WASHINGTON (UPI) -President Ford today warned eligible voters that by failing to cast ballots in Tuesday's election they will be "actually voting 'no' on our system of self government."

In a statement delivered the White House Rose Garden. Ford said that some surveys predict a turnout of only 40 per cent of the voting population.

## Watergate Lost Memo Disclosed

WASHINGTON (UPI) -The prosecution in the Watergate cover-up trial today disclosed a long lost memo it said showed the seven original burglars knew they were being paid for their silence and expected to be pardoned by the Nixon administration in return.

**Prosecutor James F. Neal** told the cover-up trial of five former aides to Richard M. Nixon that the new evidence—a "bombshell" memo written by bugging conspirator E. Howard Hunt Jr. on Nov. 11, 1972-was surrendered Saturday by attorney William O. Bittman.

MINERS STRIKE EXPECTED

**Coal Negotiations Break Down** WASHINGTON (UPI) - William J. Usery Jr., the White House's chief labor trouble shooter. expressed hope today that both sides in the scoal negotiations could be brought together soon to avert a nation wide strike Nov. 12.

But others in the industry were not as optimistic after negotiations between the United Mine Workers union and representatives of the Bituminous Coal Operators Association broke down Sunday over a procedural issue.

The present contract for 120,000 miners' in 25 states expires Nov. 12 and since union rules require a secret ballot by every member it was doubtful a ratification could be completed by that time. The union has a "no contract, no work" tradition on the aggravated assault meaning miners would walk out even if they were voting on a contract.

Usery has been in touch with both sides since talks stopped and although no new negotiations have been set up. he was hopeful today of getting the sessions started again.

"I think we can get it going again." Usery said. "I hope so."

A bloc of union delegates voted to go back to the mines and prepare for a strike. UMW President Arnold Miller said Sunday the outlook was "pretty glum," but said a strike was not inevitable.

According to sources close to the negotiations, both sides were close to a contract but there were still major economic questions to be worked out. Negotiations broke down when it could not be decided what issues to negotiate, they said.



that is, money that does not come from productive enterprise - creates an inflationary situation.

That should be easy to understand since it is obvious that there will be more paper money in the hands of consumers and less goods and services to buy. If 10 persons each have \$10 to spend for gasoline, and there is gasoline enough for only five, chances are the gasoline will be sold to the five willing to pay the highest price. Each potential buyer has his own idea of what gasoline is

worth The free market works that way whether there is an inflated price situation or not. Individuals always differ on how much they are willing to pay for things. The seller simply tries to fit his product to the greatest portion of the market.

But when politicians enter the picture, free market adjustments are more difficult and sometimes impossible to come about. In a free market situation. cash in hand is mostly indication that the holder has created something for the market. Usually, he has created more than the value of his cash in hand. He has had to produce enough to pay his own wage plus something to help pay the costs and something more to provide a fund for investment in new tools, etc. With this cash in hand he

becomes a buyer of other commodities and competes with other buyers each of whom bas provided

According to Mr. Ford's plan, individual income tax returns which show an adjusted taxable income of \$15,000 or more will be taxed again at five per cent of the tax they already pay

The latest figures we have are from the tax returns of 1971, so they are not completely reliable for today's economy. Still one can get an idea of how this fits into the picture since inflation has hit just about everyone

According to the Internal Revenue service figures, there were 11,379,798 individual income tax returns in 1971 which listed adjusted taxable incomes about \$15,000. Taxes paid on those returns is listed at \$48,363,620,000. Five per cent of that is \$2,418,181,000. 





Except that they all will have an effect on the blood content, there is no connection. They are unrelated disorders.

Polycythemia is an excess in the number of red blood cells, due to any of various causes.

Hypoglycemia means periods of low blood sugar. The blood sugar level usually is pretty much normal most of the time, but there are unpleasant episodes when, from time to time, the level falls too low or too rapidly

Excess insulin by injection (as with diabetics) or from a tumor of the pancreas or comparable condition can cause these episodes; but so can faulty function of the pituitary, adrenal; or thyroid glands. Or certain nervous disorders may be involved. Hemochromatosis is a liver disorder involving excess iron deposits in that organ, and demands skillful attention as the condition can result in diabetes and impairment of the liver itself

Nathan Pritikin, coordinator of the national study, told the Health Insurance Institute there were hopes that the research could lead to a "breakthrough in man's search for longer life." The diet aims to eliminate fat,

"The main thing in this diet," says Pritikin, "is to avoid butter, margarine, oils, added fats and sugars. Why if you can do this, this is about 80 per cent of the diet." He adds:



is Mrs. Eula Weaver, 85, winner of two gold medals in the 1974 Senior Olympics at Irvine, Calif. A year before she joined the low-fat exercise program at 81 she was being treated for congestive heart failure, hypertension, angina, arthritis and atherosclerosis. She could barely walk.

Since the age of 82, adhering strictly to the program, she has not needed any drugs and she has shown no symptoms of her former ailments.

Mrs. Weaver's exercise program includes a daily jog of more than 1 mile and 10 to 15 miles of stationary bicycling. She also works-out in a gymnasium twice a week.

"And there are dozens of people in our study with equally dramatic results," says Pritkin. He said the study has been enlarged with two controlled tests dealing with diabetes and heart problems now going on at the medical centers of two univer-

Pritkin said the study group planned to release further findings in the near future.
