### **Hearing Slated** On Application By Packerland

An application by Packerland Packing Co. of Pampa seeking a waste control order for the discharge of industrial waste water will be considered at a Texas Water Quality Board public hearing Nov. 14 in the Council and Courts Bldg. in Duncanville.

According to Hugh C. Yantis Jr., TWQB executive director. Packerland is asking to discharge an average daily flow of 300,000 gallons of wastewater consisting of process water from the beef slaughtering, packing and processing plant on the eastern edge of Pampa.

The treated industrial wastewater effluent is to be discharged into stabilization ponds and then utilized in an irrigation system for 210 acres of pastureland owned by Packerland.

The plant also has a hide processing operation and wastewater from that will be diverted to Pampa's waste treatment plant.

The hearing in Duncanville, is set for 10 a.m. Thursday, Nov. 14, and Packerland's application is one of three to be considered at that time.

The other new waste control order applications are from Berned Bros. Farms, Inc. of Windhorst and the Mildred Independent School District south of Corsicana

## FEA Nomination Meets Criticism WASHINGTON (UPI) - Sen.

This appointment is an insult to every patriotic American, McGovern said in a statement. "Gibson has a million-dollar ring through his nose with the oil industry and is holding the chain at the other

"There can be only one reason for this appointment - and that is a further raid on the American consumer by big oil.' Gibson, 52, was appointed energy chief 10 days ago.

A government source said the White House knew at the time of the appointment that Gibson stands to collect an estimated \$880,000 over the next 10 years as part of a separation agreement with a Philadelphia oil

He had been an assistant secretary of commerce and head of the Maritime Administration before

transporting firm.

joining International Oil Transport Inc. of Philadelphia. On Wednesday, the Wall Street

Journal said Gibson and the company were first involved in job negotiations in the spring of 1972. On May 16, 1972, the Maritime

Administration approved \$4.5 million in mortgage insurance for International Oil to build a tugboat and a barge. The paper said Gibson was out of town when the insurance was approved. Both the Journal and the New York

Times estimated the separation agreement at \$1 million, including Gibson's salary as president of the transport company. White House spokesmen maintain

that Ford did not know about the arrangement when he nominated Gibson and that he is standing behind his candidate while the government. mainly the FBI, conducts a full investigation.

The source who disclosed the terms of the "severance contract" said Gibson had given the White House personnel office that information along with his other financial records several weeks ago -when he was under consideration for another

appointment -and the President should have been told. The issue surfaced Thursday when

Ford's press secretary, Ron Nessen, responding to the published reports, said the nomination had been run through a routine background clearance before Ford announced it He said Ford was told about Gibson's financial arrangements, but he declined to say when.

He later said he had made a mistake and that he had just learned that "because of the urgency in finding a replacement for John Sawhill, the usual background checks were waived.

He added, however, "before the nomination is sent to the Senate, these checks will be completed. Several hours later, Nessen's

deputy, John W. Hushen, said "I can tell you the President was not aware of these allegations of the time of the announcement." Hushen said he was not prepared to

say whether the White House would consider it a conflict of interest if the reports were correct. He said he didn't know if Ford would withdraw the nomination in that event.

### Purse Strings

Congress still has plenty of authority and power to control the purse strings in the national government. but it seems to have no interest in exercising this power

Actually: most power in the national government has not been usurped by the executive branch Rather, it seems to us. power has been abandoned by the legislative and executive branches to the bureaucracy, as has been pointed out by many knowledgeable individuals, including Sen. Barry Goldwater.

At one time, the practice was for the executive branch to propose expenditures, with the members of Congress then exercising their authority of determining whether such expenditures were considered proper, legal or constitutional. But in the past 40 years, both legislative and executive branches have leaned more toward building up a bureaucracy, which seems to be answerable to no one. Either the administration. the legislative branch or both seem to want it that way regardless of the


wishes of the people. There have been occasional lapses from the general rule when the legislators, after demand by their constituencies have become unusually

strong, have temporarily pared down on the budgets and appropriations. However, they soon return to their old habits. And when an executive attempts to force reductions in expenditures, the bureaucracy, members of Congress and special privilege groups raise strong protests and nullify

Presidents have attempted to hold back spending appropriated funds at times, usually because they personally disapprove certain programs. It worked when President Johnson was in office because his party also controlled Congress It did not work as well with Nixon because the opposition party controlled the legislative branch.

