CITY ENGINEER A. H. DOUCETTE GIVEN CHARGE OF PAVING; WORK TO START SOON IS BELIEF

City Engineer A. H. Doucette was awarded the contract by the City Council to get up plans and specifications for, and to personally supervise the laying of, Pampa's extensive paving job.

Cuyler street is familiarly known to newcomers as "Main street", as it is the most used thoroughfare in the city, it being the street upon which most of the Wilcox Bayshore oil field traffic goes out, and extending into what is popularly called "the main north-south highway" from Pampa proper to outlying new boom towns and the scene of intensive drilling operations from four to eight miles south of the city limits.

Foster avenue is the passage for traffic coming into Pampa from Amarillo, Panhandle, White Deer, and Kingsmill on the southwest and Chasena, Hoover, Codman, Miami, Mendota and Canadian on the northeast.

Atchison avenue is the thoroughfare that has to bear the heavy traffic of thousands of automobiles, and huge three-to-four-ton trucks and hundreds of big teams carrying equipment to drilling sites from unloading points on the Santa Fe right-of-way.

After these main thoroughfares in the business and warehouse districts have been paved, a third unit will be laid, covering extensions of Cuyler street to the city limits, and of Foster, Atchison and other important east-west traffic laterals also to the boundaries of the original townsite.

The various new subdivisions, and additions will be paved as fast as possible, including Wilcox addition, (starting about one mile south of the old townsite); Talley addition,

to the northwest; Hill Crest, to the northeast; Wynnelea, to the northwest; Channing addition; West End; East End; and South Side additions.

The first laterals to be paved after Foster and Atchison avenues, in the main part of town, will be Kingsmill, Francis and Browning avenues on the north Foster; and Tyns, Craven and Brown avenues on the south of the Santa Fe railroad tracks.

The main streets to be paved after Cuyler, will be Russell, and Frost, (on either side of Albert Square), and on the South Side; and Somerville, Gray and West streets, to the west of the Square and also on the South Side.

The next main streets to be paved will be Ballard, Gillespie, Houston, Starkweather, Wynne, Warren and Hazel, on the east of Cuyler.

OSCAR DOTSON VS. JACK VINCENT IN NO-TIME-LIMIT MATCH AT THE SKATING RINK PAVILLION TONITE

Oscar Dotson heavyweight, better known as the "Smiling Blacksmith", meets Jack Vincent the light-heavyweight champion of three states in a no time limit match at the skating rink pavillion tonite. Dotson has wrestled such men as Craddock, Joe Stecher, Jimmie Browning, Dick Davis and many others. Dotson is considered one of the hardest men to beat in the game; his main hold being the head lock, depending on the enormous strength in his arms to win. Jack Vincent won the light-heavyweight championship of Oklahoma, defeating the well known Greek wrestler, Gus Pappas in one hour and 26 minutes.

Jack Vincent is famous for his reverse step over toe hold which is considered one of the most dangerous holds in the game. J. A. Mr. Levine states that his customers here will be given the advantage of the chain store buying power and can expect to get the very latest styles at popular prices.

J. H. Hughes of Iowa Park, Texas will be local manager of the store. He is an energetic young man and is expecting to see a wonderful growth in Pampa during the next few months and expressed himself as being optimistic over the future of Pampa and Gray county.

MORE TRACKAGE IS BEING BUILT BY SANTA FE FOR PAMPA AND OIL FIELD

In Pampa and environs, the Santa Fe railroad company is rushing laying of new grade, to accommodate twenty miles of side-tracks to hold strings of freight cars for unloading of oil field equipment, and is also leveling surrounding high places, or filling low, boggy depressions, along its right-of-way, to prevent the miring down of teams and auto trucks forced to haul from hazardous "spots" of cars along the present limited sidings paralleling the main line.

The Santa Fe is pushing the double-tracking of its line northeast from Panhandle to Pampa; when this job is completed, there will be a thru double-track for oil field equipment cars and tank-cars, all the way from Pampa to Amarillo. As 3200 tank-cars are already being loaded out of Panhandle over the Santa Fe each day; and as the flush production from new wells is expected by field experts to reach 25,000 barrels more per day in side of two weeks in the Pampa area, (from the Wilcox Bayshore field wells), it may be readily understood why the Santa Fe is in such a hurry to provide adequate trackage, and loading and unloading facilities between Pampa and Panhandle.

