

Egypt Threatens **To Boycott Talks**

By United Press International Egypt said today the breakdown in truce talks with Israel forced it to reconsider plans to attend a U.S.-backed Middle East peace conference. Israeli Prime Minister Golda Meir warned of a possible resumption of fighting.

Secretary of State Henry A Kissinger, however, said Thursday the United States was still hopeful a peace conference would get under way and said Washington had made "a major commitment to this goal."

The cease-fire talks collapsed Thursday in a crisis-charged atmosphere at the Kilometer, 101 checkpoint 60 miles from Cairo. The negotiations were punctuated by the sounds of machine-gun fire and mortar blasts only two miles away.

The two sides, meeting for the 10th time. failed to reach agreement on troop withdrawals from the Suez Canal region -the crucial issue still unresolved in the six-point ceasefire agreement

Newest Greek **Regime Meets More Criticism**

ATHENS (UPI) - Opposition leaders who welcomed the ouster of strongman President George Papadopoulos have begun to attack Greece's newmilitary backed regime for delaying a return to democratic

Ioannis Zighdis, a cabinet minister under the late Premier George Papandreou, accused the new government Thursday of singing "the same boring song of nebulous intentions" as Papadopoulos when he came to power in a 1967 coup. Zighdis was referring to a

policy statement by Premier Adamantios Androutsopoulos. an American-educated economist picked to run the country by the military chiefs who ousted Papadopoulos last Sundav

When the country is ready, it will be led to elections. Androutsopoulos said Wednesday night. "Our intention is to prepare the country for the undisturbed and purely democratic life. Zighdis, an outspoken mem-

ber of the Center Union. a coalition of four center-left political parties, said Greeks were wrong when they thought the abolition of yesterday's corrupt and paranoic regime would rid the country of the nightmare of tyranny.

'Like their predecessors, the present holders of power are possessed by the same illusions of the spirit of April 21. 1967." hesaid



4-H Youths **Plan Annual Food Show**

By AUDETTE VAUGHN Asst. County Extension Agent The annual 4-H Food Show will be Saturday. Dec. 1. Judging will begin at 9 a.m. in the Courthouse Annex.

The theme for this year's show will be "Lone Star Foods." A dish will follow the theme if it is a statewide or a regional favorite

There will be junior (9-13) and senior (14-19) division judging in four classes

Main Dishes - Foods classified as main dishes usually contain a meat or meat alternate such as cheese, eggs. dry beans or peas, or peanut butter. They may contain other foods in addition to this.

Suggested dishes to enter in this category are beef, veal, lamb. pork. variety meats. poultry, eggs, fish and shellfish. dry beans, dry peas, casseroles. loaves, stews, meat, poultry or fish pies; souffles, omelets, meat group salads, sandwiches, soups and chowders.

Side Dishes - Foods classified as side dishes are usually served along with a main dish or as accompaniments to the main course. These are usually fruit or vegetable dishes.

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Suggested dishes to enter in this category are relish tray. salad, cooked vegetables. vegetable casseroles, fruit platters and buttered rice.

Breads and Desserts -Suggested dishes to enter in this category are quick breads. yeast breads, cakes, cookies, baked fruits, doughnuts, pies, cobblers, other fruit desserts, custards and puddings.

Snacks and Beverages -Snacks are defined as foods eaten in addition to or in lieu of a full meal (entree and beverages). Any dish may qualify as a snack if it is designated as a snack on the card giving the menu for a day. A beverage is defined as a drink. Soups are not considered beverages.

Suggested dishes to enter in this category are milk drinks and floats, fruit drinks, dips and dippers, fondues, sandwiches, party foods and refreshments. appetizers and pizzas.

