league and two loop records.

He batted out five hits in one game four times during the season to equal the major league mark set by Detroit's great Ty Cobb in 1922.

Musial joined Hornsby, Ginger Beaumont and Jess Burkett for leading in batting averages. He has the most times, four, and tied Wagner and Vaughan for pacing the loop in three-baggers the oftener, three.

# NFL and AAC Officials Meet; Browns and Eagles Champs

## Attempts for Truce Seen

By HUGH FULLETON  
PHILADELPHIA (AP)—The first real effort to end the three-year professional football war between the National League and the All-America Conference was to be made today.

But the flat announcement from the two leagues that their representatives will meet here today to discuss peace terms brought a fresh flood of conjecture about how it can be accomplished.

The only definite information given out was the statement by Admiral Jonas Ingram, AAC commissioner, that Ben F. Lindheimer of Los Angeles, Dan Topping of New York, Arthur B. (Mickey) McBride of Cleveland, James Breul of Buffalo and Tony Morabito of San Francisco were on their way here to confer on a settlement. National League Commissioner Bert Bell added a one-sentence confirmation.

Indications here, however, are that the National Leaguers still feel they have the upper hand in the struggle and will settle only on their own terms. This, perhaps, can be discounted to some extent in the light of previous statements.

While rumors of peace efforts were developing at a one-a-minute rate for the past week, most of the National Leaguers insisted there had been no negotiations. But it has become increasingly evident that what they called "informal man-to-man talks" actually were something more than that with Topping acting as an intermediary to carry proposals and suggestions between the two groups. Topping, a former National League club owner, switched to the All-America Conference.

Although the National League owners remained closeted in a conference after their brief announcement and would not comment, one observer close to the scene predicted that they would "lay down their proposition and the All American would have to take it or leave it."

In any event, this proposition would put the All American out of existence as a separate league. The National Leaguers admittedly would be glad to accept McBride's Cleveland club and Morabito's San Francisco team in their circuit, although Morabito's bid for a franchise several years ago was turned down. They also have hinted strongly that both these owners have been considering such a switch.

Whether the remaining AAC clubs merely would come out of business, whether some of them would combine with NFL teams or whether some face-saving gesture, such as buying players from defunct teams, would be made still remained in the realm of conjecture.

## Eagles Down Cards 7-0

The Philadelphia Eagles and the Cleveland Browns emerged yesterday as 1948 champions of the National Football League and the All-America Conference, respectively.

The Eagles downed the defending champion Chicago Cardinals, 7-0, on a snow-covered gridiron at Philadelphia.

Cleveland took its third consecutive AA title by walloping the Eastern Division champion Buffalo Bills, 49-7, in blustering weather at Cleveland to wind up an undefeated season.

Unlike baseball, where the two major leagues mix in a world series, there are no announced plans for a playoff between the two grid league winners. There have been rumors the teams might clash in New York Dec. 28, or possibly in Los Angeles.

Cleveland Coach Paul Brown suggested after yesterday's game he believed an exhibition game next fall before the 1949 starts would be an ideal playoff time.

But whether anything along playoff lines would result from today's so-called "peace" conference among rival moguls at Philadelphia was conjectural.

## Give Yuletide Buffet Party

A main party dish that uses leftover turkey or chicken is a welcome holiday entertaining idea. There's more—it is made in one of the new skillet-shaped pressure

saucepans, a handsome gleaming affair in which the party food is not only cooked, but also served. And, of course, because of the pressure cooker, the dish can be

prepared completely in half an hour or less.

For the buffet supper, here's the menu: Almond chicken with fried noodles, mixed green salad, ripe olives, hot rolls, cranberry sherbet with holiday cookies.

**ALMOND CHICKEN WITH FRIED NOODLES**  
(Serves 6)  
Three cups cooked chicken, cut in strips, 2 cups celery, sliced, 3

medium onions, sliced, 1 cup mushrooms, 2 tablespoons fat, 2 cups chicken stock, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-4 teaspoon pepper, 2 tablespoons cornstarch, 1-4 cup cold water, 2 teaspoons soy sauce, 1-2 cup blanched almonds, quartered lengthwise, 2 No. 2 cans fried noodles, heated, pimiento, parsley.

