36 WELLS WILL START DRILLING SOON

ELEVEN BIG COMPANIES NOW IN PAMPA OIL DEVELOPMENTS

Undreamed of developments are starting this week in the Pempa oil field. The number of drilling wells in the field will be more than quadrupled within the next two weeks if present plans are carried forward.

Thirty-six new rigs are being shipped to the Pampa field to start drilling operations as soon as practical. The H. F. Wilcox Company alone has forty cars of rigs and drilling supplies on the road to this field.





Farmers Income for 1925 Shows Rise in Prosperity



7 HHLE farm production has not yet assumed a proper relationship to con-W sumption as a whole, states the Sears-Roebuck Agricultural Foundation American agriculture has been more properly balanced during the past year than it has for five years, and is slowly reaching correct proportions.

Only three staple farm crop groups, reports the Foundation, showed a decrease in gross farm prices for 1925 as compared with 1924. The crops induded were hay, cotton, corn, wheat and one or two small miscellaneous crops. 



Then, the composition of evaporated milk is constant, for the reason that it has been put through an homogenizing process, which breaks up the fat globules into tiny particles and dismilk. This attribute makes for an icecream mixture of uniform quality and

Finally, experts agree that the use of evaporated milk in ice cream contributes to its hygienic qualities, for tirely sterile. Health authorities declare that milk and cream should be treated to a heat of 150 degrees F. for half an hour in order that a product may be produced free from infective organisms. Evaporated milk is processed at 240 degrees for 30 minutes. and, therefore, its introduction into an Ice-cream mixture increases its purity in proportion to the amount of evaporated milk used.

On a warm and sultry summer day, there is nothing more refreshing to the mind and to the body than an iced drink. Of course, when such drinks are being used, moderation should be practiced, because if taken in excess or too rapidly, they are liable to be injurious to the stomach. However, when taken in a sensible manner, they are refreshing and beneficial to the fatigued. In the manufacture of these drinks, care should be taken to avoid any combination that may be indigestible or hard to assimilate. The drink should be consumed in a slow and leisurely manner.

The greatest danger present in the use of iced drinks is the one that involves the use of ingredients that are possibly impure or contaminated in any way. This is very liable to happen If the juices that are used are allowed to stand until they become soured and until for use, or if the milk or other ingredient used is not strictly fresh. 


