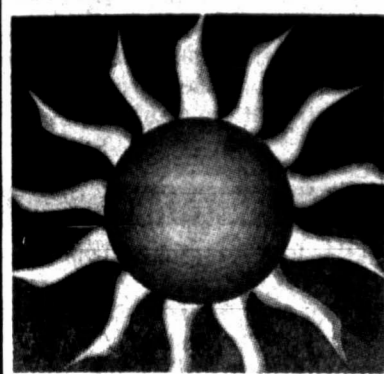

**AUSTIN (AP)** — Young drivers who complete state-approved, parent-taught driver education courses will be eligible for a 10 percent auto insurance discount, the state's insurance commissioner decided today.

The discount already is available to young drivers who complete traditional, school-taught drivers education courses.

Lawmakers, parents and industry officials all told Commissioner Elton Bomer this morning that teen-agers taught to drive by their parents are at least as good — and often better — at driving than those who go through traditional school training.

"Who has the most time with a teen-ager? The parents," said Charles Taylor, a director of program development for National Driver Training, a company that develops parent-taught driver education courses.

## Endorsement law catches candidate off guard, he says

Pampa mayor and county judge candidate Bob Neslage says he violated the Texas Code of Judicial Conduct by publicly endorsing a candidate for the March primary.

But, Neslage told *The Pampa News* he was unaware of the state law when he spoke out in favor of some fellow Republican candidates.

Neslage, who attended Dr. Joe Lowry's election announcement on Dec. 2, publicly announced his support of Lowry's candidacy.

"I know you're the man for the party, you'll bring consensus to the party," Neslage said of Lowry.

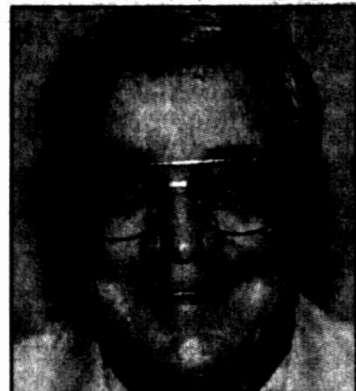
Thursday, Jan. 8, Neslage attended an announcement for Steve Emmert and again publicly supported Emmert, who is running for judge of the 31st Judicial District Court.

The Code of Judicial Conduct states, "A judge, or a candidate for the election or appointment to judicial office shall not make speeches for a political organization or candidate or publicly endorse a candidate for public office."

DeAnn Scott, an attorney on the Texas Judicial Conduct Committee in Austin, confirmed that the term "judge" in the handbook refers to a county judge, or in this case, a candidate running for county judge.

## Candidate statement made 'to clear the air'

Mayor Bob Neslage, Republican county judge candidate in the upcoming March 10 primary issued the following statement this week:

## Library workers busy getting ready for move

The library staff is making a big effort to make sure as much of its resources as possible are available at the Baker school annex during the upcoming renovation, but not everything can be.

The day after the city commission approved using the Baker school annex on Tuke Street as a temporary site for the library the staff and volunteers got busy Wednesday boxing up much of the collection for the move.

While the position of head librarian is still vacant many of the command decisions are left to Bill Hilderbrandt, Pampa's director of Community Services. He is the person who

worked out the details of using one of Pampa's recently closed elementary schools as a temporary base and has arranged for the utility and phone changes necessary for such a move. Many of the day-to-day decisions and labor have been left to other members of the library staff like children's librarian Shanla Brookshire. Brookshire spent much of her day Wednesday putting cardboard boxes together, filling them and getting them ready to transport.

Because of space limitations there will be a few items that will be boxed but available if needed and some items that will not be available at all at Baker.

## Arson cause of three house fires this month

Three fires this month are being handled as arson, according to Gary Stevens, fire marshal for the City of Pampa.

One of them resulted in the arrest of two 12-year-old girls. That house, at 709 Jordan, had a small pile of trash set on fire in the middle of the living room Monday morning. A neighbor saw the two girls run from the abandoned house which had minimal damage.

That is in contrast to the other two houses where damage was more severe. A house fire Jan. 19, at 744 Scott, essentially destroyed the house which was unoccupied but still full of furniture. The owners of that house moved and have not been located, according to Pampa Fire Marshal Gary Stevens. He believes they moved to the Las Vegas area but has

no address or phone number.

