## CAR SHORTAGE SLACKS WHEAT MOVEMENT

### MUCH GRAIN IS PILED UP ON GROUND OVER COUNTY; ABOUT HALF OF CROP IS HARVESTED

#### CLARENDON COLLEGE ELECTS NEW HEAD

At a call meeting of the trustees of Clarendon College, Dr. R. E. L. Morgan, presiding elder of the Western Oklahoma Conference, was elected president for the next five years.

Dr. Morgan was born and reared near Bedford, Ky., and received his education from the Kentucky Wesleyan College and University of Louisville. He practiced law for ten years prior to entering the ministry in which he has been engaged for twenty-five years.

Dr. Glover the retiring president, who was elected president emeritus, sold his home in Clarendon to the trustees, who will tender the occupancy of it to the new president, the home hereafter being kept as the president's home.

Dr. Glover came to the president's chair thirteen years ago, when the college had only thirteen units of affiliation and a building worth approximately \$25,000.

The present institution is now housed in three fireproof brick buildings worth \$500,000 and is of senior accreditation. In honor of Dr. and Mrs. Glover's service to the college a new building will be named for each of them.

Dr. Morgan and wife will arrive in Clarendon within the next thirty days.

#### J. H. JOHNSON BUYS PROPERTY HERE

Another Pampa believer placed himself on record Tuesday, when J. H. Johnson, well known Texas Restaurateur, of Fort Worth, closed for the purchase of the southeast corner of Bonarville and Foster streets, from H. Owen. The consideration was not made public. The transaction was handled through the realty firm of Rice & Park.

"Pampa has a steady and consistent growth ahead of it," declared Mr. Johnson to a News reporter. "I am very much impressed with the possibilities here in a business way, and within 60 to 90 days I look to see the real growth of the community to become more noticeable."

Approximately 400,000 bushels of wheat has been shipped to date of the 1926 wheat crop, according to a survey made by a News reporter Thursday of this week. It is estimated that approximately 500,000 bushels of wheat is now piled on the ground either around the elevators in Pampa or in the fields where it is being harvested.

The harvest has been in full way for the past three weeks with the exception of a few days lost on account of rains. It is estimated that harvesting is little more than half completed with the pre-harvest estimate of 2,000,000 bushels still standing.

Wheat has had a slight tendency to the upward trend during the past three weeks, selling here at \$1.08 to \$1.15. There is very little smut on the wheat and it is testing about 60 pounds to the bushel.

P. J. McKee, superintendent of the Santa Fe lines, Amarillo division, was in Pampa, Thursday making a thorough survey of the need for cars. It is believed that Mr. McKee will see that every possible effort is used in securing cars for wheat shipments.

#### GERLACH-HOPKINS STORE IS HOLDING BIG SALE HERE

The Gerlach-Hopkins Mercantile Co. is holding one of the biggest sales ever offered to Pampa people and are closing out their entire stock, according to J. H. Hopkins who recently arrived from Woodward, Oklahoma and took charge of the Pampa and Panhandle stores.

Mr. Hopkins states that the reorganization of the company has made it necessary that the stock of the several stores be sold immediately and that the store will be closed on July 31.

### AMARILLO MEN OPEN TWO NEW ADDITIONS TO PAMPA THIS WEEK

J. D. Wraether and associates of Amarillo recently closed a transaction whereby they became the owners of the northwest quarter of section 30, located in the southeastern part of Pampa. This tract was bought from Bob Campbell and will be put on the market and known as the Wilcox Addition.

W. S. Roberts of Amarillo was in Pampa, Thursday of this week attending to the details of opening the addition and placing it on sale. G. C. Walters will establish an office in Pampa shortly and will be sales manager for the firm here.

Mr. Roberts states that it is planned to have a well go down on this tract within the very near future and plans are being formulated by this firm to build a 1000 barrel refinery here as soon as possible.

### M HOWARD STARTS WORK ON NEW \$18 000 STEAM LAUNDRY

Work will be pushed to the limit in installing Pampa's newest business enterprise a modern steam laundry, according to M. Howard of Oklahoma City, Okla. Mr. Howard states that machinery and supplies have been ordered since July 1, and that the construction work on the building started early this week.

Mr. Howard made numerous trips here during the past six months watching the development of Pampa and purchased lots for his laundry several weeks ago. He states that he believes Pampa has the greatest future of any town in the Texas Panhandle. Mr. Howard is an experienced laundry man, having been engaged in the

business for a number of years in both Amarillo and Oklahoma City. His plant here will cost approximately \$18,000 and will be the most modern obtainable. Equipment will be new throughout and will be able to handle the laundry of a town more than twice the size of Pampa.

