High Court Clears State Liquor Case

AUSTIN -(AP)- The U. S. Su-preme Court has cleared the way for confiscation of \$75,000 worth of liquor impounded by Texas authorities, Attorney General Price Daniel said today. The high court Monday refused to review a New Orleans circuit court decision which upheld Texas laws prohibiting transportation of liquor across the state in private

liquor across the state in private carriers without a permit. The case arose when the state-seized a load of liquor near Quitman, in Wood County, en-route from Shreveport, La., to Okiahoma. The case was tried in federal court by two of Daniel's assistants, Ned McDaniel and William S. Lott.


