TANK FOREMAN KILLED AT KINGSMILL TUESDAY

RAINS DELAY WHEAT HARVEST HERE

RAINS DO LITTLE DAMAGE TO WHEAT CROP BUT SLOW UP HARVEST FOR SEVERAL DAYS

Intermittent rainfall during the past week has greatly hampered the harvesting of Pampa's greatest wheat crop, but despite this handicap the elevators of this town are still running at their full capacity.

It is estimated that approximately 150,000 bushels of wheat has been shipped out of Pampa up to Wednesday of this week, but this is not an accurate gauge of the amount of wheat that has been harvested.

The wheat is testing from 59 to 64 pounds per bushel and is making between twenty and fifty bushels per acre, with the average around thirty bushels per acre testing sixty-one pounds per bushel.

Some little difficulty is being experienced in securing cars to take care of this crop. Many farmers are delaying harvesting on this account while others are building granaries or simply piling the grain on the ground until it can be taken care of.

These has been more available harvest hands this year than in recent years. It has not been necessary for the farmers of this section to send out a call for hands so far. If fair weather prevails, however, for a period of thirty days, it is thought that a larger number of men will be needed and will have to be brought here from some less fortunate section of the State.

DRUNKEN BRAWL LEADS TO FATAL SHOOTING OF KINGSMILL MAN

L. M. Black is dead and J. C. Williams is held in jail here awaiting action of the grand jury in September as a result of a drunken brawl last Monday night and morning at Kingsmill eight miles west of Pampa. Williams is charged with killing Black on the highway while returning from a bootlegger's hangout where they purchased two quarts of corn whiskey.

At the examining trial held here Thursday morning the State called nine witnesses to the stand. Principal among these were Jno. E. Bell, nightwatchman at Kingsmill, W. H. "Whitie" Clark, Claude McDougle, "Happy" Davis, Muri Phillips, Sheriff Graves and G. C. Malone.

In the examining trial, which was held before Justice of the Peace I. S. Jameson, according to testimony offered, Whitie Clark, J. C. Williams and H. L. Black left the poker game at the bunk house at about two a. m., Tuesday to go to a bootlegger's hangout about a half mile distant, where they bought two quarts of whiskey. All three were drinking before buying the last two quarts and continued their drinking on the way back to the bunk house.

According to Whitie Clark and others the two, Williams and Black had started quarreling over the pos-

session of a .38 caliber revolver at the time they left the bunk house. Clark testified that the quarrel was kept up on the road and that he left the two in the roadway when it became impossible for him to get them back to the bunk house.

Williams claims a car and five men stopped on the roadway and had several drinks with them and started a dice game, and that he went to sleep at the side of the road where he was found that morning at five-thirty by officers.

Clark is being held on a \$500 bond for appearance before the grand jury in September as a material witness. Williams is being sent to the Potter County jail at Amarillo and had been unable to make the \$10,000 bond offered by Justice I. S. Jameson.

Black was the tank construction foreman at Kingsmill and left a wife and eight children. His body was shipped to Texas City, Oklahoma, by G. C. Malone, local undertaker, Thursday morning.

Sheriff Graves and assistants are searching for one more man said to be a material witness and possibly an accomplice in the crime but who had not been apprehended at a late hour Thursday night.

Pampa bank deposits reached a new high level this week with over \$1,600,000, deposited here. This is said to be the highest figure ever reached by the Pampa banks. The complete statements of the two banks reached the News office too late for this week's issue, but will be found in next week's regular issue.

This new high mark shows an increase of more than \$632,000 over the report of three months ago. This is accounted for by the oil production in this section and the harvesting of the greatest wheat crop in the history of the Texas Panhandle.

It is thought that this amount will be doubled within the near future from the wheat and oil productions around Pampa. Oil leases have accounted a considerable sum of this money and transactions in real estate have also added materially to Pampa's available resources.

