

Sixty-eight FFA members from Gray County will join other FFA and 4-H members from throughout Texas for intense show ring competition at the upcoming exhibitors showcase Houston Livestock Show, Feb. 20 their animal projects through March 8, in the Astrohall.

These FFA and 4-H exhibitors week of livestock showcase their animal projects during the second week of livestock competition-the junior junior show. show. The first week of competition, the open show, features professional ranchers and breeders

from throughout the country exhibiting their breeding stock.

Entries in both the open and junior shows combine with horse show entries to make the Houston Livestock Show the world's largest.

Representing approximately 930 Texas 4-H clubs and FFA chapters, the junior show will have close to 15,000 entries this year. A variety of animals is shown in the junior and open divisions of livestock competition: market steers, market barrows, market lambs, market poultry, beef and dairy heifers, breeding sheep, goats, commercial steers, and breeding rabbits.

The four market animal categories (steers, lambs, barrows, and poultry) represent animals raised by the exhibitors as food sources. Top animals in each of these categories are eligible for their individ-

Gray County Commissioners agreed to contract with the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) and contribute in-kind services in exchange for substantial funding toward the purchase of a county Geographical Information System (GIS).

The PRPC, who is spearheading a statewide effort to re-number rural addresses as part of 911, will give Gray County \$60,000 toward the purchase and implementation of a GIS. Prior to the court's decision yesterday, Gray and Carson Counties were the only two counties in the 26-county area not involved with the project.

According to the contract, the county is required to contribute \$20,000 worth of man-power and machinery to make new signs and assist with re-numbering rural addresses in the area.

A GIS is a pictorial computer mapping system with data systems that can be programmed to provide detailed information and advanced computer pictures of properties in the county.

The system has the potential to provide local entities with immediate information about county residences.

Pat Bagley of the Gray County Appraisal District is an active participant in the project. Bagley and the PRPC's Pamela Nielsen first approached the commissioners in December. By accepting the proposal, the county authorized the appraisal district to create the computer animated property maps for the system.

Republican candidate for Texas Attorney General Barry Williamson unveiled his plans in Pampa today for an "anti-crime strategy" that would target juvenile gangs and illegal drug operations if elected attorney general. Williamson, who currently serves as chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission, visited with about 30 Pampa residents this morning at Chaney's Cafe on the fourth day of his statewide tour.

"For 7:15 a.m., you guys are eager," Williamson said.

State Representative Warren Chisum, Gray County Sheriff Don Copeland and County Commissioner James Hefley were among the interested crowd of Williamson supporters. Williamson praised Gov.

George W. Bush's efforts to strengthen the Texas education system. And as attorney general, Williamson said, he would focus on fighting crime.

"How can we educate children when crime is in the schools?" asked Williamson.

"We have to face drug lords head on and run them out one city at a time," he said.

"I want to do the same thing to cocaine pushers as the attorney general is doing to nicotine pushers."

Barry Williamson began his career with the oldest law firm in Midland, where he specialized in commercial law, banking and finance, and oil and gas. In 1985, he established his own law offices and founded an independent oil and gas company.

Williamson left his legal practice in 1988 when he was appointed to serve in the Reagan Administration as a principal advisor to the U.S. Secretary of Energy in the creation of a national energy policy. He then served under President George Bush at the U.S. Department of Interior as the Director of

TUCKER

SShe was declared dead at 6:45 p.m. Tuesday. "I am going to be face-to-face with Jesus," she said softly, just before lethal drugs began flowing into her veins as the state of Texas executed her for a killing almost 15 years ago.

Her execution was peaceful and quick, marked by farewells and repeated exclamations of "I love you" to her husband and friends watching through a window a few feet away.

Condemned for a brutal attack that left two people fatally hacked, she was the second woman executed nationally in the 22 years since the U.S. Supreme Court allowed capital punishment to resume.

"I think she was thankful this horror show was over," George Secrest, one of her attorneys, said bitterly. "Seeing the poison go into her veins, it's nothing short of an abomination."

Eight minutes after the drugs began flowing, she was pronounced dead. Her dark eyes and mouth were open, her long dark curly hair flowed around her head and contrasted sharply with the white sheet on the death chamber gur-

The case of Ms. Tucker, 38, sparked a worldwide debate over whether the former drughyped prostitute should be put to death. Pleas for mercy came from the Vatican, the United Nations and death penalty opponents around the globe.

Ms. Tucker contended she had found the Lord and was not the same person who accompanied a companion, Daniel Garrett, to the northwest Houston apartment of an acquaintance, Jerry Lynn Dean, 27, to steal some motorcycle parts the night of June 13, 1983.

