









# President Clinton will host Middle East summit

WASHINGTON (AP) — Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin and Jordan's King Hussein will meet in Washington on July 25 in hopes of concluding a historic peace agreement between the two Middle East neighbors.

In announcing the meeting today, President Clinton said Rabin and Hussein had demonstrated "courageous and bold leadership" in negotiating a framework for peace, a follow-up to last year's treaty between Israel and the Palestine Liberation Organization.

While in Washington, Clinton said Hussein and Rabin also would address a joint session of Congress. And he said he would host a White House dinner in their honor.

Clinton called the agreement for the Washington talks "another step forward toward achievement of comprehensive and lasting peace in the Middle East." The president dispatched Secretary of State Warren

Christopher to the region to help the two countries resolve remaining differences.

"It's essential that they move forward in these discussions and I am prepared to engage intensively with them," Christopher told reporters at the White House.

He is to fly to the region Sunday, and Clinton said Christopher also would meet with PLO Chairman Yasser Arafat.

Israel and Jordan have already concluded the framework of an agreement, but the king delayed a wrapup while Syria negotiated with Israel. With those talks moving slowly, Hussein said earlier this month he would not be deterred by the slow pace.

Hussein told the Jordanian parliament last Saturday that he would not hesitate to meet with Rabin if "it is a service for my country, which is facing threats from all directions."

His statement was broadcast live, suggesting he was preparing the Jordanian people for the historic breakthrough.

The Washington meeting will put Clinton front and center in Mideast peacemaking and could improve his image in foreign policy. Israel's agreement with the Palestine Liberation Organization to provide Palestinian self-rule was worked out secretly between the two sides, with the help of Norwegian diplomats.

However, Clinton stepped in, and presided last September at a White House ceremony with Arafat and Rabin. It produced a handshake between the two old adversaries and launched Palestinians on the path to self-rule.

In Jerusalem, Rabin's office released a message sent by Clinton to the Jordanian and the Israeli leaders.

"This historic meeting is another big step forward toward reaching a comprehensive peace in the Middle East," said Clinton's letter, released in a Hebrew translation.

Just before making the announcement, Clinton called Syrian President Hafez Assad to inform him about the Israel-Jordan progress.

Less promising is the state of

negotiations between Israel and Syria. The two sides are at a standstill over a land-for-peace formula. Rabin has offered to relinquish most of the Golan Heights, which Syria lost in the 1967 war, and remove Jewish settlers. But Syria wants all of the land back.

Israel and the PLO, meanwhile, have resumed negotiations over extending Palestinian self-rule beyond the Gaza strip and Jericho.

Christopher said the Washington summit is "an event that transforms the landscape."

"The Middle East is really entering a new era, and the opportunity to have that happen is one we wanted to grasp as soon as possible," the secretary said.

Christopher said that on his visit to the Middle East, he will talk with Arafat about the support he needs for Palestinian autonomy.

He said he also would point out to Arafat "steps he must take to assure accountability" to nations which are providing financial support to the Palestinians.

## Study: Virus causes blood vessels to close after treatment

WASHINGTON (AP) — Some blood vessels treated with coronary angioplasty may become blocked again because of the action of a common human virus against a gene that normally prevents the formation of cancers, a new study suggests.

Scientists at the National Institutes of Health report today in the journal *Science* that cytomegalovirus may deactivate the cancer-defense gene and allow an overgrowth of smooth muscle cells inside arteries that have been opened by angioplasty, a procedure that uses an inserted balloon to clear clogged arteries.

Earlier studies have identified the gene, called p53, as one of the body's defenses against cancer. Studies have shown that the gene's normal function is to limit the growth of cells. Missing or deactivated p53 has been linked to many human cancers.

Dr. Stephen E. Epstein, an NIH researcher, said the study in his lab should be considered only preliminary and not proof that the cytomegalovirus, or CMV, is the culprit in closing the treated arteries.

"We aren't there yet (with proof)," he said, "but the evidence does suggest this as a possible

mechanism for restenosis (the re-closing of arteries) after angioplasty."

