

PAMPA OIL ACTIVITY IS BRISK 1016 ENROLL MONDAY IN PAMPA SCHOOL

ATTENDANCE DOUBLES THAT OF LAST YEAR ON FIRST DAY; ALL STUDENTS TO BE TAKEN CARE OF

Attendance at the first day of school this year exactly doubled last year's enrollment. There was 1016 students enrolled here Monday and last year on the opening day there was 508.

Members of the school board, the new faculty, interested patrons and friends of the school and several score of excited students gathered at the school auditorium for the opening exercises at 8 o'clock Monday morning.

C. of C. Hosts To Business Men At Banquet Last Night

The business men of Pampa met at the Pampa Hotel last night in a get-together meeting at a banquet given by the Chamber of Commerce.

The purpose of the meeting was to enjoin the new citizenship of business men with the old and to perfect the organization of the Chamber of Commerce for the mutual benefit of the people. John Boswell, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce of Dallas; O. C. Goodwin, secretary of the board of development of Amarillo; W. C. Hawk, of the Amarillo News-Globe and Charles Cook, local attorney, were the speakers on the program.

It was decided that \$5000 would be raised for the carrying on of the work of the Chamber of Commerce. This work will consist of an advertising campaign for citizenship of the proper type in case a slump should come at Pampa. Another feature of the work will consist in calling attention to problems in the city and assisting in those matters in which the city at present is unable to attend to.

It was pointed out what the meaning of fellowship and the association of business men meant in their mutual problem, that of building a city, and the way to bring business men together was said to be through the chamber of commerce.

Ben S. Baldwin, of the school board, gave an address on "The Ideals of Education." Rev. H. F. Tippen, pastor of the Baptist church, read the scriptures and gave a talk on "Team Work." Rev. O. J. Osborne also gave a short talk.

"General Co-operation" was the subject chosen by Superintendent R. C. Campbell. He stressed the necessity of the students, the patrons, the board and the teachers working together in the perfecting of the organization necessary to carry on the work of so great a school. The teachers were introduced and an interesting talk was made by J. T. Glass, principal.

The faculty in the high school is made up of twenty-five teachers who hold degrees from standard colleges. Every teacher in the high school has a degree and twelve of the grade-school teachers are college graduates. All the other teachers have had at least two years training and have proven themselves by efficiency, Mr. Campbell said.

The school board met Monday afternoon and ordered the immediate erection of two two-room cottages with a seating capacity of 140 pupils. "With the building of new cottages and hiring of more teachers from time to time, we will be able to accommodate all students desiring to enter," Mr. Campbell said. Five teachers for the grades and one high school teacher were elected Monday.

The school board requests that the town's people co-operate with the school in the matter of fire insurance between now and the first of the year as this will be one of the big problems later on. Two international trucks have been provided to bring the students from the oil fields in to school.

Teachers Found Pampa's Growth Hardly Believable

"We left Pampa in May, a peaceful little village. When we came back this fall we thought we were in Chicago," one of the teachers said yesterday between breaths as she directed a host of primary students at the school house. She said that the change was inconceivable for so short a time.

"We couldn't find any place to stay and many of us are tramping from house to house from night to night to find a place to sleep. We have found the people very hospitable, but a permanent location would look mighty good," she said. Some of the teachers have their trunks parked in the domestic science room until they are able to find a location. Superintendent R. C. Campbell urges that all persons who can, open their homes to the teachers.

The teachers are enthusiastic about the prospects for the coming year and promise to make the schools better than they have ever been. "Pampa is a city now and we are going to have a city school this year," Miss Daniels said.

Pampa's Football Team Looks Good For This Season

If material signifies anything, Pampa High School should have a very good football team this year, according to one of last year's men who will be back on the field this year. Besides two of last year's players and four from year before last, there are a number of experienced players from Oklahoma and surrounding high schools who will be out for football in Pampa this fall.

