

Though much less common then formerly the vampire-superstition is by no means extinct. In 1870 and 1871 there were many trials of people accused of disturbing dead bodies in connection with vampireism in Germany—there seemed to be an epidemic of the superstition just then -and in comparatively recent years at least two cases have come to light

A vampire is supposed to be a dead person who comes forth from his grave the Saturday Evening Post, some as to the form in which the vampire comes, whether as a ghost or in the actual, buried body. An examination of the oldest and best authorities would seem to indicate a sort of "astral body." Criminals and suicides grave of an innocent person may change him into a vampire.





Students Will Go Afield to Learn

Early Altars Ablaze With Human Sacrifices

Throughout the ages men have made buman sacrifices whenever they were under adversity and felt that the gods were athirst. H. G. Wells paints a graphic picture of a scene that may have occurred in the dawn of a prehistoric day about the vast stone altars on the Wiltshire uplands at Stonehenge, in England-the Druld priests with horribly painted masks, the air of festivity among the people who have come wearing their very best skin garments for the occasion and the helpless victims gazing toward the distant smoking altars upon which they are to die.

As time went on, the practice of human sacrifice became more elaborate. The reasons and occasions for human sacrifice were codified. The most civilized races decided that an entire community might be cleansed of an epidemic or saved from other calamity by this barbarous means.

Seek Synthetic Rubber

The Amazon district of Brazil is the great rubber-producing country of the world, for more than half of the total supply comes from there. The federated Malay states, the Congo region, Portuguese West Africa, the east coast of tropical Africa, Rangoon, Penang, Borneo and Mexico, the West Indies and Central America are the rubber-producing districts. About one-tenth of the total yield comes from the Congo.

The rapidly increasing cost of the article has aroused experimenters, who have produced substances that have some of the qualities of rubber. It is not improbable that they may ultimately succeed, as the chemists did in producing artificial indigo, in making real rubber by synthesis.

Cream intended for whipping purposes should contain at least 30 per cent butterfat. Either raw or pasteurized cream will whip satisfac-The whipping quality of cream is improved by age. Aging for 24 hours is usually about right for cream with a 30 per cent butter fat content.

ADOPTED BY CALIFORNIA

The Nessberry is a perfect success in southern California, according to a report to E. Teas, a Houston nurseryman, from H. M. Ramsay, formerly of Houston, now living at National City, near San Diego, California. Mr. Ramsay states that the berries are as large as English walnuts and grow in clusters. They have the delightful flavor of raspberries and are almost black when fully rice, at which time they are of the best flavor. Mr. Ramsay also reports that the Hauptherry is a failure with him and that the Loganberry has no raspberry flavor and does not compare in quality with the Nessberry. He says the vines are very vigorous in California, growing 6 or 8 feet in a season.

Professor H. In Texas Professor Ness states that the berry seems to be at its highest flavor when it is at its most brilliant red color, rather than when dead ripe as mentioned by the California

Distribution of this new berry was made from the station to numerous growers in Texas, including several nurseries, and the public now has access to supplies of this splendid fruit through the nurser-

S FOOD materials differ in price As with the locality and the season, it is often impossible to strictly follow a recipe, as we find some ingredient either too expensive or difficult to

If the housewife understands the composition of foods she can substitute some other food material with

good results. For example, when butter is called for in a recipe chicken fat, sour cream, clarified bacon fat or some other butter substitutes may be used, depending upon the food to be prepared.

Cream contains more water than butter, chicken fat less; so, in using such fats, their composition must be considered.