The plant will be known as the Pampa Steam Laundry and will be located one block east of the school grounds. Young and Osborne are drilling around seven or eight hundred feet on their A. Holmes No. 1, in the SE corner of the SE quarter of section 18, block 3, Gray.

Following a tip that moonshiners were operating an illicit "boose plant" several miles northwest of Pampa, Sheriff Graves and City Marshal Andrews discovered sixty gallons of whiskey buried in a shallow ravine about seven miles northwest of Pampa. No charges have been filed as yet, but it is thought here that the owners of the liquor will be apprehended within the near future.

"Bootleggers and bums beware" was the gist of a statement issued by Sheriff Graves, Thursday afternoon of this week. Sheriff and the other local peace officers state that they are going to keep Pampa clean of the undesirable element that usually follows the flow of oil.

Sheriff Graves states that all loafers and vags will not only be fined but jail sentences imposed. Pampa is establishing a record for being the cleanest oil town in Texas, according to prominent oil men and business men who recently visited here.

In addition to the whiskey found, a large quantity of beer, both bottled and brewing, and sufficient cans, bottles and jugs to take care of more than three hundred gallons of liquor. This latter was brought in by truck late Thursday afternoon by the local officers.

### MANY NEW RIGS DOT PAMPA FIELD; DRILLING WILL BE RUSHED BY ALL COMPANIES

Undreamed of developments are now taking place in the Pampa oil field. More than fifty new rigs have been constructed in the field, covering several sections of land, with congested traffic on the railway lines as the only obstacle to the biggest "oil rush" the Texas Panhandle field has known.

A dozen new wells have been spudded in within the past two weeks, with more than three times as many to follow as soon as the strings of tools arrive.

A six inch feeder line is being laid this week from the main 80,000 barrel storage tank built by the H. F. Wilcox company last August to every part of the field so that production will not be held up for lack of pipeline facilities.

Material is in transit for the \$1,000,000 casing head gasoline plant that will shortly be erected by the Wilcox company on their holdings six and one-half mile southeast of Pampa. The gas from this field is the best for making casing head gas in the entire State of Texas, experts claim.

The R. B. Titter Company started work on a rig for the Humble Company in the southeast corner of the NE quarter of section 37, block 3, Gray county, on Monday of this week.

The Humble company will shortly complete work on their 55,000 barrel storage tank located in SE corner of the NE quarter of section 37, block 3, Gray.

The Phoebe A. Worley No. 1, SE corner of the SE quarter of section 62, block 3, Gray, is pumping around sixty barrels per day.

Phoebe Worley No. 2 located in the SW corner of the SE quarter section 62, block 3, Gray, is making better than 400 barrels daily.

Phoebe Worley No. 3, located in the SE corner of the NW quarter of sec. 62, block 3, Gray, is making 2,700 barrels per day, steady flow. This well has never been shot. Oil was struck at around 2975 and the flow went up as high as 4,300 barrels daily within a week after it came in. It is said to be one of the best wells in the Texas Panhandle field.

The Wilcox-Worley No. 4, located in the SE corner of the SW quarter of section 62, block 3, Gray, has been having trouble for the past two weeks with cavities. This well was standardized at 1500 feet and is now drilling at 2300 feet.

Wilcox-Worley No. 5 in the NE corner of the SW quarter of section 62, block 3, Gray, will be spudded in shortly. The rig is up and Superintendent Johnston states that delayed shipments of machinery are holding up the work.

The Wilcox-Worley No. 6 is drilling around 2,000 feet this week. This well is located in the SW corner of the NE quarter of section 62, block 3, Gray.

The 5g is practically completed on the Wilcox-Worley No. 7, located in the SE corner of the NE quarter of section 62, block 3, Gray.

Wilcox-Worley No. 8 was spudded a Monday of this week and drilling will be rushed on this well, which is located in the NE corner of the SE quarter of section 62, block 3, Gray.

Rigs No. 10, 11, 12, 13 and 14 in the Wilcox-Worley field in section 62, block 3, Gray, are either completed or are being constructed and will be spudded in as soon as the tools arrive.

Combs & Worley No. 1, located in the SW corner of the SW quarter of section 59, block 3, Gray, is making

75 barrels daily on the pump. Combs & Worley No. 2 is being cleaned out at a depth of 2,900 feet. This well is located in the SE corner of the SW quarter of section 59, and was shot on May 31. It made a good oil showing, but has not been producing due to cavities and a small amount of salt water that showed up following the shot. There is a good gas flow in the well.

