

# TWO OIL WORKERS LOSE LIVES

## TRUNK PIPE LINE BIG AID TO OIL FIELD

### GRAY COUNTY PRODUCTION IS BELIEVED FACTOR IN PRAIRIE ANNOUNCING BIG DEVELOPMENT

Confirmation of a story printed several weeks ago in the Oil and Gas Journal concerning the building of a trunk pipeline from the Gray county oil field was made during the week-end.

The Journal stated that the Prairie Pipeline Co., contemplated building a trunk line from Kingsmill in Gray county to Ringgold, Okla. The prediction has thus been fulfilled by the definite announcement just made.

The eight inch line is expected to be completed by February 1, 1927, and will have a capacity of 40,000 barrels daily.

Rapid increase in drilling activities in the Gray county field is thought to have been a factor in the Prairie people hastening their decision.

With a hundred wells drilling in Gray county and with hundreds of locations under consideration, the need is held apparent for the trunk pipeline.

Although a trunk pipeline handling 40,000 barrels daily will be of great help, it is predicted that far more trunk lines will be required to handle the production that the field will produce.

Location at Kingsmill will enable the Prairie people to handle oil most economically from the Gray, Hutchinson and Carson oil fields. Should the Wheeler field become a big producer, then the pipeline would be able to tap that section.

Oil men are elated over the announcement by the Prairie people. However, it is believed that other major companies will announce trunk pipelines and start construction.

Three months ago oil men predicted that the Gulf Co. would announce at any time a trunk pipeline that would connect with one from the Ranger field.

### Third Water Well To Be Ready When Machinery Arrives

As soon as adequate machinery is received, the city's third water well will be turned into the mains, said Mayor F. P. Reid this week.

Completion of this well should mean that all water shortage will be temporarily relieved, he said. However, he is anticipating such a rapid growth for Pampa that it will be necessary to complete the other wells at once.

Two wells will be drilled in additive wells. The derrick is up on the tion to the others, giving the city fourth well now. These additional wells should give water for all additions, the Mayor said.

The wells produce around 80 gallons each to the minute. The pump will have a carrying power of 500 gallons a minute, and thus assure good pressure all over the city.

Interest in Gray County in the Democratic primary run-off Saturday was not large with only a moderate sized vote cast at Pampa and McLean.

### New Machinery Purchased.

The Pampa News has purchased \$7,500 worth of additional equipment during the past week. The plant will be enlarged to take care of the development that is coming at Pampa and in the surrounding territory.

A single keyboard 14 Linotype has been purchased and will be delivered in a month. This is considered the best all-round machine made for the newspaper field. The News owners have one of these linotypes on the Panhandle Herald. At the same time one was bought for Pampa, the owners purchased a 14 for the Hutchinson County Herald, Borger, which they own.

Body and head type, except the handset, will be identical on the Pampa News, Hutchinson County Herald and Panhandle Herald when the new linotypes are installed and in operation.

The News ownership is showing its faith in Pampa by making plans to go to a semi-weekly newspaper as soon as the new equipment is received.

A 30 inch paper cutter—a size seldom seen in a Panhandle newspaper office—has been purchased. A new 12 by 18 job press was bought. The Pampa News will soon have three jobbers, giving it by far, the best equipped job shop that may be found in this section.

Some new type is being included in the purchase of additional equipment. The News owners plan at all times to keep in step with the development of any community in which they have holdings.

As was announced last week, a slight advance will be made in the subscription price when the semi-weekly newspaper is started. New or old subscriptions will be received at the present rates until the semi-weekly is started. You can save some money if you will renew or subscribe at the present rates.

Response to The News during the past six months under the present ownership has been encouraging. The subscription list has almost doubled—about 50 being received the past ten days. The News is glad that the list is rapidly growing, for it assures our advertisers receiving more thorough coverage.

Although our subscription list is increasing, a plan of selling through newsboys has enabled us to reach many of the transients, thereby giving more service to our advertisers.