HISTORIC B HALL CHANGED TO CLASS ROOMS AND OFFICES

AUSTIN, TEXAS, July 8—The Board of Regents of the University of Texas has ordered the remodeling of Breckenridge Hall, commonly known as "B" Hall, men's dormitory. The building is to be converted into class rooms and offices. The dormitory was one of the benefactions of the late Col. George W. Breckenridge of San Antonio, and was originally intended as a mess hall for poor students. It is stated.

PAMPA HIGH SCHOOL RECEIVES FOURTH CREDIT IN ENGLISH FROM EDUCATION DEPARTMENT

The Pampa high school now has four affiliated units in English, according to a communication received this week by Superintendent R. C. Campbell from the State Department of Education.

There are only four or five other high schools in the Texas Panhandle that have four credits in English. This last credit was the only one asked for by Superintendent Campbell, and makes thirty affiliated units with the Department of Education, a standing

far above the average for towns of this size.

The Pampa School Board will start work on the new domestic arts cottage this next week. It was found necessary to build a house for this purpose with the increased scholastic enrollment of last year. It is possible that other buildings will be erected on the school grounds for class rooms in order to take care of the number of new students that will be enrolled this fall.

WEST TEXAS MAN TAKES COURSE IN HOME-MAKING

AUSTIN, TEXAS, July 8—W. H. Younger of Tulla is the only man student who is taking a course in home-making at the University of Texas. Members of the department of home economics were somewhat surprised recently to discover a man burrowing among the professional text books, pouring over the intricacies of the unit-kitchen and the hollow square plan, the best way to teach felled seams, and puzzling as to whether to locate the ironing-board in the cellar or on the back porch.

On being questioned, Younger, who is superintendent of schools at Tulla, admitted that he had equipped and gained affiliation in two home economics departments within the last few years. His study of the subject has met with such success that his Tulla laboratory school has been selected as a model for Texas schools.

PAMPA ICE MANUFACTURING CO. PUTS PLANT IN OPERATION HERE

The Pampa Ice Manufacturing company announces that their new ice plant is now in operation and that they will be in a position to take care of the needs of Pampa people this summer.

George C. Cluster of El Reno, Oklahoma, is the local manager of the ice plant and states that every effort will be made to serve the people of Pampa. The plant was bought of Haynes and Lutz about a month ago and

has been completed by the present owners. Its present capacity is twelve and one-half tons daily, but will be enlarged as soon as additional machinery can be shipped, according to Manager Cluster, who also states that a forty-ton plant is now being constructed in Borger.

The owners of the Pampa plant recently sold five ice plants in the State of Oklahoma.

SHERIFF GRAVES ARRESTS THREE BOOTLEGGERS HERE THIS WEEK

Sheriff Graves and deputies arrested three men this week in Gray county on charges of selling intoxicating liquors. Those arrested were L. M. Denton, John McGregor, and Hunter.

County Attorney John Studer states that Hunter admitted selling whiskey to J. C. Williams, who is charged with having killed L. M. Black. This trans-

action is said to have taken place shortly before the fatal shooting at Gray at an early hour Tuesday morning. Hunter has been released on \$1,000 bond.

Sheriff Graves states that this town and county are going to be kept clean as it was before the oil boom started. Pampa is becoming known as a town in which laws are strictly enforced.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 33 and Section 49 of the Constitution of Texas so as to permit officers of the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States to hold public office in Texas.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 33 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

The accounting officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that his restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States."

Section 2. That Section 49 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"No person hold or exercise at the same time, more than one civil office of emolument, except that of Justice of Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, officer of the National Guard, the National Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer, or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States from holding in conjunction with such office any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States.

Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of

this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in November A. D. 1926, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional amendment permitting officers and enlisted men of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, and officers of the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the Organized Reserves of the United States, to hold other offices or positions of honor, trust or profit under this State or the United States."

Each voted shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary Proclamation for said election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law. Approved March 16, 1925.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution providing for taxation of school lands owned by counties.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding after

Section 6 thereof 6a, which shall read as follows:

Section 6a. All agriculture or grazing school land mentioned in Section 6 of this Article owned by any county shall be subject to taxation except or State purposes to the same extent as lands privately owned.