The Gulf Oil and Gas Refining company will spud in with their first well, Worley & Reynolds No. 1, SE corner of the SE quarter of section 83, block 3, Gray, this week.

Worley & Reynolds No. 2, Gulf, located in the SE corner of the NE quarter of section 83, block 3, Gray, was spudded in this week.

Worley & Reynolds No. 3, Gulf, located in the SE corner of the NW quarter of section 83, block 3, Gray, was spudded in last week, and the bit is steadily going oilward.

The Humble Oil & Refining company completed their first rig in the Pampa field; Worley & Reynolds No. 1 in the SE corner of the NE corner of section 83, block 3, Gray, this week.

Worley & Reynolds No. 2, Humble, has its rig up and drilling will be started as soon as the tools arrive. It is located in the NE corner of the NE quarter, section 83, block 3, Gray.

The McMan Oil company are drilling around five hundred feet on their first well in the Pampa field, the E. A. Holmes No. 1, located in the SW corner of the NE quarter of section 83, block 3, Gray.

The Sun Oil company has completed their first rig in this section of the Texas Panhandle, which will be known as the Worley-Reynolds No. 1, located in the NE corner of the SW quarter of section 83, block 3, Gray.

The Clark et al well on the Merced land four miles south of Pampa is making around 1,800 barrels daily. It is located in the SE corner of the NW quarter of section 83, block 3, Gray.

The Empire Oil and Gas company has just completed its rig on the Phoebe A. Worley No. 1 well located in the SW corner of the SE quarter of section 62, block 3, Gray.

The Pure Oil and Gas company have their rig up on their J. T. Benton No. 1 located in the SE corner of the SW quarter of section 62, block 3, Gray.

The Magnolia Petroleum company has just completed the rig on the W. & P. Merton No. 1, located in the SE corner of the SE quarter of section 82, block 3, Gray.

The Magnolia Petroleum company has the material on the ground for their W. & P. Merton No. 2, located in the NW corner of the SW quarter of section 82, block 3, Gray.

W. & P. Merton No. 4, has its rig up in the NE corner of the NW quarter of section 82, block 3, Gray.

No. 5 is also in the same quarter and the same corner and its rig is up.

No. 6, located in the NW corner of the NE corner of section 82, block 3, Gray, has its rig up also.

Clark No. 2 located in the NW corner of the NW quarter of section 82, block 3, Gray, is drilling around 2700 feet. A fairly strong flow of gas was encountered last Sunday at a depth of 2600 feet. This well is expected to come in during this or next week. Clark No. 3, located in the NW corner of the NW quarter of section 82, block 3, Gray, will be spudded in this week.

**PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION**

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7**

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 23 and Section 40 of the Constitution of Texas so as to permit officers of the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States to hold public office in Texas.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 23 of article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

The accounting officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States; except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that his restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States."

Section 2. That Section 40 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"No person hold or exercise at the same time, more than one civil office of emolument, except that of Justice of Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer, or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States from holding in conjunction with such office any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States.

Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in November A. D. 1926, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional amendment permitting officers and enlisted men of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, and officers of the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the Organized Reserves of the United States, to hold other offices or positions of honor, trust or profit under this State or the United States."

Each voted shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary Proclamation for said election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

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**THE PASSING OF B HALL**

"B Hall, Texas has weathered many a storm, but at last, it seems, it is to pass from the campus of the University of Austin, where for a quarter of a century it has been the haven of boys with more determination than money. Literally hundreds of these, some of them by now among the most useful and prominent of Texas, will mourn its passing.

The old building has been the scene of a thousand unembittered scuffles wherein husky youth and abundant energy grappled for the sheer joy of combat. Sometimes the plaster came down; but it was unpretentious plaster, anyhow, and soon replaced. And if the tint of it never matched the rest of the wall, nobody noted it and nobody cared. Sometimes a door gave way and portions of it came conveniently to hand as paddles the better to pursue the argument; but nobody was really hurt and nobody hated his brother. Sometimes water flowed too freely, and tubs and pitchers came mysteriously into play. But the victims scurried good-humoredly to their rooms and ironed their drenched clothes dry with an iron borrowed from somewhere, and the old-time rite of one dollar per bucket of water thrown was loved in due season by the "hall committee", composed of students themselves, to make good the damage to the building.

In B Hall, Texas, democracy fero-gathered. The largest and truest fraternity on the campus, it had no insignia save hands that knew the meaning of work, no oath save the bond of self-respect, no exclusiveness save such as was earned by the individual's own surliness and rejection of fellowship. The want of money or of social standing elsewhere meant nothing there. In B Hall, Texas, no man stood lower than his own shoes or measured higher than his own stature.

