

OIL NEARS PAMPA FROM WEST GREAT CITY IS FORECAST FOR PAMPA

NEW WELL WILL PROBABLY MAKE THOUSANDS OF BARRELS DAILY; OTHERS TO BE IN SOON

The sensational oil discovery of recent weeks was made Monday when the Bryan well No. 1 of the Roxana Petroleum Co. came in. The well was pinched in, so that storage for the oil might be arranged.

The well is located in block 4, section 92, the southeast quarter of Carson County. It is nine miles due north of White Deer and about fourteen miles west of Pampa.

High Line to Pampa Will Be Completed Within Six Weeks

Work on the high line from Amarillo to Pampa is progressing rapidly, according to Theo Tipps, manager of the Southwestern Public Service Co., here. "We will be using electricity that is generated in Amarillo within 40 days," says Mr. Tipps.

Poles are being installed in all the lower places first so that a seige of wet weather will not delay the completion of the line. The new line will furnish electrical power to Panhandle and other towns along the route. It may be extended to the oil fields around here after it reaches Pampa, according to Mr. Tipps.

The present light plant will be left in Pampa until the high line has been thoroughly tested for at least six months, then, if it is satisfactory, the plant will be removed to another place and a sub-station will be placed here.

The present plant at Pampa is capable of producing 435 horse power. The high line will produce several thousand horse power. The local plant recently installed a new engine here which led many to believe that the high line would not be extended to Pampa. Mr. Tipps says that the equipment here is to care for the present demand temporarily, and that it will be removed within six months.

New 35-foot poles, larger transformers and higher voltage wires are being installed here now so that as soon as the high line is completed the city will be ready to use the electrical power. The entire electrical equipment of Pampa will be rebuilt. Last month there were 163 new customers added by the light department. To date this month there has been 33 new ones added.

"We will take care of everything that comes in now," says Mr. Tipps. "We have added 85 addition horse power in motors within the last month and can (Continued on Page 5)

Many Subscriptions Received Before New Rate Takes Effect

The Pampa News has had a wonderful growth in the subscription department in recent weeks. Subscriptions are pouring in daily to The News, and it seems that September will be a record month in the number of subscriptions received.

The News is enlarging the paper and is fully keeping pace with the Pampa field. Subscribers are going to receive greater value than ever for their year's News subscription.

Information was received early this week that the new Model 14 Linotype had been shipped from New York and that it would arrive in this city in a short time. Probably in three or four weeks the linotype will be received and installed.

When the linotype and other new machinery are installed, it is planned to have a semi-weekly newspaper. It is possible that The News may be able to make arrangements for establishing the semi-weekly before all the new machinery arrives.

The News is enlarging the force, as is announced in another part of the paper. Ben Reno has been employed as city editor and will devote full time to gathering local news.

Persons desiring to save money on their subscriptions should send them in before the semi-weekly paper is started. An advance of 50 cents a year will be made on the semi-weekly, the management believing that the extra service surely should be worth at least that much. However, all subscriptions received now will be credited at the present rates of \$2.00 a year in Texas or \$2.50 a year outside the state.

PAMPA TO HAVE FREE DELIVERY; CARRIERS WILL BE ADDED WHEN REQUIRED IMPROVEMENTS MADE

One mail carrier will probably begin delivery service at once to cover the business district of Pampa. Another carrier, and possibly two will be started within two or three weeks according to W. A. Crawford, postmaster.

The money orders and postal receipts have tripled during the past week. There has been a steady rapid increase in the receipts ever since the boom started, according to Mr. Crawford.

A letter has been received from the post office department asking for the number of patrons residing within territory having sidewalks, crossings, street lights and signs, and where the building lots are 50 per cent improved, that it, houses erected and occupied on one-half of the building lots.

W. A. Turner, city manager, is preparing this data and it will be forwarded to the post office department at Washington at once.

Preparations for the paving of streets are being completed as quickly as possible. The city will be ready to receive bids on a part of the paving by September 29 or 30, according to Mr. Turner. The first paving to be done will be: 3 blocks on Caylor, 2 blocks on Francis, 2 blocks on Foster, 2 blocks on Kingsmill and one and one-half on Browning.

