### Crime Report Suggests **Local Government Test**

federal commission says official political corruption is "a serious impediment to the task of reducing criminality in America." It urges citizens to conduct their own 'do-ityourself" tests of local

In the last of six reports, the National Advisory Commission on Criminal Justice Standards and Goals said Sunday: "The existence of corruption breeds further crime by providing for the citizen a model of official lawlessness that undermines

any acceptable rule of law. The report—basically comp leted before the Watergate scandals came to light-also urged states to require officials to disclose their financial records and to crack down on other corrupt practices.

The study was made under a \$1.7 million grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, a branch of the Justice Department.

#### ABOUT JUSTICE DOUGLAS **House Wants To Ask**

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Rep. Gerald R. Ford is expected to win overwhelming Senate approval to be vice president this week, but his House colleagues want to ask him more questions about an effort to impeach

Justice William O. Douglas. Ford's confirmation was one of the immediate items before Congress, as lawmakers return om a Thanksgiving holiday facing a massive workload that could keep them busy until Christmas.

The Senate planned to debate Ford's nomination today and vote Tuesday. Majority approval in both House and Senate are needed to make him vice president to succeed Spiro T.

Meanwhile, the 60-year old House Republican leader was recalled to testify today before the House Judiciary Committee, where Rep. Jerome Waldie, D-Calif., has charged that Ford's unsuccessful 1970 effort to impeach Douglas from the Supreme Court may have been aided by President Nixon and his former attorney general, John N. Mitchell.

Waldie says his research has established that Ford was acting as the "handmaiden" of Nixon and Mitchell in the impeachment effort and that the Justice Department fed Ford information on Douglas in iolation of its own rules,

'If he in fact was a participant in a concerted political effort by Nixon and Mitchell to impeach Douglas. then it's my view that hisunderstanding of using the Department of Justice only for other than political purposes is lacking," Waldie said Friday.

The military leadership installed Lt. Gen. Phaedon Gyzikis, once a loyal supporter of Papadopoulos, as president of the new regime.

loannides. Greece's new "behind the scenes strongman. planned the takeover which a communique said was carried out because Papadopoulos was frying to fool the Greek people" with plans for free elections

The toppled strongman, who crushed a student-worker uprising the week before fell victim to the same type of bloodless coup he used to seize power as an army colonel 6 1/2 years ago.



### Merchants Taking Efforts Seriously

head of the government's campaign against dangerous toys says merchants seem to be taking the effort more seriously than in the past, and they better or he will "swell" the jails with violators

Richard Simpson, chairman of the Consumer Product Safety Commission, told UPI that few store owners took the program seriously last year, when it was run by the Food and Drug Administration. He said some 55 per cent of all retail stores checked last year were selling banned toys.

Simpson's agency took over the program six months ago.

'I think this year they are taking us more seriously." Simpson said in a Washington Window interview. They really should. We mean to enforce the laws." He said the number of dangerous toys on the market will be reduced or "the lails are going to swell—one or the other

As to what the consumer himself should do. Simpson said, use common sense and watch for toys with sharp points and edges, small parts that might be swallowed and things that might burn.

BEIRUT (UPI) - Arab released seven jailed Pales guerrillas who commandeered a Dutch jumbo jet with 264 persons aboard forced the plane to land today at Libya's Tripoli airport climaxing a 12-hour drama across Middle East

A spokesman for Royal Dutch Airlines (KLM) said all 247 passengers and 17 crewmen aboard the Boeing 747 were in good condition. The Libyan News Agency said it believed there were seven hijackers aboard the plane.

A spokesman for the agency said the plane landed at Tripoli soon after dawn, but five hours later the doors of the craft remained closed. He said nobody tried to get off during that time

Libyan airport officials sent food to the plane, including milk for children aboard.