CITY PURCHASES ADDITIONAL GROUND FOR MORE WATER WELLS

The City of Pampa has just bought another three acres of land in the famous Pampa water-belt and will immediately start on the job of drilling more wells, to be put down beginning at a point about 300 yards west of the present three city water wells, in the northwest corner of the Pampa townsite proper, on the E. C. Foster land, according to official announcement made by Mayor Frederick Peter Reed.

The work of drilling these three additional water-wells will be prosecuted with all possible vigor, declared the Mayor. Also the population of Pampa is growing by leaps and bounds, owing to the great influx of newcomers from all parts of the world, attracted by the oil excitement following the bringing in of the Wilcox Wonder and Shamrock Sensations, as are the largest present producers of high gravity crude in the world, the municipal government is working hard to keep the city's water-works up to full demand.

The oil boom which struck central western Gray county and the Pampa area about two months and a half ago, right after the Wilcox Pampa Oil & Gas company's No. 3 Worley-Worley well blew in from top of sand unexpectedly for 2,000 barrels, the flow continuing at the rate of 2,500 to 3,000 barrels per day, ever since then, depending upon days they blow out, despite a six-inch bit at bottom and 1 1/2 inch of drilling cable in the hole, took local white and commercial buyers by surprise.

WILCOX NO. 4 EXPECTED TO COME IN HOURLY; LOG LOOKS FAVORABLE FOR BEST WELL OF PAMPA FIELD

With the crew running six-inch casing to cut off a strong flow of gas just above 2600 to 2700 foot - usual gas horizon in a gas-sand in the Big Lime at this region at midnight, Wednesday, and Braden-heading off his gas flow with four-inch at top of eight-inch, prospects looked bright for the bringing in of another Wilcox high gravity record breaker, in the No. 4 Worley & Reynolds located about three hundred yards south and about two hundred yards west of the world-famous Wilcox Wonder, familiarly known to scouts as the No. 3 Worley & Reynolds, in central western Gray county.

The rate at which they were running the six-inch and the fast drilling time already hung up with Standard tools all the way on this rig, formed the basis for the conclusion by field observers watching the well, that this Wilcox No. 4 Worley & Reynolds would be just about ready to be drilled into the pay-sand in two towers, including the one on which they were working Wednesday at midnight.

Another words, it would occasion no surprise to scouts who have had their eyes glued to this derrick, to see the Wilcox Oil & Gas company of Tulsa, Okla., start to drill in its No. 4 Worley & Reynolds in the early hours of Friday morning, August 13.

Throws Play Southwest

The bringing in of another mighty Wilcox Champion gushing money-maker in this No. 4 Worley, will precipitate a secondary boom wave in the Pampa district of Gray county which probably will eclipse the first "Mother Wave", in drilling intensity, and will attract a bigger surge of "boomers", speculators, and ordinary business investors looking for locations in the city of Pampa, or in some of the dozen or more surrounding subdivisions, new additions and fresh oil-boom towns immediately tributary to the producing field, such as Wilcox and Gusher Town the two latest sensations in population-growth, and trading activity.

Cusher Trend Toward Bayshore

The most important feature of the bringing of this anticipated new giant (which stands no field observers if it should surpass in flush production the Wilcox No. 3 Worley & Reynolds and the Clark & Baldrige No. 1, now Shamrock Oil Co. No. 1 Merten Bros. put together), is that it indicates the biggest gusher trend as running southward, headed straight for the Bayshore well, and a wild drilling plunge by six or a big companies and a score of large independents between

this Wilcox No. 4 Worley and the Bayshore well, is presaged by the intense excitement on the part of operators, who are rushing rig timbers and drilling equipment into the territory between the No. 4 Worley and the Bayshore.

Exact Location Described

The Wilcox No. 4 Worley is located in the Southeast quarter of the southeast quarter of the southwest quarter of section 62 block 3, Gray county, only about nine miles east of the Carson count yline, in the Great Bay of the ancient Permian sea, as outlined in the contours of Harry McGee, eminent geologist.

The No. 4 Worley is located due southwest about four hundred yards (as the crow flies) from the champion daily money-maker of the present leading gushers of the oil fields of the world, - namely, the Wilcox No. 3 Worley, which is located in the southwest corner of the northwest quarter of the southeast quarter of section 62, block 3.