Verde Dickey, of Austin College, will be head coach of squad and Oscar Dial and Rex McKay will be assistant coaches. The coaches express the opinion that with the material available they see no reason why the team this year should not be as good or better than the famous team of three years ago.

The line material will be heavier than the average high school team and the back field will be light. The financial agency for the team this year is in the hands of C. E. Buckley, a member of the school board, and all new equipment will be issued.

The boys have a hard schedule ahead of them nine games already slated against competition whose strength can not be estimated. The first game will be played Oct. 1. Games will be played with the Canyon Yearlings, Shamrock, Canadian, Panhandle, McLean, Wellington, Miami, and Amarillo.

813,000 Bushels of Wheat Shipped So Far This Season

Five hundred sixty-four car loads of wheat have been shipped out of Pampa so far this season by the five local elevators and it is estimated that 40 per cent of the wheat has not been shipped yet.

The wheat market took a 5 cent drop last week and has never returned to the price paid all season. The top this week is around \$1.14 with small lots selling for \$1.10. It is believed that the market is coming back slightly since the break.

The 564 cars carried a total of 813,000 bushels. The MacMurry Grain Company shipped 85 cars, Strader Grain 82 cars, Pampa Grain, handling the wheat growers association's output, 242 cars, Great West Mill and Elevator 85 cars and the Martin Lane Company 70 cars.

SEVERAL WELLS DUE TO COME IN AT ONCE; STATE PRODUCTION TO BE MOVED PROMPTLY BY BUYERS

Oil activity in the Pampa area is continuing unusually active. With many wells about to be brought in, it is expected that more attention than ever will be given to the Gray county field.

That the Gray county field is sure to increase rapidly is evidenced by the big development program now going ahead. Many more new towns will be established shortly, and it is held that it will be necessary that the development continue to assure success to these projects.

The Gulf well in section 83 flowed some Monday night. Several Wilcox wells are due to be brought in without delay. Some of the wells are off sets to the Magnolia, which is in the southeast corner of Section 82, and other tests.

Shortage of water has held down completion of some wells. With the Prairie, Gulf, Magnolia, Atlantic, Sinclair, Humble and other big concerns interested in the oil field, it is believed that the Gray county area has a long period of development ahead.

A tremendous flow of gas has still been noticeable in the Bayshore test. The flow Tuesday was estimated at more than one hundred cubic feet, making it one of the greatest test in the field.

Prairie officials were in Pampa this week making plans for the trunk pipeline to be built to Ad-dington, Okla., a distance of more than 200 miles. A feeder line comes to Kingsmill from the Hutchinson county field. This will join the Gray county line and go on through Wheeler and Collingsworth county.

Many Pampa oil men have expressed disappointment that some of the larger papers have carried stories about the sale of one-half interest in the Shamrock Petroleum Co. to the Prairie company, stating that the holdings included are in the "Amarillo oil fields."

These men say that correspondents and all editors should learn to call the specific area or refer to the Texas Panhandle area, as does the Oil and Gas Journal, which is generally regarded an impartial authority on oil development.

Heavy shipments of oil have been reported lately. With the Sinclair, Humble and Atlantic lines ready to take oil and the Prairie trunk line proposed, it is believed that there will be an ample outlet for the Gray county oil.

An announcement of interest from South Texas is that the Phillips Petroleum Co. is considering the purchase of properties of the Gibson Oil Corporation in Texas. A thousand acre lease in Hutchinson county with an additional 4,000 acres pat the Gibson corporation on its feet. Gibson capitalization is one million shares and it has been listed on the New York curb market, selling at around \$4 a share.

Free Delivery To Commence At Once Postmaster Says

The numbering of the houses has been completed and two men will be started on the free delivery service as soon as possible. W. A. Crawford, postmaster, announces. Word was received Sunday from R. B. Craeger that delivery service had definitely been decided on here.

This system will greatly relieve the congestion at the post office, the postmaster said, and after it has been inaugurated boxes will not be allowed for individuals living within the city limits. It is estimated that at least 350 boxes will be accessible by business houses and men out of town when this plan is carried out.