The reason there is no real attempt to control government spending is that the politicians have learned they can get votes. prestige and power by fooling the people into believing they are getting something for nothing. They do this by voting vast sums of money in appropriations, setting up bureaucracy to administer the spending and "help" the people, who were described by an early day promoter of socialistic schemes as "too dumb to understand.

## Planning Lack Is Amazing

WASHINGTON - Up in German inflation. New York, one restaurant, once jammed with working newsmen who today must find less traditional joints. now charges \$24 for a lobster and \$15 for a steak And if you don't order vegetables, at \$2 a portion. the meat dies of loneliness on the plate. So are many maitre d's. So are some of the famed big restaurant

And as I jet from city to city I often find myself in communities deep in psychic and financial recession, studded by empty stores and just about beginning to be haunted by a strange malaise candidly called fear in earlier days of depression

It's weird. The \$24 lobster and \$15 steak bring less profit than they did in the days of far lower prices. The cost push, yes, indeed. including the price of labor. is making it almost impossible to operate and sell at a workable profit markup. Should anyone doubt it I can lead him or her to a delicatessen restaurant where the counterman gets \$350 a week and still is unhappy.

So "the place" closes, just as plants are closing and the layoffs start. Manufacturers are frightened at the cliff like drop in sales, especially before Christmas. Middle management, their white collar aides as well as workers are now fearful. Black areas are restless. Housewives are plain scared. Only union members who are insulated by escalating cost of living contract clauses are 'enjoying' as usual.

And amidst it all President Gerald Ford appears isolated. Just nothing is happening in the White House. The President hasn't even conferred privately with Princeton Prof. Albert Rees, executive director of the Council on

Wage and Price Stability. Nor has the council's operation been geared. It has just about gotten a deputy director. It still needs a staff. It has virtually no power. It has no reporting system - for intake or output. It must step gingerly. It must only look" at what's happening and hope that labor and industry will talk to it.

It hasn't yet been coordinated with Harvard Prof. John Dunlop's White House Labor - Management Committee which supposedly was to meet with the President himself and members of his Economic

Policy Board. Actually the President appears in no hurry to consult the Labor Management group. It met with him some weeks ago and got a good warm hearted pep talk. WIN buttons and banner sort of thing. Its next meeting is scheduled for Nov. 11. By that time the lobster may cost \$36, steak \$20 And if you can't afford steak and don't want to eat cake, you always can buy a hamburger for \$2.50 or a street corner hot dog for 50 cents or franks and beans

This begins to approach

the post - World War I

What truly is disturbing and it is tempting to say 'frightening" - is the fact that no one seems to know why Jerry Ford and his handful of aides, such as adviser Bill Seidman and Treasury Secretary Bill Simon, who are decent and well - meaning chaps, are doing little but speechifying.

No one takes seriously the air - raid - warden type of community committees which plan to hand flags to businesses which go in for "voluntary price restraint. In no way will this succeed. Insiders point to what is-

happening elsewhere. In-Germany they're easing up on tough tight money France has a vast practical program swinging. And in England. Prime Minister Wilson wasted little time after his Oct. 10 election victory. On Oct. 14 he called in the leaders of labor and management. They weren't asked to 10 Downing Street as a "labor - management committee." They were called in and served some of that "tough turkey President Ford threatens to

dish out some day. The prime minister summoned Len Murray, the George Meany of Britain. along with Campbell Adamson, director - general of the Confederation of British Industry. I met with both of them in London recently. They are pragmatists, loyal to their followers. But they were told that if the United Kingdom were to survive there would have to a partnership of all with all. including the people, all the

poeple. There was a second conference the next day. And I presume their surrogates and technicians have continued to meet.