Street signs will not be erected until the paving is completed because the streets are to be widened eight feet on each side and the signs will be erected near the curbing. Sidewalks must be built before free delivery can be extended to the residential sections of the city. (Continued on Page 5)

GRAY COUNTY BANK ADDS ACTIVE VICE-PRESIDENT; QUARTERS TO BE PRACTICALLY DOUBLED SOON

With information of the purchase of a substantial block of the Gray County Bank by J. M. Dolson of Ranger, who will be active vice president, announcement is made that the quarters of the bank will be doubled in a short time.

The new vice president organized the Ranger State Bank of which he was cashier for two and one-half years. He was with the state bank department three or four years.

Mr. Dolson has long been a resident of West Texas. His father went to Vernon in Wittsburg county in 1889. Mr. Dolson has been in the banking business 25 years most of the time being in the oil field area.

The office of Lee Banks at the rear will be taken over by Lee Banks. A large vault 14 by 16 feet will be installed and the present vault out. The new vault will start eight feet behind the present rear vault, giving an idea of the extension of the quarters to the rear. Work is expected to start at once in remodeling the building so that the increased business can be taken care of, Mr. Dolson said.

C. L. Thomas is president and W. H. Doyle cashier of the bank. The new officer has a wife and three children. They will most likely be with him as a home can be obtained, and next spring it is probable that Mr. Dolson will build a home.

"LET'S MAKE THIS THE BRIGHTEST SPOT ON EARTH," SAYS AMARILLO MAN AT C. OF C. BANQUET HERE

About 100 business men and visitors attended the Pampa Chamber of Commerce banquet here last Thursday night at the Hotel Pampa. The need for funds was expressed by several of the speakers, and \$1371 was subscribed.

More money is expected as soon as local representatives of various companies here obtain permission from headquarters to donate to the organization, according to M. A. Turner, secretary.

M. A. Turner, who acted as toast master, introduced the speaker, Mayor F. P. Reid who welcomed the visitors and new citizens to Pampa. "We want all the new citizens to be with the pioneers," said Mr. Reid. "Your assistance is needed in order that Pampa may grow. The old timers are not hold-backs, instead, they are always pushing ahead. We ask the help of all new comers to make Pampa a better place in which to live," said Mr. Reid in concluding.

O. C. Goodwin of Amarillo told do. "The greatest thing in our lives is our homes," said Mr. Goodwin. "Many have come here to live, to make Pampa their home. As citizens of Pampa they owe something in return. Some of the old timers may have a feeling of regret, some may have a feeling of joy to see their town growing so fast. Every one should join hands and push Pampa on to what it might be."

"The new comers make the towns, without them there would be no towns. The citizens of Pampa should not extend anything but a warm welcome to the new comer. It is not true, as is often heard, that only a rougher set of people come to the oil fields. Instead, some of the biggest hearted men are the oil men. A right spirit usually exists among them and their followers."

"New comers are sensitive to the first welcome. Create an atmosphere of hospitality. In church, in homes, in business, always welcome the new comer."

"What can a Chamber of Commerce do for a town? It can build your town. Pampa had a good community before, but the present boom means big things for all of us. A well organized Chamber of Commerce can do much to make progress for Pampa. We wouldn't need a Chamber of Commerce if no other town in the United States had one, but they have and we must keep pace with the times."

"Vision and forethought gives the primary need for a Chamber of Commerce, and such an organization must be supported. Your support shows your confidence. Every dollar you put into such an organization is a safe and certain investment. It makes for better homes, a better place to live. Schools, roads, streets, you haven't time to personally care for all of them, that's what the Chamber of Commerce does for you."

"Pampa is growing so fast that an active leader is necessary for the Chamber of Commerce, and the present secretary, M. A. Turner, is the man. He is a business man and knows the field. This organization should hold weekly, instead of monthly meetings. It forms a clearing house for the exchange of ideas as well as enjoyable entertainment. The women can help wonderfully in such an organization. They should help fight the battles that will make Pampa better. I suggest that a Ladies' Auxiliary be organized in connection with the present Chamber of Commerce."