Once inside, Garrett began beating Dean with a hammer. When the battered man began making gurgling sounds, Tucker grabbed a nearby 3-footlong pickax and began plunging the tool into Dean to stop the sounds.

When she discovered Deborah Thornton, 32, hiding under some sheets, she turned the ax on her. She left the weapon buried in the woman's chest, the last of some two dozen blows.

At her Houston trial, she bragged on tape played for the jury that she experienced an orgasm each time she swung the ax.

After her arrest and while in jail, she said she found God.

Strapped to the death chamber gurney with

Richard Thornton, whose wife was killed in the attack, was almost gleeful as he watched. "Here she comes, baby doll," said Thornton,

who vigorously called for Ms. Tucker's execution. "She's all yours. The world's a better place." Outside, hundreds of people and hordes of news reporters waited for word about the execution. When prison officials and witnesses emerged, many of the spectators down the street from the prison cheered, chanted and sang. A religious song blared from a loudspeaker set up by supporters of Ms. Tucker.

The execution came less than an hour after the U.S. Supreme Court rejected the last of several final-day appeals. Then Gov. George W. Bush refused to grant a 30-day reprieve, saying her case had been thoroughly reviewed by courts.

"I have concluded judgment about the heart and soul of an individual on death row are best left to a higher authority," Bush said. "May God bless Karla Faye Tucker and God bless her victims and their families."

His decision was not unexpected. In his three ears in office, he has refused similar pleas as Texas bolstered its standing as the nation's most active capital punishment state, executing 145 since 1982.


People on both sides of her case, and Ms. Tucker herself, said gender should have no bearing on her punishment.

But the oddity of a woman being executed there were only 49 women among 3,365 death row inmates nationwide as of Jan. 1 — prompted hundreds of reporters and photographers to descend on Huntsville, about 80 miles north of Houston, where executions in recent years have been carried out without media glare.

The last time a woman was executed, however, was 1863 when Chipita Rodriguez was hanged in South Texas for killing a horse trader.

Nationally, since the Supreme Court in 1976 allowed the death penalty to resume, 431 men have been executed. In 1984, Velma Barfield, also a born-again Christian, was put to death in North Carolina for lacing her boyfriend's food with rat poison.

Ms. Tucker's legal challenges primarily centered on the Texas commutation process, which her attorneys contended was unconstitutional because it set no rules for parole board members to follow when considering clemency. None of the 16 condemned inmates who asked the panel

Lincoln, Martin Luther King – both belong to the ages

► Partisanship must not be allowed to change the perspective of America's past.

'Now he belongs to the ages." So said one of Abraham Lincoln's Cabinet members after the 16th president's assassination.

Those famous words, uttered as the bloody strife of the Civil War was closing, suggested that Lincoln's legacy rose above party and sectional divisions - that in death he belonged to all freedom-loving people, both living and yet-to-be born.

Americans today must recapture that inclusive regard for the heroes of our history if we are fully to appreciate and preserve the freedoms they helped secure for us. Unfortunately, there are signs that a destructive partisanship of memory and allegiance is corroding many people's perspective on America's past and the people who made it. Last year, for instance, a predominantly black Louisiana school district won nationwide headlines when it stripped the name of George Washington from a public school.

Yes, Washington was a slave-owner - but he was born into a time and place where that unjust institution was a given. What is more significant is that he had the vision to see beyond his era's assumptions; he integrated the Rhode Island militia, for instance, and he provided for the freedom of his own slaves on his death.

Most important, of course, he helped found a nation whose defining propositions pointed toward eventual freedom and equality for all its citizens. As Martin Luther King Jr. said, "The goal of America is freedom."

My search for Oprah began long ago. Last March I won a contest at school and ended up getting to go to Chicago for a con-vention. best, when he said how wonderful it was to see Oprah in person.

She was tired, but she was great. And the show, so much longer and more interesting in person, was wonderful to watch. I must admit, I hadn't heard of one of the guests on the show, but I didn't care.

The most interesting thing was how many people it took to do one show. All those clips. It's like you think that Oprah does almost all of it herself ... but how could she? And the people on the show and in the audience, how articulate they were. It sounded like their answers were canned, or something. I was impressed.

She candidly spoke with those audience members who would yell, "Oprah!" at commercial break. I myself wanted to whack them over the head. In that sense, Washington belongs to all Americans, of all backgrounds.

The same is true with regard to King himself. When some Riverside, Calif., residents recently protested a proposal to name a high school after the civil rights leader - some of them arguing he was a "black" hero, while the school that would bear his name is predominantly white - they were displaying profound lack of understanding of the implications of his work.