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, thereon "For the Constitutional amendment providing for taxation of all agriculture or grazing school land owned by any county, to the same extent as land Constitutional amendment providing for taxation of all agriculture or grazing school land owned by any county to the same extent as and privately owned.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the necessary said election and have the necessary listed as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such

amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

Editor Pampa News—

Shortly after my arrival in Pampa a few days ago from San Jose, Calif. I called at your office to pay my respects, to express my appreciation of the local paper and to congratulate you on the faithfulness with which you have broadcast the news from Pampa and its surrounding territory.

I was just a little fearful that you had somewhat overdrawn in the matter of expansion and development here as well as the vastness of the wheat crop—something your predecessor never did. You ask me to look around a little and then write up my impressions.

That, I thought, would be easy enough and that I would come back in a short while after having catalogued every change worthy of note that had occurred since my visit here a year ago.

But after I looked around a little I discovered that my task was not going to be so easily or quickly accomplished as I had expected. The more I looked the more I saw and the more I saw the more I wondered.

It did not take me long to give up the idea of itemizing the houses that had been built or that were in process of building. My observations

naturally divided themselves, like all things, into three parts.

First I considered the numerous buildings that had gone up. I was specially impressed with the Smith building, so artistically designed and so substantially built of the very best material and executed by workmen of skill and taste; the Johnson building of majestic proportions and pleasing aspect, a monument to the faith that its proprietor has in the future of the town, the Texas Hotel, the J. W. Martin building, the Dodd Hatchery to be completed soon, the ice plant, the Methodist church, the multitude of lumber yards which necessity has called into being, and the numerous additions which have been laid out with other to follow.

I was likewise impressed with the number and beauty of the homes which have sprung up within the last year. I have not attempted to count them nor to learn to whom they belong. But they are invading the south side, the west side, the east side, the golf ground. In fact these new homes are in evidence all around as well as within the town and more are in process of building. Wonderful as the recent growth and expansion of Pampa has been, it is to my mind, only the beginning of a period of undreamed of prosperity and development.

In the second place, I was impressed with, in fact amazed, at the extent and magnitude of the great wheat crop which the farmers are now engaged in harvesting, surpassing anything of the kind I have ever seen in the Panhandle. My fear is that the elevators and the railroads are not going to be able to take care of it. This crop would attract vastly more attention were it not for the oil excitement which holds the uppermost

thought in the minds of your people at present.

And this leads me in the third place to say a few words about this great industry which is attracting so much attention now: only in Pampa but thruout the country. It now looks as if my dreams of years ago in that direction are going to come to pass; for this Pampa territory to my mind, lies within one of the country's great oil fields—great not only in extent but in potential production as well. Prospectors to my notion have scarcely touched the areas of production as yet.

But with the energy with which they are attacking the problem amazing results may be looked for in the near future. Until last Sunday I was not aware of the extent to which efforts were being put forth to insure a large production in this locality. In company with Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Wynne, Mr. and Mrs. De Lea Vicars, Miss Sallie Jackson and Mr. J. T. Crawford Jr., we drove over to the W. W. Merten home, where we were joined by Mr. and Mrs. Merten, Miss Birdie Short and Mr. J. H. Thompson of Oklahoma City, and proceeded in a southeasterly direction to the oil fields which lay only a short distance further on.

From an elevated point where the eye could sweep a large area of broken country Mr. Merten pointed out to us the various rigs and drilling sites that came within the range of vision. We were greatly surprised to learn the extent and vastness of operations actual and contemplated in that locality. I did not attempt to count rigs and locations that we saw. They were very numerous, however.

After spending a brief while there we returned to the Merten home where a feast good enough and bountiful enough to satisfy the appetite of the most fastidious as well as the most hungry, was spread under the branches of those lovely ash trees, just as the golden sun was going down behind the western horizon. We were joined there by one other person, Mr. G. H. Thompson, brother of J. H. Thompson already mentioned. This part of my letter would be incomplete if I did not mention Walter Merten Jr., who was the life of the party and a favorite with everyone.