"Let's all grow together," said Mr. Goodwin in closing, "and make the Panhandle of Texas the brightest spot on earth."

School Enrollment Passes 1100 Mark; More are Expected

The enrollment in the Pampa schools increases almost daily. New pupils are entering all of the grades, from the primary to high school. The present enrollment has already reached 1100. Members of the faculty predict that it will near the 1200 mark within the next two weeks.

Mostly registration has been due to lack of transportation and scarcity of rooming and boarding accommodations. A few pupils are registering late because they have just moved to Pampa from other towns.

Two two-room cottages are now under construction. When completed, these cottages will care for 74 pupils each. Two more cottages similar to these will be built in the near future, according to Superintendent R. C. Campbell. With four cottages and the present school buildings there will be 32 pupils to a recitation room, the law allowing 34 to a room. 192 new desks have been ordered with which to equip the new buildings.

There are 21 teachers in the school faculty at the present time. At least four more will be added in the near future, according to C. T. Hunkapillar, president of the school board.

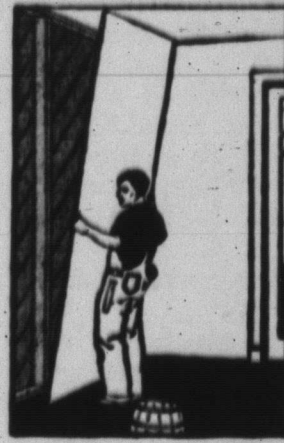

BACK TO SCHOOL AGAIN

Pampa children, large and small, are turning their steps, but not their thoughts, back to school. Except in rare cases, they don't want to go back. But why should they? Nothing to do but sit between four walls every day and go through the same routine—study and recite. The great outdoors just outside the window is beckoning to them. They know what it is out there because they have had months of careless abandon and freedom—no cares, no worries—just fun.

The time will come, and in the very near future, too, when the majority of them will become reconciled to their lot. They will become absorbed with school activities and school friendships, and under the guidance of a thoughtful teacher, they will begin to take an interest in their work. Then the battle is won.

A great responsibility rests upon the school teacher to get them back on the right track. An equally great responsibility lies in the parents to form a strong second line of defense. The teacher is helpless without support from home.

If your child is not engrossed in school work within a reasonable length of time after school opens, examine the part you are taking and see if the blame is not in a measure yours.

LET THE VOTER BEWARE

"Public indifference toward the responsibility which every voter should assume is to blame for the crime wave and hypocrisy which has engulfed a large part of the nation," John R. McQuigg, national commander of the American Legion, says.

This is the key to an effort to get out its 11,000 individual posts, to get out the vote for the fall elections. It is proposed to have non-partisan conferences of representatives of various civic, religious, professional and educational organizations September 21 to work out ways and means to get out the vote.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION ONE OF CITY ORDINANCE NO. 36, WHICH WAS PASSED AND APPROVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PAMPA, TEXAS, ON THE 12TH DAY OF MARCH, A. D. 1923, AND ENTITLED.

CITY ORDINANCE NO. 36, TO REGULATE THE CONSTRUCTION, MAINTENANCE, REPAIR AND REMOVAL OF BUILDINGS WITHIN THE CITY OF PAMPA AND PRESCRIBING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION THEREOF.

Section 1. That Section 1 of City Ordinance No. 36, known and entitled, An Act to Regulate the Construction, Maintenance, Repair and Removal of Buildings within the City of Pampa, and Prescribing Penalties for the Violation Thereof, be amended so as to read

Section 2. The provisions of this ordinance shall apply to and be coextensive within the boundaries now designated or which may hereafter be designated as the fire limits of the City of Pampa, except such provisions as are by special reference made applicable to all territory within the city limits.

Section 3. That Section 5 of said ordinance be amended to read as follows:

That on and after the date of publication of this amendment there shall not be constructed within the territory named herein any buildings of any kind or character except those that are permitted under Section 5 of Ordinance No. 36, that all the provisions of said ordinance shall apply to the west half of Block Twelve of the South Side Addition to the City of Pampa, Texas.

