Inside Washington

The Mess in Washington — City Government, That Is Washington, Nov. 8 — Most unusual election in the country was the first in a century municipal election in the nation's capital — with literally scores scrambling for the well-paying jobs.

Washington's public school system has long had the biggest budget for a city its size, the teaching record is among the worst. A recent official report rated 6th, 7th and 8th graders as scoring lower on standardized tests measuring reading and math skills than at any time in the last three years.

Reaction of school superintendent Barbara Sizemore (third to hold the job in five years) to these shocking findings was, "These tests are culturally biased, they don't provide enough information to draw valid conclusions."

They angrily voiced them the other day at a public forum attended by candidates for the school board. Illustrative are the following: "The D.C. school system has the most top-heavy and stultifying bureaucracy in this town — and that's saying a lot."

What effect that judicial spanking will have remains to be seen. An equally stern injunction against Washington's notoriously dirty and unkempt streets and parks has had no apparent effect.

Several months ago the Senate Appropriations Committee, in an unusual step, wrote into the capital's record — high \$870 million budget a blunt stricture that the "highest priority" be given to cleaning up the city.

Unsanitary and dirty conditions throughout the capital cannot be ignored, especially because of their negative effect on the health of the residents and on neighborhood stability. It is imperative that a comprehensive and effective program be launched without delay to clear up the nation's capital in time for the 1976 bicentennial celebration.

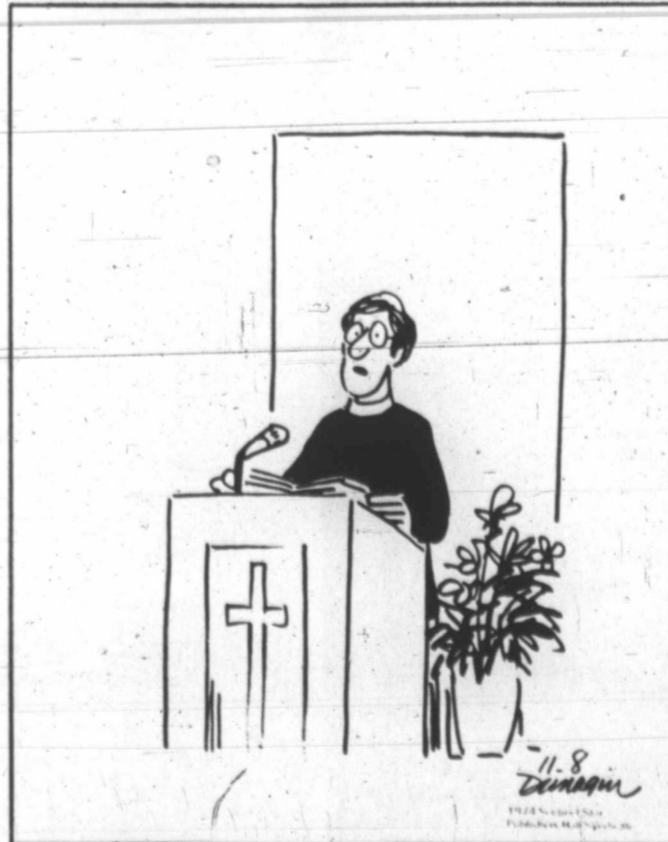

### Drug Treatments Helping Cancer Cure In Children

HOUSTON (UPI) — A specialist said drug treatments have radically improved the survival rate of children with tumors of the kidney, bone, head and neck area; but it may be difficult to improve on that rate.

Dr. Wataru Sutow of M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute said Thursday tumors are the No. 2 killer of children with only accidents costing more lives.

### Dead Youth's Father Claims He's Innocent

HOUSTON (UPI) — A father charged with poisoning his 8-year-old son with cyanide in Halloween candy says he is innocent and is stunned anyone would believe he could do it, his minister said Thursday.

"There is some room for improvement (in survival rates) but much more work is needed," he said.

Sutow, attending a conference on cancer chemotherapy, said the incidence of cancer in children is not as high as in adults and is often easier to cure.

"The tumors we see in children are more responsive than those in adults," he said. "Tumors in children are different than in adults and have to be treated much differently."

Sutow said the greatest strides have been made in treating-wilms-tumors (of the kidneys), osteogenic sarcoma (bone cancer) and rhabdomyosarcoma (tumors of the head and neck).

The survival rate in 1945 of wilms tumors was 40 percent, under the best conditions," Sutow said. "Today, in stage 1 of wilms the survival rate is up to 90 to 98 percent. In the more advanced stages it's around 88 percent."

Sutow said tumors of the head and neck—except for those around the eye—had a 16 percent survival rate before 1966 and now it's above 68 percent.

Bone cancer treatments have improved vastly since 1969, he said, from about 6 percent survivors to more than 60 percent today. He said although a number of athletes have died of the disease, the cancer is not connected to injuries.

Sutow said the survival rates are deceptive because they are for all cases. "For the individual patient it's either 100 percent survival or zero percent," he said. "I've seen too many good kids go that way. It's hard to improve a 98 percent survival rate but with new drugs we will see if we can save those failures."

