MERTEN MAKES 1200 BARRELS WORLEY WELL CONTINUES HEAVY FLOW

PHOEBE WORLEY GUSHER IS BEST IN PAMPA FIELD THUS FAR

The Phoebe Worley No. 3 continues its astonishing natural flow of better than four thousand barrels per day, according to authentic information received Thursday afternoon. This well came in without a shot Wednesday morning of last week and has been producing steadily since that time. It is believed that this is one of the best wells in the Texas Panhandle oil field.

WHEAT GROWERS MEET SATURDAY

The local organization of the Wheat Growers' Association met Saturday afternoon of last week in a special meeting to discuss the general outlook of the organization. The main object in having the meeting was to get the general opinion of the members. Judge Gough of Amarillo, President of the Texas Wheat Growers' Association was present and spoke at the meeting. Dr. Loyd of Vega, was another out of town visitor at the meeting.

WHEAT RECOVERING FROM DAMAGE LAST WEEK END

Pampa and surrounding country received another of "the heaviest rains in years" Thursday night and Friday morning of last week when more than three inches fell.

Much damage is reported by wheat farmers who state that much of the wheat is headed out and was blown down by the high winds and heavy rains.

It is possible that no serious damage was done the wheat crop because of its stage. Most of the wheat will straighten up if dry weather prevails for the next two weeks.

Roads are reported in good condition today, but were practically impassable Friday of last week.

The Phoebe Worley is located in section 62, block 3, Gray County. It is the largest well to be brought in thus far in the Pampa field and it is attracting widespread attention from the oil fraternity, especially those companies that have holdings in this section.

It is possible that the well will be shot in case the production is appreciably lowered, but with the strength it has been showing during the past eight days this is not through probable.

Officials of the Wilcox company state that development on their holdings will be pushed forward with more rapidly than during the past two months. It is planned to drill wells every 1240 feet on the entire 1600 acres in this block before intensive development of the tract is begun.

MOODY TO SPEAK IN AMARILLO JUNE 17

One of the most enthusiastic political meetings in the Panhandle country in years is expected in Amarillo next Thursday, June 17, when Dan Moody will speak.

Reports to the local committee indicate large delegations will be on hand from various outside towns.

Mr. Moody will deliver his talk at 8 o'clock. It is not known just yet who will introduce him.

The candidate apparently is extremely popular in this section and his supporters are predicting he will "sweep the Panhandle" in the first primary. —Amarillo News.

PAMPA CHAMBER OF COMMERCE PLANS FOR AMARILLO CONVENTION

The Pampa Chamber of Commerce held one of the most enthusiastic meetings of the spring Monday night of this week in the American Legion Hall.

Homer D. Wade, assistant manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, was present and spoke briefly on the West Texas Chamber of Commerce convention at Amarillo on June 21, 22 and 23. Mr. Wade stated that this convention was not an affair put on by Amarillo or for the special benefit of Amarillo, but was a West Texas convention for West Texas, and for the special benefit of this section of West Texas.

Chas. Cook, well known lawyer of Pampa and Gray county also spoke. Mr. Cook stated, among other things, that the West Texas convention will be held whether Pampa and Pampa people were represented or not, and that "it is up to us whether or not we will take advantage of this wonderful opportunity to advertise our town and country to the business men who will attend this convention."

According to plans formulated at the meeting Pampa will have a float decorated with wheat and a "queen of wheat."

A large number of Pampa people are planning to attend this convention, but a few have not yet applied for their badges and ribbons to be worn. Secretary C. P. Buckler requests that all those who have not already applied for their badges to do so at once.

PRAIRIE COMPANY OFFICIALS VISIT PAMPA FIELD; BUY 200 ACRE LEASE FROM SAILOR BROS.

Pampa had as visitors Tuesday morning of this week the biggest oil operators in the Texas Panhandle Field. This was a party of the Prairie Oil and Gas Company officials. In the party were N. K. Moody, president; D. H. Kelsey, vice president; W. F. Gates, president of the Prairie Pipeline Company; C. H. Kountz, vice president of the pipeline company; Geo. Coyle, general superintendent; Bob Gawthrop, geologist; and W. S. Fitzpatrick, president of the board of the Prairie Oil and Gas Company and his secretary, Mr. Iobe.