A vacant house at 839 Russell, belonging to J. C. Honeycut, was not as severely damaged but one bedroom was destroyed and smoke and water damage was more widespread.

The fires at Scott and Russell both happened in the early morning hours and may be related, according to Stevens. "I don't have enough to say their related but it is a possibility we're investigating."

The three arsons are especially upsetting to him because he moved up from assistant fire marshal to fire marshal just this month when Tommy Adams retired.

Stevens urges anyone who might have information to call the fire marshals office or Crime Stoppers at 669-2222 to help solve these crimes.

Morris is collecting taxes for eight local entities, simplifying what used to be a more complex process involving other collection agencies and more tax statements.

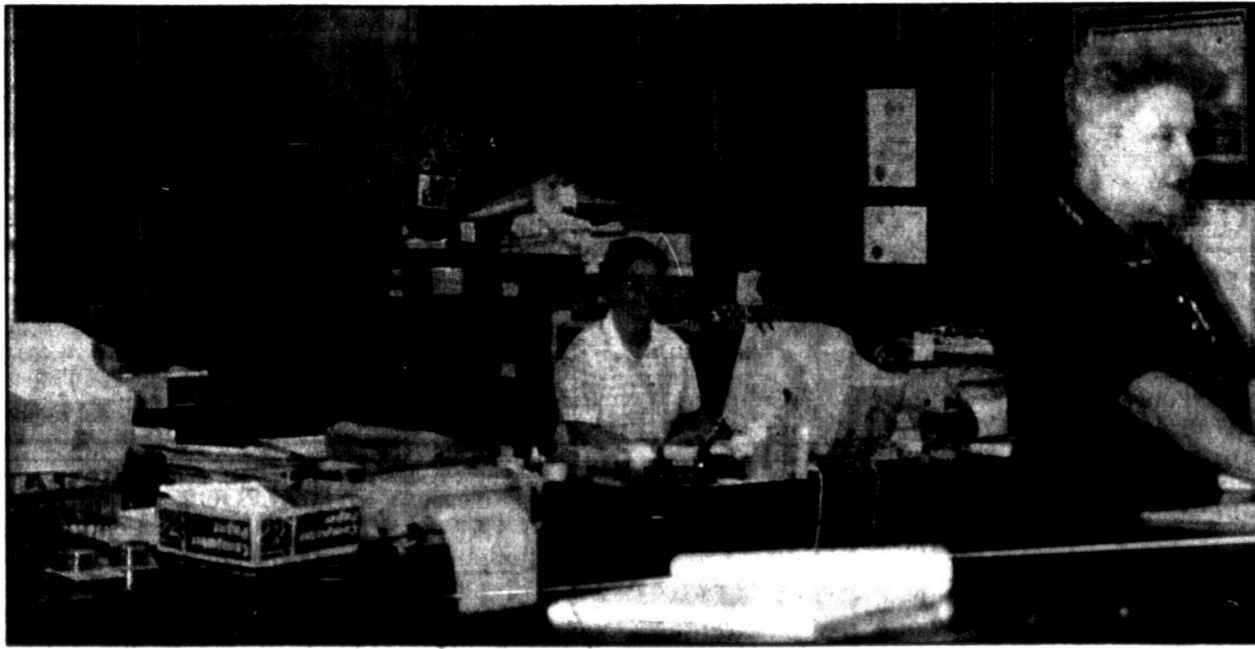
By the first of February, Morris said, the Lefors Independent School District will be added to the list, bringing the number of agencies her office serves up to nine.

### Twentieth Century home tour benefits scholarship fund

CANYON — The Twentieth Century Club of Pampa recently held a home tour to benefit The Opportunity Plan, Inc., of Canyon. The Opportunity Plan offers low interest loans and scholarships to help area college students meet educational expenses. The plan, established in 1954 by Milton "Buff" Morris, has helped more than 5,500 students attend the college or university of their choice. A student loan or scholarship from the Opportunity Plan can help fill in the gap between a student's available funds and the cost of attending college.

The plan provides the highest level of personal attention from a dedicated and experienced staff. Student loans through the plan carry a seven percent interest rate. Loan pay-

ments are deferred and interest is not charged as long as the student remains in school full-time and maintains a 2.00 grade point average. Opportunity Plan student loans are intended to assist students unable to obtain a subsidized Federal Stafford Loan.

