WEEDS AND TRASH BEING REMOVED TO LESSEN FIRE RISK

"Clean up" has been the watchword of the city of Pampa for the past week. An effort is being made by city officials to remove all trash, cans, dead weeds and grass from the alleyways streets and lots of Pampa in order to decrease the fire hazard that has been created by the accumulation of trash in the city.

M. A. Turner, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce and general clearing house for the city government has employed four or five wagons and men for the past several days in this work.

The hose truck is being repaired this week and it is thought that sufficient water will be on hand now to cope with any fire that may break out. A new fire truck, however, is the next step for the fire department in order to keep the insurance key rate as low as it now is.

Mr. Turner issues the following statement:

"It has been the practice for some time past for the merchants in the business district to burn their papers and trash. We are arranging for an adequate service for trash, and no more fires should be lit in the business district. For some time our fire has been out of service and we have not had an adequate fire pressure for water. Had a fire started in the past two weeks in the business district it would have been hard to control. We are making every effort possible to get an adequate supply of water, one more well will be in operation in a few days and the contract has been let for the drilling of two more. Until we get these on the jump we will ask your cooperation."

According to an article published in the McLean News of recent issue McLean has had a decided increase in insurance rates due to the neglect of the ordinary little precautions that are also being overlooked in Pampa, or rather, were until the past week. The article states, in part:

"While the key rate for fire insurance remains the same after the inspection and rating by the State Fire Commission, individual risks are increased in a number of cases in McLean.

"Nearly all the business houses are affected, many of them being raised almost 50 per cent. This is surprising when it is remembered that it was the belief of everyone that the rating would mean a much lower rate for property in the city.

"The State Fire Insurance Commission law requires that an analysis of the rating of each risk be furnished with each policy written, unless a copy of such analysis has been previously furnished, and each person should insist that such be furnished in order that existing hazards might be known and removed.

"The key rate is arrived at with the following penalties: water work, duplicate electric pumping units 30 per cent; pumps deficient 85 per cent; capacity 50, power other than steam or water 50, no standard storage tanks 20, supply mains not in duplicate 20, 22 per cent of mains less than 8 inches in mercantile district 20, 100 per cent mains deficient in size in residence district 50, fire hydrant deficient 10 per cent in number in mercantile district 10, deficient 20 per cent in number in residence district 20, wholly voluntary fire department 10, fire apparatus, all equipment not self-propelled 30, no auto pumper 40, no reserve pumper 40, no reserve hose truck 40, no hook and ladder truck 40, no chemical engine 40, no alarm system 20, headquarters building low, but fire limits established and general character of construction therein properly restricted 10, electrical streets in residence not paved or properly maintained 20, streets in mercantile district not paved 20, no fire marshals or overlords with in mercantile district 20, frame ranges in mercantile district 20, over 15 per cent of roofs wood shingles 40. Total charges 120. Credits none.

"It will be noted that a number of things that were thought by many to be OK are not allowed. It would appear that keeping the old hand now used carries a charge of 10. Not recognizing our fire alarm or fire apparatus means another charge of 10. That building roof could easily save us 40 if properly maintained.

ELISING INTERESTS STARTING GASOLINE EXTRACTION PLANT

The Elsing interests of Tulsa are putting up a big casing-head gasoline extraction plant on section 41, Bl. 24, in Wheeler county, at a cost of \$125,000 for the initial unit.

Other units will be added as rapidly as production of good wet gas heavily saturated to the commercial point, increases in the fields of Wheeler and Gray counties with the bringing in of new wet gasers, or oil wells making considerable gas.

The gas ready for the first unit in abundance, allows an easy and economical recovery of one and one-half gallons of pure natural gasoline per one thousand cubic feet of gas.

This new plant is located nine miles north of Lela on the Rock Island railroad and ten miles southwest of the town of Wheeler; and only ten miles east of the Gray county line, hence it will serve not only the wet gasers brought in in the western Wheeler field, (especially those coming in for up to 200,000,000 cubic feet per day in the Shamrock area, and in the vicinity of the Bibson oil producer on the Henry Phillips ranch, 15 miles northwest of Shamrock), but will also serve all wet gasers brought in in the new Gray county field.