So insiders here in Washington are asking why all this calm inside the White House? Why aren't the facts put squarely before the President? Why is no one anticipating the

explosion of wages and prices which will rock the land in the next seven or eight months, believe you Why is it taken for granted only voluntary action will succeed? Does the White House brain trust believe that the coal diggers won't get a fabulous wage fringe package, or the railroad workers, the oil workers, and the construction unions? Already workers in the aerospace industry, weak compared to some of the others, have won an annual 11 per cent wage - fringe

The Mess in Washington -City Government, That Is

Washington, Nov. 8 Most unusual election in the country was the first - in - a century municipal election in the nation's capital with literally scores scrambling for the well paying jobs. In this noisy free - for - all

Six candidates for mayor. paying \$40;000; six candidates for nonvoting delegate to Congress, \$42,500 with probably a juicy raise next year; three candidates for chairman of the city council; 17 candidates for four at - large council seats: 25 candidates for eight ward seats; 12 candidates for four school board seats.

The election took place against a dismal background of grievous local problems and afflictions - foremost among them high taxes, high crime rate, dirty streets, and a costly but alarmingly mismanaged and incompetent public school system.

From polls and other indications, it was quite evident Washington voters were not counting on the election to do much, if anyting, to improve conditions.

Most pronounced manifestation of this attitude was the general apathy toward the election. Candidates had a hard time staging rallies and whipping up public interest and

enthusiasm In an effort to stimulate participation, the D.C. Elections Board distributed a large quantity of posters and literature advertising the election - including 150,000 flyers in public schools urging students to encourage their parents to go to the polls. Graphically symptomatic

of the situation was that there was even considerable doubt about when the election results would be

Several months ago the Senate Appropriations Committee, in an unusual step, wrote into the capital's record - high \$870 million budget a blunt stricture that the "highest priority" be

given to cleaning up the city. The powerful committee noted particularly that even around the White House, in the heart of the capital, streets are littered and only occasionally cleaned, with refuse containers overflowing and other debris scattered about. Explicitly directed the committee

"Unsanitary and dirty conditions throughout the capital cannot be ignored. especially because of their negative effect on the health of the residents and on neighborhood stability. It is imperative that a comprehensive and effective program be launched without delay to clear up the nation's capital in time for the 1976 bicentennial celebration... City authorities are herewith directed to submit quarterly reports on the progress in carrying out this cleanup program If there have been any

reports, they are not known to the committee - nor anyone else. Also, there are no visible signs of improvement.

Streets and parks are still dirty and unkempt. Parents' Protest

A record - high budget of \$193.2 million is being sought for D.C. public schools - a \$20 million increase over the current year. This big hike is being asked for despite:

(1) A steady decline in student enrollment. In the past six years elementary

school enrollment dropped from 62,500 to 58,000; junior high schools from 32,700 to 31,000; senior highs from 21,000 to 18,700. In the coming year, enrollment is expected to go down still further.

(2) Although Washington's public school system has long had the biggest budget for a city its size, the teaching record is among the worst. A recent official report rated 6th. 7th and 8th graders as scoring lower on standardized tests measuring reading and math skills than at any time in the last three years. Eighth graders scored a full grade - level lower in both reading and math than their counterparts in the spring of 1973. The study made clear that D.C. schools again fell below national norms in reading and math at all grade levels tested.

Reaction of school superintendent Barbara Sizemore (third to hold the job in five years) to these shocking findings was. These tests are culturally biased, they don't provide enough information to draw valid conclusions.

Perhaps not for Mrs. Sizemore, who before becoming superintendent a year ago had never run a school system, but indignant parents of students have vehemently differentopinions

Bone cancer treatments have improved vastly since 1969, he said, from about 6 per cent survivors to more than 60 per cent today. He said although a number of athletes have died of the disease, the cancer is not connected to injuries.

Sutow said the survival rates are deceptive because they are for all the cases.

For the individual patient it's either 100 percent survival ro zero percent," he said. "I've seen too many good kids go that way. It's hard to improve a 98 percent survival rate but with new drugs we will see if we can save those failures.