However, Baylor College of Medicine virologist Dr. Joseph Melnick called the NIH study "fascinating" because it indicates a possible link between cancer and heart disease.

Patients with blocked arteries are treated with coronary angioplasty. In this procedure, a tube is threaded up an artery until it comes to a site that is blocked by a heart disease process. A collapsed balloon is then threaded up the tube and positioned at the blockage. The balloon is inflated and compresses the plaque material that caused the blockage. This allows blood to flow freely.

But in more than 25 percent of angioplasty patients, a blockage reforms at the treated site, often leading to the need for coronary artery bypass surgery.

The NIH team reasoned that the new blockage may be caused by an uncontrolled growth of smooth muscle cells like those in the artery wall. Angioplasty often causes a slight injury to the artery and the vessel then heals itself by growing new cells.

It is possible, said Epstein, that the injury somehow activates CMV particles that are present, but latent, in the artery. This virus, he said, could attach to p53 and then shut down the gene's action.

When p53 is deactivated, said Epstein, smooth muscle cells repairing the artery are allowed to grow without restraint, forming a new blockage.

"There are a lot of theories about what causes this restenosis and ours is just one of them," said Epstein.

CMV is a widespread and common virus that seldom causes disease in people with mature and healthy immune systems.

In the NIH study, researchers examined specimens from 60 patients whose arteries had reclosed after angioplasty. In 23 of the patients, there was evidence that p53 had been inactivated, Epstein said.

The researchers also looked for evidence of CMV. In 11 of 13 patients who had inactivated p53, the scientists found traces of the virus. This was true in only three of 11 patients who did not have inactivated p53, Epstein said.

Epstein said the study had too few patients to draw final conclusions. But the work "gives a hint" that CMV and p53 could play a role in atherosclerosis, a common type of heart disease that leads to narrowing and blockages of coronary arteries, he said.

*Science*, which published the study, is the journal of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

## Prosecutor: Sisters to be tried for gouging sibling's eyes

DALLAS (AP) — Two Louisiana women will stand trial on charges of gouging out their sister's eyes in an attack blamed on an evil hoodoo spirit, says a prosecutor.

George West, Dallas County assistant district attorney, said Thursday that attorneys for Doretha Crawford and Beverly Johnson have not presented valid reasons for halting the prosecution.

"It's fish or cut bait time," he said. "We will go to trial unless they can come up with a good reason not to."

The Arcadia, La., women are scheduled for arraignment Aug. 3 before State District Judge Mike Keasler on aggravated assault charges in the attack on former schoolteacher Myra Obasi.

The 30-year-old woman, who still resides with Ms. Crawford in Arcadia, had asked that her sisters not be arrested and prosecuted.

"But we have enough evidence, at least in my opinion, to take them to trial," said West.

Ms. Crawford, 34, and the 35-year-old Ms. Johnson are accused of beating Ms. Obasi with their fists, then blinding her with their fingers during a prayer session

March 18 at a church-home in south Dallas.

The defendants contended that a demonic spirit invaded their Caddo Parish sister after the trio left Arcadia March 17 for a car trip to Texas. Ms. Obasi was later brought to Parkland Memorial Hospital in Dallas by her sisters.

"I've been educated beyond my wildest dreams as to the distinction between hoodoo and voodoo, the bottom-line distinction being what form of spirit they are dealing with, either one from a Biblical type of passage or one from something made up through a native culture," West told WFAA-TV.

He said Ms. Obasi's attack was associated with hoodoo, which combines elements of voodoo from Africa and Haiti with Biblical verse and Catholicism. But the

beliefs did not excuse the attack.

"The devil made me do it," that's not going to wash with me under any circumstances," West said. "I mean it's not recognized in Texas law and I don't recognize it."

He said that attorneys for Ms. Crawford and Ms. Johnson did not provide additional pre-arraignment information in the case to the district attorney's office by a Thursday deadline.