Heat skillet-shaped pressure saucpan, add fat. Sauté celery and onions. Add mushrooms, chicken, chicken stock, salt and pepper. Mix well. Place cover on pressure saucpan. Allow steam to flow from vent pipe to release all air from saucpan. Place indicator weight on vent pipe and cook 5 minutes with stem at COOK position. Cool saucpan at once. Thicken mixture with paste made of cornstarch and water. Season with soy sauce. Pile chicken mixture on large serving plate and surround with a ring of noodles and almonds. Garnish with pimiento cut in threadlike strips and parsley.

## BRUSSELS SPROUT SAUCE

An excellent sauce for Brussels Sprouts is quickly made by melting a quarter cup of butter or margarine and allowing it to brown lightly over low heat; then add two tablespoons of cider vinegar and pour over a quart of the sprouts that have been cleaned and cooked.

### Fate of Japanese War Lords Rests on High Court Decision

WASHINGTON —(AP)— The fate of 25 Japanese warlords rested on a Supreme Court decision which Justice Jackson says will vitally affect this country's relation with the rest of the world.

The court did not indicate when it will hand down its decision as it heard final arguments Friday on the appeal of seven of the convicted Japanese.

The justices were not asked to pass on the question of guilt or innocence, but on whether the Supreme Court has the right to judge the legality of the international military tribunal at Tokyo which convicted the seven and 18 others of "crimes against peace."

Lawyers for the Japanese, contending the tribunal was set up illegally, have asked the Supreme Court to order release of the prisoners.

It was on the point of jurisdiction that Jackson on Dec. 6 based his estimate of the far-reaching import of the court's ruling.

At that time he broke his self-imposed rule that as former prosecutor at the trial of Germany's major war criminals he should not vote in Supreme Court cases involving war crimes.

He ended a four-to-four split by voting that court should hear arguments on its right to question the Tokyo tribunal's legality, commenting that "the issues here were truly great ones" and should not be decided by a tie vote—which would have been a negative one.

The final decision, he said, "will establish or deny that this court has the power to review exercise of military power abroad and the President's conduct of external affairs of our government."

"And if the court decides it has that power, he added, "it

would substantially handicap our country in asking other nations to rely upon the word or act of the President in affairs which only he is competent to conduct."

In Friday's hearing, Solicitor General Philip B. Pearlman, arguing that the high court lacked jurisdiction, said General Douglas MacArthur would not have to obey that court's order for release of the convicted Japanese.

He said the supreme allied commander's duty is to obey the orders of the 11-nation Far Eastern Commission.

"That," said Justice Douglas, "is a rather startling statement."

"Why cannot MacArthur release these Japanese when he as their jailer is an American citizen? Although he acts for 11 nations, he's still an American. So far as he acts as an American, can't he be controlled by American courts?"

Pearlman replied: "Your processes can't reach him as supreme commander. In that capacity he is not acting under any American law or under the U. S. Constitution. His only right to hold the prisoners comes from the commission—not the American government."

The American lawyers representing the convicted Japanese argued that "so long as there was American participation" in the Tokyo trial "the safeguards of the Constitution must apply."

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## Wallpaper Effective as Means To Liven Uninteresting Room

Rooms that are dull and uninteresting from an architectural standpoint often seem hopeless from the decorative angle. There may be no fireplace, no picture window, seemingly no place to create a center of interest in the room, just four blank walls with the conventional door and window openings. So many of the modern homes have rooms of this type but they are far from hopeless and in most cases the situation can be overcome by the use of wallpaper.

Bold, splashy wallpaper on the area which most needs accentuation, such as a long unbroken wall, provides an interesting background for a furniture grouping. To avoid discordant notes or over-emphasis, monotone papers such as textured

weaves which simulate fabrics, picking up the dominant color of the pattern should be selected for the remaining wall spaces.

**COMPANION WALLPAPERS**  
Another good way to give interest to a dull room is to use companion wallpapers such as stripes or plaids with plain papers, or vivid pattern or scenes with plain or striped papers.