#### Long Living **Heart Patient** Dies At L.A.

HOUSTON (UPI) - A Baylor College of Medicine spokesman confirmed Thursday Dusan Vlaco of Yugoslavia, the second longest living heart transplant patient, has died in Los Angeles.

inflam mation. The oldest living heart transplant patient is Louis

B. Russell Jr., a schoolteacher\_in Indianapolis, Ind., who got a

new heart on Aug. 24, 1968. Vlaco was a guitar player with a five-member rock band and his first record, "The First Step on the Moon," was at the top of the hit list in Yugoslavia two years after his operation.

## Sirica Concludes Tapes Admissible As Evidence

Richard Nixon may never testify at the Watergate coverup trial, but his voice will soon be heard on tapes of the White House meetings which the prosecution says were at the heart of the conspiracy

Overriding defense objections, Judge John J. Sirica ruled Thursday that 26 of the tapes were admissible as evidence in U.S. District Court —thus clearing the way for them to roll beginning Monday.

They cover the time between June 23, 1972, six days after the Watergate arrests, and April 26, 1973, near the end of the cover-

A grand jury named Nixon an unindicted coconspirator, but President Ford cut off all possibility of prosecution with his pardon in September

Former Nixon campaign aide Powell A. Moore was to be back on the witness stand today.

'I think you have a different situation here," he said. "These tapes that are being offered as evidence in the alleged conspiracy were made at the discretion of the President and kept in the general course of business.

Sirica hinted that he may dismiss part of the indictment charging Mitchell and Ehrlichman with lying to the FBI.

For many years the schools have used the Words of the Champions' booklet, prepared by the National Spelling Bee, The 1975 issue may be obtained by writing.



#### Court Orders Governor To **Attend Meeting**

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI) -Gov. Dolph Briscoe is under a court order to answer attorney's questions in a Uvalde motel next week in connection with a \$2.5 million campaign practices suit filed against him by Frances Farenthold.

Briscoe cancelled his Austin appointment with the attorneys for the second time Thursday because of the illness of his mother. hospitalized at Uvalde. District Judge Herman Jones ordered Briscoe to meet with the Farenthold attorneys next Thursday to give a deposition.

Jones also order Briscoe's ranch foreman, Edwin King, to meet with the attorneys in Uvalde Nov. 15. Mrs. Farenthold said Briscoe solicited and accepted \$500,000 raised at an October, 1973, fund raising dinner before he formally appointed a permanent campaign chairman as required by law. She asked for \$1 million in damages and another \$1.5

million for the state. Briscoe, a million banker-rancher, placed the disputed funds in escrow pending settlement of the suit and used \$6\$5,000 of his. funds to finance his successul re-election campaign. He defeated Mrs Farenthold, of Houston, in the Democratic primary and Republican Jim Granberry in the general

Briscoe, who missed the final two weeks of the fall campaign because of his mother's illness, told his attorney Wednesday he could not keep the Austin appointment with the Farenthold attorneys

#### Erwin Claims He Won't Take **Board Position**

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI) -University of Texas Regent Frank C. Erwin Jr., in an effort to get his name "off the front page and off the Thursday said he would not seek or accept another appointment to the regents board.

Erwin has been in the news in connection with the firing of UT Austin President Dr. Stephen H. Spurr, and because of drunken driving charges filed against him by Austin

Spurr has contended Erwin was influential in getting him dismissed from the university.

Erwin was arrested Oct. 8 for drunken driving. It was his second such arrest in three years. He is to enter a plea in the case Dec. 8 in a county court at law. His trial on a similar charge in July. 1972, was moved to Belton. and he was acquitted.

A front page story in the Austin American-Statesman Thursday reported a suit for \$4,434 in delinquent taxes was filed against Erwin by the city, school district and

Erwin issued a one-page printed statement Thursday, saying it was an effort to "get off the front page and off the air."

"I hope that this statement will put an end to the vicious campaign of character assassination that has been waged against me," he said.

He said certain members of the Austin-based news media repeatedly demonstrated a determination to keep his name before the public in the most unfavorable possible ways.

"I have been most gratified in recent months by the hundreds of people who offered to contact the governor in behalf of my reappointment and by the many senators who have offered to work for my confirmation to that office. he said in the statement.

