

**AUSTIN** (AP) — In the face of rising college costs and an anti-affirmative action federal court ruling, the Texas House Higher Education Committee endorsed tripling student financial aid and scholarships and giving universities extra money for enrolling low-income stu-

dents. The recommendations, which would increase student financial aid and scholarships by \$250 million annually, are among several proposals being forwarded to the 1999 Legislature.

"We saw there was a need to put serious monies into financial aid because the burden of attending college has shifted to students and their parents," said Rep. Henry Cuellar, D-Loredo.

# **Fugitive couple** won't face trial in Wheeler Co.

accused of stealing guns from a Lubbock Aaking a car from an Amarillo car dealer will not be tried for kidnapping in Wheeler County.

Panhandle Now, Potter and Lubbock Counties must decide County Deputy and where Hays and Ludington will be tried first.



# Domestic violence common, but least reported of crimes

national Domestic Awareness month)

Domestic violence is one of the most common and least reported crimes in both this state and the country. Thirty-tive percent of all women murdered in Texas in 1997 were killed by their intimate partners, according to the Federal Bureau of Investigation. That's almost 10 percent higher than the national average of 28 percent.

Over the last three decades, according to Linda Town of the Tralee Crisis Center, there has been a movement to end domestic violence and to help those who are victims of this crime.

As part of the effort to end the violence, October is designated as national Domestic Violence Awareness Month.

"Domestic violence cannot be considered a private matter and only in coming together as a com-

# Chrysler recalling 685,000 cars that may roll in park

WASHINGTON (AP) — Chrysler Corp. is recalling 685,000 late-model cars that can sometimes roll away when left in park.

Models covered in Tuesday's announcement are the Chrysler Cirrus and Dodge Stratus from model years 1995-1998 and the Plymouth Breeze and Chrysler Sebring from model years 1996-1998. Dealers will notify motorists in December about bringing their cars in to be fixed for free, said company spokesman Mike Aberlich.

Drivers shifting out of park when the key is in the locked position can break a part connected to the shifting mechanism, later allowing a stationary car to roll away when the parking brake is not set, Chrysler officials said.

Aberlich said today that someone would have to be in the car and shift the car out of park for it to roll away. Cars designs usually prevent shifting while parked by requiring the use of the key

Fifty motorists have reported the problem, claiming it caused five accidents and one injury, Aberlich said.

Both, recalls appeared in a government report released Tuesday and were confirmed by Chrysler

More than 160 parents have complained that their children were trapped in built-in child seats in Chrysler minivans when the restraint systems' belts malfunctioned, according to reports filed with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

Some parents said they were forced to cut children out of the seats when the shoulder belts started retracting and failed to release from around childrens' heads. A handful said the retracting restraints became so tight they choked the child, according to reports filed at the NHTSA.

Research shows many of today's consumers, especially younger shoppers, have less cooking knowledge than previous generations.

"They buy a limited range of staple cuts they find easy to prepare," Schwertner said. "To sell a broader range of cuts and increase consumers' comfort level with cooking fresh beef, the beef industry is using checkoff dollars to work with a major retailer that take the guesswork out of making beef meals. The retailer plans to launch the on-pack instruction

labels this fall."

To simplify the shopping experience, the beef industry is using checkoff dollars to work with This presents some challenges, as well as some retailers to test alternative meat case layouts that

"While most fresh meat cases are set by sp research indicates consumers don't think about that when making purchase decisions," Schertner said. "Instead, they consider factors such as what meal they want to prepare, their families' tastes, time influences and cooking skills. As a result, consumer tend to buy a limited range of products like ground beef and steaks,"

To sell a broader range of beef cuts and increase consumer demand, the beef industry is helping fresh meat retailers implement alternative case layouts to better market beef products.

"The goal is to help retailers match their case layout,to how their consumers shop," Schwertner said. "If consumers can consistently find the products they want, sales will increase. Because beef to roll out simple, three-step cooking instructions, leads the pack in total meat case volume, the beef industry stands to win a larger share of the consumees meat dollar."

### PHS senior homeroom class makes donation to Teen Grief Seminar

Seniors in Beth Shannon's homeroom class at Pampa High School recently turned tragedy into a way to help others by donating to Hospice of the Panhandle's Teen Grief Seminar.

A classmate who had moved away from Pampa some time ago committed suicide last summer, explained Shannon. The students, wanting to remember their friend in a special way, decided to donate to Hospice of the Panhandle's Teen Grief Seminar, a fiveweek support program for teens aged 14 to 18 who have experienced the death of someone close to them.