Many other architectural defects in a room can be eliminated by the use of wallpaper. If the room is too long and narrow, doing three walls with a plain paper and accentuating the fourth with a bold patterned wallpaper will make the room seem almost square. Another excellent way to increase the depth of one side of a room is to use scenic paper on that wall contrasted with plain or striped paper on the other three.

**STRIP EFFECTS**  
If the room is too high, horizontal stripes will make it appear lower while vertical stripes have the opposite effect giving an illusion of height to the room.

## Use Lamp to Find Short Circuits

When an electric fuse blows out, the cause can be found by screwing a 15 or 25-watt light bulb into the socket which held the fuse. If the bulb falls to light, it means that too many appliances are on that circuit; rewiring is needed.

If the bulb does light, it indicates a potential short-circuit and fire hazard. With someone watching the bulb in the fuse box, turn off all lights and appliances. Then turn them off one by one. When the bulb goes out, it is safe to replace the fuse. The short-circuit is in the last appliance disconnected. Remove this for repair. If the bulb in the fuse box will not go out, an electrician is needed immediately to find the short-circuit.

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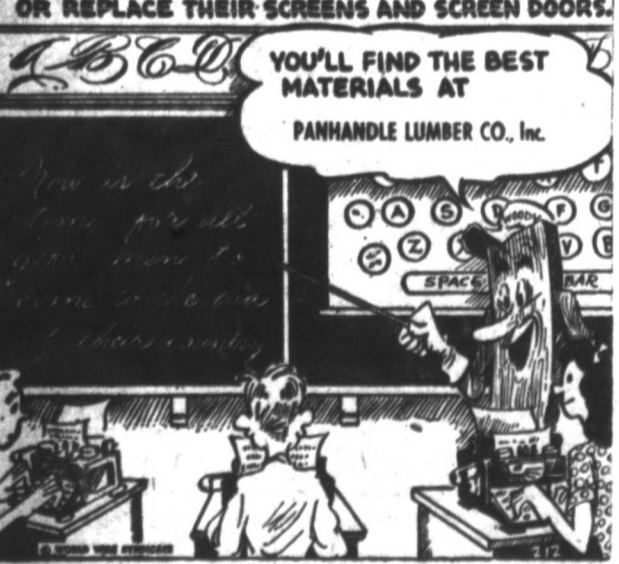
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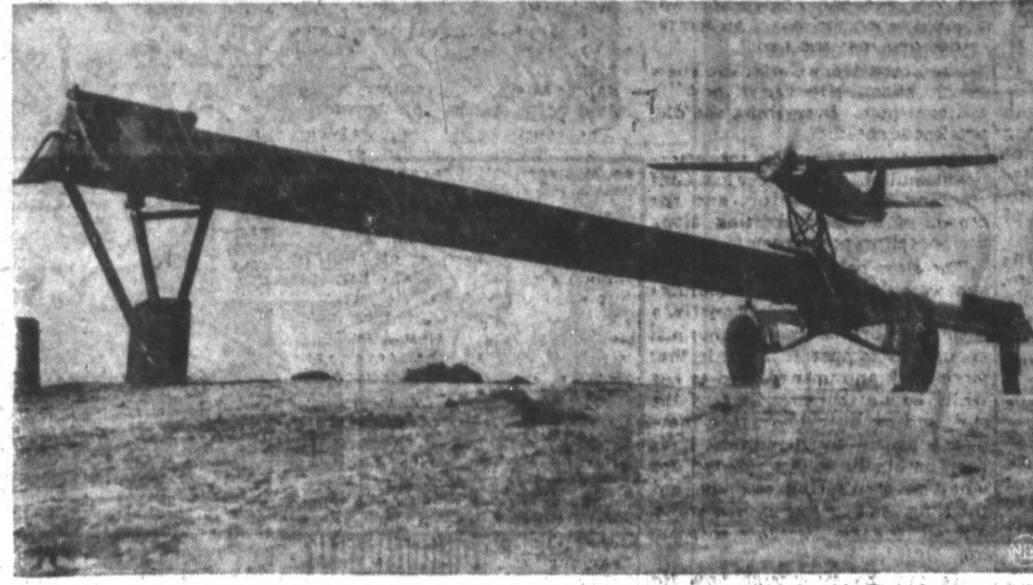

## Kitchen Built on U-Plan Is More Efficiently Operated

The trend toward space-saving in the smaller homes being built today involves the planning of the kitchen. And although they are smaller and more compact, they are far more efficient than the large rambling kitchens of grandmother's day.