### DRILLERS GASSED WEDNESDAY AT BAYSHORE TEST; BELIEVE ONE TRIED TO AID CO-WORKER

H. B. Hawk and A. C. Underwood, drillers, lost their lives sometime Tuesday night or early Wednesday morning when they were overcome by gas at the Bayshore Oil Company's No. 1 well seven miles south of Pampa.

The men are believed to have been trapped in the cellar and overcome by gas. The well has been making more than 80,000 cubic feet of gas.

Hawk's home was at Carlton, Ohio. He was a 32nd degree Mason and was a driller.

Underwood was from Pennsborough W. Va., and was 40 years old. He is survived by a wife and four children. He was a member of the Odd Fellows.

The men had been in the field about 30 days, co-workers said. Underwood was a tool dresser. Both were employed by the National Drilling Co.

Hawk and Underwood were on the night crew, and it is not known for what reason they went into the cellar.

Just as soon as the bodies were found, an emergency call was sent to Grover C. Malone Pampa, undertaker. Not knowing whether the men were alive or not, he made a record trip.

The bodies were brought to Pampa Wednesday afternoon.

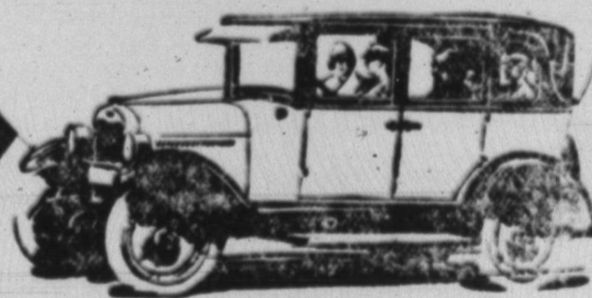

# A Grand Canyon Marvel

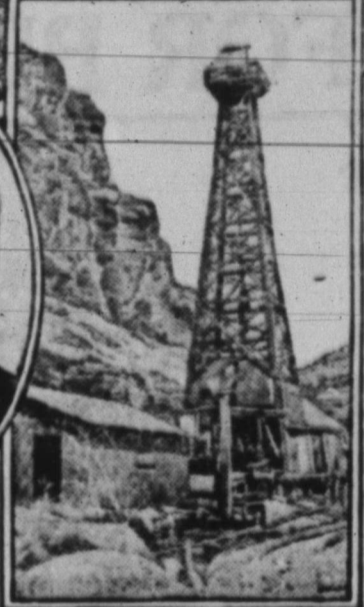


Where the Grand Canyon is Grandest

Just Room for the Derrick

**T**HE Grand Canyon of the Colorado River, widely regarded as the world's most imposing natural wonder, has suddenly taken on a new and startling interest.

A few years ago, when it was as inaccessible as the North Pole, John Wesley Powell won fame by making the first trip through it. A little later another adventurer conceived opening a trail from the canyon's rim down to the river, a mile below. It seemed grotesque, but the impossible was accomplished, and its accomplishment has made the canyon's innermost wonders accessible to thousands of tourists each year. They come from all quarters of the world every season in greater numbers to traverse the Bright Angel Trail. That trail is truly a monument to the daring and devotion of its builder. He worked at it for ten years, almost without help or financial backing, at one period spending almost half a year alone in the vast gorge. But today Ralph Cameron, builder of the Bright Angel Trail, occupying a seat in the United States Senate voted to him by the people of Arizona, has his reward.

### Greatest Artificial Lake

But the conquest of the canyon had hardly been realized when the engineers discovered a new use for it. At Boulder Canyon, Arizona, the greatest dam in the world, a third of a mile high, should impose a lake which, spreading over a great area in Arizona and Utah, would be, next to Lake Michigan, the largest fresh water body entirely within the United States. Harnessed to mighty turbines, the water, falling hundreds of feet, would produce a power greater than Niagara, and irrigate an area several times that of the Nile Basin, which served for uncounted centuries as granary of the ancient world.

The Boulder Canyon dam has not yet been built, but the people of the Southwest are as confident of its construction as that the Colorado will continue to flow between its giant walls.