After extraction of natural gasoline from the wet gas, at this new plant, the residue dry gas will be used one of the most highly profitable by-products of the Panhandle, or cheap fuel in drilling other wells in this district.

The Mid-West already has some good wet gasers, and is expecting to bring in others.

The Elsing plant will also take casing-head gas from oil wells making gas in Wheeler and Gray Counties.

SANTA FE PASSENGER TRAIN NO. 22 HITS FREIGHT IN OKLA.

Passenger train No. 22, eastbound, which arrives here at 4:52 p. m. Wednesday night had a head on collision with a freight train on a long grade east of Woodward, Oklahoma.

The details of the collision are not known here, but it is reported that no one was seriously injured. Train No. 21, westbound, was derailed over the southern route, however, which indicates that quite a little damage was done to the track.

The West Texas chamber of commerce is an organization that is sure to be of great service to Pampa and Gray county during the coming year. Pampa should give 100 per cent support to the organization during the coming year.

Mr. Bennett this year feels that Pampa should have a large number of individual memberships. Panhandle will have 100 members a week and Mr. Bennett believes that Pampa people will respond when they learn about the W. T. C. C. organization.

Benefits of this region from the stand point of fighting vicious oil legislation will be worth the price of every membership obtained in this section.

Pampa's growth in recent months is marvelous. It has been nearly six months since the present ownership took charge of the News. Although we felt Pampa was going to grow, yet we could hardly realize that the oil development would sweep down on this city as it has.

But Pampa would have been a good city regardless of oil. The best wheat city in the Panhandle could not have kept from having plenty of prosperity this summer and fall. The wheat yield has been far beyond the expectations of most farmers and business men.

Traffic regulation is becoming a problem in Pampa. There is too much double parking in the business section. When automobiles are parked on each side of the street against the curbing and then two additional lines are formed, through double parking, it becomes a problem for a motorist to drive his car.

Pampa has several times as many automobiles in the business sections as it did a few weeks ago. The old habit of stopping wherever one desires should not go in Pampa anymore.

A stage line driver told us recently that he was fined for cutting the corner, and he feels that traffic violation is so noticeable in this city that he should not have been asked to pay a fine, unless others were arrested.

Back to the West Texas chamber of commerce. The annual meeting of the Panhandle-Paines division will be held at Clarendon, Monday, Aug. 23. Pampa should have a caravan of several automobiles to Clarendon.

The convention a year ago was in Delhart. The distance to Clarendon is much shorter and should enable a larger attendance.

SUGG RESIGNS AS MANAGER OF THE PAMPA NEWS

Effective with this issue, J. D. Stagg, who has been editor and manager of the Pampa News for the past five months, ceases his connection in order that he may go into business for himself. Mr. Stagg will open the Gray County Printing Co., a job shop in a few days.

Several substantial improvements are being considered by the owners of the News and details will be announced in a short time.

PAMPA COMMERCIAL AND CIVIC LEADERS WORK NIGHT AND DAY TO CARE FOR BOOM

With an elaborate city paving program already under way on the two main thoroughfares, (Cuyler street and Foster avenue), while the City Council has just purchased three additional acres out of the famed "Pampa-Water-Belt" of shallow water gravel levels adjoining the present city water acreage on the northwestern edge of the original townsite, upon which nine more wells are being drilled as fast as the cable tool rigs can drop the bits, so that ultimately the municipality will have total of twelve water wells producing pure cold water as delightful to the taste as the flow of a mountain spring, Pampa is launched on the Herculean task of keeping up with the rapidly increasing needs of the sudden influx of more than fifteen thousand souls attracted to this brightest spot on the oil map, by the bringing in of such monster high gravity gushers as the Wilcox No. 3 Worley & Reynolds and the Shamrock No. 1. (Formerly known as the Clark & Baldrige No. 2) on the Merten Bros. land, only five miles south of the Pampa postoffice on the Santa Fe railroad's main line from Wichita, Kansas, to Los Angeles, via Amarillo.

Mayor "Pete" Reid on Job

Mayor Frederick Peter Reid, (Familiarly known for years thru out the Panhandle as "Mayor Pete of Pampa" and as the most enthusiastic goodroads booster in southwestern America), is extending himself in trying to keep the city's facilities adequate to caring for the horde of "boomers", oil-field workers and their families, and the executives and field managers and "tool-pushers" of the big companies including an army of subsidiaries and independents drilling the rich Wilcox Bayshore district, who make Pampa their residential as well as their operating headquarters.