Although officials of the company state that they were not here to buy anything, it is understood that they leased 200 acres of land from Oscar and Art Sailor for a cash consideration of \$31,200, located in section 80 and 81.

H. W. Miller, president of the First National Bank of Hinton, Oklahoma, and son in company with Mr. Seligson of that place are in Pampa this week investigating business possibilities here.

HUMBLE TO RUSH WORK ON PIPELINE TO MERTEN WELL

The Humble Pipeline Company will start construction of a four inch pipeline to the Clark et al wells and the Wilcox field immediately according to official information received here following the bringing in of the Merten well four miles southeast of here.

The Humble Company owns a ten acre tract of land in the heart of the field and will start the construction of a 55,000 barrel tank immediately on the tract. It is planned to make the tank farm in the field instead of near the leading racks, which will be built 20 miles west of Pampa on a three acre tract recently leased for that purpose.

It is impossible for developments to be continued on the Merten well until arrangements can be made to take care of the oil. Mr. Clark is of opinion that work on the pipeline will be rushed by the Humble Company in order to take care of this well and the one to the south of it, which is now down to a depth of 2350 feet.

One dealer in combines has thirteen new combines in Pampa getting ready for the wheat harvest to begin.

WILCOX TO BUILD \$1,000,000 CASING HEAD GAS PLANT HERE

Pampa will have a casing head gas plant within the near future according to G. M. Dye, vice president of the Wilcox Company, who states that the gas from the Phoebe Worley well No. 3, section 62, block 3, Gray County, will probably make as much as three or four gallons of gasoline per thousand cubic feet of gas.

The casing head gas plant will cost between \$750,000 and \$1,000,000. Construction work will start within the near future according to officials of the company who state that thousands of dollars worth of gas is being wasted daily.

A new tank was brought to the well this week to divert the gas as a safe guard against possible fire.

OIL FIELD NOTES

The Worley-Reynolds well on the southeast corner of the northwest quarter of sec. 83 is drilling at 2350 feet. This well is expected to make a better well than the Merten well that just came in by geologists connected with the company of Clark, Harbin and Bladridge et al. It is expected that more gas will be found in this well.

McConnell No. 1 on the J. C. McConnell land nine miles west of Pampa is now down to a depth of 2700 feet. This is one of the heaviest gasser of this section, with 75,000,000 feet of gas coming from the hole daily.

The White Deer Oil Company will add in their well in the center of the southeast quarter of section 114, block 4, Carson county, this next week. A number of Pampa citizens are interested in this well and own stock in the company.

Roy was shooting at some birds in the orchard near the house, and did not notice his brother sitting near. One shot went wild and pierced the side of Mr. Luter. The bullet lodged in the right side near the back bone.

The injured man was rushed to the local hospital, but was later taken on to Amarillo on account of lack of room here. It is reported that his condition is not serious and that he is resting well.

MERTEN WELL COMES IN FOLLOWING 240 QUART SHOT

Merten No. 1 on the W. W. Merten land four miles southeast of Pampa held true to predictions of officials of the Clark, Harbin, and Bladridge et al company and came in a gusher after it was shot in Wednesday of this week. The well is now making around 1200 barrels per day, but is not cleaned out as yet, as there is not sufficient available storage tanks to hold its full flow, officials of the company believe.

Merten No. 1, Clark et al, four miles south east of Pampa came in a 1200 barrel gusher Wednesday night about 11 o'clock following a shot of 240 quarts of nitro glycerine at eleven o'clock Wednesday morning.

The well bridged after a brief flow Wednesday morning and cleaning out started. Officials state that as soon as the well is properly cleaned out it is thought that it will make between 1500 and 2000 barrels per day.

Drilling was halted Wednesday morning at a depth of 3164 feet and the shot was lowered and exploded at eleven sharp. Showings of oil were found at a depth of 3039 feet but oil was struck in good quantity at 2970. The elevation at this point is 3222 feet above sea level.