"We are doing close to a first class business here, handling more mail than any station in this section with the exception of Amarillo, and with a little co-operation we can have a first class post office here within a short time," Mr. Crawford said. He urged the people to be patient and to consider the fact that there had been 100 per cent increase in the last few months and to try and co-operate with his force which is working two hours overtime every night to give better service without pay. T. D. Hobart is assisting Mr. Crawford.

Present M. A. Turner With Pen and Pencil

The cooks and waiters who presented M. A. Turner, city manager, with a life time Shaver fountain pen and pencil at a meeting in the Mayor's office at 5 o'clock Monday morning.

The gift was presented in recognition to the action Mr. Turner took in cleaning up the restaurants of Pampa.

H. K. Warren of Tulsa, Okla., has become manager of the Gibson Supply Co. He reports that Pampa should have a great future.

Funeral Services Held at Pampa for Hawk, Gas Victim

Funeral services were held at Pampa Thursday afternoon, Sept. 2, for H. H. Hawk, one of the victims of gas at the Bayshore Oil Company well, seven miles south of Pampa. Burial was in Fairview cemetery under the auspices of the Masons.

The body of A. C. Underwood, the other victim, was sent Wednesday night of last week to Painsborough, N. Y., for burial. The men were trapped by gas some time Tuesday night or Wednesday morning of last week.

Grover C. Malone, Pampa undertaker, had charge of the bodies and made an emergency trip to the well to bring them to Pampa.

