A proposition was presented to the city council here Mon-day night whereby Pampa may have a hospital in the near future. Doctors A. Cole and W. Purviance propose to open a hospital of not less than twenty-eight rooms here, providing the city and county will pay for the care of keeping the city and county patients. A sum of five dollars a day is asked for the care of such patients. Hospital fees, medical attention and operations will all be covered by five dollars a day, providing the city and county and county officials will make other investigations as to the ability of the patient or relatives to pay the sum. The Wilcox Worley-Reynolds number 13 came in Mon-day night for a 2500 barrel well. Oil authorities here say that it promises to make one of the best of wells. It is located in the northwest corner of the southwest quarter of section 62, block 3, Gray county.

The Magnolia company's Mert number 4 was given a 210 quart shot Sunday and is making 500 barrels at present. This well is in the northeast corner of the southwest quarter of section 82, block 3, Gray county.

The Young and Osborn Holmes number 1 three miles south is swabbing 250 barrels a day.