CITY COUNCIL TO CONSIDER TWO NEW ORDINANCES

There will be an important meeting of the City Council at the Mayor's office Monday night of next week. Every council member is urged to be present as several important problems will be considered at this meeting.

The meeting will begin at eight o'clock and members of the council are requested to be present at this time so that the entire business to be taken up can be dispatched in the shortest possible time.

The City Council of Pampa will consider two important ordinances at their regular meeting next Monday night. The most important is the ordinance governing the open toilets of the business and residential districts.

This ordinance provides for the box and can type of toilets as recommended by the State department of public health, and the ordinance will provide for the condemnation of all open toilets in the city, within a specified time. The city is now making arrangements for a sample of the cans which will be carried in stock by the hardware stores and tin shops. Any carpenter can do the work or it can be done by the owner himself as long as he follows the specifications.

The other ordinance to be considered is the one covering the installation of electric work and closely follows the Dallas City ordinance on the same subject. It will provide for the license and bond of all master electricians, who must pass an examination before the electrical board, before their license will be issued. It provides for conduit work in the fire limits and for all buildings of a public nature such as hotels, rooming houses, restaurants, et cetera. This ordinance is very necessary as a fire preventive and will result in the key rate for fire insurance being lowered.

Both ordinance have been drawn up by City Attorney Jno. F. Stader and are expected to be favorably reported by the council Monday night.

PAMPA DRY GOODS MERCHANTS VICTIMS OF HOT CHECKS

Merchants of Pampa are warned to guard against hot check artists that have recently harvested some rich pickings here. One artist had a special preference for the dry goods stores. He received several hundred dollars on faked company checks from a number of dry goods merchants.

This special artist used checks forged on the Gulf Refining company, has brown eyes, age about thirty, height five feet ten inches, wears 32-31 trousers, 15 1/2 inch collar, and No. 9 gloves. He was dressed as an oil field worker and had about three days growth of beard on his face. He was described as being slightly flat chested, and had Auburn hair.

The local Gulf company dealer had been warned against this forger, who has been cashing checks forged on the Gulf company for the past eighteen months.

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BEN BLOCH OF OKLA. JUMPS ACROSS GRAY WITH 125-FOOT RIG

In accordance with the recent drilling plunge by an aggregate of over a score of majors, including both subsidiaries and independents, and about 100 smaller outfits, following the Shamrock and Wilcox record breakers and the Bay Shore well, in central western Gray, a new independent entrant has made a big jump in a different direction almost across the width of the county to the east and location being spotted in its train from the present Wilcox-Pampa field eastward and southeastward, presage another big drilling campaign in these directions.

The Bloch Oil company, headed, by Ben Bloch of Oklahoma, has already finished erection of a splendid 125-foot rig—the light in the whole field, by the way, which can be seen clear from the Wilcox-Bayshore district.

The Bloch rotary outfit is located in NW corner of SE quarter, Sec. 41, Bl. 25, and Mr. Bloch is authority for the announcement that drilling operations will begin early in September.