Now comes a new chapter in the romance of the Colorado. The intrepid "wildcatters" of the oil industry, scouting for new sources of petroleum, have brought in an oil well right in the canyon! Drilling from a narrow shelf at the gorge's bottom, they have overcome unbelievable obstacles. Perpendicular walls of rock grimly forbade construction of road or trail to transport machinery and supplies. From the river a succession of rock walls rise in gargantuan terraces to a height of 3,000 feet.

### The "Great American Desert"

The little Mormon town of Moab, eighteen miles up-stream, is the nearest supply base. But Moab is not a railroad town; a drive of forty miles is still required to reach the Denver & Rio Grande railroad. Salt Lake City is 350 miles away, to the northwest.

Standing at the foot of the derrick which marks the site of the new oil well, one's back is fairly against an 800 foot cliff, which is matched by another immediately across the river. Looking up, one imagines that if he could climb one of these walls he would be "outside." But, trying this, he finds himself on a plateau or terrace, with another cliff a little way ahead. To climb this, in turn, would only bring him face to face with still another cliff, and so on till he had mounted full 3,000 feet from the river.

Not only must this succession of cliffs be mounted, but to traverse the rock terraces, gashed and torn, is only less difficult. And finally, the ascent to the outer rim accomplished, one confronts a waste of ridged, seamed and boulder-strewn desert, endless save for distant mountain peaks. Manifestly, the oil "wildcatters" could not make roads as they built

a flat-bottomed boat and floated down from Moab. It was a daring performance, for the stream twists constantly; unseen rocks and shifting bars add to its difficulties, and the canyon's perpendicular walls threaten instant wreck.

But it was done. Materials were brought, a derrick reared, machinery placed, a camp built and drilling begun. Now, with oil flowing from a depth of 2,035 feet, the Crane Creek well is suddenly the wonder of the whole intermountain country.

### A Maze of Difficulties

Just about a year from the beginning of drilling the well began to flow with every indication that when the drill goes somewhat deeper into the producing sand it will be an important producer. For the present, drilling has been suspended, awaiting provision for taking the oil away. It is doubtful if in all the history of the 600,000 wells that have been drilled in this country, largely in regions difficult of access, any one has ever presented such a category of obstacles as this canyon well in Utah. How the oil will be transported to a refinery is still sheer guess work, but a way will be found, for the ingenuity and resources of the oil engineers have never failed.

The "bringing in" of this well illustrates the difficulty of petroleum development. Convinced that the geological structure was particularly favorable, the projectors determined to gamble \$75,000 on drilling. Before they got oil they had spent more than twice that.

For years wells have been drilled in various parts of the state—fully 200 in all—at a cost of probably \$5,000,000, and this canyon well is the first real producer! It is only by dint of such persistence in coping with natural obstacles and financial hazards that the country's supply of oil is maintained. The first oil well in Western Pennsylvania became a producer at the depth of 694 feet. Now days wells a mile deep are not uncommon, and they have gone down as far as a mile and a half.

### Every Well is a Gamble.

A large proportion of wells produce nothing whatever and represent total loss. It was recently estimated that in the last twelve and a half years \$1,200,000,000 was sunk in wells which were failures. Despite every effort of science, engineering and long experience, and notwithstanding the stupendous depths now reached, 25 per cent of wells last year were dry.

The "wildcatter" is the Columbus of oil. He is to petroleum, to gasoline, to the fuel supply of the country's 20,000,000 automobiles, what the old time gold prospector was to building the empire of the far west. He is essentially a gambler; good loser or good winner. The lure of enormous winnings keeps him tirelessly searching, and sometimes he finds his reward. But in the aggregate, offsetting all winnings against the total cost of this engrossing gamble, it is not improbable that all the oil that has been taken from the soil of this country from the beginning cost more than its producers got for it.

### A World in the Big Game

But their huge gamble is the basis on which the whole industry rests. The ice-bound Arctic and the fever-festering tropic jungles alike attract the hardy "wildcatter." To them the world owes its newest and best in transport by land, sea and air. They help light its homes and streets, provide an astonishing share of its power, furnish an endless list of necessities which are by-products of petroleum. The "wildcatter" is well nigh the father of this modern mechanized world.

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**THE REAL QUESTION**

A Washington correspondent discussing the wet and dry situation says the wets are very much elated over prospects of a congress favorable to their viewpoint after the next election.

