

AUSTIN, Jan. 19-Plans for the Students Union project at the University of Texas being sponsored by the Ex-Students' association of that school have been drawn tentatively by University architects. A campaign to raise funds for the project will be inaugurated shortly, according to T. W. Gregory, president of the Ex-Students' association and sponsor of Arrest and Discharge the project. Regents of the school have already approved the plans and agreed to appropriate a considerable portion of the funds needed. A large number of prominent Texans have also endorsed the project and agreed to work with Gregory in making it a reality. Included in this number are R. J. Lutcher Stark of Orange, chairman of the Board of Regents of the University, and Will C. Hogg, of Houston, former regent and for many years active in University affairs. Both men have agreed to make substantial gifts to the project.



Road Building Machinery Now **Highly Efficient**

The largest one-industry display the world has ever known-the Good Roads Show last week at Cleveland gave a picture of road progress that would be difficult to visualizefully otherwise. Road development. has been so rapid and marvelous that the nation is just catching its secand wind.



This will be a dual structure of two buildings connected by an arcade in which outdoor meetings and gatherings may be held in the mild Texas climate for much of the year. Both buildings will contain lounging rooms for men and women, reading rooms, game rooms, etc. In one of the units there will be an auditorium seating about 1,500 persons for the use of dramatic clubs, debating societies and similar organizations, which are now forced to use theatres and auditoriums away from the campus. A dance floor large enough to, care for small social affairs will also be provided here. In the other unit of this building will be office space for all worthwhile campus organizations, the student self-government and honor councils, and committee rooms for student meetings.

The project was designed from recommodations made by a committee of the presidents of all campus organizations to meet the needs of all interest, athletic, cultural, literary, dramatic, social, forensic, and scholarly, and to correct as fas as may be possible the lack of common interests among the students or the school.
