BUENOS AIRES (AP)—The city's "pure Spanish" campaign has backfired.
Just after the City Hall decreed that ungrammatical posters would be torn down, a newspaper pointed out that the city's own subway signs referred to "paths" instead of "sidewalks."
Also the monument to the founders of the city speaks of "the anniversary of its foundation" rather than the correct Spanish form "anniversary of the foundation." This mistake is out into stone and can't be changed.

South Caused Own Ills, Editor Says
BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP)—Editor Ralph McGill of the Atlanta Constitution says the South has brought most of its woes on itself so far as civil rights legislation is concerned.
In an address before the Birmingham branch of the American Association of University Women, McGill said:
"Until our Negroes are given more opportunity to acquire skills and are paid accordingly, we will be vulnerable to FEPC and held down economically."

Sheng Pao said 20 miles still separated the 12th from troops trying to fight to its relief north of the Hwai.
(The picture also appeared to be darkening in North China, where Gen. Fu Tso-yi is trying to save Peiping and Tientsin from the Communist tide.
Fu's headquarters confirmed earlier reports that government troops had withdrawn from Shunyi, only 18 miles northeast of Peiping.
Associated Press Correspondent Spencer Moosa reported that the Communists also were putting on the pressure from the southwest and that Peiping was in danger of early Red capture.
Moosa said Fu must decide quickly whether to fight a decisive battle on the plains around Peiping or retire northwest to his old citadel in Inner Mongolia.
Moosa reported that the bulk of Fu's personal army from Inner Mongolia was concentrated in the Peiping area. Other government troops were deployed east for the defense of the Tientsin area.
This indicated that Fu would be ready to haul out for Inner Mongolia if Communist pressure becomes too great to stand.)

Baptists Approve State Mission Budget
DALLAS (AP)—The Executive Board of the Baptist General Convention of Texas yesterday approved a \$594,131 state mission budget and elected R. A. Springer of Dallas as secretary of the convention.

a former Communist courier. Chambers has testified that while he was in the Red underground before the war, government workers fed him secret documents for transmission to Russian agents. He has named Alger Hiss and Henry Julian Wadleigh, both formerly in the State Department, as two of the suppliers.
Hiss, now head of the Carnegie Foundation for International Peace, has denied all.
Wadleigh, now unemployed and living at nearby Vienna, Va., refused to say whether he had or had not slipped information from the State Department.
Wadleigh said he might incriminate himself by answering questions on that point.
It was brought out that Wadleigh already had been questioned by FBI agents and had appeared before a New York grand jury investigating espionage.
Chambers has yielded some of the papers he obtained in the form of photographs or copies. Most of them came from the State Department and are dated 1937 and 1938.
The committee showed signs of hearing the advice of the State Department on whether it should publish the texts. Some probably will be turned loose and the rest withheld.

"I did not always agree with Gen. Eisenhower on strategic questions," Churchill said, promising to set forth his views on this at a later time. But he said he was sorry to note that some British newspapers, reviewing Eisenhower's book, "Crusade in Europe," interpreted it as a slap at British-American unity.
Churchill hailed the projected North Atlantic pact as a sure Western-Europe of American and Canadian military support as a "tremendous event."
"If such an event had occurred in 1940 or 1939 the whole tragic history of the world might well have been altered and possible catastrophe might have been averted," he said.
Churchill got mixed boos and cheers when he endorsed the labor government's action in giving bomber bases to the United States in Britain.
Churchill also supported the labor government policy in the East-West dispute over Germany. But he repeated his plea that attempts should be made to reach a settlement.
"Only in this resides the best hope of avoiding a third world war," Churchill said.
The earliest instance of a regency in English history was the appointment of the Earl of Pembroke as regent upon the accession of Henry III to the throne.

Britain to Keep Hands Off China

LONDON —(AP)— Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin declared today Britain will follow a hands-off policy in Communist-menaced China.

The foreign secretary was opening a House of Commons debate on foreign affairs in which Winston Churchill will speak tomorrow. "Our attitude to China has been governed by the Moscow declaration of 1945, in which the United Kingdom, the United States and the Soviet Union declared a policy of non-intervention in the internal affairs and His Majesty's government have consistently followed that policy," Bevin said.

Fragmentary accounts said 30 rural defense soldiers were involved in the incident, which occurred at a polling booth.

Sheep, Goat Raisers Seek USDA Branch

SAN ANGELO —(AP)— Texas sheep and goat raisers want a wool and mohair branch set up within the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The request to the secretary of agriculture was embodied in one of several resolutions passed at the annual convention ended here Wednesday.

J. S. Farmer of Junction was elevated to the presidency. His successor as first vice-president is J. C. Mayfield of Juno. Frank Roodie of Brady was named second vice-president.

Ernest L. Williams of San Angelo was retained as secretary. Members also elected 162 directors from 44 principal sheep and goat producing counties.

Other resolutions: Asked Congress to repeal the federal law requiring goat meat to be sold under the name of chevon.