This old dormitory for men is ugly—hopelessly ugly. And, to some, old women, too, are ugly. But where is the son worth his salt who will admit it? Those who have had the shelter of the thatched roof and who have known the brotherhood of its weathered and somewhat dingy walls find nothing ugly there, now that they look back upon the birthplace of lifelong friendships and man-sized aspirations. On the contrary, they sense a beauty there which money can not buy nor schooled art replace.—Dallas News.

venue derived from the State Oc-  
cupation taxes and poll taxes of one  
dollar on every inhabitant of the  
State, between the ages of twenty-one  
and sixty years, shall be set apart  
annually for the benefit of the public  
free schools; and in addition thereto,  
there shall be levied and collected an  
annual ad valorem State tax of such  
an amount not to exceed thirty-five  
cents on the one hundred (\$100.00  
dollars valuation, as with the avail-  
able school funds arising from all  
other sources, will be sufficient to  
maintain and support the public  
schools of this State for a period of  
not less than six months in each  
year, and it shall be the duty of the  
State Board of Education to set aside  
a sufficient amount out of the said  
use of children attending the public  
free schools for this State; provided,  
however, that should the limit of taxa-  
tion herein named be sufficient the  
deficit may be met by appropriation  
from the general funds of the State  
and the Legislature may also provide  
for the formation of school districts  
by general laws; and all such school  
districts may embrace parts of two  
or more counties, and the Legislature  
shall be authorized to pass laws for  
the assessment and collection of taxes  
in all said districts and for the man-  
agement and control of the public  
school or schools of such districts,  
whether such districts are composed  
of territory wholly within a county  
or in parts of two or more counties,  
and the Legislature may authorize  
an additional ad valorem tax to be  
levied and collected within all school  
districts heretofore formed or here-  
after formed, for the further main-  
tenance of public free schools, and for  
the erection and equipment of school  
buildings therein; provided that a  
majority of the qualified property tax  
paying voters of the district voting  
at an election to be held for that pur-  
pose shall vote such tax not to ex-  
ceed in any one year one (\$1.00)  
dollar on the hundred dollar valua-  
tion of the property subject to taxa-  
tion in such district, but the limita-  
tion upon the amount of school tax  
herein authorized shall not apply to

### PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9**  
A resolution proposing an amend-  
ment to Article 7, of the Constitu-  
tion of the State of Texas by chang-  
ing Section 3, eliminating the provi-  
sion authorizing the Legislature to  
create special districts and making  
an appropriation therefor.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of  
the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 3, Article  
7, of the Constitution be so changed as  
to read as follows: (creating new  
Section.)

"Section 3. One-fourth of the re-

Section 2. The forgoing constitu-  
tional amendment shall be submit-  
ted to a vote of the qualified electors  
of the State at an election to be held  
throughout the State on the first  
Tuesday after the first Monday in  
November, 1926, at which election  
all voters favoring said proposed  
amendment shall write or have print-  
ed on their ballots the words, "For  
the amendment to the constitution  
of the State of Texas eliminating the  
provision which authorizes the Legis-  
lature to create special school dis-  
tricts," and all those opposed shall  
write or have printed on their ballots  
the words, "Against the amendment  
to the Constitution of the State of  
Texas eliminating the provision which  
authorizes the Legislature to create  
special school districts."

Section 3. The Governor of the  
State is hereby directed to issue the  
necessary proclamation for said elec-  
tion and to have same published as  
required by the Constitution and exist-  
ing laws of the State.

PROFIT IN LOW SPOTS

Farmers who have marshy places on their land that they contemplate draining should first consider possibilities of these low spots as places for producing muskrats, growing fish, or attracting waterfowl. The biological Survey of the United States Department of Agriculture has information on this subject and will be glad to advise interested persons about the possibilities of profit in the increase of wild life.

FIGHT LATE BLIGHT EARLY

When cool moist weather occurs in July and August, late blight of potatoes often causes great losses, particularly in the Northern States. The disease spreads very rapidly in favorable weather, killing the plants in a few days. Late blight can be controlled by thoroughly spraying the plants with 4-50 Bordeaux mixture, beginning when the disease is first seen. Repeat the spraying every 10 to 14 days in dry weather and every 7 to 10 days in moist weather.

HINTS FOR HOT HOGS

A hog will find shade if not weather if he can, but if the shady place he finds is also hot he does not seem

to realize it, and will stay there and die from overheating. For this reason it is best to close any buildings that are not cool, forcing the hogs to get shade elsewhere. The natural shade from trees is preferable to any other. If trees are not available, a good artificial shade should be made by setting posts and building a cheap framework about four feet from the ground, covering it with brush, hay or straw. A shade of this kind is better than one made of boards or sheet iron. If dust accumulates the covering should be made wet by watering with a hose or bucket. This will serve the double purpose of cooling the air and settling the dust.