Student loan applications are accepted at any time of the year. Processing can take up to one month. Applicants are required to complete a financial budget for the semester they are requesting aid. Additional requirements include letters of recommendation, academic transcripts, verification of enrollment and eligibility for federal aid.

Students completing at least 12 hours of college work should contact an Opportunity

Plan staff member to see if they are eligible to apply for any of the program's scholarships. A majority of these scholarships require a 3.00 grade point average or higher and most are awarded during the spring of each year, accordingly there is a June 1 deadline for applications.

For entering college freshmen, the application process is generally handled by high school counselors or local civic groups.

## Police say interstate vehicle theft ring barns like something out of Bond movie

TOLAR, Texas (AP) — The four barns at the Lawhon Exotic Ranch looked ordinary on the outside, but on closer inspection it was more like something out of a James Bond movie, authorities say.

The ranch had a collection of donkey, emus and Texas longhorns, but its barns contained hidden compartments and industrial-strength ramps that a high-tech, interstate theft ring used to conceal at least 25 vehicles — ranging from earth-moving equipment to a spanking new Cadillac.

A Johnson County commissioner said he watched in amazement last Friday as a man attempted to haul off a county-owned 38,000-pound back loader parked along a highway.

Pam Jetsel, a spokeswoman for the Johnson County sheriff's department, said commissioner R.C. McFall saw the man trying to load the heavy equipment and contacted deputies, who arrested the ranch's owner, Charles Wayne Lawhon, 48.

Hood County Sheriff Allen Hardin said officers found stolen vehicles, some traced to Iowa and Arkansas, hidden inside the barn. "When the ramp was up, it just looked like a barn," Hardin said. "But when you flipped a switch — boom — there would be Dodge pickups, Chevy Tahoes and Suburbans on the second floor. It was unreal. There was all kinds of equipment up there."

Authorities believe the vehicles are valued at more than \$2 million. Lawhon was arrested Friday night on a charge of suspicion of theft over \$100,000. He was released from jail Tuesday night after posting \$20,000 bail, Jetsel said.

Lawhon, owner of C&S RV World in south Fort Worth, is

cooperating with investigators, according to his attorney, Don Carter.

The barns, equipped with high-tech amenities that fascinated investigators, are part of his client's RV business, Carter said. "He uses them to store vehicles for his business," Carter said. "They may look like barns, but they're storage facilities."

Hardin said he would not discuss how the vehicles were stolen until two other suspects are captured.

Lawhon appeared to prefer Chrysler vehicles, Hardin said.

"I think he had a Dodge fetish," Hardin said. "They were all over the place."

Officers said McFall was driving home last Friday when he saw the man with a flatbed trailer parked beside an earth mover

owned by Johnson County. "I told him, 'You need to stay right there, I'm calling the sheriff,'" McFall said.

The man, whom authorities later identified as Lawhon, apparently had damaged his truck or trailer trying to load the \$133,000 earth mover and was summoning help on his cellular phone.

Between 25 and 50 cars and trucks will be recovered along with dozens of construction and recreational vehicles, Hardin said.

"You can find just about any type of equipment out there you want," said McFall, who toured the ranch Tuesday. "Jet skis, golf carts, Bobcat front-end loaders — they had to bring in a computer just to catalog all of the stuff, and I think they had to get Lawhon to help them. There ain't no telling what's out there."

