Things are looking up a bit for American farmers' cash income from milk during July increased \$16,000,000 over July, 1935, according to the latest figures.

This 14.1 per cent rise in July over the same month a year ago brings the 1936 total farm income from milk to \$812,000,000 for the seven months' period, topping the 1935 seven months' period by \$44.-

Part of the unusually large July increase was due to farmers receiv-ing substantially larger unit prices for their milk as a result of the drouth. The higher prices have helped farmers offset higher feed costs resulting from the drouth.

Since feed prices are expected to remain qui.e high for the re-mainder of the year and until the pasture season early in 1937, dairy farm milk income should continue

CENSORING NEWSPAPER IS FAVORED BY **DEMOCRATS**

FORT WORTH, Sept. 9 (AP) -Texas Democrats adjourned their state convention last midnight after an uproarious session in which the national administration was indorsed without dissent but delegates wrangled for hours over the child labor amendment to the federal constitution and censorship of the University of Texas student

The American people show what can only be described as a criminal disregard of the hazards responsible for the fires that destroy hundreds of millions of dollars worth of property each yearand a legion of lives.

No other country in the world suffers a fire loss as great as this country. In many European countries the person responsible for fire must pay for any damage the blaze

does to his neighbor's property. It would send our fire loss into a tail-spin if our citizens adopted the attitude of mind that the European law represents. Every citizen should realize that it is a crime against society-even though it is not listed in the law books-to permit fire hazards to go uncorrected and to take the chances that lead to fire. And every citizen should likewise understand that practical fire prevention requires but little effort and little money.

Don't be an "unconscious arsonist"—a term that can be justly applied to anyone who neglects fire hazards on his property, or doesn't trouble to unearth them. Fire prevention is up to every one of us-and if we all accept the responsibility, at least eighty per cent of fires can be