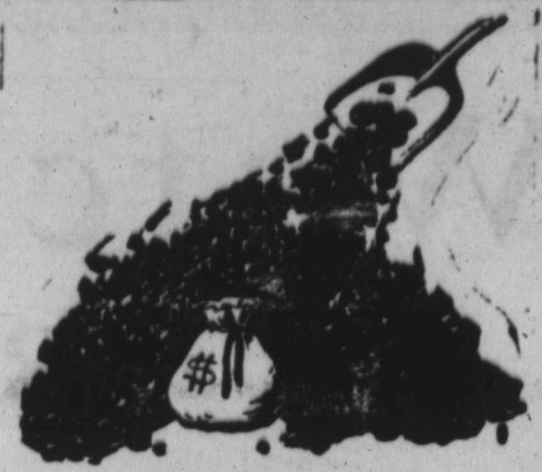

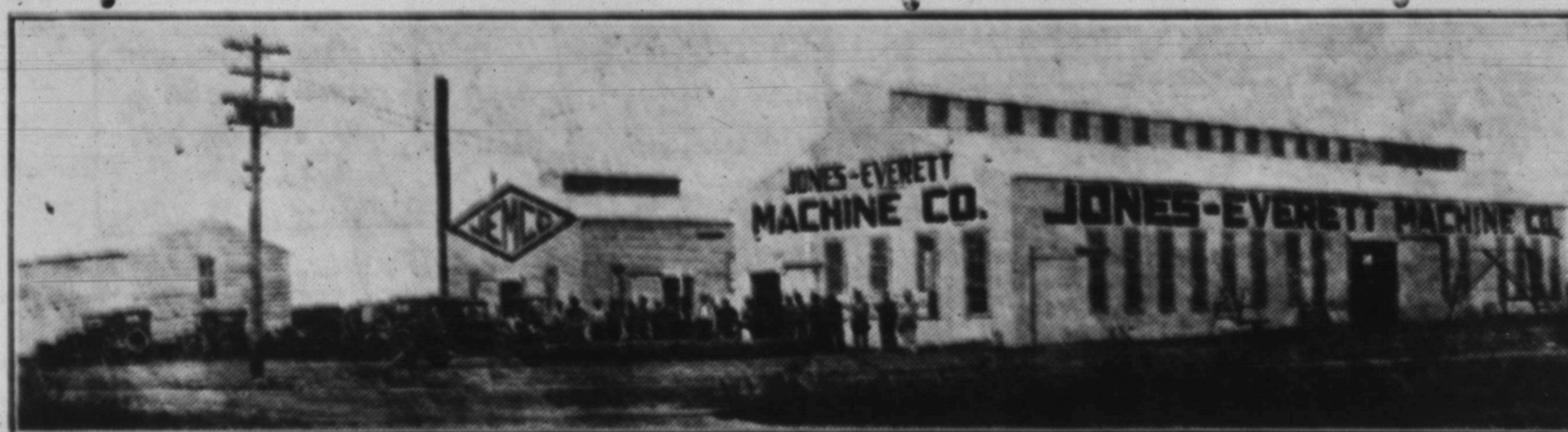

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION THIRTY-SIX (36) OF CITY ORDINANCE NO. 41, WHICH WAS PASSED AND APPROVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PAMPA, TEXAS, ON THE 11TH DAY OF JUNE, A. D. 1923, AND ENTITLED, CITY ORDINANCE NO. 36, REGULATING SEWER PLUMBING AND MAINTENANCE THEREOF AND SEWER DRAINAGE AND THE KIND AND CHARACTER OF WATER CLOSETS AND PRIVIES AND THEIR CONNECTION WITH THE SEWER SYSTEM AND THE KIND AND CHARACTER OF CLOSETS WHERE THEY ARE NOT REQUIRED TO BE CONNECTED WITH THE SEWER SYSTEM, AND PROVIDING

FOR THE DESCRIPTION OF AN INSPECTION OF PLUMBING AND LICENSING PLUMBERS AND PRESCRIBING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF. THAT SECTION THIRTY-SIX (36) BE AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS: Any person desiring to do business as a plumber in connection with the sewer system, its mains, laterals, pipes, fixtures, etc., shall file in the office of the City Secretary an application giving the name of the individual or firm and the place of business and asking to be licensed as a plumber. Said license shall not be granted by the City Secretary unless said applicant submits to the Chairman of the Sanitary Committee the certificates of two plumbers in good standing, said

plumbers to be selected by the Inspector of Plumbing, or unless the applicant submits other evidence satisfactory to the said Inspector of Plumbing. Each applicant for license shall execute and deposit in the office of the City Secretary with his application a bond with two or more good and sufficient sureties, to be approved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Pampa, Texas, in the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), conditional that such plumber shall save the City harmless of any and all damages of whatever kind resulting from negligent or unskillful work on the part of said plumber, that all pavements, curbs or sidewalks removed, damaged or injured in excavating shall be replaced and maintained by him for six months. That he will abide by all the rules and regulations made by the City of Pampa in regard to plumbing work. The above bond shall be made payable to the City of Pampa and shall be renewed every year. Failure to renew said bond as above required or as demanded shall of itself operate as a forfeiture of said license. No license shall be granted for more than one year, and all licenses shall be granted to expire on June 1st. A discontinuance of business shall act as a revocation of said license. Before any license is issued, the applicant shall pay the City Secretary to be deposited in the City Treasury a license fee of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00). The following shall be the requisites of such license: It shall state the consideration received, the name of the person or firm to whom license to pursue the occupation of plumber is granted and the location of the business. It shall state the dates of issuance and expiration thereof and be attested with the corporate seal of the City of Pampa and be subscribed by the Chairman of the Sanitary Committee or City Secretary. This amendment was introduced at a regular meeting of the City Council on the 22nd day of August, A. D. 1926, and passed at a regular meeting of the City Council on the 22nd day of August, 1926. Approved this the 22nd day of August, 1926.

EVERY-DAY GOOD THINGS

APPLES are so wholesome, so well liked and usually so plentiful that they should be eaten every day when possible to obtain them. An apple eaten at night, when it agrees with one, is a fine remedy for constipation. "An apple a day keeps the doctor away" is a good and true saying.

Apple Sauce Frappe.
Make a sweet apple sauce, flavoring with red cinnamon candies. Press through a colander, add two table-spoonfuls of lemon juice and freeze to a thick mush. Serve in apple cups, garnished with bright jelly.