"The DA's office in Dallas County, they do a lot of weird things," Lela Washington, a Dallas attorney representing the defendants, said. "I think it's a waste of the taxpayers' money, effort, time but they continue to prosecute."

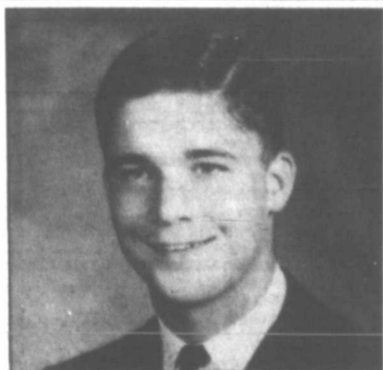
West said he would move to set the case for trial at the arraignment unless the defendants plead guilty or no contest. Then, he said, the

sisters could negotiate a plea bargain with prosecutors or ask the judge for leniency.

Although Ms. Obasi has been uncooperative, other witnesses can testify for the prosecution, said West.

"But not having a cooperative complainant worries me," he said.

Religious broadcaster: World will end in September

*"If the sentinel sees the sword coming and does not blow the trumpet, so that the people are not warned, and the sword comes and takes any of them, they are taken away in their iniquity, but their blood I will require at the sentinel's hand."*  
— Ezekiel 33:6.

Harold Camping says he knew 25 years ago that the world was going to end this September.

But a fear of stirring up his followers and the possibility of his own fallibility kept the religious broadcaster from making the date public until two years ago when the words of Ezekiel convinced him other's blood would be on his hands if he did not share his prophecy.

Since then, in his books "1994" and "Are You Ready?" and on a nightly radio talk show along the 40 stations owned by his company, American Radio, he has claimed that on one day this September the "saved" will be raised up and the "unsaved" condemned to everlasting damnation.

"I couldn't maintain a low profile anymore because an alarm had to be sounded to the world," the 72-year-old Camping said in a telephone interview from his office in Oakland, Calif.

"The judgment throne is coming. In a few days it will be here."

No one knows the extent of Camping's following, but when September comes and goes with no apocalyptic event there will be thousands of disillusioned Christians, say some prominent evangelical scholars who take Camping seriously enough to publicly rebut him in debates.

"I'm a little bit afraid of what's going to happen in October 1994 — what psychologically is going to happen," said Tremper Longman III of Westminster Theological Seminary in Philadelphia.

Camping, whose background is in

engineering, has devised his own system for dating biblical events that fits into a plan of salvation history in which key events occur in 1,000 year periods.

For example, he says Jesus Christ was born 2,000 years ago and David ascended the throne of Israel 3,000 years ago, two events that point to this year as the time for another major event along the millennial time line.

The period of tribulation forecast in biblical books that would occur before the end times began in May 1988, 13,000 years after the world was created in 11,013 B.C., according to Camping's dateline. It was in 1988 that Satan was turned loose on the Earth, and churches have been teaching what he calls "false gospels" that ignore the concepts of hell and damnation. Not coincidentally, in May 1988, Camping was relieved of his duties teaching an adult Bible class in his former church in Alameda, Calif., because of his apocalyptic predictions.

Working from the May 1988 date, he arrived at September 1994 as the date of the end of the world by taking literally a reference in the eighth chapter of the Book of Daniel to a vision of a sanctuary being rebuilt 2,300 days after it was desecrated.

Evangelical scholars say Camping's theory is groundless, that his dating system is his own invention and he has manipulated a Bible that consistently teaches no one will know the hour of the final judgment.

"He totally misuses virtually every biblical text that he comes across," claims Longman, who says Camping is not even able to read the earliest texts in Hebrew and Greek.

John Walvoord, a prophecy expert and former president of Dallas Theological Seminary, takes a harsher view.

"It's just another screwball interpretation," Walvoord said. "Nobody has ever guessed the date right. You'd think they'd learn."

But if scholars dismiss Camping's theory, they do not dismiss the influ-

ence of the religious broadcaster, who reports annual giving to his stations is up 20 percent this year to \$12 million.

