

NOTICE

By making publication of the hereinafter set out ordinance notice is given of all matters and facts therein contained, which said ordinance is as follows, to-wit:

ORDINANCE DETERMINING TO ASSESS A PART OF THE COST OF IMPROVING PORTIONS OF CUYLER STREET AND SUNDRY OTHER STREETS IN THE CITY OF PAMPA, TEXAS, AGAINST ABUTTING PROPERTY AND THE OWNERS THEREOF, AND AGAINST RAILWAYS AND THE OWNERS THEREOF, ADOPTING ENGINEER'S ROLLS, PROVIDING FOR NOTICE OF HEARING AND HEARING, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Pampa has heretofore ordered that the following portions of streets in said City be improved by raising, grading and filling, and installing concrete curbs and gutters, and paving with three inch Vertical Fibre Brick on 5 inch Concrete Base, with necessary incidentals and appurtenances, and in accordance with the plans now on file with the City and in accordance with the specifications therefor attached to the contract between the City and Stuckey Construction Company hereinafter referred to, said portions of streets being as follows, to-wit:

CUYLER STREET from its intersection with the North property line of Francis Avenue, known and designated as Unit or District No. 1.

KINGSMILL AVENUE from its intersection with the West property line of Cuyler Street to its intersection with the East property line of the alley between Cuyler and Russell Streets, known and designated as Unit or District No. 2.

KINGSMILL AVENUE from its intersection with the East property line of Cuyler Street to its intersection with the West property line of the alley between Cuyler and Ballard Streets, known and designated as Unit or District No. 3.

FOSTER AVENUE from its intersection with the West property line of Cuyler Street to its intersection with the East property line of Sommerville Street, known and designated as Unit or District No. 4.

FOSTER AVENUE from its intersection with the East property line of Cuyler Street to its intersection with the West property line of the alley between Cuyler and Ballard Streets, known and designated as Unit or District No. 5.

ATCHISON AVENUE from its intersection with the West property line of Cuyler Street to its intersection with the East property line of the alley between Cuyler and Russell Streets, known and designated as Unit or District No. 6.

ATCHISON AVENUE from its intersection with the East property line of Cuyler Street to its intersection with the West property line of the alley between Cuyler and Russell Streets, known and designated as Unit or District No. 7.

WHEREAS, contract was let and entered into with Stuckey Construction Company for the making and construction of such improvements and the City Engineer has prepared and filed rolls or statements concerning the improvements and assessments therefor in each unit; and same have been examined and all errors found therein by the City Council corrected; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined to assess a portion of the cost of such improvements against the owners of property abutting thereon, and against such property:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT OR-

DERAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PAMPA, TEXAS: THAT,

The City Council of the City of Pampa, Texas, does hereby determine to assess a portion of the cost of said improvements on said portions of the streets against abutting property thereon and against the owners of such property, and against the owners of railways using or occupying any portion of same, said assessments to be levied in exercise of the powers granted by the Charter and by Articles 1086 to 1096, both inclusive, and Articles 1104 and 1105, of the Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas, of 1925, heretofore adopted by this City.

Said rolls or statements, as corrected, be and the same are hereby adopted and approved.

Assessments when levied shall be and constitute the first enforceable lien and claim on the property against which such assessments are levied, superior in all respects to all other liens and claims, except state, county and municipal taxes, and shall also be a personal liability and charge against the real and true owners thereof. The descriptions of the parcels and tracts of the abutting property, the several amounts proposed to be assessed against such parcels of property, and the owners thereof, the total estimated cost of the improvements in each district, the amount to be assessed against railways for work between rails and tracks and two feet on the outside thereof, the total amount proposed to be assessed against each parcel property, and other matters and things as shown on said rolls or statements being as follows, to-wit:

Engineer's roll or statement for Cuyler Street from its intersection with the North property line of Brown Avenue to its intersection with the North property line of Francis Avenue known and designated as Unit or District No. 1.

Table with columns: Name of Owner, Description of Property (Lot No., Block No.), Number Front Feet, Assessment for Curb, Assessment for other improvements, Total Assessed. Lists various property owners and their assessed amounts.