From dry sources comes the claim that out of 270 seats of representatives affected by the primaries, 215 are still dry. In cases where present congressmen were not renominated, dries were nominated in their places.

It is further stated by dries 41 seats have been retained or gained by wets, while 14 are uncertain. If this information is correct, there can't be much doubt about the claim of the prohibition forces that the forthcoming congress will almost certainly be dry in just about the same proportion as the present congress.

There has been a large volume of loose talk about prohibition, that has been emanating from wet centers, and which has been misleading to the person uninformed on the subject.

It is practically a safe prediction that states which will hold referenda on the subject this fall will be carried by the wets because they are largely responsible for a vote being taken. The dries as a rule will not participate, knowing full well that nothing can be accomplished.

Prohibition is a part of the federal constitution and so long as the people of the country continue to elect a dry congress, there is not much chance of the law being changed.

The real question involved is the election of dry congressmen and senators, state referenda serving no purpose other than to provide ground for the argument by the wets.

**GUINEA PIGS**

Guinea pigs multiply rapidly and the promise to buy all that his customers raised from the original stock brought a St. Louis man a large income until Uncle Sam got suspicious.

The postoffice department, in issuing a fraud order against the dealer in guinea pigs, said he was swindling children, women and credulous persons. He was receiving an unusually large number of letters daily and cashing money orders rapidly when the government called a halt.

It seems a little hard that the reward for the winner is only to topple off as soon as he gets there.

