in advance of today's talks that they would be concerned more with how Congress should handle ECA's money problems than with the sums involved.

The agency started reorganizing last April 3. By current reckoning its present funds will run out next April 2 leaving three months less before the start of the new fiscal year. The ECA's so-called "second annual program" is being completed.

ECA chief Paul G. Hoffman has said he will ask about \$1-200,000,000 to fill the three-month gap. He has made no statements on the second annual program except that it probably will cost less than the first year because of progress so far made.

Most of the comment from members of Congress on the eight-month record of operations has been favorable. But Vandenberg has said the recovery program certainly will face a "critical showdown" early in the session.

He told a reporter earlier this week that in his own opinion ECA has "convincingly justified its existence." However, he said, its operations should and undoubtedly will be subjected to an "exhaustive survey."

Levine, now an American citizen, was the go-between for Chambers when the admitted former Communist courier decided to take his story to the government in 1939 two years after breaking with the Reds. It was from a pumpkin on Chambers' farm that microfilm copies of some of the pilfered documents were removed only last week.

From last night's session, too, came the blast by Rep. Nixon (R-Calif.) at the administration. Nixon said the Justice Department "has made it very clear" it does not want the House group to hear witnesses slated to testify before the federal grand jury in New York, which reopened its inquiry into spy activities as a result of the Chambers' disclosures.

Calling it "certain that the grand jury will indict Chambers for perjury," Nixon said this action will make it impossible for the jury to get at persons who worked with Chambers "because the chief witness will be an indicted perjurer."

Levine, last night's only witness, is editor of the magazine Plain Talk which he identified as "anti-Communist and anti-Fascist." He asked to appear to amplify previous testimony last August.

the discretion of Chandler some time before the 51st Legislature meets Jan. 11.

The group asked Gov. Beauford H. Jester to add two voting members of the Senate and one of the House to the committee. He agreed. The idea was this would help whatever suggestions are made through the canvassing mill.

Dozens of inadequate, confusing, conflicting and muddy sections of the election laws were discussed. Each member was asked to bring concrete suggestions for changes to the next meeting. Party officials and county judges will be asked for ideas.

The committee voted not to make any suggestions for a change in the primary system or for abolition of the poll tax as a pre-requisite to voting. It decided it would study the secret ballot question—a perennial legislative subject.

Arguing for this, Mrs. William Y. Fann of Midland said she felt that a coerced vote was in effect a fraudulent vote. She said something should be done to make certain the ballot is truly secret. She said she had heard of cases where banks had called in loans when business men did not vote the way bankers wanted them to vote.

Vann M. Kennedy of Corpus Christi, who served for many years as secretary of the state Democratic Executive Committee, urged the committee to declare itself for an adequate registration law that would prevent fraud. Under the present system, fraud is invited, he said. The committee believed it wasn't ready to go into such a specific question, and Kennedy withdrew his motion.