The foregoing ordinance was passed by the City Council in the City of Pampa, Texas, on the 13th day of September, A. D. 1926, approved by the Mayor on the same date, and becomes effective on and after its publication.

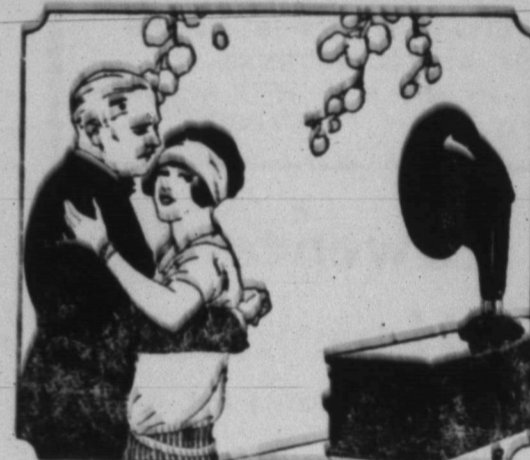

LETTER FROM CALIFORNIA

Editor Pampa News:

I returned home recently after an absence of two months, six weeks of which was spent in your city. Altho I have been an interested reader of the News, I was hardly prepared for the progress and development which had taken place since my last visit to Pampa, relatives to which I will speak further before concluding this letter.

When I witnessed the growth and expansion of your city and considered the interests centering there, I decided to discontinue these letters and I told my friends as much, but so many of them were so insistent that my letters were read with much interest by many more people that I supposed.

After leaving Pampa I spent two days in Amarillo. I was surprised at the growth and prosperity of that city. It is a city of beautiful homes and its business buildings are of splendid architecture and substantially built of durable material. It is new and beautiful and much better planned than the average city and many of the streets are well paved. Although it is a very desirable place to live and for this reason is attracting citizens of a high class order; I predict a great future for Amarillo. I went to hear Rev. Dr. Culpepper preach at the revival which he was conducting in a temporary tabernacle there. The audience was large, the music was inspiring, the sermon was excellent, and the interest was great. I was truly glad to see so many people turn aside from their business cares and social affairs and spend an hour devoted to worship. For thus are men and women exalted and inspired and better fitted for the daily tasks of life. It is a sad day when the church wans and religion fails to attract.

The west bound train which I boarded at Amarillo was well filled with passengers, many of them California bound. One naturally talks with people on a train. One just can't help it. That is one place where one needs no introduction. I talked with several but two of them stand out conspicuously in my memory. One of them, a man about 50 years old, a citizen of Chicago, going on a visit to his daughter living in Burlingame, Calif. He is a

native of Norway and came to America when a young man. He located in Chicago where he has lived ever since, having left the city only once in all these years and that for only a few days.

He had never learned the use of a time table, and when I explained its mysteries to him he was greatly interested, and kept it in his hand or near him all the time. He was surprised that it could teach him so much; the distance he was at any time from Chicago, the altitude of any place on the road, the time of day or night that he would reach any point, the distance to any station or between any two stations, and so on.

As we came thru that great stretch of desert country comprising western New Mexico and Arizona, he would look out of a window across the wide stretch of barren waste until his eyes and mind would grow weary contemplating the unbroken solitudes which continually met his gaze. Finally he said to me, "I wonder what God was thinking about when he made this great barren country of which we see only a narrow cross section. There can't be any possible use for it."

I replied by saying that God is never in a hurry. It takes a million years and more to make a world and He does not make it for any one age or generation. Time was when it was all "without form and void." Gradually he fitted it up for the habitation of man. In the ages to come this desert may be transformed into a fruitful land. Where Chicago now stands once rolled the sea, and the ocean once covered all this weary land. The stratified rocks in yonder hill and in other hills and ridges are sufficient proof.

Another passenger whom I will mention was a young Catholic lady dressed in the garb of a Catholic sister. She must have been on the train when I entered it at Amarillo, altho I did not notice her till some time later. She had been traveling already for several days and had a long journey yet ahead of her for she was going to Santa Rosa, Calif. When she heard me say I lived in California she introduced herself and told me where she was going. She had never been west

and I don't think she had even traveled very much, although was intelligent and well educated.