The company official said radio negotiations were going on between the hijackers and a 'high Libyan official" in the Tripoli control tower. He did not identify the official:

The plane, the world's largest commercial jet, was seized by the hijackers an hour after taking off from Beirut on a flight to New Delhi. The guerrillas ordered the craft back to the Middle East, forced the pilot to land at Damascus where a request for fuel was turned down and then finally

filled up in Nicosia. The aims of the hijackers were unclear

In Nicosia, they threatened to blow up the aircraft with the passengers and crew inside unless the Cypriot government

Although the dispute has been raging in the petroleum and gas utility worlds for some time, it was hrust into the limelight by a big firm of transportation experts, Robertson Distribution Systems of Houston.

Tiis company asked whether it makes sense to spend billions of follars to build special ships to haul LNG from Algeria, the Soviet Union and the Middle East (after the Arabs finally decide to lift the embargo) when methanol can be hauled in ordinary tankers costing only a third as much and which already exist in considerable numbers.

It's true that a ton of LNG contains about twice as much energy as a ton of methanol but LNG has only one major immediate use: it can be quickly gasified and fed into the natural gas system.

Methanol, on the other hand, has many uses, a prominent Oklahoma gas expert pointed out to United Press International. "You can use liquid methanol as it comes off the tanker to run automobiles, as a feedstock to make pipeline grade gas and as a replacement for high sulfur oil and coal as a general fuel.

He said methanol can be used for everything except diesel fuel. He has been urging the domestic manufacture of methanol from coal-"it's an extremely clean fuel." Methanol also can be stored more cheaply than LNG. The Oklahoman, whose company insisted he remain anonymous, said ships costing only \$180 million can haul an equivalent amount of energy in the form of methanol that would require ships costing \$800 million to carry in LNG

Studies published by the British and Dutch and by Harvard University favor methanol over LNG. So does ecologists and Houston Natural Gas Corp., whose Don Freund said, "We see more exciting opportunities nation by hamstringing its for investing capital than energy.

sinking our money in costly LNG ships that have no other use." Freund's company intends ultimately to buy methanol now being flared off as. an unconsumed by-product by Saudi Arabia's Petromin organ-

Why, then, is so much of the gas and pipeline industry eager to invest huge sums in LNG? Contracts for billions of dollars woth of refrigerated LNG tankers have been awarded to major shipbuilders.

'The truth is we need both," the Oklahoma expert conceded. "The trick is to make sure we choose right for particular markets

He said LNG makes sense despite the investment cost if you're in a big enough hurry to get the gas and if you don't have to haul it too far. The transporation break-off point, he said, is about 5,000 miles. From the Middle East, with the Suez Canal closed, the distance is 11,000 miles," he pointed out

'I don't see how the cost of hauling LNG that far can be justified. The return on investment won't be enough.

#### Dealers Seeking Devices' Removal

FORT WORTH, Tex. (UPI) -The New Car Dealers Association of Fort Worth announced it unanimously passed a resolution urging Congress to pass legislation removing antipollution devices from automobiles to save gasoline

during the energy shortage. The organization, made up of 23 franchised dealers in the city, said copies of the resolution would be sent by telegram to the congressmen serving the city and Tarrant County and Texas two senators.

Q. I had an auto accident, but I don't want to report it to my insurance company because my policy might be cancelled. Can I deduct the damage to my car as a casualty loss?

A. No. Although a portion of your unreimbursed damage from an auto accident is generally deductible as a casualty loss, a deduction will be denied to the extent that you fail to claim available reimbursement.

Q. I read that taxes "checked off" on last year's tax return to particular political parties will be transferred to a general fund to be divided among all parties. Is this true?

A. Yes. Recent legislation approved by Congress transfers taxes designated to particular parties on 1972 returns to a general Presidential Election Campaign Fund. The new legislation also provides that on 1973 returns taxpayers will have the option of designating tax only to a general fund which subsequently will be divided among all parties.

Q. Isn't there some sort of tax credit for which retirees may qualify?

Yes. A retiree may qualify for the retirement income credit if he is a U.S. citizen or resident, had \$600 of earned income in each of any 10 calendar years before the current year, and had retirement income during the tax year. For more details, see IRS Publication 524, "Retirement Income Credit." You can get a copy free by contacting your nearest Internal Revenue office.