A hearing shall be given by and before the governing body of the City of Pampa, Texas, on the 2nd day of February, 1927, at 10:00 o'clock, A. M., in the City Fire Station of Pampa, Texas, in the regular meeting room, to the owners of the respective parcels of property and of such railways and to all others in any wise interested, whether they be named herein or not, all of whom are hereby notified to be and appear at the time and place herein named and fixed, and said hearing shall be continued from time to time and from day to day, if necessary, until all desiring and presenting themselves to be heard shall have been fully and fairly heard, and at which hearing any mistakes, irregularities, or invalidities in any of the proceedings with reference to the making of said improvements or assessments therefor may be corrected, and the benefits by means of the said improvements, and the amounts of the assessments, and the apportionment of the cost of the said improvements, and all other matters shall be determined, and the real and true owners of the property abutting upon the said streets to be improved and of railways using or occupying any portion of same, and any and all others in any wise interested, their agents and attorneys, shall be and appear at said hearing at said time and place and present and make any protests or objections which they, or any of them may have as to the said improvements, as to the benefits therefrom, as to the cost thereof, as to the amounts of such assessments, or as to any mistake, irregularity or invalidity in any proceedings with reference to said assessments, such improvements, or the contract therefor, and as to any matter or thing in anywise connected, either with said improvements, contract or proceedings, and after all desiring and presenting themselves to be heard, either in person or by agents, attorneys or representatives, have been fully and fairly heard, the said hearing shall be closed and assessments will be levied against the respective parcels of abutting property and the owners thereof, and against such railways, whether such owners be named herein or not, and whether the property be correctly described herein or not. At such hearing any one in anywise interested or affected may subpoena witnesses and introduce evidence, and has the right to appear and to be heard.

The improvements in each district or unit constitute an entirely separate, distinct, and independent unit, and the proposed assessments for the improvements in each unit are in nowise affected by any fact or circumstances in connection with any other unit, all to the same extent and as fully as if entirely separate and independent contracts had been made for each unit and separate proceedings had, separate hearings, and separate notices thereof ordered.

The City Secretary of the City of Pampa is directed to give notice to the owners of property abutting upon the said portions of streets named to be improved and to the owners of railways using and occupying same, and to all others interested, of the time, place, and purpose of such hearing, and of all matters and things, by causing a substantially correct copy of this ordinance to be published at least three times in a newspaper published in and of general circulation in the City of Pampa, Texas, the first of which publications shall be made at least ten days before the date for such hearing, and by such publication all owners of property abutting upon said portions of said streets, and all owners of railways using or occupying any portion of any such streets and avenues, whether named herein or not, and whether the property be correctly described herein or not, as well as all others in anywise interested therein, or to be affected thereby, shall be and are duly notified, and no error or mistake in the name of any property owner, in the description of any property, or in the amount of any proposed assessment shall in any wise affect or invalidate such notice or any assessment levied pursuant thereto, and the real and true owners of such abutting property shall be and are by such notice duly and fully notified. The City Secretary is further directed, but not required, to give further notice of such hearing by causing a substantial copy of such published notice to be mailed to each owner of property abutting upon such portions of said streets, and to the owners of railways, but all such notices by mail shall be only cumulative of such notice by advertisement, and publication, and said notice by advertisement and publication shall in all cases be sufficient and binding whether or not any other kind or character of notice be given.

The present condition of said portions of said streets and avenues endangers health and safety, and it is necessary that the improvement thereof be proceeded with at once and while the weather will permit, and such facts constitute and create an emergency and an urgent public necessity requiring that the rules and provisions providing for ordinances to be read more than one time or at more than one meeting be suspended, and requiring that this ordinance be passed on and take effect as an emergency measure and such rules and provisions are accordingly suspended and this ordinance is passed as and shall take effect as an emergency measure and shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage.

Texas Progress Notes: Mineral Wells—Construction is underway on two modern hotels here each to represent more than a million dollars of investment. San Antonio—Extension of gas service by the San Antonio Public Company this year will involve an investment of about \$175,000 for mains and meters to supply the new customers.