She asked me to tell her about the balance of her journey, for she was specially anxious about crossing the bay to San Francisco where the "Mother Superior" was to meet her. When I told her she would change cars at Barstow and go on Oakland and the ferry boat would be waiting for her at Ferry Point, and she would go right across the bay to San Francisco where the passengers would be discharged right in immense building where the "Mother Superior" would be waiting for her—that there was no need for worry or anxiety, that everything would be just right, she seemed greatly relieved and thanked me for telling her. "Now," she said, I won't have anything to worry about.

But before we got to Barstow she did have something to worry about however, for when the conductor asked to see her ticket she handed him a pass on which she had been traveling all the way. He took it and looked at it on both sides, and then said, "This pass is no good, I can't honor it. I shall have to take it up and collect your fare to the end of my run which is Barstow."

"Oh, but it is good," she exclaimed. "It has already been honored, approved and punched by six conductors and you will certainly not be less kind than they. We know the pass must be good or they never would have accepted it. I could never have got this far on it. If you have a right to take it up you certainly have not the heart to do it, seeing what the other conductors have done." He replied by saying, "They had no right to accept it, and he had no right to issue it. Your fare is \$8.25 to Barstow." With this he struck the pass in his pocket, but she didn't move. Finally he said, "Give me \$8.25 or I will stop this train and put you off right here." She handed him a bill out of which he took the change and went on punching tickets.

I asked her why she paid it. "Why he would have put me off," she said. "That would have been alright," I replied, "It is six to one that the next conductor would have accepted your pass and you would have saved your fare all the way to Santa Rosa."

"I never thought of that," she said.

She changed at Barstow and I went on to San Angelo where I took a stage to Fallbrook, located on the great highway midway between Riverside and San Diego, and 60 miles from either. Here lived my brother-in-law, J. J. Brown, and my sister who I had gone to visit. They sold out while I was there, reserving nothing. He told me that he never expected to own another home. The interest on the money it would take to buy a place would rent a house, and if he didn't like it, or was not satisfied with the location, he could move at once.

On the way from Fallbrook the stage was held up by two young men who stood in the middle of the road in front of us, each with a brace of revolvers buckled around him. I asked a man seated by me the meaning of this. He explained that we were near the border and that these men were on the lookout for rum runners, smugglers and foreigners trying to get into the U. S.

The foregoing has already consumed so much space that I think it wise to conclude my letter at this point and write again next week.



"We are putting on an extensive drive against the law violators," says Sheriff Graves, "and we're organized to clean up all the crooks and drunkards in the community."

Crescent Theatre Installs Modern Player Pipe Organ

A new Seeburg player pipe organ has been installed in the Crescent Theatre. The organ has automatic control, but it will be operated by hand part of the time. It is enclosed in a grained oak cabinet finished in dark mission, presenting an appearance of genuine dignity.

The Seeburg is a combination organ and piano with but a single keyboard. The arrangement of stops makes possible the instantaneous change from various organ combinations with piano eliminated, to piano alone—or where a touch of novelty is desired, the mandolin effect is at hand, all from a single keyboard.

Two electric switches control the operation of the instrument, one for the pipe organ blower, and one for the automatic music roll operation. The keyboard is automatically locked the instant the automatic playing action is turned on, thus preventing undesirable or accidental manipulation of the keys while operating from the roll.