The Merten No. 1 is located in the center of the north west quarter of section 82, I. & G. N. R. R. survey Block 3.

This well has aroused more interest than any other well in the Pampa field probably because of the fact that it is only four miles from town and is just off the edge of the breaks. Its development has been looked forward to since the location was first made with a great deal of interest.

W. W. Merten, owner of the land the well is on, states that several wells will go down in the near future on this property in all probability.

Mr. Clark states that another well will be located about 1200 feet south east of the Merten No. 1.

Storage tanks are being rushed to completion near the well at this time. One 500 barrel tank is completed and two more will be finished some time Thursday. Mr. Clark states that the well will not be cleaned out and allowed to run at full capacity until the pipeline is built to accommodate the flow of oil.

H. E. Everett announces the opening of the South Side Rooms east of the light plant. Mr. Everett has a new building and states that it will be furnished new throughout.

PAMPA TO HAVE TWO MODERN HOTELS—TO COST \$150,000

Pampa will have one of the most modern hotels in the Panhandle within the near future according to Alex Schneider, Jr. who states that he and his father have practically completed plans for a modern three story hotel with between sixty and seventy-five rooms.

The hotel will be of brick construction and will be built along the most modern plans. The new hotel will cost approximately \$100,000 when complete.

Alex Schneider and family came to Pampa about fourteen years ago and established Schneider's Commercial Hotel one-half block east of Cuyler Street, and have owned and managed this hotel since that time.

The new hotel will be completed within about ninety days after construction starts. A modern dining room will be established and maintained in connection and will be one of the finest in this section.

Uncle Sam and His Nephews, the States, Are Collecting Over a Billion Dollars in Yearly Tolls on Motor Vehicles and Fuel

More Than Meets the Nation's Billion Dollar Highway Building Bill—Thomas H. MacDonald, Chief of the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads, Tells Striking Details.

America has reverted to the ancient system of collecting tolls wherewith to build and maintain highways.

In 1925 these tolls amounted to \$1,094,000,000, collected through motor licenses, gasoline taxes, property, corporation, income production and other taxes on automobiles, automobile manufactures, the petroleum industry, etc.

In the same year \$1,003,000,000 was spent on rural roads. It took near a century to build \$20,000,000,000 worth of railroads. A highway system costing that much will be created in twenty years at present rate.

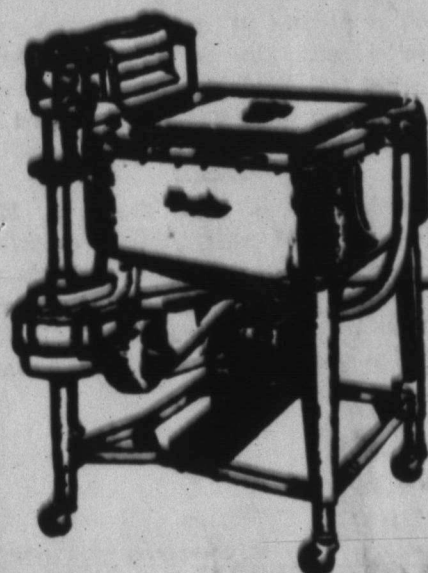

- Two 2 1/2 lb. chickens (broilers)
- Salt
- Pepper
- 1 cup evaporated milk diluted with
- 1 cup water
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup bread crumbs
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1-3 cup salt
- Dash pepper
- 2 tbsp. flour

Wash, clean and cut up chickens. Sprinkle with salt and pepper, dip in crumbs, egg, and crumbs. Place in a well-oiled dripping pan, and bake twenty minutes in a 350-degree F. oven, then reduce the temperature to 325 degrees F. and cook until tender, about twenty minutes longer. Baste every ten minutes during cooking with 1/2 cup melted butter. Remove to platter and pour around a cream sauce made of fat in dripping pan, the soup, diluted milk, salt and pepper.

Rank Health With Three "R's" Is Plea

As an educational subject for children, health should hold equal rank with the three "R's" in the curriculum of public schools. Doctors declare that without a healthy, sturdy body it is impossible for the child to have a healthy, happy mind.