The No. 4 Worley is located about two hundred yards due west of the Wilcox No. 2 Worley & Reynolds, (the first good well of the Wilcox-Bayshore district in Gray county, which came in for five hundred barrels per day), located in southwest corner of southwest quarter of the southeast quarter of same section, same block.

Checked on Shamrock Sensation

This new Wilcox No. 4 Worley & Reynolds (about to be brought in) is located one and a half miles south and one and a half miles east of the Shamrock Sensation, familiarly known as the old Clark & Baldrige No. 2, now the Shamrock No. Merten Bros.

Drilling between this Wilcox No. 4 Worley and the Shamrock No. 1 Merten, are sixty rigs, including eleven Magnolia, (off setting Shamrock in section 82); 4 Humble; 3 McMan; 4 Giff; 2 Phillips.

Drilling between this Wilcox No. 4 Worley and the Bayshore well, are a score, including Giff, Danciger, Skelly, Empire, Constantine, Humble, McMan, Magnolia, Phillips, Shamrock, Sun, Texas Company, and the Wilcox Oil & Gas company itself, (the latter on its southwesternmost holdings).

C. OF C. HEADS RESIGN

At a regular meeting of the Pampa chamber of commerce last Tuesday night, President J. J. Marfee and Secretary C. P. Buckler resigned following a resolution unanimously adopted empowering and instructing the directors of the Chamber to employ a paid secretary.

Secretary C. P. Buckler has served the Chamber for a number of years without compensation, on terms that the duties of the office are such as to require the full time of one man. Mr. Marfee also writes that his business will not permit his giving the time to the organization that it should have and in resigning his only motive was to allow the Chamber the opportunity to secure someone in its head who could devote more time to the work.

It is thought that the board of directors of the Chamber will secure the services of a paid secretary this week however, no definite report has been made as to what has been done.

MISCELLANEOUS



HOG PRICES IN 1925, according to a market analysis by the Sears-Roebuck Agricultural Foundation, have been the highest since 1920 and the number of hogs slaughtered nearly 20 per cent less than in 1924 and 1925, when production was at a record level. With prices approximately 50 per cent higher this year than last year, hog producers have had an especially profitable season. The range of prices has run from \$10 to almost \$14.50 per hundred pounds, the peaks being reached in March, July and September.

The ratio between prices of hogs and corn prices turned favorably for the feeder last spring and is now the best that it has been since 1922. Last spring's pig crop in the corn belt, which is now coming on the market, was estimated to be 10.6 per cent less than the pig crop of the spring of 1924. This indicates that rather high prices are likely to be maintained during most of the 1926 season, unless a very large crop of hogs is produced and pushed rapidly into the markets. Excepting the months of January and February, receipts at the eleven leading markets of the country have gone below the \$75,000 level and from June to October have been below the \$50,000 mark.

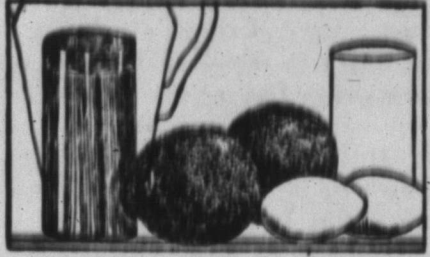

Eating Greater Cause of Death Than Drinking

Drink is the second greatest cause of disease and death. Food comes first, then drink. Excluding alcoholic beverages, there are dozens of drinks on the market today whose effect is detrimental, particularly to children. Milk is the best drink for children. Not only is it drink, but food as well—the most nearly perfect food known to man. Milk is an all-the-year-round drink and for this reason the children often rebel against drinking it. This condition, however, may be overcome by the introduction of the mixed drink. Milk or diluted evaporated milk may be mixed with eggs or used in fruit juices or in some other way which will disguise the fact that the drink contains milk. In the hot summer months when the child naturally drinks more than in cooler weather, it is wise to vary the ways of serving milk, so as not to create a distaste for this important food.



In connection with mixed drinks, the following formulas for milk beverages may aid mothers in serving something new!

iced Cocoa
 1/2 tsp. cocoa 1/2 cup evaporated milk
 1/2 tsp. sugar 2 cups water
 1/2 cup hot water diluted with
 Few grains salt 1/2 cups water
 1/4 tsp. vanilla

Boil the diluted milk in a double boiler. Mix cocoa, sugar, salt and add the hot water. Cook over a low flame from 10 to 15 minutes, stirring occasionally to prevent burning. Add to the cocoa the scalded milk; return to the double boiler and continue cooking for 10 minutes. Add vanilla, chill before serving. Pour into tall glasses which contain a few small cubes of ice. Serve plain or top with whipped cream sprinkled with cinnamon. Serves four.