As King himself indicated many times, his doctrine of equality and non-violent protest in behalf of liberty was no narrow racial gospel, but steeped in the wisdom of western civilization. In the Birmingham letter he named Socrates, St. Augustine, St. Thomas Aquinas, Thomas Jefferson, Lincoln and T.S. Eliot, among many others, as his inspirations.

Notably, he expressed reverence for Washington and America's other nation-makers. There was need, he wrote, to bring "our nation back to those great wells of democracy which were dug deep by the founding fathers in their formulation of the Constitution and the Declaration of Independence.

Just as King knew no bounds of color in the wisdom that he drew upon, so his own legacy transcends narrow human distinctions. It is therefore a shame that he has been honored up to now on buildings and facilities primarily in African American neighborhoods. Apparently the Riverside school board agrees, because it unanimously voted in favor of naming that school after King. Just as Washington and Lincoln belong to the ages, and to all races, so does King and his message of color-blind equality before the law.

In the back of the budget book, unmentioned in the political debate about the size and reach of government, is \$7.9 trillion worth of evidence that Washington still is a major force shaping the decisions of everyday American life.

In buying a home, paying for college, guarding a pension or planting an uncertain crop, federal loans, guarantees and insurance underlie what people can afford to do and risk.

President Clinton said he is balancing the budget "the right way, by reducing the size and scope of our government." Republicans in Congress counter that he wants to spend too much, take federal charge of too much, expanding, not curbing, government power.


"This is a budget only a liberal could love," House Speaker Newt Gingrich said of Clinton's \$1.73 trillion spending plan for fiscal 1999, which foresees a surplus for the first time in 30 years. Tax and spend, other Republicans complained. Big government.

There's another big government, apart from that familiar argument - the gradually growing federal role in underwriting credit and insurance for a wide assortment of programs and purposes.

It makes the federal government the largest financial institution in the United States, with \$6.2 trillion in direct loans, guarantees and insurance outstanding at the end of 1997. Another \$1.7 trillion is guaranteed through government-sponsored enterprises - privately held, federally chartered lenders.

Directly or indirectly, the government provides money for home buying, college costs, small businesses, exports, pensions, deposit insurance and an assortment of other items.

"Like other programs, they are operating under tight budgetary constraints," Clinton's budget says. But unlike other programs, they have little impact on year-to-year spending, a ing.



the dispute over next year's dollars.

That wasn't always so. The crisis in deposit insurance that began with savings and loans failures a decade ago made those guarantees into budget-busting expenses for a bailout, as 2,500 banks and savings and loans went broke.

The bailout prompted a close look at the interwoven system of federal financial guarantees, and the new budget promises an effort to strengthen government credit management including a look at expanding private markets to determine whether some federal loan programs are still justified by need

But ending any of them would stir a political uproar. Keeping them does not, since neither Republicans nor Democrats are likely to tackle interests that benefit from federal guarantees at home

U.S. credit and insurance covers people who want to buy homes, helps the contractors who build them, lets college students borrow for tuition with up to 25 years to pay, helps build farms, insures against floods and disasters, and more

Foreign aid loans and international guarantees to revive shaken foreign economies are another matter; conservative Republicans are balking at them.

that way, save for normal default rates, unless there were an economic crash or financial crises like those that forced the deposit insurance bailouts. With the economy strong, the network of loans and guarantees is a low-cost way of achieving federal goals, one of which the budget describes as the redistribution of resources by providing subsidies "from the general tax-

payer" to the disadvantaged. Conservatives who get that far into the fine print might argue with that, but not with other isted objectives, including increasing home ownership, helping more people graduate from college, strengthening small businesses, promoting exports, creating jobs.

The two government-sponsored enterprises in housing loans hold or guarantee 47 percent of \$4 trillion in residential mortgage loans now outstanding. The Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. covers about \$2.7 trillion deposited in some 1,100 savings institutions.

No commercial banks or savings and loans failed during 1997. Delinquent or defaulted loans in the other federal guarantee programs increased by \$2 billion.

Overall, it is a low-cost system with a vast reach across the American economy.

It may change as the private financial marketplace changes, with new technology and new services to sell.

In some cases, according to the budget appraisal, private credit and insurance markets may expand to the point of taking over functions that had been left to the government to provide for people who couldn't get the money



Criminal Appeals, Place 2. That seat is currently held by Morris Overstreet, who is not running for subvert the will of the people as expressed by reelection. Johnson, 51, was a candidate for the Court of Criminal Appeals in 1996, and was the leading candidate in the primary election. She has been a sole practitioner in Austin since 1984, and since 1993 has been certified by the Texas Board of Legal Specialization as a specialist in criminal law.