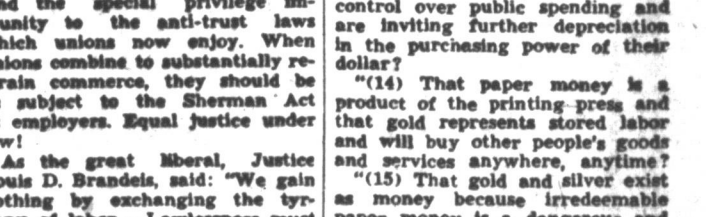

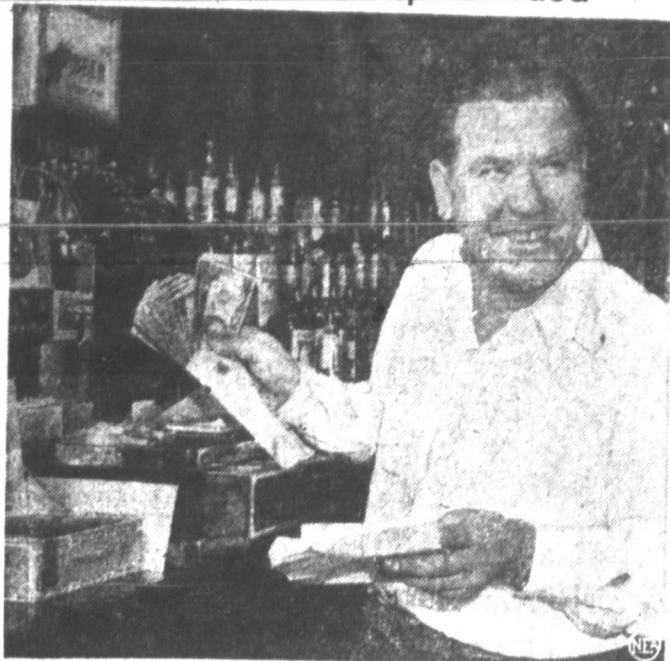

WASHINGTON (AP) — The AFL said labor will have to ask for "maximum wage increases" unless business stops raising prices and cuts those that

Rock Permeability Measure Code Is Being Revised

AUSTIN — Revision of the oil industry's standard code for measuring the permeability of rocks in connection with oil well drilling is now underway, directed by a University of Texas petroleum engineer.

Dr. George H. Fancher is chairman of the American Petroleum Institute's Committee on API Code No. 27, the code which gives oil researchers a common language in which to exchange research information.

The committee is undertaking revision of the code, last published in 1942, to bring it up to date on results of recent research.

Measurement of permeability is important because it is the foundation of oil production, Dr. Fancher explains. It is the measurement of how much oil can be recovered and how long it will take, based on the ability of the rocks, discovered in early sampling, to transmit fluid.

Company Measures Texas Life Span

NEW YORK — The average length of life in Texas is 61.07 years for white males and 65.96 for white females, according to a state-by-state study of longevity just computed by statisticians of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company. The state's record for longevity is somewhat lower than that for the country as a whole. The figures relate to the time of the last census.

The average length of life for the United States as a whole at that time was 62.87 years for white males and 67.29 for females. Nebraska had the best record with 66.75 years for white males and 70.04 for females.

The differences in longevity observed from state to state are attributed by the statisticians to such factors as the prevailing standards of living, the proficiency of public health administration, and the availability and quality of medical and hospital facilities. "The agricultural states of the Midwest, which enjoy relatively high standards of living, are at the top of the list with respect to longevity," the statisticians comment.

Texas Today

AUSTIN — (AP) — President Truman's victory and the national Democratic sweep put the liberals firmly back in the saddle on the Democratic donkey in Texas.

Dissolution is not the word to describe the party's future in Texas. Realignment is nearer to it. This started back in 1944 and came to a more definite head in 1948, with extreme leftwingers joining the Progressives and rightwingers lining up either with the Republicans or with the States Righters.

Many Texas Democrats have felt that most of the ultra-conservatives who at times have been top leaders were at heart Republicans. There has been, for example, many instances where big contributors have chipped into the war chests of both parties.

Some Democratic leaders believe that during the next four years, quite a few one-time Democrats will openly join the Republicans and it might even result in less squabbling and bickering within the party ranks. This warfare between factions which could not agree on party principles has broken out at numerous recent conventions.

Republican State Chairman Henry Aweifel has frankly invited "purged" Democrats to join the GOP. He believes the Republican vote polled Nov. 2 has given Texas a good start toward becoming a real two-party state. Very few thought it had in 1928, even though the Texas elec-

torial vote went to Herbert Hoover instead of the Democratic nominee for president, Al Smith. Most Republicans then admitted the issue in that race was not partisan, nor has it been in some governor's races where Republicans ran strong—but never strong enough to win.

Evidence of the new Republican hope is the fact the party will set up at Austin a permanent headquarters, looking four years ahead.

In their public pre-election statements, Republican leaders were loud in predicting their party would elect Jack Porter to the Senate and name Republican electors. Privately, they said they thought they had a fighting chance of going Dewey.

If they can persuade some of the new thousands who voted Republican Nov. 2 to stay put, they believe they have a better chance of taking Texas at some future date.

Gov. Beauford H. Jester, titular head of the Democratic Party in Texas, was supported in his first election by many big shots who this year broke away from the Democratic Party to join the Southern revolt.

Many of the present liberal leaders fought him then, but they joined with him when he made up his mind to stick with Truman although he had opposed Truman's civil rights program as a federal project. He has always insisted the Southern states can handle it, and that Texas is—for example, in providing better higher education for Negroes. He expressed hope the party has "proved itself strong enough to get along without its dissenting

elements; now I hope it will prove itself strong enough to get along with them."