 1 egg diluted with
 Few grains salt 2-3 cup tea water

 evaporated milk

Separate white from yolk of egg. Add salt to white and beat until stiff. Beat yolk until thick and lemon colored and add the fruit juices, nutmeg and sugar. Combine diluted milk with yolk mixture. Pour into a tall glass and put the egg white on top. Sprinkle top with chopped nuts and serve at once. Serves one.

Orange-Nog
 1/2 cup orange juice 1-2 cup evaporated
 Few grains salt milk diluted
 1-2 tsp. sugar with
 1-2 cup cold water

Add sugar and salt to orange juice and pour slowly into the diluted milk, stirring to mix thoroughly. Chill before serving. One half tsp. lemon improves this drink for many. Serves one.

live as long as men whose pursuits keep them out of doors and active. Examine the records of longevity and you will find that on the average the longest-lived men are soldiers, sailors and farmers, all vocations which tend to keep a man at his physical best. Man, in general, rolls down the hill of life fastest when his figure is rotund. "Leanness and longevity" is a good axiom for business men to remember. If office workers would eat a little less, they would add years to their lives.

Overfeeding is as dangerous to adults as underfeeding is to children. Foods difficult to digest, or which overstimulate, should be avoided by persons whose work does not require any particular amount of physical exercise. Yet thousands of business men eat as much as or more than men who do manual labor. And, inevitably, nature rebels and sickness results. Thousands of other business men confine themselves at noontime to custards, puddings, soups and other sustaining dishes made with milk, or evaporated milk, which is milk in its most sterile form, from which 60 per cent of the water has been removed by evaporation. Such a diet is light and readily assimilated.

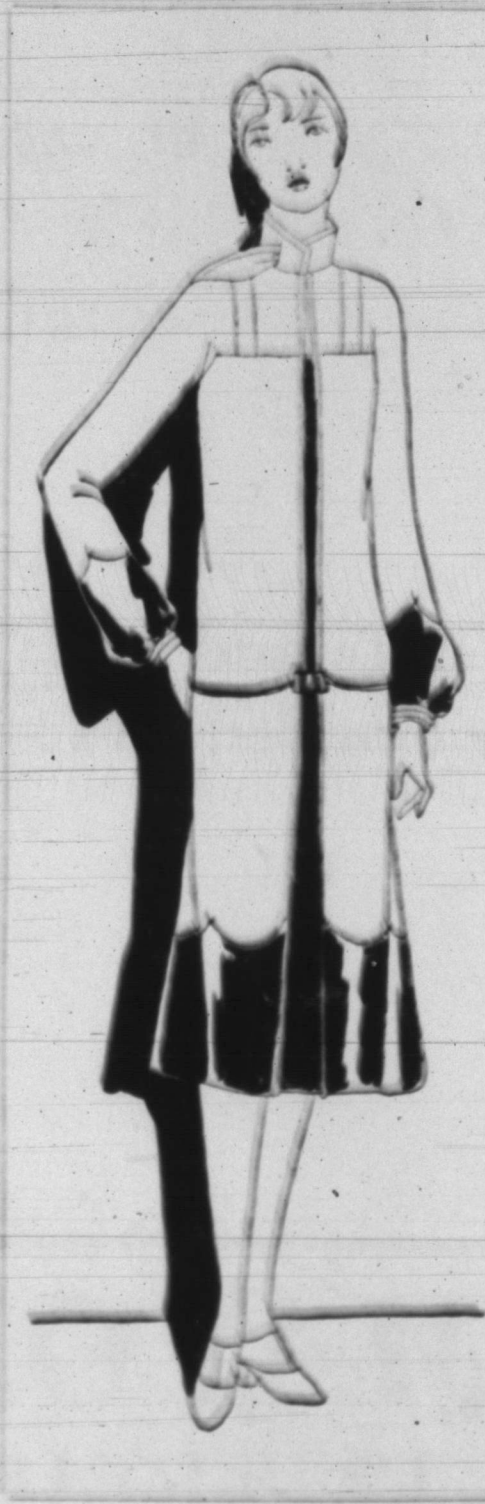

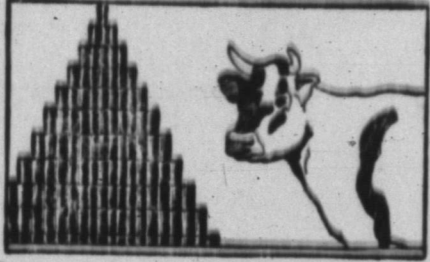
Purity of Milk Protected Now By Scientists