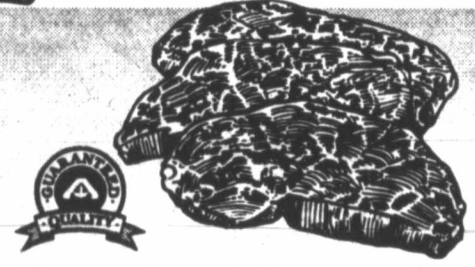

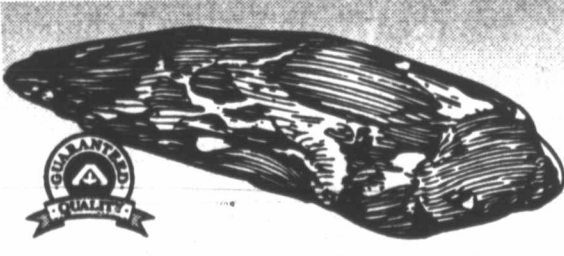

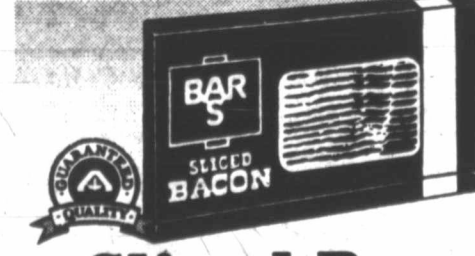

### Report: Ramseys turn clothing over to police

DENVER (AP) — The parents of JonBenet Ramsey have complied with a police request to turn over the clothing they were wearing the night before their daughter was found slain, the Denver Post reported today.

Police received two shirts, a pair of pants and a sweater this week from John and Patsy Ramsey, the newspaper reported, citing anonymous sources.

Police spokeswoman Leslie Aaholm declined to comment.

Sources told the newspaper that police asked for the clothing two months ago to compare with fiber evidence in the 13-month-old case.

Police conducted preliminary interviews with the Ramseys on Dec. 26, 1996 — the day the little beauty pageant winner was found beaten and strangled in the basement of the family's Boulder home. It took four months of negotiations between prosecutors and the Ramseys' lawyers to arrange formal interviews with the couple.

The Ramseys have proclaimed their innocence. The couple and their 11-year-old son, Burke, now live in Atlanta.

The Ramseys have rejected police requests for further interviews, but Ms. Aaholm said negotiations continue on whether police will be able to talk to Burke.

## Public housing authorities evict troublesome families

BOSTON (AP) — Public housing authorities have a simple message for the families of three white youths accused of beating a Hispanic woman: Get out.

Because of a nationwide policy that took effect here in September, the Boston Housing Authority can punish the families for the sins of the sons. It has led to sharp criticism in South Boston, where racial tensions have simmered for years, but housing officials are sticking to their guns.

"To have a child go back and kick the daylights out of people, throwing rocks through windows, assaulting people ... something has to be done," Housing Court Judge E. George Daher said Wednesday as

he rejected the families' appeal to stay at the Old Colony development.

"When there are 12,000 people dying, dying to get in there, to leave these people there is unconscionable," Daher said.

The policy was created by President Clinton in March 1996 as a way to make government housing for the poor a safer place to live. At the time, Clinton said "if you mess up your community, you have to turn in your key."

Tenants who are arrested — or whose family members or guests are arrested — for civil rights violations, drugs or violent crimes can be tossed out of public housing. A conviction is not necessary.

In the Old Colony case, Keith Berry, 20, Scott Cathcart, 16, and Sean Beatty, 17, are accused of kicking and punching Somaira Osorio, a 22-year-old mother of two, on Dec. 6. They denied starting the fight, and said it was not racially motivated.

The mothers agreed that their sons should be kicked out, but asked the judge to let them and their other children stay. Supporters said it was only fair.

"It is repugnant to our sense of democracy that individuals be punished for the crimes of another," said Brian Burke, attorney for Carol Berry and Carol Beatty.

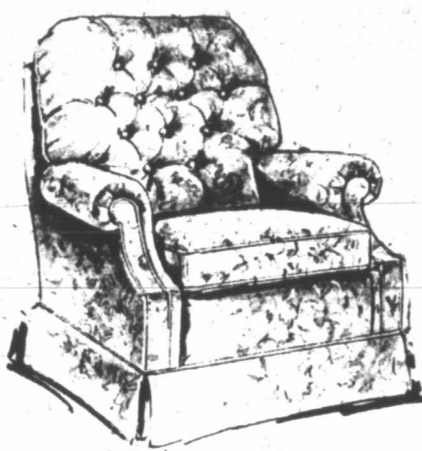
"If a child is just out of control or unable

to be controlled, how can you penalize the parent and the innocent siblings?" Burke has said. He predicts the families will end up in homeless shelters because neighborhood rents are too high for them to afford — and he promised to appeal Daher's decision.

The judge has given the families a week to move out.

"It is unfortunate, but some public housing occupants view their tenancies as tenured, and the law as nothing more than an irritating, irrelevant, inconvenience," Daher wrote earlier this month. "This mind set must change, and the court intends to change it and quickly."