Q. I paid an employment agency \$300 to find a job for me. Can I deduct this fee?

A. Yes. Employment agency fees paid for securing employment are deductible. However, the IRS regards fees paid for seeking rather than securing employment as not deductible.

## Rules On Refrigerating Foods

By G.C. THOSTESON, M.D. Dear Dr. Thosteson: My mother - in - law, now 83, taught my husband not to put leftover food in the refrigerator until it

If I am correct, I shudder at the thought of how many undiagnosed cases of food poisoning must have occurred. and I think it's remarkable how many of us have survived.

Rapid cooling is not going to harm the food; your explanation about conserving ice is doubtless the correct one. In the old days, if you used all the ice in the ice box, you had to wait until the next time the ice man came.

However, the type and quantity of food involved has some bearing on how soon it should be refrigerated.

As a rule of thumb, a brochure from one of the university extension services. says that food should not be left at room temperature for more than two hours.

The reason, of course, is that by that time bacteria begin to multiply rapidly - in other words, food spoilage begins.







### The Unpegging of Gold

desert with an empty tank and a \$10 bill, would you spend the \$10 on gasoline or on gold?

That, we believe, is the analogy which leads to an understanding of the so-called 'unpegging' of gold. In this space we shall give our

first estimate of what the unpegging means, and we will also try to brush away one of the officialy spun cobwebs of confusion.

The story starts with oil. For more than a decade. Europeans had been getting a big part of their energy supply from Arab countries. At the onset of the Mideast War, the Arabs turned their oil valve off. This action left European manufacturers and consumers virtually stranded. Up to that time, the Europeans had held a surplus of U.S. dollars. They had been trading those dollars for gold as rapidly as feasible. But when the Arabs shut down their supply, the U.S. in effect was running the only service station in town. That is, for Europe. American producers were the only alternative source of energy.

Because of climbing American oil exports, the dollar was recovering in recent months. The balance of payments that had been so unfavorable to the U.S. throughout 1972 was being brought closer to balance during 1973. Thus, the American dollar was like a sick man who was getting better; it had one leg out of bed.

At this point, the U.S. Government and six European countries saw a chance to take advantage of the recovery. Acting together, they decided that the U.S. ought no longer to hold gold in storage, but ought to be free to sell gold on the free market when government officials so choose. Instead of holding gold at a theoretical price of \$42.22 an ounce, the U.S.

now has the latitude to sell gold in the vicinity of \$100 an ounce. . Ordinarily, the freeing of gold would have been considered a

devaluation, and that probably still is the case. But the devaluation that took place officially came at a time when an upward valuation was occuring unofficially in the marketplace (as a result of the oil situation). The net result should turn out to be a more reliable dollar, a more useful dollar for international trade because of a greater stability. This stability arises from oil exports and a new potential for gold exports, both at advantageous prices from this

country's view Some amount of nonsense originated from government sources about the "unpegging." Government economist Pierre A. Rinfret told the press, "By a stroke of the pent the United States has increased the value of its gold reserves from \$10 billion to \$25 billion." May we suggest that no pen under heaven is capable of such creativity

The only change - the real change to which Rinfret referred - was the gold value of the dollar

In brief, from the European standpoint, the U.S. dollar represents a quantity of fuel. Whenever the Arabs open up their European "filling station" again. Americans no longer will have a virtual monopoly on Europe's oil business. Europeans will have a choice and probably would go back to Arab oil which can be delivered to them cheaper. At that time, it is reasonable to suppose that Europeans once again will prefer to convert their surplus dollars to gold instead of buying high - price American fuel.

In the meantime, our estimate is that the 'unpegging' of gold is a healthy step in the direction of

It is possible for a trial not to be public and yet to be a fair one and do justice.

The reason for a public trial springs out of the gap between theory and practice, in the crevice between possibility and actuality. Public trial is a means for providing eyewitness

President Caught In Crisis Box

By RAY CROMLEY WASHINGTON (NEA) President Nixon is caught in an economic box. He had been slowing the economy in an attempt to curb inflation. reasoning that if we had less to spend it would cut demand enough to force prices down.