By KATHRYN ST. JOHN

Careful housewives constantly make it a point to ascertain the quality of each item that goes on their tables. Preparing food for the family is an extremely important job, for the proper selection and preparation of foods make in a large measure for the health and happiness of the family.

Milk is the most nearly perfect food, but it is a very delicate one as well. The keeping qualities of milk are slight. Danger from contamination is ever present. Evaporated milk, which is double rich because of the removal of 60 per cent of the water, is science's solution to these conditions.

Safeguarding evaporated milk is worked out as perfectly as man's ingenuity has been able to make the process. From cow to can, the milk which goes into the evaporated product is watched every step of the way.



Cows of the dairy herds are guarded with constant care and are subjected to regular inspections by veterinary surgeons. Herds are carefully groomed, and their yards and barns are kept scrupulously clean, as are all utensils. Milk condenseries are located in the heart of the big dairy regions to facilitate speedy handling, for this is essential if the milk is to be canned at "its moment of maturity." Canvas-covered trucks haul the milk to market, thus protecting the product from contamination on the way. Arriving at the condenser, the milk goes through tests for acidity, sediment, flavor and butterfat content before it is accepted.

Experts watch the progress of the milk through every step of its way. It goes into the evaporating machine; to the homogenizer, which breaks up the fat globules so that the milk may be easily digested by the consumer; by way of the almost human filling machine into sterilized cans; then into the sterilizer, where the cans are surrounded by steam and boiling water, destroying any possible bacteria. Inspectors handle the product as the last step to see that the canning job has been perfectly done. Labeling and packing follow. The housewife obtains the milk as fresh and sweet as when it came from the cow.

It is "Ses-qui-cen-ten-ennial" with the accent on the first syllable of the "Sesqui" and on the second syllable of the "cen-ten-ennial."

Young At 60, Or Old At 40? Diet Decides

Women are as old or as young as their state of health. A woman may be young at sixty years of old at forty. It all depends on her physical well-being.

Youth and beauty have a foundation in sound health. And food is easily the most important item in health. In giving consideration to the subjects of diet and beauty, women should not forget the food essentials that make for the preservation of teeth, hair, figure and complexion.

Blame for round shoulders, flat chest and poor teeth among women is due in large measure to faulty diet, or, specifically, to a lack of lime and phosphorus. Milk, or evaporated milk, which is simply cow's milk with 60 per cent of the water taken away, is especially rich in lime.

Because of the concentration of evaporated milk, which is regulated by government standards, it is of



double the richness of ordinary market milk, as is shown in the following table:

Ordinary Milk.	
Fat	3.5 to 4 per cent
Sugar (lactose)	4.5 to 4.75 per cent
Proteins	3.5 to 4 per cent
Minerals	.7 to .75 per cent

Evaporated Milk.	
Fat	7.5 to 8.2 per cent
Sugar (lactose)	9.5 to 10 per cent
Proteins	7.5 to 8.2 per cent
Minerals	1.4 to 1.6 per cent

A quart of milk a day for adults is recommended by doctors not only because of its high mineral content, but for the reasons that it helps keep the digestive tract in proper condition, strengthens the body to resist disease, and gives proper balance to the diet.

Salads also play an important part in the dietary. Some sort of a salad, lettuce, tomato, fresh fruit, cabbage or vegetable, should be eaten at least once a day. Neither is the daily menu complete without a generous quantity of coarse, leafy vegetables, valuable for their high vitamin content. Fruit juices also have very beneficial properties.