Perhaps the most satisfactory arrangement for the small area allotted to the kitchen is the U-plan. This plan, with the sink placed in the center under the window and the refrigerator and stove on either side with counter and storage space filling the areas between, saves most steps.

**FLOOR COVERING**  
After the kitchen units have been satisfactorily installed, the next consideration is the floor covering. This should be durable, resilient and easy to clean. In addition to linoleum, which has long been a popular kitchen floor covering, there are the practical new hard-surface materials including asphalt tile, rubber and cork, and a new vinyl plastic covering which comes in tile or sheet form.

Kitchen walls offer many decorative possibilities. They may be painted bright colors, covered with interesting tile effects or with gay, washable wallpapers. Often painting the insides of the cabinets with a contrasting color will add sparkle to the room.

For greater efficiency and convenience, the kitchen should be particularly well lighted. There was a time when one central ceiling light was considered sufficient but in the newly designed kitchens, wall or ceiling lights over the working areas are deemed essential. Indirect lighting in a groove around the top of the walls is an excellent idea for kitchen lighting.

To put the finishing touch on a "dream of a kitchen," there is a wide variety of curtain fabrics and ready-made curtains to choose from. These include chintz, cotton plaids and gingham, percales, marquisettes and most practical of all, the lovely new plastics.

Personality and accent color can be brought into the kitchen by bright accessories such as pottery, glassware, canisters, growing greens and gay linens.

AUSTIN — Public school music teachers should go back to school to familiarize themselves with many new discoveries in basic philosophy and techniques, says a University of Texas music educator.

Dr. Archie Jones claims salary increases in recent years not contingent on additional study have made some teachers careless about continuing their professional education. He insists teachers should continue to improve themselves professionally by periodic additional school work.

Planning the shining cleanliness of the bathroom and kitchen is most people's favorite part of house-planning, says the Plumbing and Heating Industries Bureau.

We are a plumbing-conscious nation, the Bureau adds. Whatever else we will sacrifice in the house of our dreams, we must have a compact, step-saving, efficient kitchen and well-planned and well-equipped bathrooms.

The plural is used advisedly with reference to bathrooms. This is because the trend toward the multiple-bathroom house which began before the war has continued and is today a definite buyer and builder preference.

The demand for at least two bathrooms for an average family has grown so enormously that building developers declare that many buyers are willing to overlook small rooms or small lots if they have an extra bathroom.

The true American is unwilling to reconcile himself to inconvenience in those daily tasks which bring him next to godliness. With family life geared to a split-second schedule, there is no time for doors. It is generally appreciated today, as never before, how important adequate plumbing facilities are in the proper training of health habits in children.

Two bathrooms do not cost twice as much as one bathroom. Since a certain amount of piping has to be installed anyway, irrespective of the number of bathrooms, an additional bathroom can be provided at little extra cost. The important thing is to make provision for the extra bathroom when the house is in the planning stage.

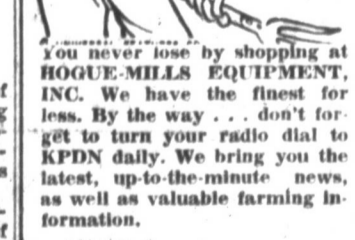
Miss Mary Frances Bowden, management and supervisory training specialist, has as her job the establishment, organization, and operation of training programs for retail stores.

HOLLYWOOD — The millionaire movie star is a thing of the past.

The word comes from Bo Roos, who guides the financial destinies of many film figures.

Even though a star can't become a millionaire, he can sock away enough for a good life in come, said Roos, and that's his job. He heads Beverly Management, which directs the finances of such figures as Red Skelton, Fred MacMurray, Johnny Weismuller, John Wayne, Frank Borzage and Mitch Leisen.