Jester called for reeducation to "true democratic principles" and said if the party can not follow a reasonable, middle-of-the-road course, the Truman victory will be only temporary and perhaps costly.

"This still leaves Jester somewhat at odds with many of the group who went all-out for Truman at Fort Worth, but many observers believe the Governor has become more liberal as his administration progressed. Here is what he said he is looking forward to:

"During the next two years I want to work closely with the Legislature in a program of state services that will strengthen our claim to States Rights. In that direction only lies our only chance to meet and defeat a trend toward governmental centralization and federalization."

Many of the liberals would go along with Jester on extension of state services. Whether or not they agree with him in opposing centralization of government is another matter.

The test may come during the 51st Legislature meeting in January. Extension of state services costs a lot of money. A lot of money is available for the Legislature to spend and few doubt that it will spend everything in sight.

If extension of state services should come to the point, for example, of bringing new demand for additional taxation of natural resources, it will be interesting to see how far Jester would go on that point. He opposed new taxes at the last session.

Cherity Foundation Formed at Plainview

DALLAS — (AP) — A new enterprise has been formed to keep the money of rich plainmen on the plains of West Texas.

The Plains Foundation of Texas is backed by F. Ivy Boggs, a tax expert and economic advisor to Wayland College at Plainview.

"The idea of the foundation," Boggs said, "is that many of the rich people of the plains who die leave a great deal of money to charity. This money has always been diverted to Eastern cities like Dallas for worthy institutions."

Headquarters of the organization are in Plainview.

New Well Flows Near San Angelo

SAN ANGELO (AP)—The Plymouth Oil Company reported that flowing oil production developed at its No. 1 J. Wiley Green well in Tom Green County 13 miles southeast of here Wednesday afternoon.

The flow is reported in straw lime at 4,724-54 feet.

W.M. (Mike) Griffith of Sinton, Plymouth vice president in charge of operations, considered the well good for 500 barrels daily as it cleaned to pits at a rate he estimated in excess of ten barrels hourly.

The discovery began flowing naturally through 2 1/2 inch hole after being swabbed seven times through 2-inch tubing from straw lime topped high at 4,870 feet, 2,446 feet below sea level. Seven inch casing was cemented at 4,708 feet.