Approved the Reciprocal Trade Agreements Act as administered

by the state Legislature. Urged an equitable tariff as the soundest approach to protection of wool and mohair industries.

Urged that wool and mohair be given the same treatment as other commodities in the long-range farm program.

Asked the state Legislature to approve items in the Texas A&M College experiment station budget providing for wool and mohair—survey, brush—eradication, grasses and legumes improvements—and sheep and goat investigation.

Asked the Commodity Credit Corporation to accept insurance charges made by cooperating warehouses and warehouse contracts with the CCC in effect during last year to be continued.

Asked the Federal Park Service to erect a fence along the boundary of Big Bend National Park to protect adjacent ranch lands from predatory animals in the park. Asked that four patrolmen be assigned to police the fence.

Asked the state Legislature to fix salaries of state hunters at a minimum of \$175.

Fast Living May Cause Sinus Ills
HOUSTON —(AP)— A St. Louis medical professor said many people are confusing sinus trouble with fast living.
Dr. Theo E. Walsh estimated that "99 percent of the people who claim they have sinusitis don't have it."
Dr. Walsh, professor of otolaryngology at Washington University School of Medicine, spoke before the fourteenth annual post graduate medical assembly of South Texas.
"When we are under tension our nasal passages become blocked," the professor explained. "Similar conditions occur when we are angry, nervous, have certain dietary defects or drink too much."
Approximately 1500 doctors from 38 South Texas counties are attending the assembly, a "refresher" clinic conducted by 15 of the nation's leading medical authorities.

Water Hearing Set for March
AUSTIN —(AP)— The water board set March 14 as the date for hearing an application of the city of Denton for a permit to secure 21,000 acre feet of water annually from the Garza-Little Elm reservoir.
The board set for hearing Jan. 10 application of the City of Dallas for 415,000 acre feet of water annually from the Grapevine reservoir to be constructed on Elm Fork of the Trinity River in Denton County.
This amount was inclusive of 300,000 acre-feet heretofore granted the city of Dallas.

Phone Company, Union Meet Again
ST. LOUIS —(AP)— The Southwestern Bell Telephone Company and a union of 50,000 of its employees in Missouri, Arkansas, Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas will try again today to agree on a new contract.
The company is expected to make a new offer.
Company officials and those of Division 20 of the Communications Workers of America conferred yesterday with a representative of the U. S. conciliation service.
Negotiations were broken off in September after six months with the union's rejection of an average four-cent-an-hour wage increase. The union said it wanted increases of 10 to 15 cents an hour.
Strike sentiment was recorded this week in a mail vote of union company employees in the five states.

 What's your trouble, girl? Bowlegged? Knockkneed? Pigeon-toed? Skinny? Fat? Just plain homely?
 Don't give it another thought. You can be downright pretty, even if you're ugly. That paradoxical remark was made by one of America's most famous model agents, John Robert Powers.
 Mr. Powers was talking about that "certain something" that some girls have and other girls just haven't. He says it is an inner glow which oftentimes is more easily spotted in the not-so-pretty girl. Beautiful girls are likely to take their beauty for granted and rest on their laurels. The homely girl knows she should develop her personality and interest in people to succeed socially.
 He cited the instance of a reporter who was sent to interview a woman billed by the circus as "the homeliest woman in the world."
 The reporter interviewed the woman, wrong from her background of hardship and unpleasantness which had left her completely untouched. She had learned to rise above all misfortune which had touched her. When he had finished with his interview, he decided it was impossible to write about the homeliness of the woman because she actually had become beautiful in his eyes.
 Mr. Powers of course makes his living as agent for pretty women. Primarily, he needs girls who will photograph well. All of them don't need radiant beauty to appear before a camera. However, Mr. Powers is noted for his ability to select girls who possess both beauty and that "inner glow."
 There aren't too many girls possessing this happy combination. I know two models, neither of them Powers' girls. Nor do they work for the same agency. One is a perfectly beautiful blonde who always has had life handed to her in a gold cup.
 When she started her model career she made instantaneous monetary success. In a short time however, her selfishness was apparent to everyone she came in contact with. Models disliked her because she wasn't cooperative. Photographers began to see her face as a perfect blank. Pretty soon she slipped from a \$300 a week fashion and photographic model to practically nothing.
 Now she asks, why? She tries to explain it to herself by seeing people are used to her face, perhaps she should change the color or style of her hair, the shape of her eyebrows or lips. She might take a tip from the other girl I know. She is tall but thin. At 23, her hair is gray. Her teeth protrude slightly. But after a year in the model business she has it in the palm of her hand.
 She started in a small way, was willing to take advice. When she began to make a good deal of money, she didn't invest a mink coat or in jewelry. She found her happiness in taking care of others. She has supplied her family with a few dollars' comforts they had missed—cleaning women and laundresses to help her mother, a television set for her father, a house in the country for the whole family.
 Her simplicity despite the world of adulation she now lives in, leaves everyone amazed. Her own wardrobe is scanty but she always looks neat and well-groomed.