In concluding, I wish to make two observations: The Chamber of Commerce is or should be a living, moving, impelling force in every town. It comprises or should comprise the best brain, the most devoted citizenship, the most disinterested manhood and womanhood who are willing to sidetrack all personal differences and forego all personal advantages in the interest of the whole town. There should be at all times both unity of purpose and harmony of action. Discussion and argument of course are necessary, but agreement must be reached and effort united.

In this frame of mind you want to go after things. With your great saw you ought to be able to secure a glass factory, for example and a brickyard and other industries that would furnish employment to the thousands and make a payroll that would give permanence to the town you are going to build.

The other observations is: Don't sell your lots too high in the unrestricted territory, that the working man may build and won his home.

PAMPA PROSPEROUS

The wave of prosperity that Pampa and this part of Gray County is enjoying is reflected, in a measure, by a comparison of the bank deposits here during the past three months. Deposits in both banks for April 12 of this year were \$982,595.03, while the figures compiled by both banks this week showed an increase of more than sixty per cent in the past ninety days. The total amount now deposited in the First National Bank and the Gray County State Bank is in excess of \$1,600,000, said to be the greatest amount ever on deposit in Pampa.

Prominent bankers state that this amount will probably be doubled within the next two or three months if Pampa continues on her present stride forward.

Less than one-fifth of this year's wheat crop has been harvested up to date and it is expected that as much as \$2,000,000 will be brought to Pampa from this crop.

The revenue from the oil developments around Pampa are also responsible for a large proportion of this amount and it is hoped that the revenue from this one source alone will more than double the present deposits within the next three or four months.

New business concerns are also bringing in not a small part of this money. A score of new business concerns have added their part to this sum during the past ninety days and many more are here daily seeking locations.

Come to Pampa, the best town in the Texas Panhandle, with opportunities abounding on every side and modern conveniences that can only be secured in the larger towns and cities.

VOTE FOR STREET IMPROVEMENT

But with this apparent prosperity Pampa is confronted with one of the gravest problems that it has ever had. New businesses and new enterprises are daily looking to other fields because Pampa does not show her prosperity in her outward appearance.

Pampa has neither pavement, sufficient sidewalks nor a proper lighting system. A few small lights help to illuminate the principal business street, but no effort is being made to extend the lighting system to the residential sections.

In an attempt to take care of this situation, the City Council has caused to be published a notice of election to be held on July 19 at the City Fire Station as to whether or not the City of Pampa shall take advantage of the provisions of Chapter 9, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, which provides that the City may use any available fund for street improvements.

The City of Pampa will derive no benefit from the increased valuations of city property until the taxes are collected for next year. Many prominent citizens state that Pampa will be materially hindered in her advancement if some solution is not found for meeting the expense of street improvements.

State, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount not to exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred (\$100.00) dollars valuation, as with the available school funds arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and it shall be the duty of the State Board of Education to set aside a sufficient amount out of the said tax to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools in this State; provided, however, that should the limit of taxation herein named be sufficient the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by general laws; and all such school districts may embrace parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such districts, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and for the erection and equipment of school buildings therein; provided that a majority of the qualified property tax paying voters of the district voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year one (\$1.00) dollar on the hundred dollar valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of school tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts created by general or special law.

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1926, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "For the amendment to the constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provision which authorizes the Legislature to create special school districts," and all those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provision which authorizes the Legislature to create special school districts."