Johnson said that her experience qualifies her to serve on the Court of Criminal Appeals, and added that the job of a judge is to apply the law which was enacted by the Legislature, not to rewrite it by judicial opinion.

"At the appellate level, where the court's inter-pretation of the law determines how lower courts apply the law, it is even more important that the judges be impartial and faithful to the law as

Austin attorney Cheryl Johnson has announced judges to apply it. If the law proves unsatisfacto-her candidacy as a Republican for the Court of ry, it should be returned to the legislature for revision. To ask a court to rewrite the law is to: their elected representatives," Johnson explained.

Johnson earned a bachelor's degree from Ohio State University in 1968 and a master's degree in 1970 from the University of Illinois. She received her law degree in 1983 from The John Marshall Law School in Chicago. After graduation, Johnson moved to Austin to serve a judicial clerkship with a judge on the United States Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit. She is a member of the Texas Criminal Defense Lawyers Association and recently completed a three-year term as treasurer of the Austin Criminal Defense Lawyers Association.

The Court of Criminal Appeals, which sits in Austin, is the highest Texas court which hears written by the Legislature. Judges should not be criminal matters and is of equal rank to the Texas lawmakers. We elect legislators to write law and Supreme Court, which hears only civil matters.

True Story of 'Taps' Blows Away Earlier Misinformation

DEAR ABBY: Last Veterans Day, you printed a story that someone sent you about why "Taps" is played at military funerals. Since I spent 22 years in the Army and studied military traditions, I knew it was not a true story - nice and sentimental, but untrue. I have enclosed the true story of "Taps." Please share it with your readers. JIM BAKER,

MITCHELLVILLE, MD.

DEAR JIM: Hundreds of veterans and students of history wrote to correct the misinfornation. The following is a conlensed version of the origin of "Taps" taken from many published accounts, including a U.S. Army Military District of Washington fact sheet: The 24-note melancholy

bugle call known as "Taps" is thought to be a revision of a French bugle signal, called "tatoo," that notified soldiers to cease an evening's drinking and return to their garrisons. It was sounded an hour before the final bugle call to end the day by extinguishing fires and lights. The last five measures of the "tatoo" resemble "Taps."

The revision that gave us the present-day "Taps" was made during America's Civil War by **Union Gen. Daniel Adams But**terfield, heading a brigade camped at Harrison Landing, Va., near Richmond. Up to that



time, the U.S. Army's infantry call to end the day was the French final call, "L'Extinction des feux." Gen. Butterfield decided the "lights out" music was too formal to signal the day's end. One day in July 1862, he recalled the "tatoo" music and hummed a version of it to an aide who wrote it down in music. Butterfield then asked the brigade bugler, Oliver W. Norton, to play the notes and, after listening, lengthened and shortened them while keeping his original melody.

He ordered Norton to play this new call at the end of each day thereafter, instead of the regulation call. The music was heard and appreciated by other brigades, who asked for copies and adopted this bugle call. It was even adopted by Confeder-

NAGANO, Japan (AP) — Exchanging their riot gear for bright blue baseball caps and ski parkas, police are hitting the streets of Nagano by the thousands to protect the Winter Olympics — and Japan's honor. Pressure on the police has increased significantly since a rocket attack on Tokyo's main airport Monday night.

No one has claimed responsibility for the attack, which slightly injured one airport employee, but police said today they suspect ultra-leftist radicals who have long opposed construction of the airport.

The security stakes are high. The Nagano Games are to feature more athletes (2,450) from more countries (72) than any previous Winter Olympics. More than 1 million tickets to Olympic events have been sold, and the games are to be seen on television in as many as 160 countries.

HOUSTON (AP) Houston Rockets didn't allow the Vancouver Grizzlies to spoil Hakeem Olajuwon's return from the injury list.



Tradition and competition have been well-worn words in the Casey Martin case, defined in different ways by opposing sides. They are also key words in whether Jack Nicklaus should be allowed to play in the U.S. Open.

Tradition would seem to cry out for Nicklaus to play in the Open as long as he wants to tee it up. No one has accomplished more in professional golf than Nicklaus.

Concerns for competition would seem to indicate that the 156 spots in the Open are too precious to hand out to players without a realistic chance of winning.

But Jack Nicklaus is Jack Nicklaus and, unlike the Martin case, this is not a situation where making an exception for one person sets a precedent.

It would be enough for the U.S. Golf Association to say, "We are letting him play because his name is Nicklaus and only he, Ben Hogan, Bob Jones and Willie Anderson have won the Open four times."

No one would argue with that. When the USGA announced last month it had granted no spe-cial exemptions to the 1998 U.S. be competitive, I'll be delighted to play."