Apple Delmonico.
Butter a baking dish and lay in a layer of tart apples cored and cut into rings. Sprinkle with ground almonds and sugar, cover with crushed macaroons and pour over one cupful of any canned fruit juice or a cupful of sirup made of sugar and water. Cover and bake forty-five minutes in a quick oven. Serve garnished with whipped cream.

A new way to serve sweet potatoes is to boil them cut into rounds and fry in butter. Serve with a ring of fried apple on each slice of potato.

Apple Salad.
Quarter three bright-skinned apples without removing the peeling. Cut into thin slices. Cut one bunch of celery into small pieces and place in cold water with a little lemon juice. Prepare French dressing, chill all the ingredients, adding enough paprika to the dressing to give color. Mix one cupful of blanched pistachio nuts with the other ingredients and serve on lettuce. The combination of white of the celery, red of the apple, and green of the nuts makes a most attractive salad.

Waldorf Salad.
This is such a common but such a good salad that it should not be slighted. To one cupful of celery use two cupfuls of apple and one-half cupful of any finely broken nut meats.

LITTLE do we stop to consider, when enjoying the various pieces of furniture with which we are surrounded in our homes, or a possible history which they might reveal, a bit of romance or color or breath of the past that may linger about them. The fact that almost everything that we use or touch in furniture as in the other amenities of modern life, harks back to its origin or its inspiration to long before the days when furniture factories came into existence, escapes a good many of us.

For centuries men wrote on tablets or any other flat support. And the desk as we know it today was not consciously designed as a writing place. Rather like Topsy, it sort of happened, an offspring of that early progenitor of modern furniture, the chest.

Chests at first opened on top; later, for purposes of convenience when something was placed over them, they opened down at the front, forming the cupboard with a door. Then came the wicker chest, the chest with drawers underneath, and this, with the opening front above made slightly sloping toward the front, originally known as the "scrubbin'," which came into use about 1700, and is still very familiar today.

With the addition of an upper cabinet, we have the popular "secretary" desk. As believed of the furniture designers of the "Queen Anne" period, the roll top desk is credited to Sheraton and the modern spinet desk had its inspiration in the spinet, the piano of Elizabethan days.