San Antonio—Two new substations and a great deal of service extension are on the program of the San Antonio Public Service Company here for their electrical department this year. Houston—Approximately 25,000 cars were carried by the Houston street cars in 1925. This is an increase of about seven per cent over the preceding year.

chain of title emanating from the sovereignty of the soil, the State of Texas, all of same being duly registered, for a period of more than three years preceeding the institution of this suit; also that plaintiff, and those under whom he claims title to said land have had the actual, notorious and peaceable possession of said land, owning, holding and claiming the same under deed or deeds duly registered in the office of the County Clerk of Gray County, Texas; and paying all taxes thereon, cultivating, using and enjoying said lands, for a period of more than five years preceeding the institution of this suit; plaintiff also alleges that he and those under whom he claims title to said land have had the actual, notorious and peaceable possession of said land for a period of more than ten years preceeding the institution of this suit, claiming the same under a muniment of title duly registered in the office of the County Clerk of Gray County, Texas, in which the boundaries of said tract are fully described and that during all of said period of ten years plaintiff and those under whom he claims title to said land have cultivated, used and enjoyed the same.

Plaintiff prays judgment against the defendants, in the alternative, for the title to and the actual possession of the above described lands and premises, together with general and special relief, legal or equitable.

Living Costs More In Cities In Business

Those cities which own and operate public utilities are notably more expensive to live in than those in which the utilities are under private operation, according to the 1926 report of the Committee on Public Ownership and Operation of the National Association of Railroad and Utilities Commissioners.

San Francisco, Cleveland, Jacksonville (Florida), Detroit and Seattle are cited by the report as the cities most expensive to live in. "It so happens that each of these cities is a "municipal ownership" city, says the report, which continues, "The National Industrial Conference Board gives the United States average as 100 per cent. In comparison, the ratings of the cities mentioned are: San Francisco, 112; Cleveland, 134; Jacksonville, 115.6; Detroit, 118.1; Seattle, 123.8."

Thirteen large cities whose living cost average is below that for the country have no municipal ownership of electric, gas, street railway, or telephone utilities, says the report. These cities include Houston, Texas, 98.8; Minneapolis, Minn., 95.3; Boston, Mass., 91.9; Cincinnati, O., 87.7; and Baltimore, Md., 84.8.

High taxes are given by the report as one cause of the high cost of living in the municipal ownership cities.

New Ice-Reporting Service By The U. S.

The approaching completion of the great system of locks and dams in the Ohio River for the benefit of inland navigation and the establishment of barge lines on the Mississippi River has greatly stimulated river transportation, and it is increasing to such an extent that a general ice-reporting service by the Weather Bureau of the United States Department of Agriculture has become necessary.

Accordingly, beginning December 29, 1926, a daily ice service was inaugurated throughout the Ohio River Basin, including the larger tributaries, and also over the Missouri River east of Kansas City and the Mississippi from the mouth of the Missouri to the mouth of the Ohio River. An interlocking system of

reports will permit the collection of daily information at Pittsburgh, Parkersburg, Cincinnati, St. Louis, Evansville, Cairo, and Louisville, and later summarized transmission to Cincinnati from the other stations except St. Louis. The Cincinnati office will then prepare a "resume" of the general ice situation and telegraph it to the other five Ohio River Stations, where it will be utilized for dissemination and, when necessary, for making forecasts of the ice movement. There is already a similar system of interchange of river-stage information.

The information received and the forecasts issued will be broadcast by radio, published in the river bulletins, weather maps, and newspapers, and telephoned to the lock masters along the Ohio River. The services between St. Louis and Cairo will be more local, but of the same

character. Special surveys and reports will be made of the formation and breaking of ice gorges, and it is expected that the new service will prove of great value to all affected by the rivers, whether they are inhabitants of the valleys or directly engaged in inland waterway service.

Seattle's Street Cars Can't Pay Wages

Once more the Seattle municipal street railway has been put on a warrant basis. As it must pay \$1,170,000 on February 1, and the needed money has not been set aside, the public ownership financiers have decided that all receipts of the road shall go into a special bond interest and redemption fund, and all warrants for salaries, wages and supplies shall be stamped "not paid for want of funds", and bear interest at 5 per cent until called and paid. This method puts the fate of the road in the hands of Seattle's banks. They have saved the street car venture before by cashing similar warrants, and will do it again, not because they believe the management of the road will improve but because Seattle must have street railway transportation.

Street car fares in Seattle are now 10 cents for single rides, or 25 cents for three tokens. This rate has prevailed for more than three years, yet Seattle must defer warrants in order to meet payments due on the \$15,000,000 promise given to the private company from which it took over the road seven years ago.

More taxes seem to be the only way out, so Seattle plans to ask the Washington legislature for a law permitting municipalities to make a tax levy of not more than 2 mills to pay principal and interest on street railway bonds.