Neglect of childhood defects may result in permanent physical impairment later on. Many childhood ills are traceable directly to malnutrition. High school students especially need a variety in foods for at this age their growth is rapid. The protein or "building food" should be abundant for high school boys and girls. When they buy their luncheons, high school pupils are apt to display a preference for chocolate sodas, cream puffs and candy. An appetizing luncheon put up at home is much to be preferred to the sort the boy or girl might obtain at the corner store near the school.

Meat is all right for the school luncheon but it should be put up in tempting form. If sliced thin it is more appetizing in sandwiches than if in thick pieces. Beverages or soup may be carried in thermos bottles but the bottles must be carefully washed and aired daily after using.

Milk is recommended for an important place in the boy's or girl's diet because of its proteins, minerals, phosphorus and calcium, necessary for the development of the body and in the case of calcium and phosphorus for the building of bone and teeth. Evaporated milk has come into favor as a health builder for children as well as adults because by removal of 60 per cent of the water it is rendered more than twice as rich in food value as ordinary milk and by a process called homogenizing more digestible than bottled market milk.

Crisp lettuce and celery, carefully washed and dried, may be so wrapped in oil paper that they will be fresh and in good condition at lunch time. Lettuce should not be used in sandwiches for wilted lettuce is almost indigestible.

RADIO MESSAGES TO OTHER WORLDS?

Recent discoveries, made known by the president of England's Royal Astronomical society, indicate that the little dark star on which we live is situated not far from the center of the greater universe, something man in his conceited ignorance has always believed. . . . For every sun, or twinkling star in space, there are many more dark stars or planets, which shine, if at all, by reflected light. This destroys one of primitive man's illusions that the sky and sun and stars were all created for the benefit of himself and his fellows alone. In these millions of unseen worlds there must be others similarly situated as our earth, on which the same forms of life have appeared and exist. One of these days radio may be perfected to the point where the people on one planet may exchange messages with those on another. It is a far-distant probability but not an impossibility.—Copper's Weekly.

Russian Tribe Long Isolated From World

Explorers fighting their way through the uncharted timber lands of northern Siberia came upon a tribe of Russians, who spoke an old archaic Slavonic and who had not heard of the Bolshevik revolution and neither of the last six or seven czars since Peter the Great. They lived completely isolated from the rest of the world. There was no knowledge of any of the great events of history, including Napoleon's march to Moscow, the Japanese war, which was fought almost within hearing of their habitat. In the middle of the jungle, the explorers came upon a completely rigged ship of the Sixteenth century, probably of Dutch origin. There was no navigable river within miles and the suggestion is put forward that the ship was deposited so far inland by a huge tidal wave, as was the case with the ship that lies 10 miles from the coast on Java and which rests against the side of an extinct volcano and was carried inland by gigantic eruptions with accompanying tidal waves. —Pierre Van Paassen, in the Atlanta Constitution.

The permanent park for the annual celebration will be laid off and planted in shrubbery and will be kept in condition the year around. It is

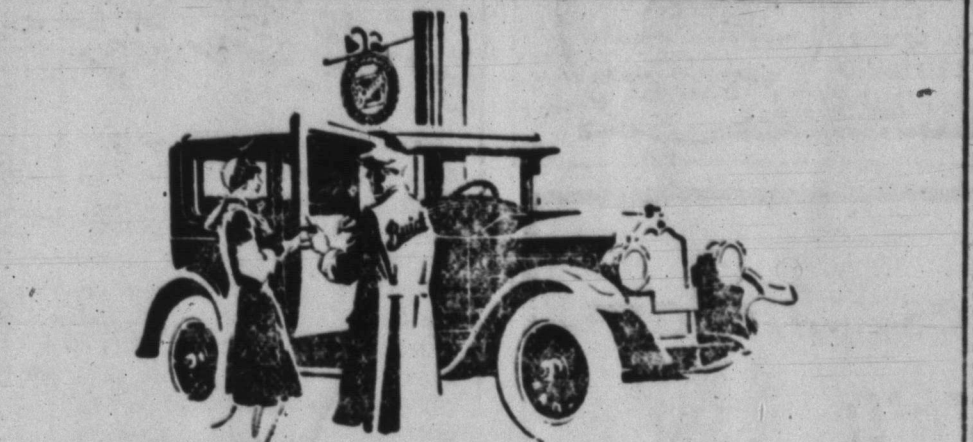
thought the Panhandle Historical Society will erect a monument on the park site within the near future.