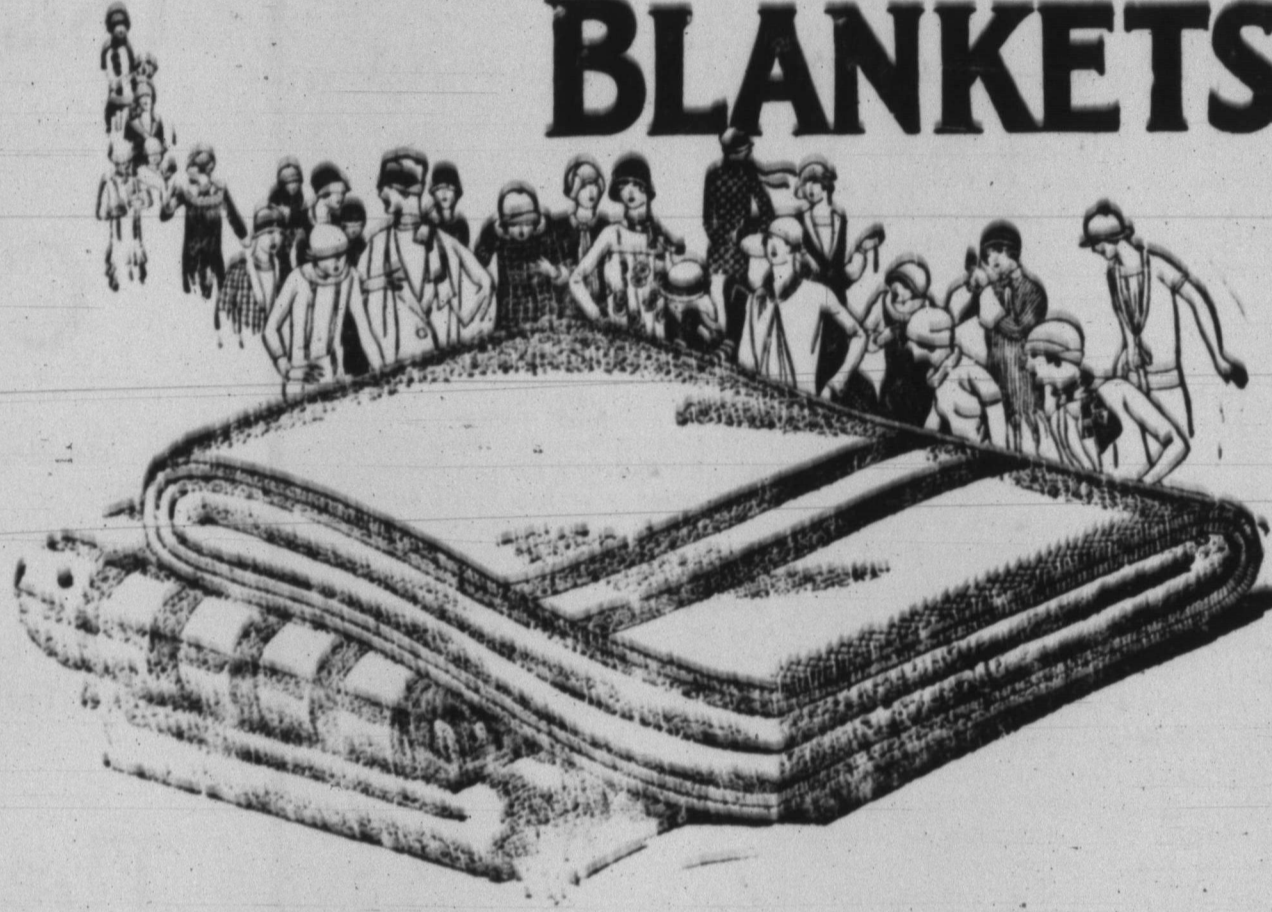

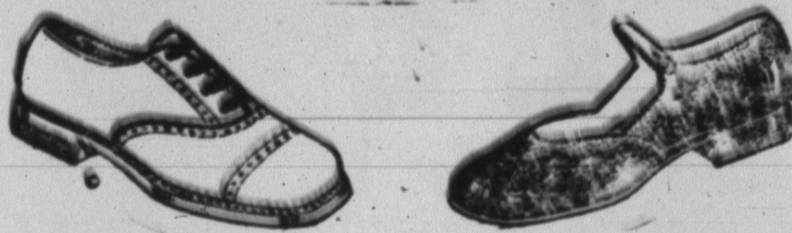

Boil a fowl until tender, salt and season with onion or garlic while cooking. Remove the meat from the bones and chop fine, add a bit of garlic and a generous quantity of cayenne pepper. Make a thick paste of corn meal, salt and boiling water. Form the meat into rolls the size of the finger and encase each in corn meal paste. Wrap each tamale in corn husk, tie with a strip of husk and drop into chicken stock to cook. Add two or three Mexican peppers and cook fifteen minutes.

