

AUSTIN (AP) - Young drivers who complete stateapproved, parent-taught driver education courses will be eligible for a 10 percent auto insurance discount, the state's insurance commissioner decided today.

The discount already is available to young drivers who complete traditional, school-taught drivers education courses.

Lawmakers, parents and industry officials all told Commissioner Elton Bomer this morning that teen-agers taught to drive by their parents are at least as good and often better — at driving than those who go through traditional school training.

"Who has the most time with a teen-ager? The parents," said Charles Taylor, a director of program development for National Driver Training, a company that develops parent-taught driver education courses.

Pampa mayor and county judge judges think they candidate Bob Neslage says he violated the Texas Code of Judicial Conduct by publicly endorsing a candidate for the March primary.

But, Neslage told The Pampa News he was unaware of the state law when he spoke out in favor of some judges only in the fellow Republican candidates.

Neslage, who attended Dr. Joe Lowry's election announcement on Dec. 2, publicly announced his support of Lowry's candidacy.

"I know you're the man for the party, you'll bring consensus to the party," Neslage said of Lowry.

Thursday, Jan. 8, Neslage attended an announcement for Steve Emmert and again publicly supported Emmert, who is running for judge of the 31st Judicial District

The Code of Judicial Conduct states, "A judge, or a candidate for the election or appointment to judicial office shall not make speeches for a political organization or candidate or publicly endorse a candidate for public office."

DeAnn Scott, an attorney on the Texas Judicial Conduct Committee in Austin, confirmed that the term "judge" in the handbook refers to a county judge, or in this case, a candidate running for county judge.

# Library workers busy getting ready for move

The library staff is making a big effort to make sure as much of its resources as possible are available at the Baker school annex during the upcoming renovation, but not everything can be.

The day after the city commission approved using the Baker school annex on Tuke Street as a temporary site for the library the staff and volunteers got busy Wednesday boxing up much of the collection for the move.

While the position of head librarian is still vacant many of the command decisions are left to Bill Hilderbrandt, Pampa's director of Community Services. He is the person who

worked out the details of using one of Pampa's recently closed elementary schools as a temporary base and has arranged for the utility and phone changes necessary for such a move. Many of the day-to-day decisions and labor have been left to other members of the library staff like children's librarian Shanla Brookshire.

Brookshire spent much of her day Wednesday putting cardboard boxes together, filling them and getting them ready to trans-

Because of space limitations there will be a few items that will be boxed but available if needed and some items that will not be available at all at Baker.

# **Arson cause of three** house fires this month

Three fires this month are being handled as arson, according to Gary Stevens, fire marshal for the City of Pampa.

One of them resulted in the arrest of two 12-yearold girls. That house, at 709 Jordan, had a small pile of trash set on fire in the middle of the living room Monday morning. A neighbor saw the two girls run from the abandoned house which had minimal damage.

That is in contrast to the other two houses where damage was more severe. A house fire Jan. 19, at 744 Scot,t essentially destroyed the house which was unoccupied but still full of furniture. The owners of that house moved and have not been located, according to Pampa Fire Marshal Gary Stevens. He believes they moved to the Las Vegas area but has

A vacant house at 839 Russell, belonging to J. C. Honeycut, was not as severely damaged but one bedroom was destroyed and smoke and water damage was more widespread.

The fires at Scott and Russell both happened in the early morning hours and may be related, according to Stevens. "I don't have enough to say their related but it is a possibility we're investigating.'


The three arsons are especially upsetting to him because he moved up from assistant fire marshal to fire marshal just this month when Tommy Adams

This year Gray County property owners saw the amount they owe in local taxes in one lump sum on tax statements sent out by Sammie Morris and the Gray County Tax Department.

"We are now consolidated," Morris told commissioners at the most

recent commissioners court session. Morris is collecting taxes for eight local entities, simplifying what used to be a more complex process involving other collection agencies and more tax statements

By the first of February, Morris said, the Lefors Independent School District will be added to the list, bringing the number of agencies her office serves up to nine.

S"Often county judges think they don't have to comply," Scott said, because the code began to apply to county judges only in the last few years.

ings, they must comply." County judges who work purely in an administrative capacity are exempt. But the Gray County Judge does maintain judicial proceedings and must then be in accordance with the code, according to

Neslage, who is running for Gray County Judge in the March primary officially filed for candidacy on Dec. 5. - three days after publicly endorsing Lowry. However, Neslage admits to publicly supporting Emmert after filing for candidacy.

# Immunity deal sours today with former intern Lewinsky

WASHINGTON (AP) — Monica Lewinsky's deal. lawyer met briefly with Whitewater prosecutor "If you asked if we made any progress, we are an immunity deal have gone sour. The prosecutor defense," attorney William Ginsburg said. then asked a judge to stop evidence-gathering in the separate Paula Jones lawsuit.