Whether or not that approach would have worked we may never know. For the energy crunch has destroyed his program. That crunch, sparked by the oil shortage, will amplify the slowdown in the economy well past the President's limits - perhaps to a very serious

Even without the Arab petroleum cutbacks, the impending sluggishness of the economy in 1974 threatened considerably greater enemployment and increasing hardships even for those men and women with steady. èmployment

Only large amounts of overtime have enabled many factory workers to get by despite inflation.

Now the hefty price rises of the first 10 months of this year. combined with the expected decline in overtime as the economy slows, ensure that labor, which had been surprisingly moderate in its wage demands in recent periods, will push heavily for major increases in the 1974

An upsurge in labor costs. combined with continued increases in the price of most imported goods, will ensure that the demand - pull inflation when demand far exceeds supply) so greatly feared by Mr. Nixon will, as fate would have it, merely be replaced by cost - push inflation, which results when the costs of production increase sharply.

Historically, cost - push inflation has been even more difficult to handle than demand pull. So we may be jumping from the frying pan into the fire.

The oil shortage will, of course, intensify this trend. For higher energy costs, by their very nature, spread through an economy like wildfire, from goods to services and back again - bringing a greater pressure for added wage boosts. There is nothing that energy does not affect, directly or indirectly

Obviously too, as prices increase and wages fail to keep pace, even though increasing. the average household will have

The stock markets have already felt the pressure. It is not good for the automobile industry, for the maker's of applicances, the operators of restaurant operators, those who manufacture a variety of luxury

goods and a host of others. The greatest problems however is what all this foretells for the years beyond 1974. There is a certain momentum to an economy. despite its ups and downs. And an economy which loses this momentum, as when it slides into a recession as distinct from a limited slowdown, often takes considerable time to recover. Hopefully, therefore, there

will be a quick ending to the Mideast crisis, with an increase country to get by temporarily. But what must be emphasized is that word temporarily. Without a long - term solution somewhat independent of the Mideast, this country will continue on the razor's edge. And a new crisis could come at any time.

### White House Aide Sees Hysteria **But Not A National Energy Crisis**

one of President Nixon's brain trusters is standing tall against the waves of energy - crunch hysteria sweeping the land

And, since this White House adviser is Secretary of the Treasury George Shultz, it's worth reporting that he is attempting to cool the heated gloom - and - doom predictions of national disaster. These include one industrialist's announcement that our entire way of life and the American system itself soon will collapse because of the Arab oil boycott

If George Shultz says there's no actual nation - wide crunch. I believe it.

And the fantastically erudite world - traveled Shultz says: Some 85 per cent of our energy is produced in the U.S. and body can boycott us out of

boycott may be a blessing in disguise. Now we must do what we need to do. Let's not be dependent on them (the Arab sheiks, kings, emirs and sultans

Shultz adds that this nation is in a boom. We must reduce our fuel demand 15 per cent, or find the 15 per cent by cutting unessential use without hurting the economy - give industry what it needs to maintain employment levels even if it means keeping homes cooler and slowing the speed of pleasure - bound cars.

Backing this upbeat thrust is a General Accounting Office report developed by the GAO's foreign staffs operating mostly in Frankfurt, Germany, and London

### Deny Is 4-Letter Word

WASHINGTON - One of the already clear that the outlook is post - Watergate, afflictions of the American body politic is semantic dyslexia. When we hear a public figure denying motel chains, highway charges made against him. certain of his words and phrases come to take on a diametrically

> opposite meaning. Thus, watching one high ranking figure "categorically deny' what he called an "incredible accusation" a few evenings ago. I couldn't help but feel sorry for the man. What aroused my sympathy was the queasy feeling that maybe he

was telling the truth. Call me naive, but stranger things have happened. After all, simply because a well - known man categorically denies an incredible accusation doesn't in oil shipments, enabling this, necessarily mean he's guilty of

the charge Conceded, it does look bad on the surface. What lawyers call strong circumstantial evidence For the experience of the last year counsels that where there is the smoke of denial there is generally the fire of duplicity.