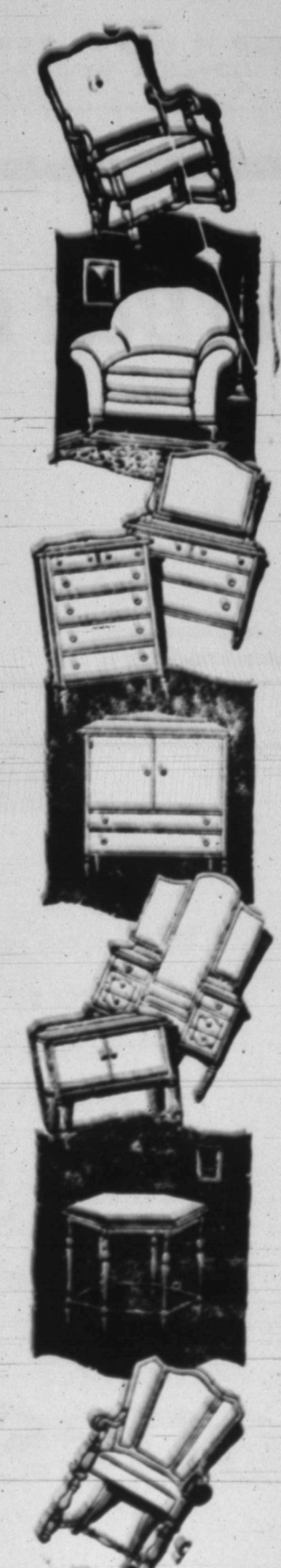

a drop of \$1.65 on 34 gravity oil to \$1.45 on 39 and over, and a change on the scale of offers.

The Wilcox-Pampa Oil and Gas Co. is constructing a casing head gasoline plant six miles southeast of here. The approximate cost of the structure is placed at \$400,000.

Preparations are being made near Perryton to put down another test well. This well probably will be spudded in within the next two weeks. It will be the eighth test well in the vicinity of Perryton within the past few months.

The interest created by the net Roxana well located nine miles due north of White Deer is not only causing considerable excitement in White Deer, but also in the surrounding towns. It is understood that Roxana has made three new locations for drilling sites, one being northwest of the Roxana No. 1. The Empire Oil Co. and Nunn-McCauley have staked out sites at offsets to No. 1 also.

EFFORT BEING MADE TO HAVE HIGHWAY 33 THROUGH PAMPA CONNECT WITH FEDERAL ROAD

The Abo Pass Highway Association called a road meeting at Canadian, Sept. 13 to investigate the possibilities of converting the Abo Pass Highway into a federal highway. For some unknown reason M. A. Turner secretary of the Chamber of Commerce was not informed about the meeting and was not present, but the Abo Pass committee came to Pampa and were in council with

representatives here. Charles A. Wright, John A. Floyd, Late Baker, Henry A. Bowers and B. A. McKisson, all of Fairview, Okla., and members of the Abo Pass Highway Association investigated the conditions around Pampa. They believe that a federal highway leading from Tulsa, Okla., via Enid and Fairview, connecting with the Southwest Trail or Highway 33 across Texas is very probable. This road would be known as the Oil Field Road from Tulsa to the Panhandle of Texas.

There is a possible chance of Highway 33 through Pampa being included in the federal mapping as well as the federal road system, according to Mayor F. P. Reid, manager and secretary of the Southwest Trail Association.

The connection of the Abo Pass Highway with the federal highway would connect the Garber oil fields of Tulsa and Blackwell with the great oil fields in the Texas Panhandle. Within the last year this has become a great trade route serving the oil fields.

The delegation of the Abo Pass Highway Association which came to Pampa were gladly received by the mayor and secretary, and investigated all details in an attempt to get the Texas Highway into the federal system. Mayor Reid had previously taken the matter up with the Texas Highway Department in

January, and that department then made the official request that this highway be included in the federal system of mapping and building. "We will again have our highway department make the request," says Mayor Reid, "in order that our highway will meet the demands created by the great number of tourist through here."

The Pampa Chamber of Commerce and the Pampa road committees have gone on record that they will cooperate with the Abo Pass Association in an effort to put the proposed program into effect.

After visiting in Pampa and investigating conditions around here, the delegation from Fairview, Okla., left for home, leaving the matter in the hands of Mayor Reid. Members of the delegation reported that the road from Tulsa to Pampa was in excellent condition. They said that it was the fastest road in the southwest.

Literature will be distributed in the near future, advertising the Abo Pass Highway and its convenience, according to Mayor Reid. Each county will probably be assessed by mileage to defray the advertising expenses. If the highway is federalized from Tulsa to Pampa it will connect with all the surrounding

roads. "For several years I have advocated changing the location of the bridge across the creek at the Bradford hill," said Mayor F. P. Reid. "Removal of the bridge 100 feet would prevent many accidents."