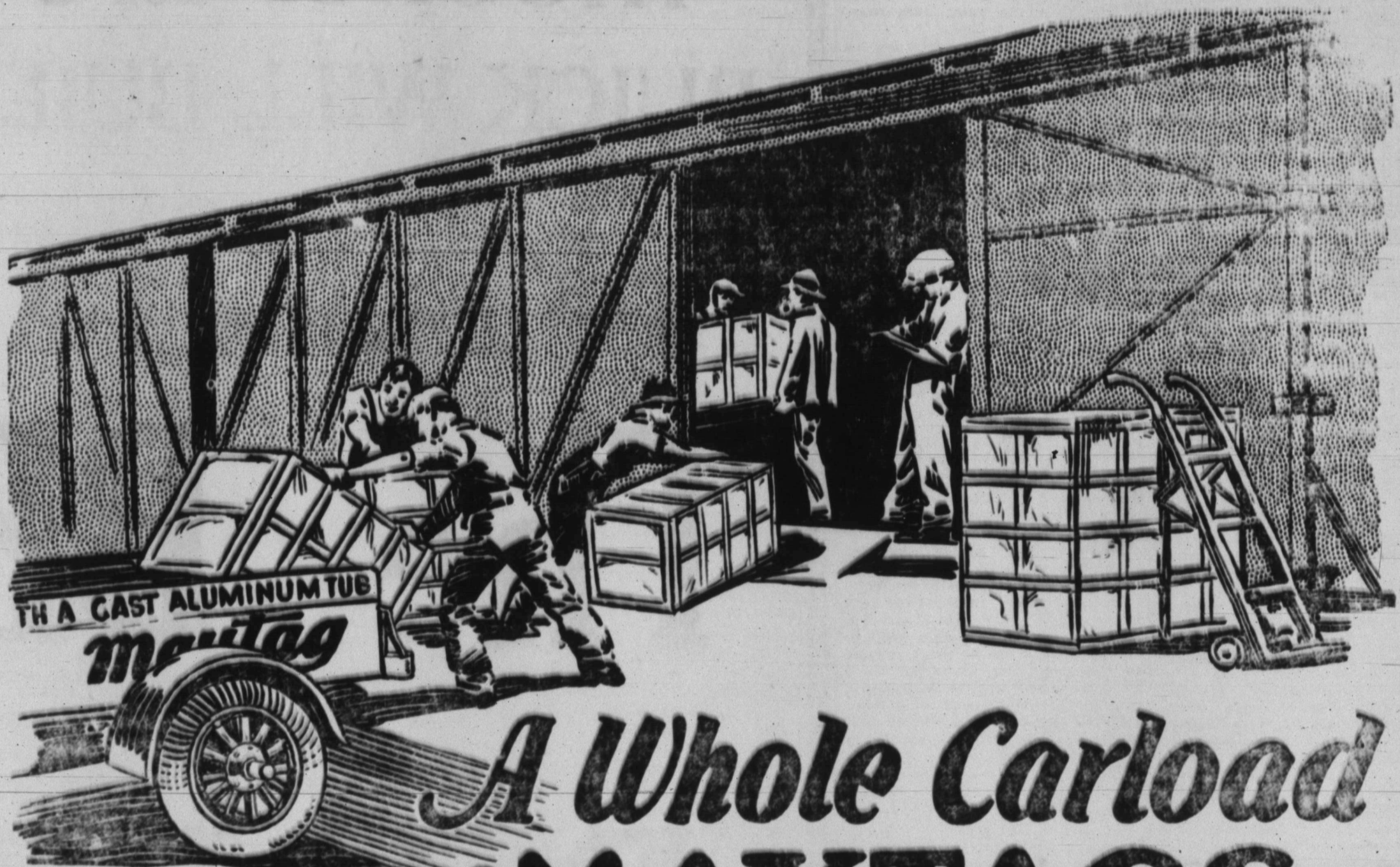

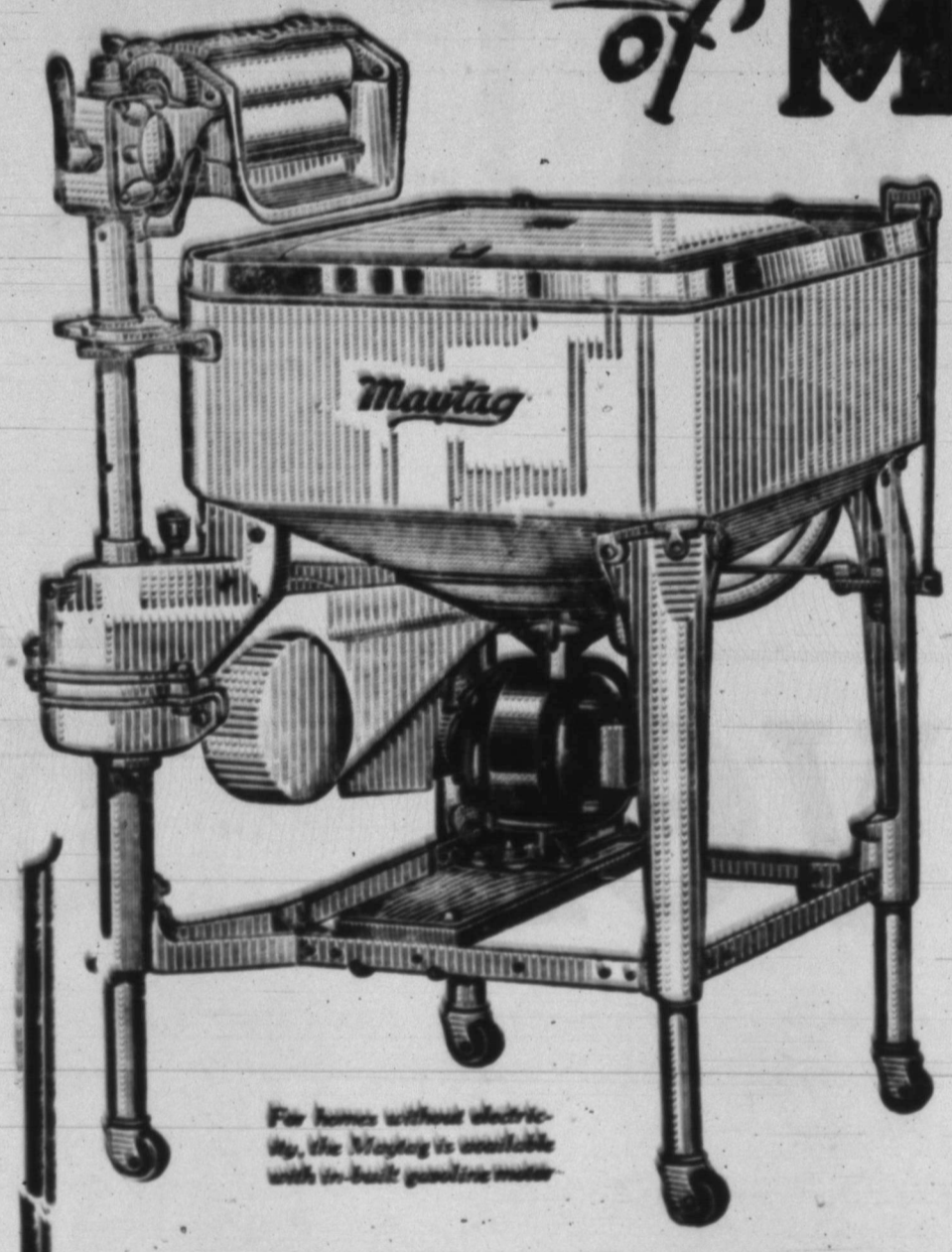

Effective But Simple Dishes Now In Vogue

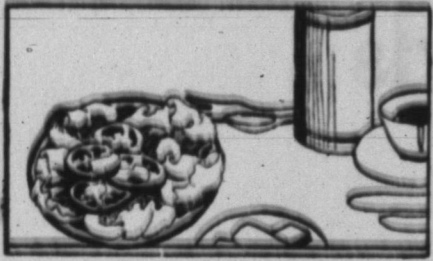
Something simple yet effective is the housewife's ideal for week-end dishes.

1/2 cup fruit juice
Combine evaporated milk and cream and whip. Add sugar and juice then fold into salad dressing. Especially nice for fruit salads.



Chocolate Velvet Cream.

1/2 tbp. gelatin
1/2 cup cold water
2 eggs, beaten
1/2 cup sugar
1 square (oz.) chocolate
1/2 cup evaporated milk diluted with 1/2 cup water
1 tbp. butter
1 tbp. salt
1 tbp. flavoring
1/2 cup evaporated milk combined with chocolate
1/2 cup whipping cream, chilled and whipped
Soak gelatin in water five minutes. Mix beaten egg yolks and sugar, pour heated, diluted milk over slowly, put in double boiler with gelatin, butter and salt. Cook until the mixture thickens. This takes about 15 minutes. Strain, beat 2 minutes, let cool. Melt the chocolate over hot water, let cool a little, then add the chocolate and vanilla to the mixture after it has cooled. Fold in the stiff egg whites, then the whipped cream. Turn into a mold and chill at least 8 hours. It may be chilled in individual dessert glasses.

