

■ Physician, RN wife happy to return to western lifestyle, people.

Two moves ago, Dr. Bruce Harrow, and wife, Penny, took with them to Wisconsin their horse, donkey, two llamas, five sheep, pot belly pig, dog and three cats. But the doctor and his wife, who is also an RN, now maintain they were low on animals when they moved to Pampa six weeks ago with only bree dogs and five cats.

Harrow, the newest member of Columbia Medical Center's Medical & Surgical Clinic, 1701 N. Hobart, also brings with him 18 years of professional experience in both family practice

Detective Beverly Chase and others testified they followed a green Thunderbird with a white vinyl top as it left I-40 and traveled north on FM 2300 to Highway 60. The car made several u-turns and went down some dirt roads. The detectives radioed information the vehicle entered Pampa turning onto McMullough where Corporal Alvin Johnson was looking for them.

He testified he turned behind the car and turned on his lights. At that time, the Thunderbird sped up and made a quick turn onto Neel Road where it struck a curb and blew out a tire and stopped.

After all three men were in custody Chase noted three "cookies" of what is alleged to be crack cocaine lying in the street near where the Thunderbird had hit the curb.

Police reports at the time said the "cookies" weighed 64.5 grams and had a street value between

\$6,500 and \$7,000. Fields conte ds that the stop was illegal, because the police had no probable cause. He cited other cases where a stop based on an anonymous source was ruled illegal. BOSTON (AP) — Dennis Eckersley, who appeared in more major league games than any pitcher, didn't have the desire to stay in shape when the baseball season ended.

What the 44-year-old pitcher didn't hear his body telling him became clear this week when the Red Sox refused to offer him salary arbitration: It was time to retire.

After 24 years - and 1,071 appearances — in the major leagues, Eckersley said on Thursday that he has thrown his last fastball.

"To be honest with you, somebody had to make the decision for me because I wouldn't have done it." Eckersley said, holding back tears. "I would much rather have left like I've done today than to leave in the middle of the season or getting booed out of the ballpark. I didn't want to taint my career."

Eckersley, who regularly runs in the offseason to keep in shape, said the thought of retirement started creeping into his mind after the play-

"People started saying that I could do it again, and I thought, 'Well, I guess,' but physically I did not want to keep it going," he said. "I just started gearing down. Usually I just keep running, but all of the sudden I didn't want to run anymore. That's what happens I guess, that's what happened to me."

Eckersley's 24 seasons in the majors were really two careers: 13 years as a starter and then, after a battle with alcohol, a move to the bullpen for 11 years as one of the most dominating relievers the game has ever seen.

"It's hard to walk away," he said. "It's been a major part of my life since I was 8 years old."

The Eck piled up awards and memories: six All-Star appearances, the AL Most Valuable Player and Cy Young awards in 1992, the AL championship series MVP in 1988. He pitched a no-hitter for Cleveland in 1977, sat in the dugout for the 1978 Yankees-Red Sox playoff, gave up Kirk Gibson's famous World Series home run in 1988 and closed games for the three Bash Brothers pennant winners in Oakland.

"I guess the favorite memories are some of the magic that happened in Oakland," said Eckersley, who was born and raised in the Bay area. "We had some magic that lasted for about five years."

DiMaggio slips into a coma

HOLLYWOOD, Fla. (AP) — Joe DiMaggio lapsed into a coma after his temperature shot up to 102 degrees and he is not responding to medication, his doctor said today.

"His outlook is very poor," Dr. Earl Barron said, pointing to a recurrence of the fever and worsening pneumonia that has clouded the overall health picture of the baseball great.

"I don't know how long, but I would guess not very," Barron said. The latest setback comes after doctors drained fluid from his lungs Thursday and said congestion in the lungs had improved.

Barron said a CAT scan of his chest showed that his pneumonuia had worsened and his fever had returned.

'We've stopped all sedation because it is no longer necessary," said Barron. "He's unconscious because of the disease."

Barron had found a sliver of hope in the 84-year-old Hall of Famer's battle against pneumonia in his left lung and a persistent infection when not much material was suctioned in Thursday's pro-