The students raised \$120 for the seminar, facilitated by Leslie Gershmel, MSW, a Pampa High School counselor, and John Southern of Amarillo, LPC, grief therapist and licensed professional counselor contracted with Hospice of the Panhandle.

"I was so impressed with the sensitivity of these students," said Sherry McCavit, executive director of Hospice of the Panhandle. They realized that teens feel grief, too, and sometimes they need support and help in handling their feelings. I think it is admirable that these kids wanted to do something to help others and they wanted to honor their friend, too."

Hospice of the Panhandle's first teen grief seminar is currently underway on Monday evenings at the agency's Pampa office. Consisting of five 90-minute sessions, the free seminar offers teenagers an opportunity to share their experiences, McCavit explained. In addition, the young people learn that grief is a natural, normal process and that there are specific coping skills to help them as they go through the grief process, she added.

Since 1988, Hospice of the Panhandle, a non-profit agency serving five counties in the eastern lexas Panhandle, has provided comprehensive care for the terminally-ill and their families and is a leader in grief education and support for this area.

# **ACLU** is back to its old tricks again

■ Good work turns into the absurd with the latest challenge by

With God all things are possible. With the American Civil Liberties Union, the absurd is likely.

Once again the ACLU has reared its extreme left-wing head and is attempting to rid Ohio of its motto. The ACLU went from good work protecting civil rights and individual liberty to radicalism meant only to grab headlines.

Since 1959, Ohio has used the motto, "With God all things are possible," a passage from Matthew 19:26 in the Bible's New Testament. This passage — apparently — offends the ACLU. So in July 1997, the organization filed a lawsuit against the state to pre-

However, in a victory for the U.S. Constitution and freedom-loving people everywhere, U.S. District Judge James Graham said the state can display the motto as long as it does not cite the biblical reference it comes from.

The motto is only part of a sentence from a biblical passage and when removed from that context, does not favor any religion, Graham said in his ruling.

They do not state a principle unique to Christianity. They could

be classified as generically theistic," he said. The ACLU is considering an appeal.

It believes the motto is a violation of the First and 14th Amendments to the Constitution and the first article of the Ohio

The citizens of Ohio have a right to a government which does not choose a 'favorite' religion to promote," Christine Link, executive director of the ACLU of Ohio, said when the lawsuit was filed

But what religion is being promoted by the state's motto? Or by the U.S. motto of "In God we trust," which has been unsuccessfully challenged in the U.S. Supreme Court?

Is there, as Ohio Solicitor Jeffrey Sutton pointed out, a religion that says, "No, with our God, all things are not possible?" Is a general reference to a higher power in a state's motto a threat to personal liberty? Are the people of Ohio shouting out as one against this so-called violation?

Later, Link told the Associated Press that the state motto is insulting to Christianity.

Yet, the ACLU's attorney in the case, Mark Cohn, said the motto makes non-Christians feel like outsiders.

Either way, it's doubtful the motto makes non-Christians feel like

The state motto is just not important enough to have any profound effect on anyone's life. In an age when barely a majority of Americans can even name the nation's first president, it's unrealistic to expect that more than 10 percent of the state's population even remember the state motto.

The problem here is not the favoring of one religion over another. It is the tax dollars wasted fighting this frivolous lawsuit.

Why is a group that calls itself the guardian of liberty clogging up the federal court system with such trivial matters? Do its members wish their contributions be spent trying to eliminate a state motto?

The ACLU's arguments are based on a principle of separation of church and state it wrongly believes is mandated by the

The First Amendment does not use the term "separation of church and state." Rather, it reads, "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof."



# Choice programs are a success

Everywhere you look in America today, philanthropists and governments are heading in the same direction - toward educational choice. Thirty-two states have considered some kind of choice system, and 45 governors have announced their support for vouchers, charter schools and/or public school choice. With the start of the new school year, 41 privately funded scholarship programs for needy kids will operate under the umbrella of the Children's Educational Opportunity Foundation (www.ceoamerica.org), providing more than which is universally acknowledged to be top 30,000 low-income children with an alternative to poor public schools.

This creative ferment has been stirred because people are finally confronting the fact that many public schools, particularly in the poorer sections of cities, are failures. 

# Officers urge internal probe regarding gun used in four killings

HARLINGEN, Texas (AP) - Nine police officers have demanded an internal investigation into how a department-issued assault rifle came to be used by a man who murdered four people, including two U.S. Border Patrol agents.

The officers' questions, which weren't detailed in a Tuesday news conference, surround an AR-15 semiautomatic rifle issued to longtime police detective R.D. Moore.