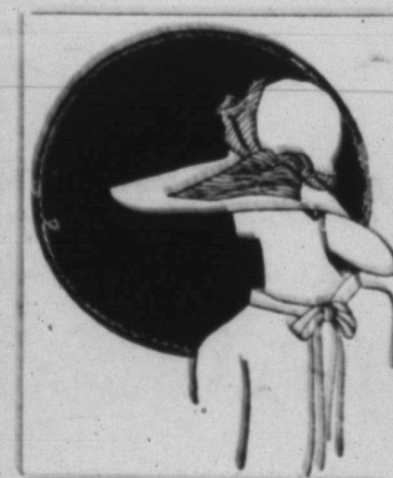

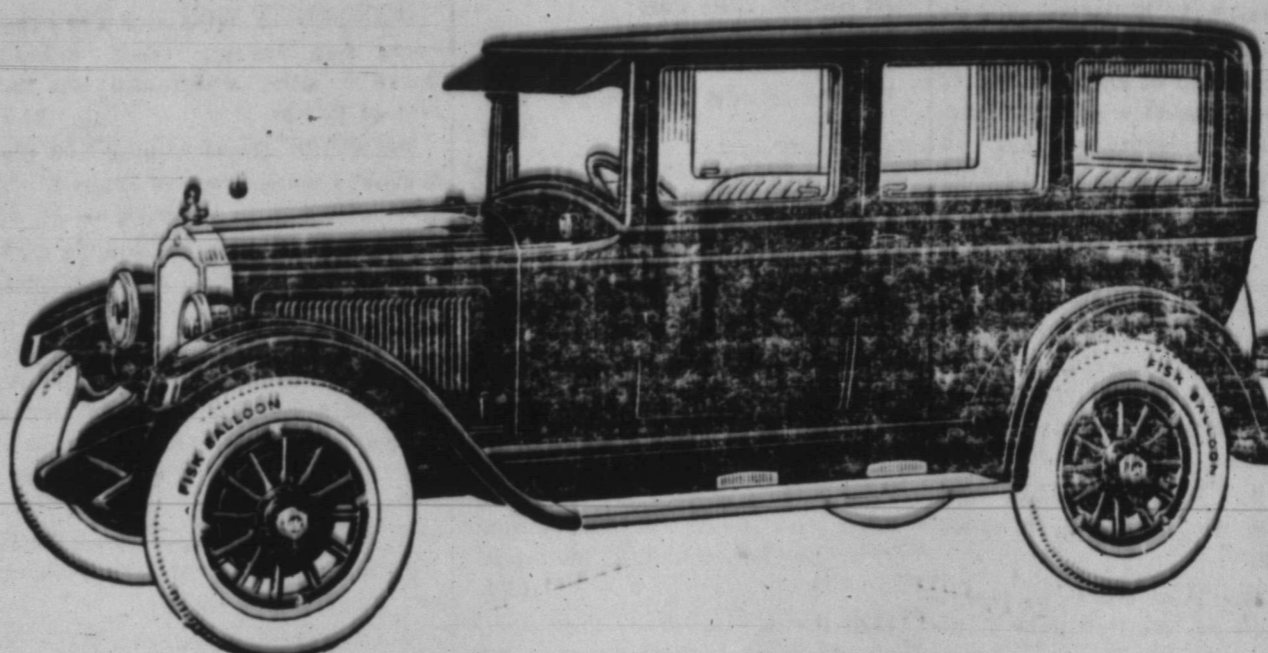

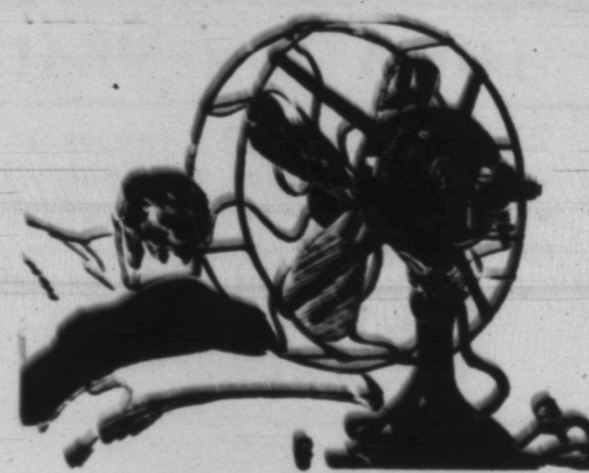

PAMPA'S FIRST LITTLE FRAME SHACK SCHOOL CONTRASTS WITH HALF MILLION DOLLAR PALACES

It is a far cry from the little board shack that housed the first thirteen school children in Pampa, in 1865, and the \$200,000 high school of the present but the contrast between today and a few tomorrows will be made even greater by the huge half-million dollar high schools and grade schools in the Pampa school district,—second largest school district in America, (Perryton being the only larger one, it also being in the extreme North Texas.)

From the poorest school district in the country, Pampa has risen swiftly in the last twenty years to be the richest school district in the educational world,—its assessed valuation being over twenty-five million dollars.

First a cow-town backed only by great unfenced cattle ranches for hundreds of miles in all directions, Pampa originally became rich from breeding and selling on the top of the market, the finest pure-bred highland Herefords, its only rival in that class today the Marfa and Alpine districts of Presidio and Brewster counties, in the Big Bend country along the Rio Grande.