Display - The contestant will exhibit a serving dish. containing the entire recipe. The contestant will serve the judges a taste (any amount)



A holiday table deserves a holiday tablecloth - a cheerful creation in bright seasonal colors, trimmed with coordinating fringe. These can be costly to buy but easy to sew and thus inexpen-

We've all learned to love knits for fashion. Now there's a brand-new knit fabric which makes up beautifully into such home fashions as tablecloths, draperies, bedspreads and pillows. It's a velvety soft, completely washable velour made of Arnel by Blue Ridge Winkler. It is available in wonderfully rich holiday colors. It falls into lustrous folds, is easy to sew and, as a knit, needs no ironing - a considerable plus for a working tablecloth. These two holiday cloths will set the scene for the whole season. One is of solid green velour trimmed with red and green fringe. The other is quartered in red and white and trimmed with red ball fringe

Because this fabric has a nap, take care to see that the pieces lie in the same direction. Cut with the nap running up for richer color. To avoid flattening the nap, press with the fabric face down on a terry towel. Stitch with polyester thread and a medium-size ballpoint needle. Keep tension fairly loose and sew 10 to 12 stitches to the inch. A zigzag stitch is not necessary if you stretch the fabric gently as you sew. Raw edges require no finishing, as the material cannot ravel. If stitches skip, clean the fuzz away from under the throat plate and from around the bobbin case.

To make the solid color cloth, which is 72 inches in diameter, you will need 4-1/8 vards of velour, 6-1/8 yards each of various red and green trimmings. You can create a round cloth by first cutting and stitching the fabric into a square, then folding and cutting the square into a circle. To do this, cut fabric in half crossways to make two pieces each 74 inches long and 48 in-

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

PASADENA, Calif. (UPI) -Mars is a live planet, not dead like the Earth's moon, scientists agreed at the opening of a "definitive symposium" on the Red Planet, but they aren't sure what the Martian atmosphere is like

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About 400 scientists from 10 nations attended the opening Wednesday of the International Colloquium on Mars at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory. They gathered to exchange opinions and discuss theories developed with the wealth of information about Mars returned by America's unmanned Mariner space." probes.



Genius Of Enterprise

Everyone, of course, is familiar with gasoline powered automobiles and most everyone has at least heard of, if they have not actually seen. automobiles which derive their motive power from batteries. (The latter, called "electric cars" and requiring frequent recharging, were popular a few decades ago as city delivery vehicles and for other short run uses)

But have you heard of an automobile that makes use of both types of power for its locomotion; and interchangeably, at that?

No? We hadn't either. Which isn't surprising, since such a vehicle hadn't been invented until just recently.

The new concept of a family and general use car, says its inventor, E. Robert Horwinski, is designed to run on noiseless battery power within the city. shifting automatically to gasoline power on long runs when the batteries begin running low.

Demonstrating his prototype at a two - day automotive sym osium held at the Uni Royal Center in Middlebury, Conn., recently, Horwinski, former chief of European operations for General Dynamics Corp., explained how his new car would perform :

You're stopped at a traffic light in the city. Nothing is running. You push down (on a lever) and you drive away on electricity

the road, and as soon as the answer

batteries are half - discharged. the gasoline engine starts automatically

Piqued by the fact that so much valuable energy is wasted by conventional car operations, the innovator explained that he has designed his car so that any unneeded power developed by the engine while running on gasoline is converted to electricity and stored in the atteries

In addition, Horwinski, explained, another device converts braking power on downhill runs to electrical power for the batteries. Eighty five per cent of the energy used to go up hill can be recovered on

the downgrade, he said. And, finally, the inventor pointed out, the batteries on his new car can be recharged from an electrical outlet as were the "electric cars" of the past.

Low-speed tests, so far, said Horwinski, have been favorable and indications are that high speed operations, which he judges will be about 90 mph, will be satisfactory, too.

With the mounting fuel shortage, the Horwinski innovation ought to be a natural and the environmentalists, if they are consistent, should love

Inside Washington D.C. Home Rule Debated Amid Rise in Crime Rate

By Robert S. Allen

WASHINGTON - Two new jarring realities have surfaced as Congress prepares to act on so - called "compromise" home rule legislation for the nation's capital.

These stark backdrop disclosures are in glaring contrast to the glowing rhetoric and hoopla propaganda spouted by the block of liberal activists. blacks and assorted militant elements spearheading the home rule drive, as follows:

(1) Murder in the District of Columbia is setting new records with 253 so far this year, of which 44 (17 per cent) are still unsolved. That last figure is an all - time high. Previous high was 39 at the end of 1971 - when the capital racked up 288 homicides

Last year this time, murders totaled 230 with only 17 (7.3 per cent) still "officially open" that is, unsolved by arrest. Authority for these grisly statistics is Deputy Police Chief Theodore Zanders.