FLOORS IMPORTANT TO HENS

Poultry houses may be built with or without floors so long as they are dry. Damp floors make damp litter, dampness is fatal to both fowls and chicks. If the house is on dry sandy soil, a dirt floor is usually quite satisfactory, but as a rule it is more damp than board or cement floors. Dirt floors need to be scraped down to the clean soil and fresh gravel or sand put in once a year to keep them sanitary.

If board floors are used see that they are both tight and smooth so as to make them dry and easy to clean. Place them 8 to 10 inches from the

ground if possible, to allow a circulation of air in order that the space may not be a refuge for rats.

Cement floors, especially for large houses, are quite satisfactory, as they keep out rats, last much longer than board floors and are easy to clean.

The floor of every poultry house, whether dirt, board, or cement, should be kept covered with a litter from 3 to 6 inches deep at all times. Oats, wheat, or rye straw makes the best litter, but if it can not be obtained, sawdust, chaff, dry leaves, or pine

needles may be used. As soon as the litter becomes damp or badly soiled, take it out and replace with dry litter. MORE "INSIDES"

Chipped places on the edges of tumblers and other glass articles can be made smooth by rubbing down with fine emery paper, or with fine sandpaper if the emery is not available. To avoid breathing the glass dust, one should tie a dampened cloth over the nose and mouth.

**PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION**

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10**  
Proposing an amendment to the Constitution providing for taxation of school lands owned by counties. Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas.

Section 1. That Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding after Section 6 thereof 6a, which shall read as follows:

Section 6a. All agriculture or grazing school land mentioned in Section 6 of this Article owned by any county shall be subject to taxation except for State purposes to the same extent as lands privately owned.

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, thereon "For the Constitutional amendment providing for taxation of all agriculture or grazing school land owned by any county, to the same extent as land Constitutional amendment providing for taxation of all agriculture or grazing school land owned by any county to the same extent as and privately owned."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the necessary said election and have the necessary published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such

amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law. Approved, April 4, 1925.

**PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION**

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9**

A Joint Resolution relating to the amending of Article 16, Section 58, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners; providing for the supervision and management of the Prison System, under such laws as may be provided for by the Legislature.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 16, Section 58 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 58. The Legislature shall have full power and authority to provide by law for the management and control of the Prison System of Texas; and to this end shall have power and authority to place the Prison System under the supervision, management and control of such trained and experienced officer, or officers, as the Legislature may from time to time provide for by law.

Section 2. The above Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a general election to be held November 3, 1926, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words "For the amendment of Article 16, Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words "Against the amendment of Article 16 Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners."

Section 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by law.

Section 3. The sum of \$5,000.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary,

is hereby appropriated out of the funds in the Treasury of the State, and not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

**NOTICE OF ELECTION**

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Pampa deems it advisable to call a special election as contemplated by Article 1104 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL of the City of Pampa, Texas, that an election be held on the 19th day of July 1926, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"Shall the provisions of Chapter 9 Article 1086 to Article 1105 both inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas 1925, relating to Street Improvements, be adopted or rejected by the City of Pampa, as provided by Article 1104 of the R C S of Texas 1925, and the constitution and laws of the State of Texas."

The said election shall be held at the Fire Station in the City of Pampa and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election, to-wit: Presiding Judge, T. H. Lane; Judge P. C. Ledrick and T. W. Johnson and John B. Ayres as Clerks.

The said election shall be held under the provisions under the constitution and the laws of the State of Texas, relating to such elections and only qualified voters who are property taxpayers of said City shall be allowed to vote.

All voters who favor the proposition to adopt the provisions contained in Chapter 9 of the R C S of Texas, 1925, shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words: "For the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 9, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925."

And those who oppose, shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words: "For the rejection of the

provisions of Chapter 9, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925."

Said election shall be held in compliance with the law with reference to regulating City Elections, in said City.

A copy of this order signed by the Mayor of Pampa Attested by the City Secretary of said City, shall serve as proper notice of said election.

The Mayor is authorized and directed to cause said notice of election to be pasted up at the City Hall and two other places in the City of Pampa, for at least thirty full days prior to the date of said election.

The Mayor is further authorized

and directed to have notice of election published in some newspaper of general circulation in said City and which notice shall be published once each week for four consecutive weeks, the date of the first publication not less than thirty full days prior to the date of the election.