What does he do for stars?

"First, we take three or four months to survey the star's financial structure. Then we try to get his living expenses down. Usually a star is spending \$2,000 a month when he should be spending \$1,000. But that's not because stars are spendthrifts. Laying is automatically higher for them."

After a star's expenses are paid down, Roos hunts for an investment. His clients own anything from oil wells to cattle herds to country clubs, but the prime investment is in income real estate. Roos has an ax to grind about income taxes on film stars. "Oil and farmers are given consideration by the Treasury Department; why not movie stars?" he asked.

"Yes, a star earns a lot of money, but he gets to keep only a small percentage of it. And the public is tickle. A favorite today might be out of work tomorrow."

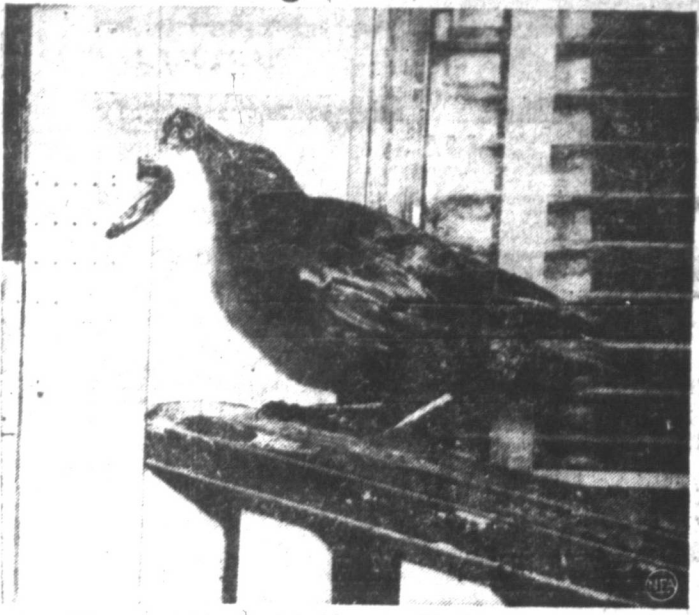

## Streamliner Leaves Rails At High Speed

OGDEN, Utah.—The Southern Pacific's steamtrain "City of San Francisco" plunged off the rails at 70 miles per hour five miles west of Lakeside, Utah, Friday night.

Although 250 passengers were aboard, no one was seriously hurt as 13 of the luxury train's 15 cars ploughed to a bumpy stop across a half mile of the deserting roadbed.

The cars remained upright as they jolted to a stop. Railroad spokesman credited an automatic safety device with applying the brakes evenly to the derailed section. The train did not buckle and the crates remained in a straight line after the derailment.

One woman, whose name was not immediately learned, suffered a slight injury to one knee. Railroad officials said a careful check showed no other injuries of any kind. They said a few persons might have been "shaken up," however.

The westbound Chicago-to-San Francisco train had just completed passage across Great Salt Lake on the Lucin cutoff when the railroad, occurred at 8:40 p.m. (MST). The diesel power unit and two baggage cars remained on the tracks.

Pending further investigation, Southern Pacific officials said it was assumed a broken wheel was responsible.

Lakeside is 48 miles west of here at the end of the Great Salt Lake bridge, on which all trains move at reduced speeds. The streamliner had just picked up its customary high speed at the time of the derailment.

The train had left Ogden at 6:30 p.m. (MST) and was due at the Oakland, Calif., mole at 9:45 a.m. (PST) Saturday. The streamliner, operated jointly by the Southern Pacific, Union Pacific and Chicago and Northwestern railroads, covers the Southern Pacific tracks west of here.

J. W. Corbett of San Francisco, vice president of the Southern Pacific, was aboard the train and provided the railroad with all its first information on the crash. He said there was no panic among the passengers and all remained in good spirits after the wreck despite a snow storm and ten degree temperature.

Communist troops in the same direction. Pengpu is 108 miles north of here.

This night indicate the Reds were trying to outflank the government's eastern defenses on the Pengpu front or that they were preparing to drive south to the Yangtze east of Nanking.