(2) In 1972, 51 per cent of black births in D.C. Were illegitimate. About half of these unwed mothers were teenagers. In 1971, the proportion of blackchildren born out of wedlock was 47 per cent. This ratio has been climbing steadily since 1960 when it was 27 per cent; four years later it rose to 30 per

cent; by 1965, 35 per cent; in 1970, 45 per cent. Actual number of illegitimate black births in that decade soared from 3,652 in 1960 to 5,855

in 1970 In contrast, the number and proportion of illegitimate white births declined last year. Whites were only 12 per cent of the capital's births, with the number of illegitimates dropping from 234 in 1971 to 150 in 1972.

-Historically, illegitimate black births outnumber whites in all parts of the country. The latest nationwide figures issued by the National Center for Health statistics showed that 35 per cent of black births were illegitimate in 1969 as against 5° per cent of white births.

Dr. Paul Cornely, former chairman of the community health department at Howard University, noted one favorable development.

Despite the increase in the proportion of illegitimate births, he stressed that the infant death rate in Washington has decreased substantially in the past five years. But he added

Once these children are born, their social and economic problems remain, and they are serious **Running In The Red** There is one somber aspect of the explosive Middle East problem about which virtually nothing is being said but which is as tragic as it is urgent. This is the dismal plight of the 1.5 million Arab refugees living in squalid overcrowded camps supervised by the United Nations Relief and Works Agency (UNRWA). This year, UNRWA is heading for a \$4 million deficit on a \$52 million budget. Estimated deficit next year is more than twice that amount UNRWA officials are dolefully warning that unless emergency funds are immediately provided, they won't have sufficient money to pay some 7,500 teachers who conduct classes for around 255,000 children from kindergarten through high school UNRWA was established in 1950 to care for the Palestinian refugees of the 1948 Arab Israeli conflict. They then numbered 960,000, and have steadily increased every year.

THE CONSERVATIVE ADVOCATE **Case Against Shield Laws**

By WILLIAM A. RUSHER As the attacks of the Washington press corps on the Nixon Administration have mounted, leaks to the media from within the Executive branch have grown steadily in both numbers and importance. And as the Administration has intensified its efforts to plug the leaks by identifying the anonymous sources, certain segments of the press have responded by claiming a "newsman's privilege" to conceal their sources, even from a Congressional committee, a grand jury or a trial jury in a criminal proceeding. I think the attempt to assert such a privilege is a mistake, and here's why.

Those favoring the privilege first tried to persuade the courts to find it buried somehwere in r about a part - time stringer? What, for instance, is a 'newsman' anyway? A full time reporter, okay; but how events? Or the unpaid writers for one of today's so-called underground newspapers? Or the freshman heelers on the "Yale Daily News?" Or your own son or daughter who writes. for the high school weekly? I publish a fortnightly

Wally Butts won a \$460,000 libel verdict against the "Saturday Evening Post:" it turned out that the magazine's informant against Butts was an unreliable ex-convict. Was the identity of that informant relevant or not? And, if so, what business would the "Post" have had concealing his identity? For that matter, I seem to recall that Jack Anderson had egg all over his face when he was finally forced to reveal the source of his false report about Senator Eagleton's

drunk - driving arrests. Plainly, any shield law will have to provide for some major exceptions. And. speaking of exceptions. has anybody read the Sixth

Amendment lately? That . amendment quarantees to every defendant in a criminal

case the right "to be confronted with witnesses against him" and to subpoena witnesses in his favor. What will happen to this right if those who know the facts, on one side or the other, are permitted to hide behind some "newsman's" privilege? The First Amendment

guarantees freedom of the press. and that - guarded by a . vigilant Court - is all a real newsman needs. The yen for more is partly derived from a sick desire to confer additional power and status on the profession of journalism, and partly from an equally sick temptation to indulge in our era's passion for dirty little secrets. First it was "taking the Fifth:" then it was "Executive privilege" and now it's the inewsman's privilege." A great

The danger is that we will repeat the mistake of eleven years ago, when we forced the missiles out of Cuba by a hostile confrontation. By United Press International The comet Kohoutek, which will pass near the earth during the next few weeks, is causing great excitement among fundamentalist Protestants.

