

Considering their rather unlike programs and policies, this seemed to prove something I have long suspected,-namely, that the American way has come to mean all things to all people, and is thus in grave danger of reaching that point where it means nothing at

Surely this would be one of the supreme tragedies of all history. The American way, about which we have bragged for generations, for which we have fought two ghastly world wars, and for which we are now spending countless billions of dollars both at home and abroad,-for this American way to mean nothing at all, or at least, nothing unique and different from many other ways,—such a thought horrifies me!

It sent me rushing back to our original charter, the Constitution, to learn again what were its basic principles. After a sober and intensive study, I have come to my own conclusions, and I think every other citizen in this land should do the same thing, both for himself and his children-whose future he may determine. For unless a majority of us can understand and agree on what our American way of life means, unless we believe it and love it enough to defend it against all enemies, and against all temptations,-then we may vote it out of existence right here at home, without even knowing what we are doing!

You may well disagree with some of my conclusions, but if your judgment is based, as mine is. solely upon an honest study of our Constitution, then I think it very unlikely that you can disagree with many or all of them. It is my conviction that the first

and most basic ingredient in our American way of life is its emphasis upon individual liberty,-not 'majority-rule," or "economic justice," or "social welfare, or "guaranteed security," or any other currently-popular goal,-but individual liberty under law. Take our Bill of Rights, for example. How many us realize that this is really a Bill of Prohibitions, a list of "thou shait nots" to the government, itemizing areas of private and personal liberty which even this sovereign body must not invade? The second outstanding feature

of our Constitution, and it follows from the first, is its obvious attempt to limit political power over its free citizens. The whole document fairly bristles with such restrictions, and our Founders' fear of concentrated political power at the top level is reflected in nearly every paragraph. To prevent it, they divided this power between individual states, and then they further divided the Federal power into three independent parts,-legislative, executive, and judicial. the Facist, the Communist and the Socialist—all emphasize governnent-guaranteed justice economicilly or socially. It was the American who always emphasized indi-vidual liberty from government! A third feature of our American way was its preference for local self-government, back home, at the grass-roots level. This idea, of course, was to keep government as personal, and as close to the people as possible, where could understand it, and fashion to their peculiar needs, and-