Starr said it was necessary to put the Jones lawsuit on hold because lawyers in that case were interfering with his criminal investigation of the Lewinsky matter by pursuing the same witnesses and evidence.

Both sides in the Jones suit "are attempting to take strategic advantage of the ongoing criminal investigation to their own benefit — with the inevitable effect of disrupting that investigation," Starr wrote in a motion filed in Little Rock, Ark.

His dramatic request to halt the civil case that spawned Starr's investigation of an alleged presidential affair and coverup came after Lewsinky's tify. attorney sounded a down note about his latest meeting with the prosecutor over an immunity office.

He said the meeting, which lasted less than an hour, was "face-to-face" and declined to provide further details.

On Wednesday, Ginsburg had said that if talks designed to reach an immunity deal for Ms. Lewinsky in exchange for her testimony broke down, he would turn to preparing a defense for the former White House intern.

Ginsburg previously confirmed his client was told by prosecutors she was a target who is likely to be indicted.

Ginsburg and Starr's investigators had been in regular contact in recent days as they tried to clarify points in her formal offer earlier this week to tes-

There was no immediate comment from Starr's



# Texans weigh **NATO** expansion

The question of whether to expand the North American Treaty Organization continues to loom large in our nation's foreign policy debates.

NATO is the most successful security alliance in history. It has maintained peace in Europe during the half-century that followed two bloody and tragic wars.

Texans remain unconvinced, however, that any further expansion of NATO is desirable. Only 40 percent of those who answered my annual questionnaire favor enlarging the alliance; 74 percent said they believe the United States should be contributing less money to support the alliance, 25 percent want the level of support kept about the same, and one percent said we should spend more. In addition, 97 percent of you don't believe our European allies are paying an equitable portion of the NATO bill. What follows are some of your obser-

From Baytown: "I am not in favor of NATO expansion if it means more money going out of the United States and being

From Boerne: "NATO has outlived its usefulness. The United States always has paid more than its fair share. But if our own citizens take every advantage they can of our government, why should we expect foreign countries to do any

From Carrizo Springs: "I believe we should begin to gradually reduce our contribution to NATO until the Europeans are carrying their own burden."

From Sugarland: "Adding new members to NATO makes sense to me. Those thousands of American boys in cemeteries all over Europe paid the ultimate price the last time we tried to turn our backs on Europe."

From Denton: "Of course we've got to expand NATO. Are we supposed to just sit here and allow the gains that freedom has made in eastern Europe be at risk. Don't we stand to benefit greatly from a stable, peaceful Europe?'

From Archer City: "Get us out of the United Nations, of NATO and all related efforts. We need to regain our sovereignty. Our Constitution doesn't permit relinquishing sover-

eignty to any organization or entity."

From Vidor: "If we are going to be spending more on our security, how about guarding our southern borders for a change? If we took just half of what we spend on NATO and

used it to reinforce the border, many of the problems we have here in Texas would be fixed." From Corsicana: "We should stop expanding NATO, for now. The level of our financial support is about right, and should be continued. But European countries are not paying their fair share of the cost of NATO. Our financial support of the Middle East appears to be in need of review as well. We spent something like \$8 billion last year to secure peace there,

but progress seems less and less. A big review needs to be From Texas City: "Why do we not support small, poor countries who really need help when they're invaded? In reality, what can we do for countries that are having civil wars that go

back hundreds of years?" If we are going to add new members to NATO, we will have to do so in a way that accounts for the concerns these Texans and others have raised. As a global superpower, America has a unique set of national security interests. We must weigh all these responsibilities and put them in proper perspective in order to maintain the ability to defend our interests at home and abroad. Most importantly, U.S. taxpayers cannot be expected to pick up an unfair portion of the tab.

# Tackling Social Security, Medicare

On parallel tracks that converge in 1999 safely past the next elections - President Clinton and Congress have commissioned efforts to resolve the 21st century financial crunches awaiting Medicare and Social Security. Given the political sensitivity and the sweep

of those massive programs, it won't be done without a consensus on hard answers. "Changes are inevitable," said Sen. Bob Kerrey, D-Neb., a veteran in the campaign for

entitlement reform. "The question is when." And the answer, he said, is when Americans understand that it has to be done, and that the

longer it takes the more difficult it will be. The National Bipartisan Commission on the Future of Medicare is assigned to look for one on that program over the next year, to settle on reforms and future financing, and to start selling the nation on the idea.

Kerrey is a member of that panel, which he sees as heir to his own commission on the entitlement program, which agreed on the problems looming with Americans living longer and the wave of people reaching retirement age beginning in 10 to 12 years.

If we delay action now, the choices will be higher taxes for Americans still in the work force or larger benefit reductions to retirees," the commission said in acknowledging that it couldn't agree on what to do.

