Study: Boomer parents dense about kids' drugs
NEW YORK (AP) - Baby Boomer parents just don't get it when it
comes to drugs and their kids, a study by the Partnership for a Drug Free America shows.
The group's 10th poll showed that parents are consistently out of
touch when it come to the allure of marijuana on the nation's youth, and the easy access they have to the drug.
'"Boomers - many of whom have 'been there, done that' - are surprisingly and ironically out of step with the reality of drugs in
their children's lives," said Partnership President Richard D. Bonnette ell found that parents underestimated the availability of mar-
Tijuana, their children's view of its risks, and whether their children's riends were smoking.
"Few parents believe their children are at risk," said Bonnette.

Gangs, violent crime in schools on the rise since 1989, according to survey
WASHINGTON (AP) - The percentage of teen-agers reporting gangs at their schools has nearly doubled since 1989, and more stu-
dents reported being victims of violent crime at schools where dents reported being victims of violent crime at schools wher gangs were present.
The increased The increased gang presence came even though overall crime victimization, including thefts, in school buildings, grounds and
buses remained steady between 1989 and 1995 at less than 15 per cent of students, the Education and Justice departments reporte Sunday
However, the percentage of youths aged 12 to 19 who reported being victims of violence such as a physical attack or robbery by
force, weapons or threats rose from 3.4 to 4.2 , equal to about 1 mil lion of the 24 million youth that 3.4 to 4.2 , equal to about 1 mil The reports of violent victimization were higher among student who also reported the presence of gangs, drugs or guns at their
schools. The percentage of those reporting "street gangs" rose from 15 to 28.
"Gangs, and the guns, drugs and violence that go with them
must be stopped from ever reaching must be stopped from ever reaching the schoolhouse door,"
President Clinton said in a statement. He called for Congress to pass anti-gang and youth violence measures that he offered more than a year ago.