No major activity was reported along the wide battle area where the Communists have surrounded three government armies. From unofficial sources it was learned, however, that small Red units attacked Hsienmuniao, only 15 miles north of the Yangtze and 50 miles northeast of Nanking.

There was no confirmation of the Communist movement east of Pengpu, but the report tied in with an on-the-spot account of government withdrawal of Pengpu.

Associated Press correspondent Seydett Topping in Pengpu said the Nationalists gave up the city of 300,000 population after the Reds pierced the Hwai River defense line and bypassed Pengpu on both sides. The government removed its base to Chuihsin, only 30 miles northwest of Nanking.

The Nationalists set up the Hwai River line after the Reds had encircled the 12th army group northwest of Pengpu and two other army groups southwest of Suchow.

dropping down on Magowo Airfield, five miles east of the city. They took the field without resistance and flashed an "all clear" for airborne reinforcements to come in.

A Dutch advance eastward in Central Java supported the Jogjakarta operation. Netherlands troops along the Batavia-Jogjakarta trunk railway advanced 40 miles from the area of Gomgong to Potworedjo, about 25 miles west of Jogjakarta.

The Dutch said marines supported by Netherlands naval units, landed on the north coast of East Java early yesterday.

The communique said Dutch forces on Sumatra, the large island northwest of Java, have invaded Assahan. The Indonesian republic is made up of parts of Java and Sumatra.

Other Dutch units thrust through Sumatra's rich rubber producing area occupying Rantau Farpat on the shores of Lake Toba. The Dutch forces were within 100 miles of Medan, major city in North Sumatra.

The Dutch sent a transport plane to Jogjakarta this morning to evacuate members of the United Nations Good Offices Committee, stranded there since the fighting broke out.

The Dutch assault began after Netherlands authorities in The Hague proclaimed a new interim regime in the islands, excluding the republic.

The republic had disagreed with the Dutch over the powers to be granted the representatives of the Netherlands crown during the transition period.

ever, the Dutch didn't stop there. They announced they had proof that the republic planned to start action on Jan. 1 to create revolts in Java and Sumatra against the Dutch.

We shouldn't overlook that in Indonesia, as in China and the other troubled areas of the Far East, communism is sparking the war machines. Thus we see that while the Bolshevik offensive has slowed down in the European cold war, it is pushing its drive in the Orient.

And who can say how great a threat the Far East in due course may present to the Western democracies?

## New Air Clipper Dwarfs Kitty Hawk's Whole Flight



Back in 1903, the Wright brothers' fragile biplane Kitty Hawk first conquered the air. It flew 120 feet. As the diagram above shows, that's not even as long as the 141-foot wingspan of the Clipper America, newest sky giant among passenger airplanes. The new two-story, 75-passenger airliner cost \$1,500,000 to build; the Wright brothers spent less than \$10,000. The Kitty Hawk had a 12-horsepower engine and a 900-pound payload; the Clipper has 14,000 horsepower and a gross payload of 142,500 pounds.

## Farmers Write 1948 Down As Best Crop Year of All

WASHINGTON.—Farmers wrote 1948 into the books as the banner crop year of them all. They combined a fine growing season with improved farm practices to set numerous records, both for total production and yield per acre.

In its annual summary the Agriculture Department placed the total volume of all crops at 137 percent of the 1932-33 base—11 points above the previous high of 126 set in 1946.

In the wake of the final report on 1948 crops, the department got ready to issue Monday its first forecast for 1949 on winter wheat.

There are indications that it might foretell the largest wheat crop in history. Reports from the nation's breadbasket have indicated that farmers are increasing their acreage of winter wheat on the assurance that the government will support prices at 90 percent of parity.

(Parity is a price formula designed to be equally fair to the farmer and consumer.)

Corn, most important of the grain crops in producing high quality steaks and pork chops, led the 1948 output with a final production figure of 3,650,548,000 bushels and exceeds the previous record (1946) by about 12 percent. The yield per acre (42.7 bushels) is six bushels better than ever before.

Also in the record crop class are flaxseed, soybeans, peanuts, rice, pecans and cranberries.