'However, four months ago, in the presence of my longtime friend, the editor of the Houston Chronicle, I told a highly placed official in the governor's office that I not only did not wish to be reappointed to the board of regents but that I would no accept reappointment even if the governor were kind enough to tender it to me. That attitude on my part has not changed and will not

'At the conclusion of my present term of office. I intend to engage in full time law practice in Austin. Meanwhile, I hope that this statement will put an end to the viscious campaign of character assassination that has been waged against-

Erwin was appointed to the UT board of regents in March of 1963 and served as its chairman from 1966 to

deposition in response to subpoenas for his testimony. Dr. John Lungren said Nixon continues to improve but he is still in serious condition 16 days after hospitalization and 10 days after urgent surgery, when he almost died of postoperative shock.

The "small area of pneumonitis in his right lung is responding well to antibiotic therapy and is resolving." Lungren said in a statement released by Long Beach Memorial Hospital. "The fluid in the left lung is becoming smaller."

Lungren said Nixon is taking brief walks in his hospital room, and "we're gradually increasing his activity.

He also said a cardiological monitoring tube has been disconnected because Nixon has shown no sign of heart trouble throughout the crisis.

In a four-page affidavit filed with U.S. District Court Judge John J. Sirica, Nixon attorney Herbert Miller said it is expected that Nixon will remain hospitalized at least another 10 days to two weeks.

Nixon's doctors and the hospital have repeatedly refused to say when Nixon could leave, calling his condition too serious for speculation.

The lawyer noted that Nixon's visits with his wife and daughters are limited to five minutes an hour because he "is very weak" and easily fatigued.

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) -A former minister and massage parlor owner from Texas has denied charges he helped plot the hit-andrun death of a young woman two weeks after performing her marriage ceremony.

Samuel C. Corey, 41, of San Antonio, Tex., made the denial Thursday while testifying during a preliminary hearing into first degree murder charges filed against him.

He was freed on \$50,000 bond after the hearing.

Corey originally had been charged with second-degree murder, but prosecutors said they felt new evidence was convincing enough for the firstdegree count, which carries a mandatory death sentence upon conviction.

The charges resulted from the Jan. 16 hit-and-run death of Patricia Ann Giesick, 25, whose husband. Claudius James Giesick, also faced a second-degree murder count.



your shoulders and neck Relax! Feel the tension leaving.

For the moment forget what you have to or want to do, and all worries. If you think at all, picture some scene that is peaceful and soothing to you. By now you should experience a light feeling as though you were

drifting in the air. This routine is more effective if you take a few very light exercises first. It does work! Take time for each step. Do not hurry the process. Check to be sure that your tongue is relaxed










## TB Affects More Than Lungs

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Is there any test whereby a person may be checked for presence of tuberculosis in parts of the body other than the lungs? I am under the impression that tests used for the lungs will not designate its presence elsewhere. -

My husband had a tumor removed from his wrist and a biopsy indicated that it was caused by the tuberculosis germ.

It had been treated at first as bursitis, arthritis, strain, sprain, etc., until the fingers began to be drawn out of position and the tumor became evident.

He made a remarkable recovery and has been taking Isoniazid pills three times a day for nearly two years. Now the doctor says he may stop the medication.

How can he be checked in the future to know if tuberculosis is present in his body? Our doctor is rather vague on that. Is there any set time a person should take Isoniazid? - E.L.S. You are correct in that

chest X - rays or other tests of the lungs will not show whether the germ is present elsewhere. But Isoniazid is extremely effective in suppressing the germ when properly used - as it evidently has been in your husband's case, so I would not be inclined to worry much about it.

The one sure test (aside

you mentioned: biopsy. Taking a bit of tissue from the suspected spot and examining it in the laboratory to identify the germ. Should trouble develop anywhere, then another biopsy would ascertain whether it was a tuberculosis lesion or some

other condition. The lungs, of course. remain the spot most frequently attacked by the tubercle bacillus; it can settle anywhere else, but infrequently. Not so many years ago, before we had the right drugs, those cases could be bitterly difficult to combat.

So thank your stars that your husband encountered this now, not a couple of decades ago.

Isoniazid is used on a moderately long - term basis, from one to two years. and it has the property of being carried all through the body's tissues, so I think you should place considerable condidence in your husband's safety after that treatment.