Moore's son, Ernest, used the weapon and another in his July 7 rampage in San Benito and nearby Rio Hondo. Ernest Moore used an MAK-90 assault rifle to kill a mother and daughter in Rio Hondo, and he later used the AR-15 to shoot and kill two Border Patrol agents who were assisting police in searching for him. Moore later died of wounds sustained in the gunfight with officers.

The Harlingen officers allege that police administrators, who await an investigation by the FBI and Texas Rangers into the deaths of the border agents, have something to hide in how the AR-

"We're asking for an investigation because this is a matter of public concern," police association president Joe Rubio said. "In this particular case, the police has to police itself. There are some

serious questions that should be addressed." The officers, who make up a majority of the Harlingen police force, questioned how Chief Jim Scheopner has handled the case and alleged that operating procedures were violated when R.D. Moore was issued the rifle.

Schoepner did not return a phone call to The Associated Press this morning.

Rubio also alleged that Scheopner has threatened the jobs of any officer who speaks up on the matter, whether publicly or to the FBI, the (Harlingen) Valley Morning Star and TV station KGBT report-

"This is the most difficult thing we've ever done," Rubio said. "We want to say there was something wrong. There's too many inconsistencies as to what was going on as far as the weapon itself. There has to be some kind of accountability."

# Wal-Mart heiress buys ranch, plans move to Texas

MINERAL WELLS, Texas (AP) — One of America's wealthiest woman may be leaving Arkansas for the Lone Star state.

Wal-Mart heiress Alice Walton, 48, purchased a 3,000-acre ranch in Mineral Wells on Sept. 16, according to the county clerk's office in Palo Pinto County.

The billionaire is reportedly moving to the area to raise cutting horses to compete and show in nearby Fort Worth.

"Alice has been contemplating this for a long time," said Layton Egger, a beef cattle and horse rancher in Northwest Arkansas and a friend of Walton's.

"I've known Alice since she started showing halter and pleasure horses when she was 13 or 14 years old. She got into cutting horses about 12 years ago," Egger said.

Cutting horses have been used in cattle herding for many years and have been shown in organized competition since the 1941 formation of the National Cutting Horse Association in Fort Worth, Egger said

Ms. Walton, who had her Arkansas driver's license suspended following a May drunken driving conviction, applied for a driver's license in Texas on Sept. 25, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Ms. Walton was convicted of driving while intoxicated in a Jan. 27 incident in which she drove her sport-utility vehicle off a local road. She paid a fine and did community service work.

#### **OBITUARY**

BALTIMORE (AP) -Mark Belanger, one of baseball's best fielding shortstops during his 16 years in the major leagues, is dead at age 54 of lung cancer.

A heavy smoker until he quit around 1990, Belanger was diagnosed with the disease about a year ago. He died Tuesday.

Belanger was Baltimore Orioles' union representative as a player, and after his retirement, he became a key figure in the Major League Baseball Players Association as the longtime assistant to union head Donald Fehr.

"He paved the way for all the contracts and all the rights players have today." said pitcher David Cone, the New York Yankees' player representative. "He was tough, no nonsense, stepped on some toes along the way and also made friends along the way. He will be dearly missed."

During his playing days, Belanger won eight Gold Gloves with the Orioles, his team from 1965-81, and six of them were consecutive, from 1973-78. Hall of Famer Brooks Robinson, with 16 Gold Gloves, is the only Orioles player to have more.

Belanger, who ended his career in 1982 with the Los Angeles Dodgers, had a lifetime batting average of only .228, but his weak hitting was more than offset by his glove. Nicknamed Blade, he had a career .977 fielding percentage, eighth among short-

stops.

He played on Baltimore's 1970 World Series championship team and on four pennant winners and six division champions.

After his retirement, Belanger helped keep players united during a two-day strike in 1985, a 32-day lockout in 1990 and a 230-day strike that wiped out the end of the 1994 season, the entire postseason and the first three weeks of the 1995 schedule.

"Players who shared the field with Mark and those who have come along since owe a debt of gratitude to him," Fehr said. "I personal-ly miss the wisdom and insight he provided on virtually every important decision the MLBPA has made over the last three decades.

"He stood up for players' rights in the early days of the MLBPA and his clear-sighted, unflinching leadership was instrumental during the 16 years he served the union."

Former teammate Eddie Murray said he was privileged to have worked with Belanger, calling him "spe-

Terry Crowley, another former teammate, said everyone knew Belanger as a great infielder, but that he was also a good friend.
