



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

HANDSOME PROFIT DERIVED FROM WHITE LEGHORN HENS

(By RUBY COOK)

McLean, Texas .- A net profit of \$6.41 per hen is the amount which Mrs. W. C. Carpenter, who lives eight miles north of McLean, realized from her flock of White Leghorns during 1925. Her entire flock of 140 hens gave her a net income of \$898.22 for her year's work.

This unusual flock, which is said to be one of the best in the State, was started in 1922 when Mrs. Carpenter purchased 100 baby chicks from a special mating pen at 30 cents each. Two years later these pullets were mated to a pure Tancred cockerel. and from this mating resulted a flock of big boned, floppy, combed, high egg producers. Indeed, these hens show ed a decided increase in egg produc tion over their dams.

In the Sprnig of 1925, with cockerels from her own raising and line breed. Mrs. Carpenter's flock showed a decided increase in egg production. From November the production show ed an increase of 50 per cent.

These pullets, with a few select hens and seven pure Tancred pedigreed, cockrels from the same breeder's imperial matings will compose her pen for the year 1926.

Mrs. Carpenter has gone into the chicken business on a small but scientific basis. She keeps a record of all expenses and her profits. She sees to it that her flock is properly fed and watered, housed and cared for. And the result is that many state poultry officials acknowledge her flock to be one of the best in Texas.

A part of the 1925 record of this fleck follows: Average number of hens and pullets during the year, 140; total number of eggs produced, 2,263 dozen; amount realized from sale of egg: \$725,39; poultry sold, including hens, cockerels, baby chicks and brotlers, \$167.45; amount of friers consumed at home-75, at 25 cents each, \$18.75; pullets raised, 135, valued at \$2 each, 270; values of breeding cockerels, \$70; total, \$1,251.59.

Total cost of feed, brooding and other expenses, \$328.37; 12 weeks old cockerels and baby chicks purchased \$25; total expenses, \$353.37, leaving a het profit of \$898.22.





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
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