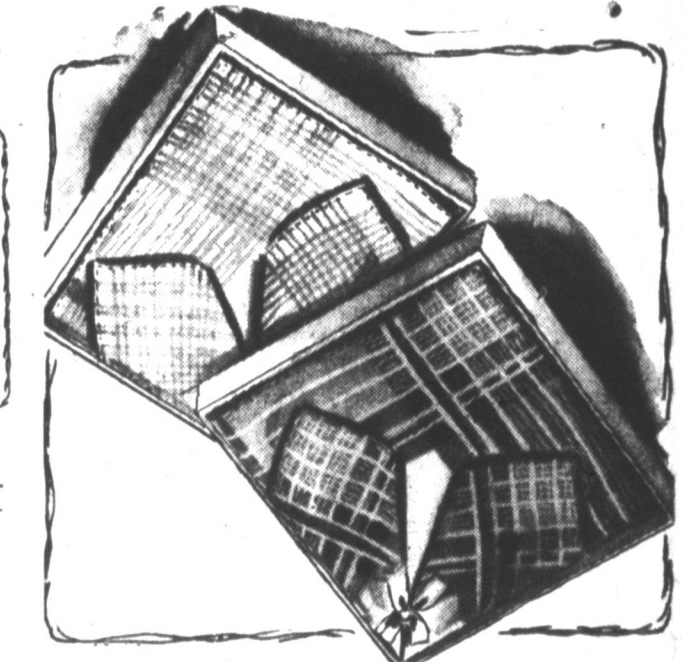

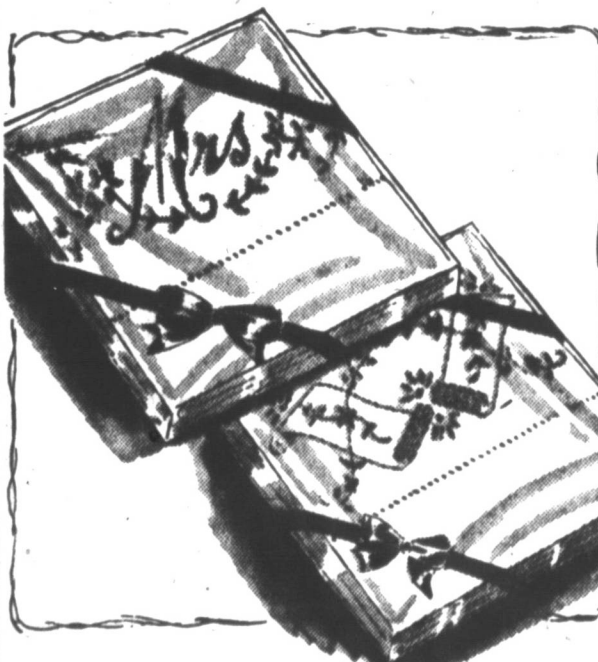

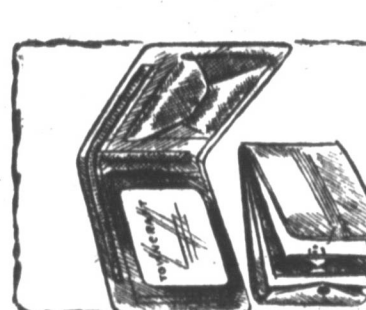

We Lose in 'Playing God' Says Writer

"No nation can play God to the world with any final result except self-destruction," declares Bruce Barton in The Reader's Digest for December. "If the President has the courage to say this—and to implement it with a realistic foreign policy he will win America's gratitude and the surprised respect of every other nation."

Alarmed at the extent of the United States' promises to other countries, "with no program for fulfillment," Barton says that millions of people abroad have been led to believe that America is pledged to solve all their problems. Because America is unable to do so she has become "one of the most unpopular nations in the world."

Europeans are increasingly taking the attitude that their problems are our responsibility, even more than theirs. Some contend that the Marshall Plan is set up not in the interests of Europe, but because the U. S. must give away \$10 billion of goods and money a year to maintain full employment and prevent a depression at home. "They expect to be on our relief rolls for years," Barton says.

The assumption that "we do not want anything from other nations" is branded by the author as a hypocritical lie. Among the things we do want are closer economic cooperation among European countries, so that they will be less dependent upon American aid, stabilized currencies, our share of the Middle East's oil, and raw materials we cannot produce at home.

Our representatives abroad should admit such needs and should state frankly that America's first consideration, in all matters of foreign aid, must be the welfare and security of her own people. Such candor is "language every foreign statesman understands," Barton observes, and will win respect for the United States. For until the strongest nation states its needs, other nations can make no constructive plans.

Scoring our military policy as unrealistic, Barton believes universal conscription to be futile as preparation for a future atomic war. "Once we accept the fact that we are living in an air age and concentrate on a supreme Air Force, we'll begin to make sense. . . . To be profligate

Book on Methods Of Getting More From Oil Fields

AUSTIN.—With new oil fields becoming increasingly hard to find, greater emphasis is being placed on methods of getting more oil from known fields, says a University of Texas petroleum engineering professor.

Dr. George H. Fancher has collaborated with Dr. Morris Muskat, Pittsburgh, Pa., research physicist, on a chapter entitled "Theoretical Considerations Involved in Secondary Recovery Operations" in a forthcoming book being published by the Secondary Recovery Committee of the American Petroleum Institute.

The committee is composed of 300 members from all over the United States, and is revising its initial secondary recovery publication in line with increasing interest in that problem.

Members of the committee from Panhandle area are: Fred Newberry, Leo Fry, M. F. Ludeman, W. L. Boosa, Dallas Bowsher, John M. Harbison, Harvey Lomax, and Roy Johnson, all of Pampa; T. G. Hollingsworth, Jr., and Bob Adams, both of Borger; and R. W. O'Neill of Phillips.

Initial publication of the book was in 1942.