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Child's Health Maintained By Wholesome Diet

Modern educators are leaning more each year to the old Greek idea of rearing the citizens of the future. They are working on the principle of "a sound mind in a sound body."

Good health is built primarily on the foundation of right food. The sort of food the child has determines to a large extent the fitness of the man or woman.

Children have to be taught to like the foods that are good for them much in the same way that they have to be taught arithmetic and history. Boys and girls are not born with any particular desire for cereals or for bread. It's up to their parents to see that they learn the rudiments of a balanced diet and the reason for such a diet. Firmness and patience are often necessary in the teaching, but the job must be done.

Many mothers unconsciously put their children under health handicaps by allowing them to use their own discretion in the matter of eating candy, fruit, nuts and cookies. By so



doing they set a precedent in the matter of other foods and make the teaching of good nutrition harder.

One or two articles are not enough to supply a child's needs for a meal. In order that there be normal development, there must be variety.

Fresh eggs, whole cereals, fruits in season and leafy vegetables should occupy an important part in the growing child's dietary. Then, too, a certain amount of concentrated food is necessary for children, because rapid growth whets their appetites to a razor edge, so that they crave more food than their systems can well dispose of. Evaporated milk, diluted with orange juice as a drink, or in custards or other baked foods, is especially beneficial for the growing child for the reason that it is concentrated to double the richness of ordinary cow's milk and is entirely sterile as well. The can of evaporated milk solves the problem of obtaining perfectly pure milk, as well as the problem of lack of refrigeration facilities, since this type of milk will keep indefinitely in the can.

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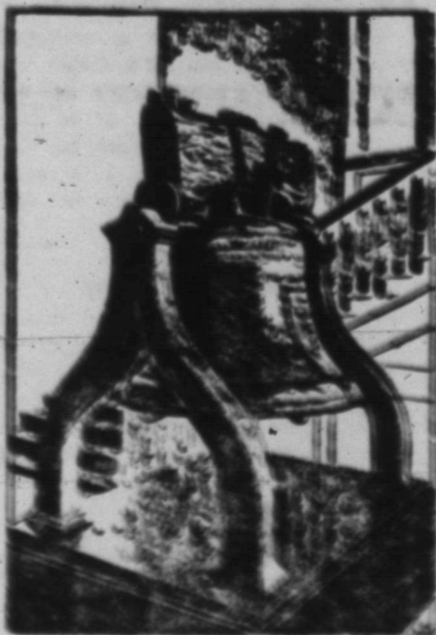

New England was alive!

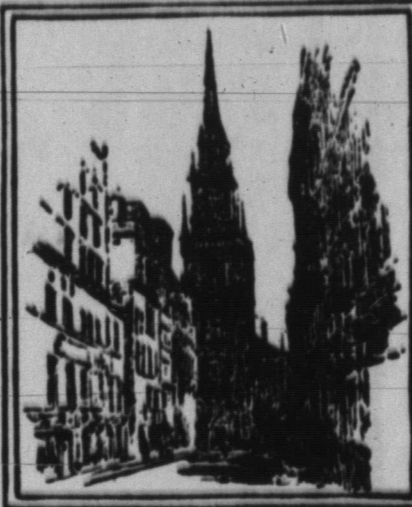
Alive and sternly glad!

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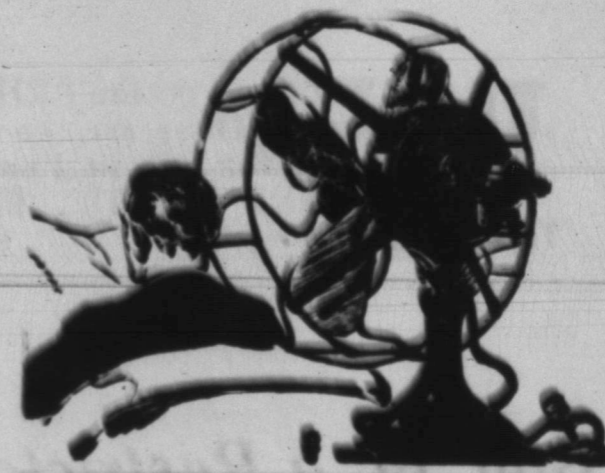