By the way, you may possibly have had in mind the "skin test" for TB. It can show only that there has been an invasion of the body by the TB germ. From now on, your husband's tests will show positive, but you already know that there had been such an invasion. However, the test does not

show whether the germ is active.

I hope this gives you an insight into why your doctor was "vague" about further tests, but I hope it also will allay the worry with which you seem to be burdened.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: My husband has asthma and emphysema. He quit smoking five years ago but chews tobacco continuously.

Our son is a chemistry student and says the nicotine from chewing tobacco is absorbed through tissues in the mouth and is harmful because it gets into the blood stream. What is your advice? - B.L.

The problems of smoking or chewing tobacco are quite different. It is true, of course, that nicotine is

absorbed from chewing, but at least the chewing does not further damage lungs which

already are damaged. Note to Mrs. F.S. Hypoglycemia (lew blood sugar) may be a forerunner of diabetes, but that is a far cry from saying that it will lead to diabetes.







Getting rich quick is a thought many of us daydream about. But we know it's not a realistic thought -and certainly not an idea that will help us make

wise investments. If you are considering investing money, you should know that the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) has issued this warning:

Consumers should beware of get-rich-quick

Specifically, SEC is trying to educate us in the tactics of promoters pushing fraudulent stocks and bonds. Often, such promoters will be selling questionable, offbeat securities that are not even registered with SEC: Some promoters promise you will make a fortune overnight, but in reality you may lose your savings.

Such losses have been suffered by many personsincluding those who are smart and knowledgeable about financial matters. Within recent months, we have all read of money being' lost by many who invested in Scotch whiskey warehouse receipts, in a fraudulent wine investment scheme and in an oil-drilling swindle.

To protect yourself, SEC suggests, be wary of pro-

• Promise spectacular returns-a solution to all your financial problems. · Claim they represent

a new or unique enterprise and that you "have been selected to get in on the ground • Pressure you to make

a quick investment decision. · Give a post office box number instead of a street address · Spread rumors so that you might hear from some-

one else in your community about "this unusual investment opportunity." SEC strongly urges con sumers to investigate before

investing. It offers these • Find out if the promoter is regulated by Federal or state laws.

There has been an unusual increase in sunspot activity ("storms" which flare up on the surface of the sun) in recent weeks. ## Congress Clings To Mailing

By BENJAMIN SHORE Copley News Service WASHINGTON - Congress always seems to have difficul-

ty reforming itself. This year it declined to get totally involved in campaign finance reform, rejected a well-thought-out restructuring of its outmoded committee system, and couldn't see the point of including itself under the terms of the Freedom of

Information Act. And the House's so-called reform of the congressional franking (free mailing) privilege, which is getting its first test in this election season, similarly appears to leave things pretty much "business as usual" on Capitol Hill.

For years, congressmen have flooded their districts with "newsletters" once or twice before election day. Mass mailings, such as the newsletters which extol the virtues and hard work of those seeking reelection, are carcost to individual congress-

ful of this abuse of the frank, which was intended to permit congressmen to communicate with their constituents about official business. A dozen lawsuits were filed and a few victories were scored against congressmen.

The message to the Congress was clear: either reform franking abuse or the courts will do it.

So the House (the Senate doesn't have the "Postal Patron" form of mass mailing addressing, which is the favorite means of abuse) spent 1973 drafting a "reform" law that does little more than make the abuse appear less blatant. For example, the few con-

gressmen who were interested in functional reform wanted mass mailings banned during the 60 days before primary and general elections, but it was watered down to 28 As could be expected,

backlog, which the congressmen knew would result in many newsletters being delivered to voters much closer to election day than the reform law intended.

The House also created a bipartisan commission to render advice to congressmen on the frankability of planned mailings and to handle complaints from citizens, who were barred by the new law from filing court suits unless the commission fails to consider their complaints.

The commission this year was asked by less than a fourth of the House membership to approve intended mailings.

"I think it's a fair assumption that some stuff that we haven't seen has gone out under the frank that shouldn't have," observed a commission official in a bit of understatement.

Furthermore, the commission, which is not the most