This year's wheat production (1,288,408,000 bushels) was exceeded only in 1947. Others in the near-record group are oats, sorghum grain, potatoes, dry beans, popcorn and citrus fruits.

Above average crops of hay, cotton, barley, tobacco, sugarcane, hops, grapes, cherries and apricots were harvested.

Crops which fell below average production included rye, buckwheat, dry peas, sweetpotatoes, sugar beets, apples, pears, plums and prunes.

The combined tonnage of the 25 commercial truck crops produced for the fresh vegetable market was larger than any other year with the exception of 1945 and 1946.

two. All the others except Pigman, a former worker at the National Bureau of Standards, have appeared previously before the committee.

Mundt told reporters that Reno might be able to throw some light on "the Aberdeen Proving Ground situation."

That was a reference to statements of committee members that around 1938 the Russians evidently got information on the supposed secret Norden bombight out of a civilian at the Army's testing station at Aberdeen, Md.

Mundt said Hedda Gompers can "throw a lot of light" on Communist activities here in Washington about 10 years ago. He added that she is no suspect.

Reno and Hedda Gompers were not identified by the committee. Mundt did not mention Francis B. Sayre, former assistant secretary of state, as an immediate witness. But Sayre told New York reporters yesterday the committee had asked him to appear Wednesday.

Sayre, the former State Department boss of Alger Hiss, now is a U. S. delegate to the United Nations. Upon his return from the Paris sessions, both Sayre and his secretary, Miss Anna Belle Newcomb, were subpoenaed to testify today before the New York grand jury.

Sayre said he would try to get a postponement for his New York appearance. But he emphasized: "I am ready and glad to try to help clear this thing up. I am very interested in getting at the truth."

The committee did not indicate its plans for today's hearing pending a promised reply from the Justice Department on the requested witnesses. But there was a possibility it might have as a witness one of the men Rep. McDowell (R-PA) questioned in New York Friday. He said then that he got some valuable information and new leads that needed further tracing.

day he argued against delay. Jessup said the United States feels "very grave concern" at events in Indonesia.

After the meeting a U. S. delegation spokesman said the American government feels the Dutch have "broken faith" with the U. N. Good Offices Committee which has been trying to mediate the Dutch-Indonesian dispute.

He said that unless the Dutch forces withdraw the positions held before the attack, the U. S. will withdraw its representative from the GOC.

The session was adjourned until Wednesday by Council President Fernand Van Lengenhove of Belgium. He acted at the request of Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov who called that Russian Delegate Jakob Malik could not be present until then.

The postponement was decided over the objections of Jessup who said the air, land and sea attacks of Dutch troops against the Indonesian republic had created a "very pressing situation."

Molotov's message recalled the council had agreed to give three-day notice for any meeting called in the last two weeks of December.

He said he had been notified yesterday of today's session. Jessup said development of days and even hours might play a part in any decision on the case by the council. He called the council's attention to Article 28 of the U. N. Charter which says that council shall function continuously and that council members shall be represented at the seat of the council at all times.

Jessup said that if it was impossible to hold a formal meeting today there should be one tomorrow. He asked that the council president mean to ask the U. N. Good Offices Committee in Java for a report.

Most delegates agreed, however, that to proceed without the Russians might cast doubts on the validity of any decision the council might make.

## Late Mailing Is Very Heavy

More than 40,000 Christmas cards and letters were mailed at the Pampa Postoffice Saturday, W. B. Weathered, postmaster, said this morning.

The Postoffice remained open all day to accommodate last-minute Christmas mailers. The peak of 40,000 cancellations expected this year was surpassed Saturday and is expected to be even higher today.

"This is the air age," he said, "the speedier air mail parcel post service, which envelops more than 300,000 route miles of domestic and international airways blanketing every sector of the world, is available from our city at the lowest rates in history."

"When you consider that patrons may still be assured that their greeting cards and packages will be delivered in ample time for Christmas by the simple expedient of air mail, whether they are going 500 or 5,000 miles, then the progress made in our postal delivery service is nothing short of phenomenal," he concluded.