Nevertheless, granting a high ranking figure was caught redhanded in the act of categorically denying something: suppose he actually was responding to an 'incredible' charge? Well, he has something of a problem facing him, doesn't he? Specifically, that the English language is composed of only so many words of denial, most of which have taken a pretty good mauling in recent times.

To be sure, nobody can advise a man in that sort of spot what to say. But given precedents set by those who have gone before. we know there are things he shouldn't say if he wants to be believed - trigger words of innocence guaranteed to convince people of the speaker's

Take the adverb 'categorically' itself. A dead giveaway. Everybody in the past year facing charges has 'categorically" denied them. It would have been better had our man made an "uncategorical" denial. A tongue - twister. perhaps, but it might at least nake people stop and think.

And what about those superlative adjectives of denial which, thanks to trial - and error experimentation in the White House press briefing next best thing: candor.

suspicion? For example, the use of the

word "incredible." Nothing convinces people more of the believability of a charge these days than to call it "incredible." The same is true of the word "outrageous." which not only assures believability but is also apt to get people mad. Ditto 'ridiculous." Some people don't even begin to take a charge seriously unless they hear it labeled "ridiculous."

Again, in the area of predicates of denial, the word nocent," as in "I am, etc.," is now considered a virtual affirmation of guilt. And 'deny' itself, keep in mind, is a four - letter word.

Finally, there are those phrases thrown out in the hope hat the charge will simply disappear on verbal contact. The best - known post Watergate example of this approach is for the accused to open and end his denial with the line. When the full story is told

By all accounts, the over whelming majority of Americans consider use of this line as ironclad proof that if the speaker has anything to do with

So much for the no - nos of denial. But what about the vesyeses? What remedy is there for the country's semantic dyslexia? Consider the bizarre course of

denial taken by a candidate running for governor of a Deep Southern state who was charged with about every political malfeasance his opponent could shake a stick at. How did he handle it? Very simply. By opening each of his campaign speeches with a flat confession: Believe me. folks, I'm guilty of everything my opponents say about me Guilty, guilty,

Incredibly, outrageously, ridiculously, he won in a landslide. And there's a moral (if not a remedy) there somewhere. Not much by way of affirmation of the sound judgment of the electorate, of

Granted, honesty is the best policy. But if they can't get that. the American people may be perfectly willing to settle for the

of it is justified since ioblessness is beginning repeat, beginning - to develop across the land. Some of the hysteria is simply alarmist. Such as the Women's Christian Temperance Union's demand for the slowing of whiskey making

And the rather startling. seemingly overheated prediction by Robert Anderson. chairman of Atlantic - Richfield Co., who announced that some 7 million to 8 million Americans will be jobless in four months if the Arab boycott continues and there is no American accommodation with the Arabs. Either he's right or Shultz's upbeat analysis, diametrically

contradictory, is correct. Shultz appears to be supported by White House domestic affairs chief Mel Laird who told some of us at lunch the other day that we can recoup some 15 per cent of our missing energy needs by upping Texas production, by using some Naval Petroleum Reserves, and some new tax techniques, just for starters.

Why then is serious trouble developing on the industrial front? In Buffalo, N.Y., the other night I learned of one big oil - less plant awaiting midnight word from/its Canadian fuel suppliers on whether they would ship in enough oil to enable the plant to

'Gag Nixon' Push in House

Denies President's Rights By Robert S. Allen

denunciation of President Nixon's series of free - wheeling talks with bipartisan members of Congress would be funny if it weren't so serious.

In effect, what O'Neill was irately doing was verbally beating the President over the head on two counts:

(1) For speaking out in his own defense; in other words, denying the President the constitutional right of every citizen to be heard. For weeks, the President's opponents have been furiously clamoring that he submit to bareknuckled grilling about Watergate and related issues. (2) That discordant blast was the tip - off of what really incensed O'Neill - the President's tough resistance to the Democrats' secret plan to ram through impeachment if they can't high - pressure him into resigning

That's the whole inside story. If the President doesn't voluntarily quit, his opponents will do their utmost to get his

scalp by force (impeachment). That's really what O'Neill is saying: even going to the astonishing extent of trying to muzzle the President on the basic right to speak for himself. To the Democratic floor leader of the House that is

unbecoming and improper O'Neill seemed startled when his gag concept was greeted by a chorus of hisses. The bulky Massachusetts politico shouldn't have been. Even members of his own party were taken aback by his extremist stricture. It's significant that it was not echoed by other Democratic leaders

Republicans were unsparing in their condemnation notably two members of the Judiciary Committee, Reps. Harold Froehlich, Wis., and David Dennis, Ind.