The main road to the Clark et al wells and the Wilcox field is in poorer condition than it has been for some time. The heavy rains of the past month have largely been responsible for this condition. The road, however, was not properly worked following the rains.

It is imperative that roads of the county be kept in first class condition at all times, but just at this time it is doubly necessary for this road to be improved.

Within a few days heavy loads of wheat will be drawn over this road. True, other roads of the county will also be subjected to this wear; but practically every road in this section is in first class condition with the

exception of the main oil field road. In two weeks large numbers of business men from the Amarillo convention will visit Pampa and its oil and wheat fields—this section is being prospected now as never before by business men and farmers from over the entire southwest.

About three quarters of a mile of this road stands under water for several days following a rain. Mr. Clark is of the opinion that this section of the road can be drained by a shallow ditch to the north. It will be necessary to run this ditch about one thousand yards. This will assure the county that no water will stand on this road following rains and will make for a greatly decreased maintenance cost.

This article is not written in criticism of the work of the county commissioners, but is published for the purpose of bringing the need of a small expenditure of time and money on one of the county's most important roadways to the attention of those in charge of the county's roads and welfare.

The spirit of generosity for which the western country has become famous in time past, but which has been lacking for some time according to the misanthropists, displayed itself Wednesday morning of this week in a way that cannot but be admired.

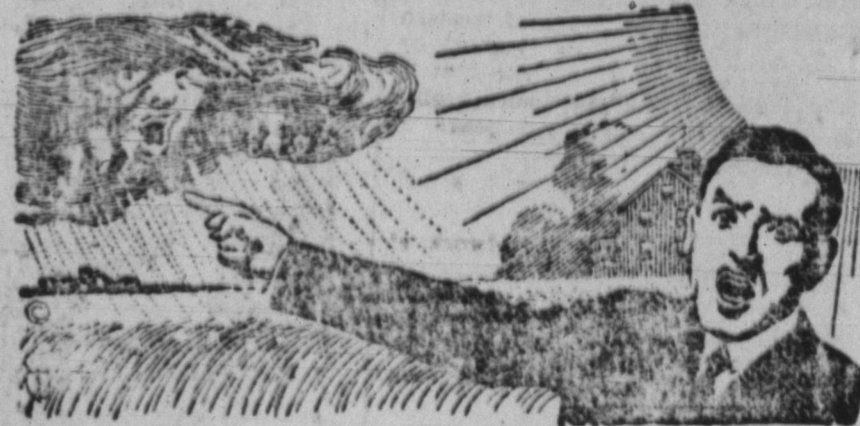

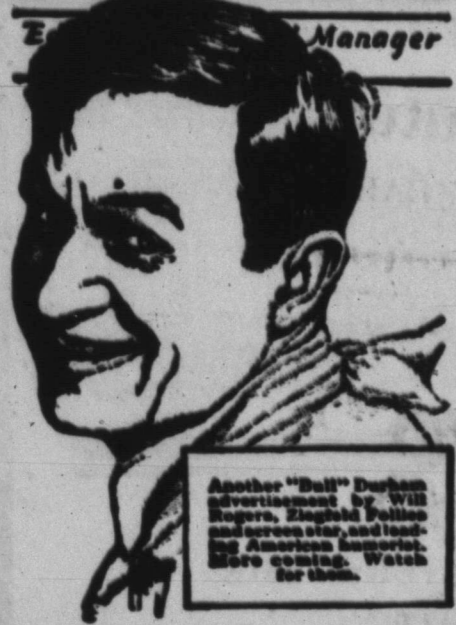