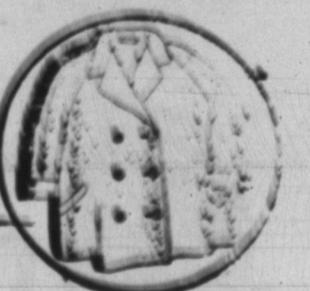

ARE YOU DOING YOUR DUTY BY YOUR PAPER?

There are about 2,500 daily and Sunday newspapers in the United States, and over 14,000 weeklies. They have a total circulation of over thirty-two million and their readers comprise the entire population of the country except illiterates and children under six. That is to say, they reach everybody whose opinion counts.

The newspaper is more powerful than the book or the magazine. It has numerous detractors, and everybody reserves the right to complain against the editor upon occasion. Sometimes they shoot him—that is, the guilty ones do. An innocent man seldom shoots even at an editor.

The editor is called on to give all sorts of advice, from counsel to the President of the United States to suggestion upon the teething of infants and how to preserve the health or improve one's golf stroke. He occasionally makes mistakes.

I was once the victim of an error for which an ill-natured man, if strong enough, would have called out the editor, the compositor, the proofreader, and the printer's devil, of the offending publication. A Denver newspaper carried near my column a very excellent syndicate feature written by a lady who was a world-famous authority on beauty. She gave advice to the love-lorn and told them how to attain those physical perfections that make the female of the species so much more deadly than the male. The headings of the two columns were transposed by accident—and I was thrown into a nervous decline by seeing over my article the caption: "How I Developed a Perfect Bust."

Your newspaper, through its local reporters, and by its membership in an international news bureau that sends dispatches by wire, informs you daily about everything that is going on in the world, from tragedies next door to political events in Europe and Asia. You expect it to do this. You demand accuracy, brevity and a careful selection of important items. Your editor does the best he can to give you what you pay for. He recognizes the importance of his position. He seeks, except on the editorial page and in signed articles, to let his paper bring you the news as it is, not as he wants it to be. He knows that if his paper is to live, he must rid the newscolumns of all personal bias.

An editor of my acquaintance printed in his paper a damaging news story about himself with the same accuracy as though the item had referred to a stranger. Not all newspaper writers do that, but it is an ideal of the profession.

What are you doing to help your newspaper? Subscribing to a newspaper should mean more to you than merely a means to keep abreast of the news. Newspapers are semi-public enterprises. The support and co-operation of citizens is necessary if good newspapers are to be maintained. The fact that newspapers, like private schools, do not solicit contributions and are not endowed does not relieve the citizen of his obligation to support them by subscription, news contributions and advertising.

The newspaper welcomes opinions as other business organizations do not. If you were to hunt up the manager of your department store and tell him you would shoot him if he didn't sell more woolen goods and less cotton, you would never

have to shoot. He would fall over dead voluntarily. Yet the newspaper welcomes, and prints, the most violent adverse criticisms of its policies and methods.

People get the kind of newspaper they want if they want it badly enough to support the good ones rather than mererly to attack the bad ones.

The newspaper will continue a power with or without your help—but if you want it to be a power for the good that you believe in, help it when you can; be interested in it; subscribe to it; when you see something wonderful in it, tell the editor so, in person or by mail, and regard it as an enterprise in which you have a part.—Harlan Eugene Read.

Mineral Resources In Texas to Be Developed Is Belief

Confidence in the future development of Texas mineral resources was expressed by Dr. B. H. Sellards, associate director of the Bureau of Economic Geology of the University of Texas, on his return from three months spent in studying methods of mineral production in Europe. Dr. Sellards visited mines of copper, lead, zinc, salt, lignite, oil and potash in Germany, France, and other European countries. Dr. Sellards study was made with the view of aiding in the exploration of potash deposits in West Texas on land belonging to the University.

With regard to the potash deposits, Dr. Sellards stated that con-

ditions of occurrence in the extensive fields in Germany are in many respects similar to the occurrence of potash in Texas. In both regions the potash is associated with extensive salt deposits.

Development of Texas mineral resources, Dr. Sellards believes, should continue along the lines of additional studies of the minerals and geology of the deposits, distribution of information through publications, and through the economic development of these resources.