Freehlich bluntly charged pressed from the offices of Speaker Carl Albert, Okla., and floor leader O'Neill, Judiciary Committee chairman Peter Rodino, D-N.J., was disparagingly brushed off by Froehlich as "merely a messenger boy running the





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### Classical Records

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By WILBUR G. LANDREY NEW YORK (UPI) - Not many records are published in the dead business days of summer or when presumably the buyers are off vacationing, so it's a good time to mention some records still in the previously unheard pile from months past.

For those interested in Spanish music from the 16th Century, there are two interesting records from Angel. One is from The Early Music

Consort of London under the direction of David Munrow entitled Music from the Court of Ferdinard and Isabella

These are mostly pieces for voices and instruments from the Palace Songbook (Cancionera Musical de Palacio) at the Royal Library in Madrid. The Early Music Consort does these things with both scholarship and love.

The second record (S-36914) is called the Sounds of 16th Century Spain and is by organist Paul Bernard performing on the great historic organs of the churches of San Jaime of Calatayud and of Santa Maria of Daroca.

They are wonderful organ compositions by 16th Century composers excellently played.

Pianist Stephen Bishop has an excellent reputation for Beethoven, and he reinforces it with a recording of two of the three sonatas from Op. 31 - No. 2 in D minor and No. 3 in E flat (Philips 6500

Wrttten in 1802 at a time when Beethoven was searching for new paths, numbers one and three look to the past, number two to the future.

Rimsky-Korsakov's symphonic suite "Antar", listed as his Symphony No. 2 is spectacular and colorful and even on first hearing is apt to sound familiar.

Kontantin Ivanov conducts the Moscow Radio Symphony Orchestra in a good recording of Antar and the well-known Capriccio Espagnol (Angel-Melodiya SR-40230).

#### Investment Chatter


By United Press International NEW YORK (UPI) - Volume in the stock market should remain high, according to Zelome Interprets. "Christmas volume has grown in importance with a rising standard of living, in particular, and the gain in the affluent society," the firm says.

Mutual funds may be a big factor in reviving stock prices in the future, according to the Alexander Hamilton Institute. The firm says conditions are such that the "funds may be right for another period of high popularity when the market comes around, perhaps comparable to their great success of the early 1960s.

The erratic performance of he market in the past few sessions is the first halting step toward establishing a major market bottom, according to the Dreyfus Fund. The firm noted the Dow Jones industrial average has dropped sharply during the past few sessions, but said it would reach a decline level and then progress

### Youngsters Immunization Campaign Brings Results

youngsters against childhood diseases ranging up to 32 per cent for one disease have been recorded in Texas as a result of a month - long campaign in October, it was reported by Howard D. McMahan of Dallas, regional director for the U.S. Department of Health. Education and Welfare

"But, although the campaign is over, we still must encourage parents of young children in our five - state area to see that their children are immunized against such diseases as rubella. measles, polio, diptheria, tetanus and pertussis (whooping cough)," McMahan warned

There is somewhat of a problem because parents don't worry too much about these diseases as a result of the vaccines that have all but

eliminated them from the list of common childhood problems, McMahan continued.

Congratulating Texas. McMahan said, "Preliminary reports indicate total doses administered during October hit 331,151, an increase over last October of 32 per cent in the five states of Texas, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Louisiana and New Mexico.

Conducted through state and local health departments. immunizations in Texas totaled 23,800 for rubella (up 20 per cent); 22,200 for measles (up 27 per cent); and 94,470 for polio (up 32 per cent).