Section 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Section 4. That the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

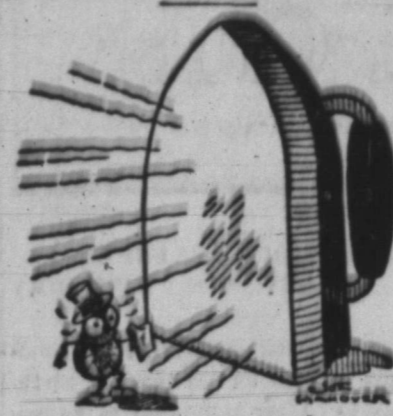

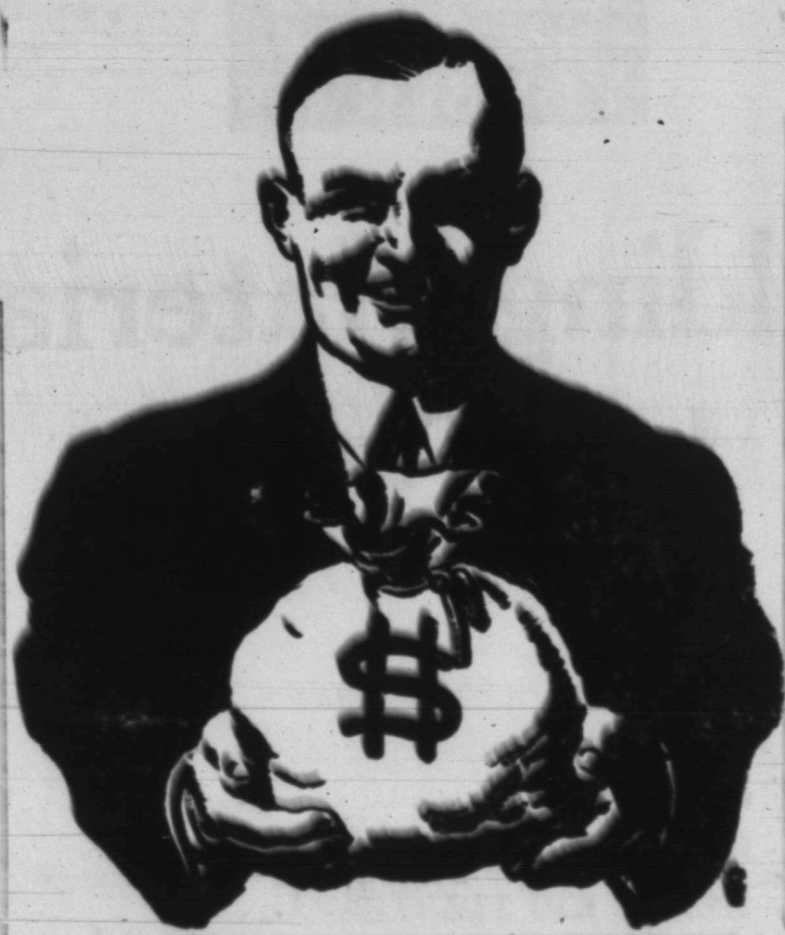

ARTICLE 705

1925 REVISED STATUTE OF TEXAS

SANITARY EMPLOYES—No person, firm, corporation or common carrier, operating or conducting any hotel, cafe, restaurant, dining car or other public eating place, or operating any bakery or meat market, public dairy or candy factory in this State, shall work, employ or keep in their employ in or about any said place any person infected with or affected by any infectious or contagious disease, or work or employ any person to work in or about any said place who, at the time of his employment had not in his possession a certificate from some reputable physician of the county where said person is to be employed, attesting the fact that the bearer has been examined by such physician within one week prior to the employment, and that such examination discloses the fact that such person to be employed was free from any infectious or contagious disease; or fail to institute and have made a medical examination of all the employees at intervals of time not to exceed six months and after such examination promptly discharge from their employment in or about any said place any person found to be infected with or affected by any infectious or contagious disease. Whoever violates any provision of this article shall be fined not less than five nor more than one hundred dollars 14-15

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9
A Joint Resolution relating to the amending of Article 16, Section 58, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners; providing for the supervision and management of the Prison System, under such laws as may be provided for by the Legislature.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 16, Section 58 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 58. The Legislature shall have full power and authority to provide by law for the management and control of the Prison System of Texas; and to this end shall have power and authority to place the Prison System under the supervision, management and control of such trained and experienced officer, or officers, as the Legislature may from time to time provide for by law.