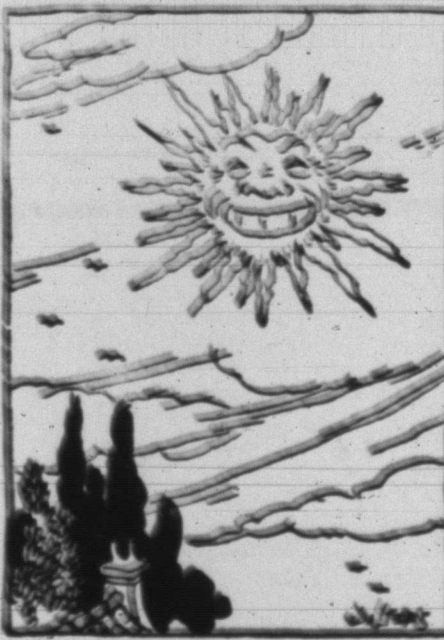

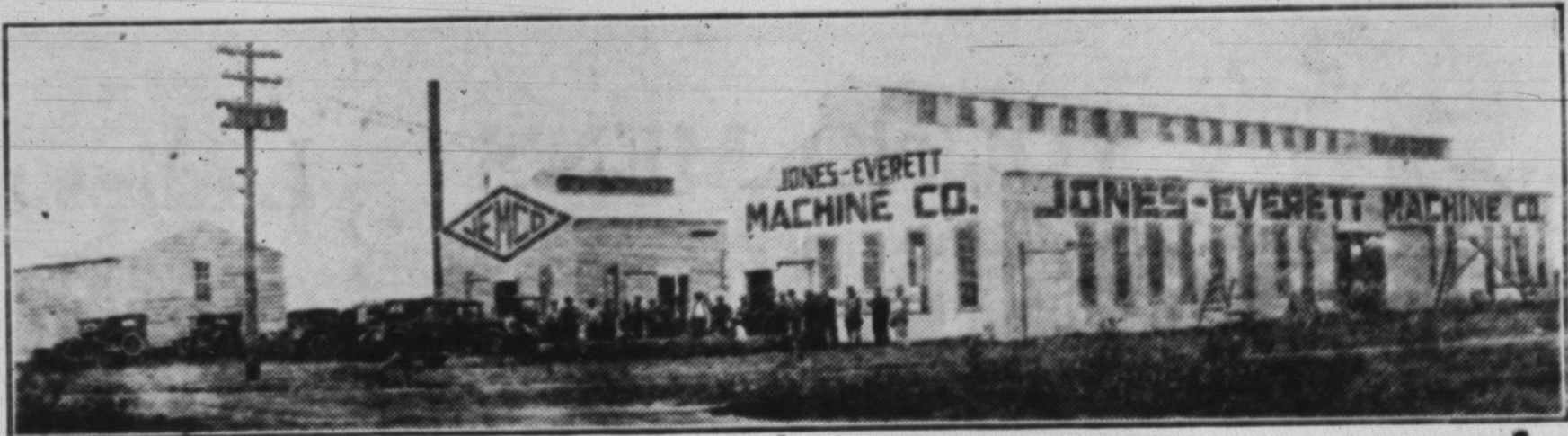

# PAMPA SCHOOL WILL BEGIN SEPTEMBER 6: PUPILS ASKED TO ENROLL FOR OPENING DAY

The school will open on Monday, the sixth day of Sept. We should have liked to have begun on the thirteenth, but the District Institute which is to be held at Canyon from the 30th of August to the 4th of Sept. makes it almost imperative that we open school on the sixth, as all of the teachers—will be here on expenses and will expect school to start then.

When should the pupils start? All of them, as far as is possible, should be present on the first day and attend regularly thereafter. All pupils who reside in this district, which district is coextensive with all of Block 3 as shown on your Gray County oil map, should be on hands the first day. Do not delay starting them as we wish to determine, as early as possible, whether new and additional building will be required.

All pupils of the first four grades and living south of the Santa Fe railroad tracks, and living north of sections 129, 112, 105 and 88 will report to the school just west of the Acme Lumber Yard. It is possible that some pupils that are transported in trucks from the Wilcox Field and the south side of the district, will also be assigned to this school south of the tracks. The distribution of the pupils is left to the management of the school and we are going to do just what, in our judgment, is best for the district as a whole, and, we do not want any patron approaching us requesting that Mary or Sam must be under Mrs. Daniels, Miss Smith, Mrs. Stowell or any other teacher you may know to be a good one. This is to be a democratic institution, as far as the management can make it, but it cannot be if the patrons are to dictate to us as to how it should be run.

All new patrons should have the pupil's report card in hand or a statement from his last year's teacher, so that there will be no delay in grading. This will aid us greatly. We will ask that you exercise all patience in the grading and in the proper classification of your children. The question is often asked, will my pupil be put back if I am here from Oklahoma or New Mexico?

The answer is no. It takes just four years to do High School course in all of the states in question, but the number of years of work below the High School in these states differ in that Texas only requires seven years, while the others require eight years. For example, their eighth grade corresponds to our seventh and their ninth to our eighth. Our High School begins with the eighth and their high school begins with the ninth. They are not set back in the work actually done, but there is a change in the digit that represents the relative standing.

Seventeen major credits will be required for graduation here in the spring of 1927. No pupil will be permitted to skip the tenth grade

and graduate from the eleventh. No pupil will be enrolled in the eleventh grade or graduating class with less than 12 major credits, and no one will be permitted to carry less than four subjects, except by special request. Four subjects in senior year will be required for senior honors; and, no student will be permitted to offer more than one extra-curricula subject in one year and it must be in excess of the four major subjects mentioned above.

If there is room, pupils who will have reached the age of seven between the first of Sept. and the first day of January, will be allowed to go; otherwise, they will not be taken, and the pupils of this particular age and all other healthy ones who will be six between the first of Sept. and the first of March, may attend a kindergarten and get credit for the first grade work as the kindergarten will be under the supervision of the regular public school.

Two teachers will be put on at Kingsmill and as many more as will be needed, and all students in that vicinity will be expected to report there up to and through the seventh grade. This, unless the work is crowded, then some of the grades will be taken off and the pupils so effected will report to the central school or wherever assigned by the Supt.

We ask that you be patient with us in all things and we solicit your full and unbiased support in building up here a school that will meet the practical needs of the pupils and whose influence for good shall ripple on the shores of Eternity.

### ADDITIONAL INFORMATION IS GIVEN ABOUT LOCAL SCHOOL

School will open on the 6th day of Sept. and will run for nine months. It was at first decided to open on the thirteenth; but, inasmuch as the Institute at Canyon convened on the thirteenth of August, it was decided to open on the sixth, as all of our teachers would have been here on expenses for a week.