Walvoord has debated Camping on radio and Longman says around a thousand of the broadcaster's followers attended a seven-hour debate he had with Camping at a Delaware church in May.

In his own church and many churches throughout the country, Longman says, there are one, two or three families who believe in Camping's prophecy. Although Camping has not advised his followers to quit their jobs or do anything unusual in preparation for the end times, some evangelical leaders are worried many people are being set

up for a potential crisis of faith when the prophecy proves untrue.

Thomas Holt, 51, a member of a Bible study group in Philadelphia consisting of 50 families who subscribe to Camping's theory in varying degrees, said if the world does not end in two months, "young or new Christians will be very disappointed, and I will be disappointed."

Still, he says, "For the most part, I plan to go on with my life."

Camping also admits the possibility he may be wrong. "Sometimes, I've thought, wow, I wish September was not the month," he said. "But I doubt it. I doubt it. I doubt it. I'm more convinced than I've ever been the world is about to end."

## Rwandan refugees sweeping into Zaire

GOMA, Zaire (AP) - A tidal wave of Hutu refugees from Rwanda's civil war flooded across the border Thursday, swamping relief organizations and Zairean authorities in instant chaos.

An estimated 200,000 to 250,000 people poured past three overwhelmed checkpoints along the border by late afternoon. They balanced bundles of possessions and mattresses on their heads, carried babies on their backs and herded along reluctant goats and cattle.

Up to 1 million Hutus have been reported on the road to Zaire. They are fleeing advancing Tutsi rebels in fear the rebels want to avenge widespread massacres of minority Tutsis by extremist supporters of Rwanda's Hutu-dominated government.

There has been no evidence of reprisals for the massacres, which have been blamed for most of the estimated 200,000 to 500,000 deaths in the latest round of the civil war.

In what could be the largest exodus in history, 600 refugees crossed into Goma each minute at the peak of the flood Thursday, relief officials said. In the next few days, the number of refugees around Goma alone could reach 900,000, they said.

Goma was a dusty city of 20,000 people before Rwanda's war resumed in April, but now is home to more than 150,000 with scant water supplies despite being on the shore of Lake Kivu.

There was fear of trouble with local residents, who lined streets to watch the procession. Some shouted obscenities at the newcomers. Zairean soldiers confiscated machetes and knives from the refugees and confiscated the film of news photographers.

By afternoon the refugees filled four fields and a soccer stadium set aside for them, then started laying down mattresses, mats and tattered blankets anywhere they could find space. Smoke from cooking fires obscured the sky. A U.N. jeep led a column of refugees north toward open fields near the airport 2 1/2 miles outside town.

An estimated 3 million people, out of a prewar population of about 7.5 million, have fled their homes in Rwanda, a mountainous Central African nation about twice the size of Connecticut.

U.N. officials estimate 1.5 million to 2 million refugees are in western Rwanda alone. More than 500,000 have fled east into Tanzania, south into Burundi and north into Uganda.

France said Thursday that 1 million refugees are crowded in the southwestern corner of Rwanda where its troops set up a sanctuary for civilians. It repeated its plea for urgent international help in caring for them.

The government in Paris also called for an emergency meeting of the U.N. Security Council to bring pressure for a cease-fire in Rwanda.

"It appears evident that no military solution will permit a durable reconciliation in Rwanda," a Foreign Ministry statement said.

But France also said it would not protect the Hutu government, whose troops have been pushed into a stretch of territory along Rwanda's western border. The statement said "it is not desirable" for the government to move its headquarters to the security zone to escape the rebels.

The Tutsi-led Rwandan Patriotic Front has said its troops will stop fighting once a new multi-ethnic government is set up and the leaders responsible for the massacres are captured.