Then came the "nesters", the homesteaders, who broke the first raw prairie soil with the plow, found the soil a rich dark, deep chocolate loam, planted wheat, and over one growing season, Pampa made Gray county world famous in wheat, and won the familiar sobriquet, "Queen City of Wheat".

Soon the farmers began "trying out" garden truck to "see if it would grow in the Panhandle", (long notorious in the tales of globe trotters and explorers from the early Spaniards of 1537, as the "desert-dry" Llano Estacado). In another year, Gray county was sacking sweepstakes, first, second, third and fourth prizes in all grasses and grains, melons, vegetables and fruit, at the State Fair in Dallas, and later repeated at Dallas and then at the Tri-State Exposition (representing all Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico), held in Amarillo,—so it went year after year.

The \$25,000 Hereford bulls of Gray county, like Pathfinder 541,386, and their progeny, cleaned up the blues at the International Stock Shows and at state fairs all over the country, giving this district first rank in the beef cattle division and spreading the fame of Gray county breeding herds in white-faces.

The Kids Who Did It

But it takes men and women to do things, no matter how rich the land. The pioneers had terrible obstacles to overcome, awful hardships to undergo. Their children faced struggles as

hard for their lighter strength, but no less bravely than the hard-bitten cow men and first farmers.

In those days there was about one family to fifty square miles, in that part of the Panhandle. Boys and girls rode, often bare-back, on the cyclone deck of a flea-bitten Indian cayuse, thru blizzards and snow-drifts ten feet deep, in order to get from home to the only school for sixty miles around, in Pampa, in the winter time.

This regime turned out a hardy, huggled race, based on stamina and grit,—a generation that "stayed with" the Panhandle and Gray county when weaker breeds, starved out and discouraged, sought pastures new and green in lands far away.

Stayers Win into Millions

The "stayers" are today sitting on top of the biggest and richest oil field on the globe,—the Wilcox Bay-shore pool of central-western Gray Co., which helps some in lease and royalty monies on top of Gray county's quota out of the Panhandle's 22,000,000 bushel wheat crop for 1926.

Teachers Of First School

Looking back thru the mist of years, old-timers credit the labors of the first teachers in the first school of Pampa district, some of whom have gone on in higher educational work in more populous communities, or in much larger institutions, and two of whom are familiar figures in the Lone Star State's history; namely, Miss Clara Dean, who for years has been a leader in the North Ft. Worth high school, and Prof. Stigler, at present a member of the faculty of the Sul Ross Normal at Alpine, Texas.

The first teacher in the Pampa school district was John Thomas, a brother of Charles R. Thomas, now president of the Gray County State Bank in Pampa. That was in 1865, and he had thirteen pupils, most of whom rode from ten to twenty miles bare hand forth to school on their ponies every day in school terms.

Membership rapidly increased from 1867 on. Miss Clara Dean was the first Pampa principal. She was instrumental in bringing Mrs. Bessie Warren

to Pampa as a teacher. Then came Mrs. Frances Knox. I. B. Hughey also taught in those earliest—Pampa school days.

Romance of Auld Lang Syne

Miss Bessie Warren and Miss Clara Dean were bosom friends. While they were teaching school together in the first little school house in Pampa, built by the White Deer Land company on David Popes present home land, away back in 1866-67, a young man came to Pampa to run a little bank in a small board shack. He was cashier for years. He went with Miss Clara Dean, an dthen with Miss Bessie Warren,—and the townsfolk were kept guessing for a long time over the probable aftermath of this bucolic romance. The puzzle was solved when Mr. B. E. Finley married Miss Bessie Warren. Mr. Finley is now president of the First National Bank of Pampa.

Two other teachers of those old days who never will be forgotten by their pupils are the parents among present old-timers, were Miss Martin and Miss Worthington. I. B. Hughey is now the Pampa agent for the Federal Farm Loan bank and one of the most prominent business men in the Panhandle. He recently sold an oil lease on some of his land southeast of town to the Empire Fuel & Gas company, and made other land deals netting him in the neighborhood of \$54,000. The "kids" who went to school to these pioneer pedagogues, whenever

they come together in social gatherings of any sort, tell stories redolent of school days, to keep the memories of their old teachers,—still dear, still green.