They are calling it "The Christmas Star of 1973. It has strengthened an

already widely-held belief that" the second coming of Christ may be near at hand

This belief is known in theological jargon as "millennialism.': It often comes strongly to the fore in periods of domestic and international turmoil such as the present.

The term "millennialism" is derived from the Biblical promise that Christ's return will usher in a "millennium" a golden era of 1,000 years of

peace on earth and good will among men. According to the Book of Revelation, this golden era will be preceded by history's

For several years the main-line denominations have been in difficulty. Membership and money are down. Apathy and antagonism are up. Like unfortunate finances within the home, quarrels and fault-finding arrive rather quickly in such a setting. Many people have been reading Dean Kelley's "Why Conservative Churches are Growing' (Harper and Row) for some clue to the success or failure of their own church family.

Statistics are in on last year, with the United Methodists losing 174,677 in 1972: The United Presbyterians, down 104,~ 000; the three leading Lutheran bodies lost 70,860. In the past six years, the Reformed Church in America, the oldest Protestant body in this hemisphere, lost 18,501. Also, in 1972, the United Church of Canada sagged by 23,580. On the plus side for 1972, you put the Southern Baptists at the head of the class, with a gain of 240,821. Others with substantial growth were the Assemblies of God, the Evangelical Free Church, and the Church of the Nazarene - which had a 17 per cent rise in the last four years.

Kelley offers these comments for the strength - and rise - of the conservative churches:

1) "Those who are serious about their faith do not confuse it with other beliefs, loyalties, or practices, or mingle them together indiscriminately, or pretend they are alike, or of equal merit if they are not.

2) "Those who are serious about their faith make high demands of those admitted to the organization that bears the faith, and they do not include or allow to continue within it those who are not fully committed to it

3) "Those who are serious about their faith do not consent to, encourage, or indulge any violations of its standards of belief or behavior by its professed adherents.

4) "Those who are serious about their faith do not keep silent about it, apologize for it, or let it be treated as though it made no difference, or should make no difference, in their behavior or their relationships with others.

Some point to the decline of the liberal churches as caused by too much social activism and too little personal piety. Editor Louis Benes of the Church Herald has a thoughtful article on this theme, noting the necessary balance between evangelism and social action:

"Ours is a time of evangelical resurgence, and this makes it also a day of crises. Are evangelicals ready to communicate the whole gospel to the whole world? Or are some evangelicals, at least, so superficial, so onesided, so anti-intellectual and so antisocial that they provide what is really a caricature of biblical Christianity?" Benes reminds us that early leaders such as Wesley and Calvin, "preached and practiced an individual repentance and an individual obedience, but they spoke of/an dealt with the sins of society, and called upon cities and nations to become obedient to the Word of God." We are approaching a period of correction and balance, a time of conserving before attempting new ministries.

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Tuesday's It Sims To Me column got a lot of reaction from local people concerning the brand of football played in Pampa. One group of concerned individuals presented to me a copy of a Texarkana (Ark.) Gazatte Souvenir Edition, which was actually a sports insert in the Nov. 16 issue of the Gazette. A column by Gazette writer Johnny Green was most interesting

The story was a summary on the life of former Pampa coach Robert E. "Swede" Lee, who left Pampa at semester during the 1971-72 school year after his Harvesters posted an 8-3 season mark and won the district championship. Lee is the head football coach at Texarkana's Arkansas High, and his Razorbacks won the Arkansas AAA state championship this season.

Three paragraphs in Green's column go as follows

'Lee took on his biggest challenge when he accepted the head coaching post at Pampa in football - conscious West Texas. The first two years his teams went 2-8 and 3-7, then in 1970 he produced the first winning season in Pampa since 53. He went 6-4.

"In 1971 Lee's Pampa team posted an 8-3 mark and won the district championship. The following year he accepted Emory Bellard's invitation to join the Texas A&M coaching staff as defensive line coach.

'It wasn't hard for me to leave Pampa even though I had most of my kids coming back." he said. 'The program there was as bad as you can get and I had to fight for every improvement I made.

When asked to comment on the above quote, Lee replied, "Anybody there at that time will understand that comment so I will not expound on it. I want no quotes from Swede Lee in the Pampa newspaper.

The column on Swede Lee was given to me as attempt to point out what certain people think is wrong with Pampa football. Those individuals point the blame to the overall program. Other people have other ideas.



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