There will be no half day sessions, unless it should be the first week, due to the fact that the 300 desks that we ordered in July, failed to arrive in time to put them in the added rooms. A school of the first class cannot be maintained with half day sessions. This is one of the first class, and the class work done here is and will be as good as the work done in Dallas or Amarillo. The state fixes the standard. It is the purpose of the management of this school to maintain that standard.

This school is one of the few Texas Schools that has the fourth credit in English; this was put on this last year after it had been attempted for several years previously. That same standard teacher has been reelected for this coming session, and the same high quality of teaching will be maintained. This high school has thirty credits of affiliation, and has ten degree teachers.

There are ten degree teachers certain teacher or teachers, it immediately ceases to be strictly democratic.

Let all pupils who live south of the railroad track, and north of sections 129, 112, 105 and 88 and who will be in the first to fourth grades; report to the school that is located just west of the Acme Lumber Yard. If more grades are required to go here, it will be so announced later: It might become necessary for all pupils of these grades in all of the south side of district to attend that school. It will be determined later as the building of a school house in the Wilcox Oil Field, or near the Wilcox Town Site. All pupils that live in the west end patrons attempt to monopolize a

first seven grades will report to the Kings Mill school. There will be two teachers there.

The routing of the trucks will be done by the board this week; and if moer trucks are to be had, the board will attend to that right away. They have added one large international already, and will put on more, if needed, or will build additional schools wheer the masses of the patrons reside.

The first day of school will be taken up in the grading of pupils and in a general opening exercises to which you are hereby invited. The proper grading of the new pupils is important and the new patrons are requested to assist us as much as is possible in this.

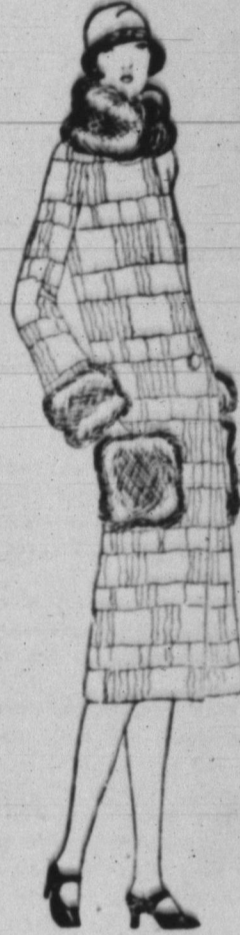

**WHEN I WAS TWENTY-ONE**

At 21—David Sarnoff, head of the Radio Corporation of America, was a ship inspector.

When I was twenty-one the position I occupied was that of ship radio inspector with the Marconi Wireless Telegraph company. During my spare time I also acted as instructor at the Marconi Wireless Institute.

As to my ambitions at that time, they were none other than to make good in the work I was engaged in, knowing that the degree in which I succeeded would be directly responsible for my promotion to the next step; in short, I wanted to get ahead in the field of radio.—David Sarnoff.

TODAY—David Sarnoff is the vice president and general manager of the Radio Corporation of America, the greatest factor in the field of radio in America, if not in the world.

Sarnoff's life is a true inspiration and lesson as to what one of the most humble beginnings can achieve in this country. He came to the United States from Russia when a youth and immediately began selling newspapers on the East side of New York in order to help support the family. By the time he was thirteen he saw that more money was needed than he could earn by his street peddling so by dint of the most arduous efforts, he managed to borrow a little money from friends and opened a news stand on a street corner.

This business paid more and in time he was able to leave it in charge of some members of his family, while he earned additional money by taking a job as a telegraph messenger boy.

In spite of the fact that he now had to look after two jobs, he yet found time to study telegraphy at night and his studies were so successful that, as Mr. Sarnoff states, "by the time he was twenty-one he was already an inspector and instructor of the Marconi company."

When, several years ago, radio suddenly shot out into its present magnificent development and the Radio Corporation was organized the officials chose David Sarnoff to manage it, as being the man who knew more about practical radio and was more fitted to direct it than anyone else of his time.