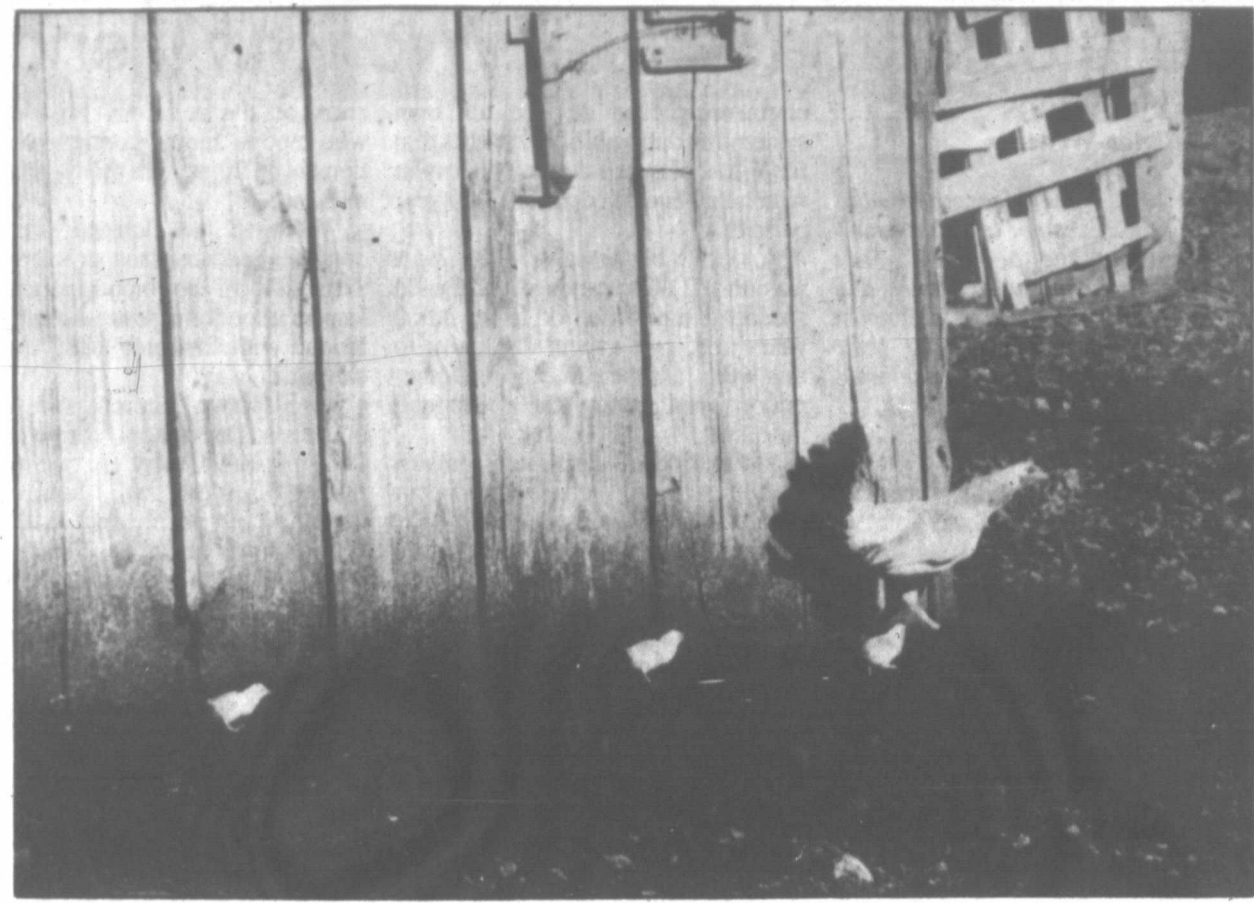
Faustin Twagiramungu, a moderate Hutu picked by the rebels as prime minister of the new government, arrived in the capital, Kigali, on Thursday, but it was not yet clear how much authority the rebels would give him. He said his first mission was to meet with rebel leaders.

Twagiramungu was named prime minister in a peace accord signed last August to end three years of war. He was to govern for 18 months until elections, but the plan was thwarted when President Juvenal Habyarimana, a Hutu, died in a suspicious April 6 plane crash that rekindled the war.