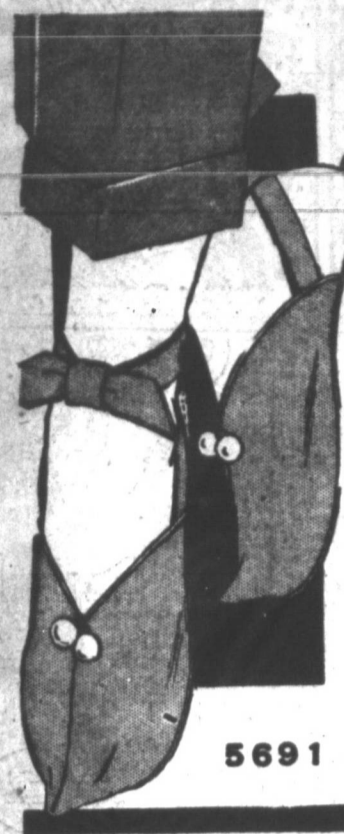

McKENNEY ON BRIDGE

LETS LEAD HOLD TO MAKE CONTRACT

When the bridge players of the nation assemble at the Honey Plaza Hotel in Miami Beach, Fla., Dec. 4 to 12, for the winter session of the national tournament, they will find something there that is quite unusual. The Cabana Sun Club will have a special type of card table, constructed to hold the cards on the table in spite of the brisk ocean breeze.

Today's hand is one that resulted in a lot of interesting discussion at last year's winter national tournament. Three no trump could be made easily, but several North and South pairs found themselves in a difficult five-diamond contract.

West's opening lead of the king of spades held the first trick. If South had made the mistake of taking this trick with dummy's ace, his contract would have been defeated. West continued with the queen of spades, which was won in dummy by the ace, declarer discarding a small club from his own hand.

Now the ace and king of diamonds were cashed, and the king and ace of clubs. A small club was ruffed by declarer with the jack of diamonds, and a small trump led to dummy's ten-spot. On the two high clubs in dummy, declarer discarded two of his losing hearts. After conceding a heart trick, he won the rest of the tricks, making his contract.

If South had made the mistake of taking the first trick with the ace of spades in dummy, it would have been impossible to establish the club suit without first allowing East to get in the lead with the queen of clubs. East then would have switched to the jack of hearts, and this would have defeated the contract.

It was Ann's first get-together with "the girls" after she had brought her second baby home from the hospital, and they were all prepared to lend her their sympathy.

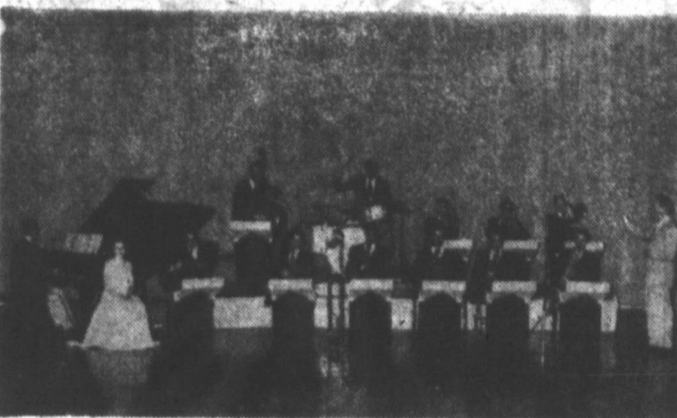
Surely sympathy was indicated when the mother of a 2-year-old baby added the care of a new baby into the routine of her day.

U.N. Group Plans Singapore Meet

SYDNEY—(AP)—The United Nations Economic Commission for Asia and the Far East decided to hold its next session at Singapore six months hence.

The commission, now in session at Lapstone, near Sydney,

gave Singapore six votes, Siam four and the Philippines one.

The Siamese delegate, dapper Prince Praobau Kulsawat, put in a strong bid to have the next session in his country, pointing in glowing colors the advantages of Siam.

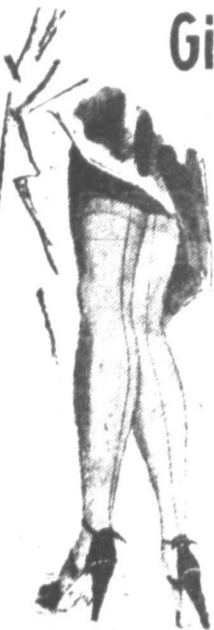
