Advocates for the homeless call the pattern "compassion

New York City clamped down on "quality of life" citing even the squeegee men who wipe windshields for spare change.
Tucson created zones downtown from which people who violate the city's anti-loitering laws can be prohibited.
Even liberal Berkeley has started sweeping the homeless from storefronts on Telegraph Avenue, long a hangout for Texas cities, too, are part of the crackdown. Witness the

How can this be?
Observers point to an important factor. While many among the homeless are families wwith children, many more are
addicts, mentally ill or both. Yet, waiting lists to get into treatment programs outpace waiting lists for housing.
Maria Foscarinis, head of the Washington, D.C.-based National Law Center on Homelessness and Poverty, says, for
some communities, "it's easier to move people out of public sight."
Of course, this doesn't solve the problem. "(All) it does is move people around," Foscarinis told USA

kill. Such people deserve punishment, not rehabilitation, which doesn't work anyway. If we make it exceedingly dangerous to com-
mit a clime, exceedingly likely a criminal will mit a clime, exceedingly likely a criminal will
be killed or caught, and exceedingly likely that once caught he will go to prison for an exceed-
ingly long unpleasant ingly long, unpleasant length of time, then the
crime rate will continue to go down. Defund the social workers, and build more prisons.
That's the happy trail to a safe society.

The White House has denied any wrongdoing and President Clinton has referred to obtaining the files as "an honest, bureaucratIndependent Counsel Kenneth Starr, authorized to investigate the matter, has said he found no evidence that Clinton or other high-