Now, in that case, was more than three years "Tough action is needed sooner rather than later," the commission advised Clinton

Clinton's only Medicare mention in his State of the Union address was his proposal to open the system to uninsured Americans at 55, entitling them to buy health insurance that way. "It won't add a dime to the deficit," Clinton said, but Republicans and not a few Democrats doubt that.

The president dealt with the other track, strengthening Social Security, telling Congress that "every penny of any surplus" in the pro-Kerrey recommended then that the eligibility jected era of balanced budgets should be

reserved until a plan is enacted to ensure the long-term health of the retirement system.

By Congressional Budget Office estimates, surpluses could add up to \$660 billion over the next decade, and Republicans prefer to use the money to cut taxes and make payments against the national debt, which includes government borrowing from the Social Security trust fund.

Clinton didn't talk about what to do, but about preparing to do it over the next year. He said he'll convene regional forums around the He proposed then, and has since sponsored country, seeking "a true consensus on how to proceed," and will convene the leaders of Congress to work on legislation early in 1999.

Clinton, 51, put it in personal terms at the University of Illinois on Wednesday. He said the problem hits "when the baby boomers retire, starting with me – I'm the oldest of the baby boomers - people my age and down about 18 years younger ..

Putting the government's two biggest direct benefit programs on the agenda for overhauls in 1999 is so ambitious as to be improbable.

# Police say interstate vehicle theft ring barns like something out of Bond movie

barns at the Lawhon Exotic Ranch looked ordinary on the outside, but on closer inspection it was more like something out of a James Bond movie, authorities say.

The ranch had a collection of donkey, emus and Texas longhorns, but its barns contained hidden compartments and industrialstrength ramps that a high-tech, interstate theft ring used to conceal at least 25 vehicles - ranging from earth-moving equipment to a spanking new Cadillac.

A Johnson County commissioner said he watched in amazement last Friday as a man attempted to haul off a county-owned 38,000pound back loader parked along a

Pam Jetsel, a spokeswoman for the Johnson County sheriff's department, said commissioner R.C. McFall saw the man trying to load the heavy equipment and contacted deputies, who arrested the ranch's owner, Charles Wayne

Lawhon, 48. Hood County Sheriff Allen Hardin said officers found stolen vehicles, some traced to Iowa and Arkansas, hidden inside the barn.

"When the ramp was up, it just looked like a barn," Hardin said. "But when you flipped a switch boom - there would be Dodge pickups, Chevy Tahoes and Suburbans on the second floor. It was unreal. There was all kinds of equipment up there."

Authorities believe the vehicles are valued at more than \$2 million. Lawhon was arrested Friday night on a charge of suspicion of theft over \$100,000. He was

The barns, equipped with hightech amenities that fascinated investigators, are part of his client's RV business, Carter said.

"He uses them to store vehicles for his business," Carter said. "They may look like barns, but they're storage facilities."

Hardin said he would not discuss how the vehicles were stolen until two other suspects are captured.

Lawhon appeared to prefer Chrysler vehicles, Hardin said. "I think he had a Dodge fetish," Hardin said. "They were all over

the place." Officers said McFall was driving home last Friday when he saw the man with a flatbed trailer parked beside an earth mover what's out there.'

"I told him, You need to stay right there, I'm calling the sheriff," McFall said.

The man, whom authorities later identified as Lawhon, apparently had damaged his truck or trailer trying to load the \$133,000 earth mover and was summoning help on his cellular phone.

Between 25 and 50 cars and trucks will be recovered along with dozens of construction and recreational vehicles, Hardin said.

"You can find just about any type of equipment out there you want," said McFall, who toured the ranch Tuesday. "Jet skis, golf carts, Bobcat front-end loaders they had to bring in a computer just to catalog all of the stuff, and I think they had to get Lawhon to help them. There ain't no telling







# Report: Ramseys turn clothing over to police

DENVER (AP) - The parents of JonBenet Ramsey have complied with a police request to turn over the clothing they were wearing the night before their daughter was found slain, the Denver Post reported today

Police received two shirts, a pair of pants and a sweater this week from John and Patsy Ramsey, the newspaper reported, citing anonymous sources.

Police spokeswoman Leslie Aaholm declined to live in Atlanta.

Sources told the newspaper that police asked for the clothing two months ago to compare with fiber evidence in the 13-month-old case.

Police conducted preliminary interviews with the Ramseys on Dec. 26, 1996 - the day the little beauty pageant winner was found beaten and strangled in the basement of the family's Boulder home. It took four months of negotiations between prosecutors and the Ramseys' lawyers to arrange formal interviews with the couple.

The Ramseys have proclaimed their innocence. The couple and their 11-year-old son, Burke, now