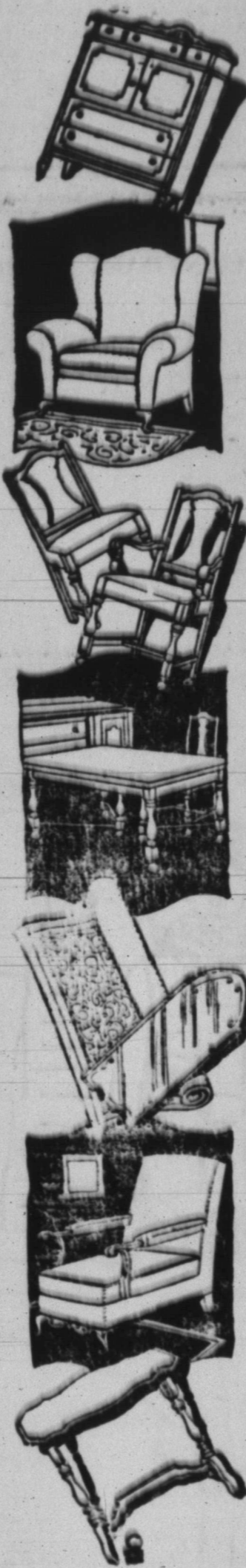

PRETTY POLL

IT WILL be recalled that it was necessary for the Wright brothers to go abroad in order to secure proper recognition for their first aeronautic inventions. The French government welcomed them and gave them proper opportunity to demonstrate that they had progressed far beyond any others in developing a heavier-than-air flying machine; but as a group, the French aeronauts were disposed to show jealousy for the two Yankees.

The point was that these Frenchmen, for years past, virtually had been holding the supremacy over the rest of Europe in the matter of aeronautic experiments. Their dirigibles, it is true, had not proved complete successes; still, French ingenuity had progressed farther in this field than the Germans or the Britishers had gone. It was only to be expected, therefore, that the two modest strangers from the States should encounter envy and meet with obstacles from their Gallic rivals.

Nevertheless, following the successful proof by them of their ability actually to fly and, what was more important, to guide their machine along a given course, a banquet at Paris was arranged in their honor. Americans had a good deal to do with bringing the dinner about, but all the French aeronauts or would-be aeronauts were invited and a considerable number of them attended.

Naturally, there was a deal of speech-making. The chief orator was a distinguished Frenchman who devoted the most of his remarks to claiming that France had led the world in the new field of endeavor—or so he insisted—and to proclaiming that future developments ever would find Frenchmen at the forefront. Curiously enough, he had very little to say in compliment of the two chief guests of honor.

Wilbur Wright was next called upon by the rostrum. Slowly he rose to his feet.

"I am no hand at public speaking," he said, "and on this occasion must content myself with a few words of thanks to the company for its entertainment of myself and my brother. As I sat here listening to the speakers who have preceded me, I have heard comparisons made to the eagle, to the swallow and to the hawk as typifying skill and speed in the mastery of the air; but somehow or other, I could not keep from thinking of the bird which, of all the ornithological kingdom, is the poorest flyer and the best talker. I refer to the parrot."

And down he sat amid tremendous applause from the American present.

FOOD FOR THE DAY

TO PLAN three meals a day for a family, trying to serve the food that is pleasing, keeping one's bills within the limit, and providing a variety, with the day's food well balanced, is the task of twenty thousand cooks in this land, or at least it should be; a task that takes real training and practice to be successful. Ill-nourished children, dyspeptic husbands and unhappy homes will always follow the inefficient and indifferent cook.

With the opportunity for everybody, of any class, who can read, there is no excuse for any girl going into the home of her husband without any equipment for caring for a home; otherwise she is not a partner in the marriage, but a parasite.

No matter how poor, with planning and study one may serve wholesome meals. A man who is working at hard labor is able to digest heartier foods and they should be well-cooked and served. The cheaper cuts of meat, though taking longer to cook than steaks, are far more nourishing and full of flavor.

By combining with vegetables, a small piece of meat which, when served alone with one vegetable, would not be sufficient, will, with two or more vegetables cooked with it, make a good meal for the average family. For example: A pound of mutton, if carefully skinned and cut into serving-sized pieces, browned in a little fat and then cooked slowly for two hours or more on the back of the stove with a few carrots sliced, an onion or two for flavor and as many potatoes as will supply the appetite of the family, adding water to cover, makes a most satisfying dish. Lamb would cost more and the flavor would not be so good. A piece of beef from the chuck or neck, cooked a long time after browning, is tender and delicious in flavor. Seasonings may vary to give variety and suit the family taste.

With a small garden spot in which many of the small vegetables may be raised, a very poor family will have a good living at low cost. The protein foods, such as butter, eggs, meat and fish are the expensive foods, so if they are stretched with rice, macaroni, vegetables and grains the food bill is very much less.