Section 2. The above Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a general election to be held November 3, 1926, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words "For the amendment of Article 16, Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words "Against the amendment of Article 16 Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners."

Section 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by law.

Section 3. The sum of \$5,000.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the funds in the Treasury of the State, and not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

NOTICE OF ELECTION

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Pampa deems it advisable to call a special election as contemplated by Article 1104 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL of the City of Pampa, Texas, that an election be held on the 19th day of July 1926, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"Shall the provisions of Chapter 9 Article 1086 to Article 1105 both inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas 1925, relating to Street Improvements, be adopted or rejected by the City of Pampa, as provided by Article 1104 of the R C S of Texas 1925, and the constitution and laws of the State of Texas."

The said election shall be held at the Fire Station in the City of Pampa and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election, to-wit: Presiding Judge, T. H. Lane; Judge P. C. Ledrick and T. W. Johnson and John B. Ayres as Clerks.

The said election shall be held under the provisions under the constitution and the laws of the State of Texas, relating to such elections and only qualified voters who are property taxpayers of said City shall be allowed to vote.

All voters who favor the proposition to adopt the provisions contained in Chapter 9 of the R C S of Texas, 1925, shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words: "For the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 9, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925."

And those who oppose, shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words: "For the rejection of the provisions of Chapter 9, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925."

Said election shall be held in compliance with the law with reference to regulating City Elections, in said City.

A copy of this order signed by the Mayor of Pampa Attested by the City Secretary of said City, shall serve as a proper notice of said election.

The Mayor is authorized and directed to cause said notice of election to be pasted up at the City Hall and two other places in the City of Pampa, for at least thirty full days prior to the

date of said election.

The Mayor is further authorized and directed to have notice of election published in some newspaper of general circulation in said City and which notice shall be published once each week for four consecutive weeks, the date of the first publication not less than thirty full days prior to the date of the election.

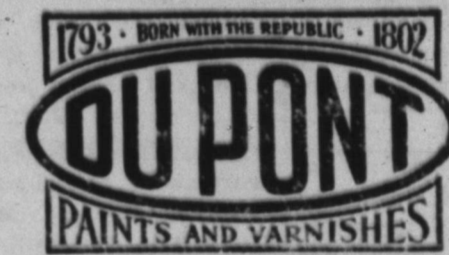

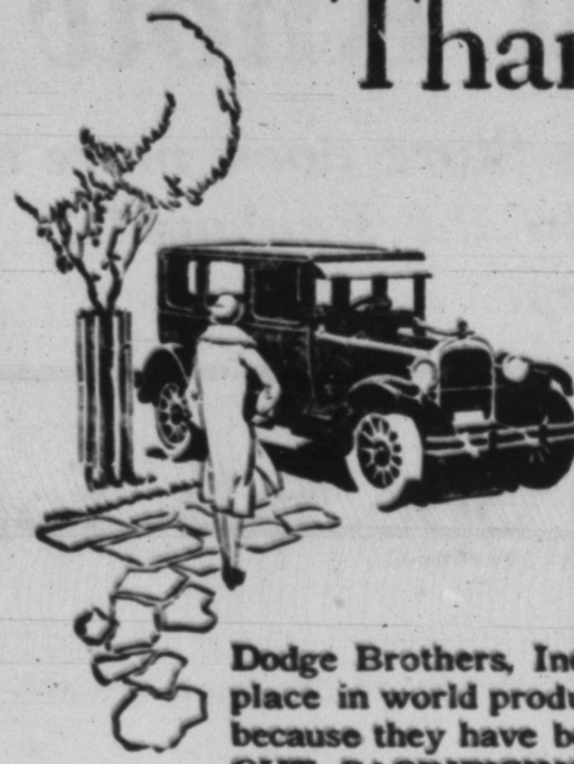