The Hutu-led government remained holed up in Gisenyi, just across the border from Goma. Government ministers said the rebels were only 15 1/2 miles away.

Augustin Ndirabatswe, minister of planning in the Hutu regime, said the government's top leaders remained in Gisenyi. "But we think the final result will be to flee," he said.

## Leaky pipes, gases create danger in Tijuana

TIJUANA, Mexico (AP) - After a newspaper made the problem public, Mexican officials rushed this week to reassure Tijuana residents that explosive levels of propane gas underneath downtown are being cleaned up.

Officials from three levels of government, including Mexico's cabinet, showed up in Tijuana after the report in the daily *El Mexicano*.

The newspaper's story cited a study done this spring by a United States firm, which found unsafe clusters of propane gas had formed beneath eleven city blocks downtown. The gas had leaked from bad pipes.

The Mexican government had known about the problems - and the report - for some time but apparently had hoped to address them quietly and out of the spotlight.

"There is very little possibility of explosion now," said Antonio Rosquillas Navarro, the city's chief of operations for civil protection. "In May, the problem was much more critical."

The study by New Mexico-based Advanced Sciences Inc. found about 350,000 cubic meters of propane, at levels exceeding the "lower explosive limit."

Technicians also ran into "combustible concentrations of oxygen in the soil" in many areas where propane was present. "Any ignition source in this area may cause a fire or explosion," the report concluded.

After the report was completed, an affiliate of Tijuana Gas Co. began working with city and state officials to rid downtown of the underground vapors.

So far, about 143,000 cubic meters of the gas have been released from the soil through a special ventilating device. And about 70 percent of the 124-mile underground gas piping has been replaced. Plastic tubing has been installed in place of the aging metal, according to city and federal officials.

Those steps have reduced the danger significantly but not totally, the officials said.

## Fatal attraction: Hospital bed bravado at Pamplona bull run

PAMPLONA, Spain (AP) - The true test of bravado in Pamplona is not whether you run with the bulls. It's whether you still want to run with the bulls as you lie in a hospital bed nursing a 5-inch horn wound in your leg.

"It felt like I was hit by a car," said Mitchell Soboleski, 40, an investment manager from Tiburon, Calif. He was gored by a bull a couple days back and suffered two deep gashes and a broken leg.

Still he complained about missing the party. "I'd run again," he said.

He'll have another year to reconsider.

The 1994 San Fermin fiesta wound to a close Thursday with the eighth and final bull run. Only three people with minor injuries were treated at local emergency wards, bringing the festival total to 54. A dozen people had gore wounds and the rest a variety of injuries from being trampled, butted or knocked to the ground by bulls or panicked fellow runners.

Among the casualties was James Ballor, 42, a veteran bull runner from Alliance, Ohio, who broke his thighbone Monday in the crush of the crowd trying to escape six irritated fighting bulls as they charged through the cobbled streets of this northern city.

"I've got to do it one more time to see if I want to do it again," said Ballor, who teaches English at Alliance High School when he's not emulating Ernest Hemingway in Spain. "I'll definitely be back next year."

That's the Pamplona spirit. A sort of fiesta fatal attraction.

Many Spanish towns have bull runs during their annual festivals, originally just a way to bring the animals to the town bullring for the afternoon fights. But Pamplona became an irresistible draw to the daring when it featured prominently in Hemingway's 1926 novel, *The Sun Also Rises*.

The attraction? Maybe it's the jolt of leaving the workaday modern life to face 1,000 pounds of snorting death. Maybe it's the love of a hard-drinking party. Or, for those who have both run with the bulls and ridden in the ambulance, maybe the wounds are a badge of courage.

Tyler Wilson, a 23-year-old student from San Jose, Calif., was gored in the left thigh Monday and underwent surgery. He hasn't decided if he'll run again.

"If you say 'yes,' you're stupid, and if you say 'no,' you're a chicken," Wilson said.

Twelve runners have been gored to death since 1924, but none, mercifully, since 1980.