IN COVER-UP TRIAL

Sirica Concludes Tapes Admissible As Evidence

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Richard Nixon may never testify at the Watergate cover-up trial, but his voice will soon be heard on tapes of the White House meetings which the prosecution says were at the heart of the conspiracy.

Jr. freed before police discovered he worked for the campaign. "I said to Mr. Liddy that I thought it was a foolish thing to do," Moore testified. "Mr. Liddy said he agreed with me but he had his orders."

The prospect of the former President testifying at the trial diminished even more with a report from Nixon's lawyers that he almost died following surgery for phlebitis, a vein inflammation involving blood clots.

Former Nixon campaign aide Powell A. Moore was to be back on the witness stand today. Nervous and sometimes stammering, Moore admitted Thursday he had "withheld certain facts" from the grand jury.

# Assemblies Of God Focus Plans On 60th Anniversary

Throughout the Assemblies of God Churches in America special attention will be focused upon the 60th anniversary of this great Pentecostal Movement. The Assemblies of God held its first General Council in Hot Springs, Ark.

60 years ago. At that initial meeting there was no intention or desire to promote the organizing of another religious group, but the objective was to initiate a fellowship where Christian believers from all churches throughout the land might have an opportunity to find encouragement and teaching in the spiritual experience called "The Baptism in the Holy Spirit" with the initial physical evidence of speaking in other tongues. This "charismatic" experience was being realized by many Christians in many different churches and a need was felt to share with others of their experience. However, before the brief meeting came to a close the Assemblies of God was formed as a religious movement.

## Higher Price Expected On Sugar, Poultry

Consumers were faced today with the certainty of even higher prices for sugar and the possibility of increases on meat and poultry.

In Washington, a White House spokesman said neither President Ford nor his advisers think the nation is in a recession in the "classic" sense. Press Secretary Ron Nessen said inflation was the major problem.

Arthur Burns, chairman of the Federal Reserve Board, and other economists have said the economy is experiencing both decline and rising prices — recession and inflation at the same time.

Prices for sugar in futures markets in New York and London soared to new highs Thursday.

The higher prices eventually will filter down to the consumer level after passing through several middle steps, including refining, transporting,

packaging and wholesaling. In the New York, futures prices in sugar rose 2 cents a pound, the maximum limit on any one trading day, closing at 53.20 cents for January, 52.97 cents for March and 51.98 cents for May.

All are record highs. In the London market, sugar closed at an average of 64 to 65 cents a pound, also

records. Six weeks ago, sugar was quoted in London at 30 cents a pound.

Retail sugar prices have soared 200 to 300 per cent since January, when a pound of sugar sold for about 18 cents. Along the East Coast, sugar prices rose to 60 cents or more a pound.

King's Supermarket in Summit, N.J., was selling

one-pound boxes for 63 cents and twopound boxes for \$1.15.

Record prices being bid this week on raw sugar deliveries months ahead provide no optimism for a lessening of the supermarket price.

In Washington, representatives of the beef, pork, poultry and dairy industries said that unless

their industries are helped by the government farmers will reduce production, which ultimately will mean their produce will cost more.

They called for stiffer controls on export of food grain, higher milk support levels, restrictions on beef imports and expanded beef and poultry exports.

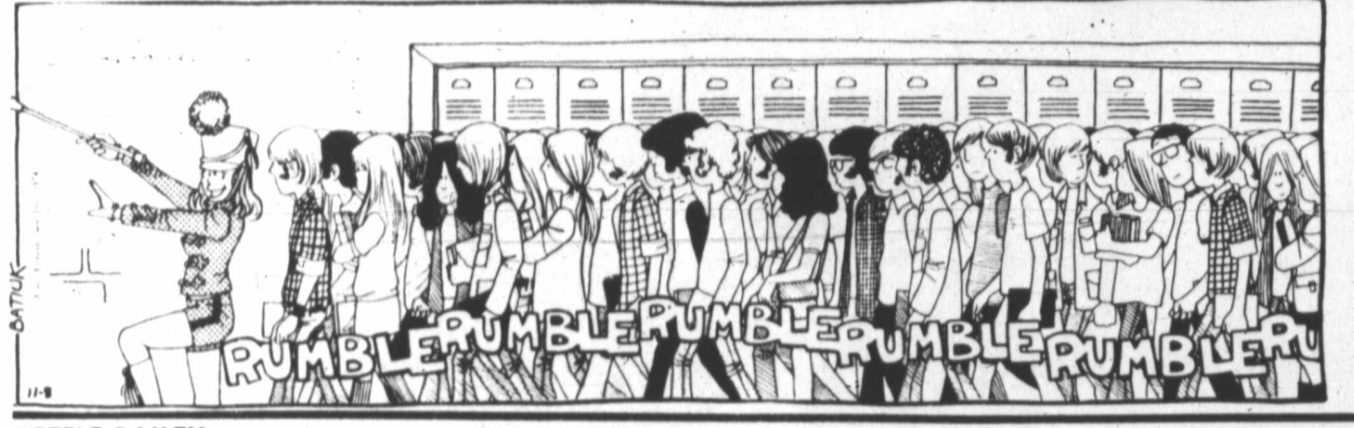

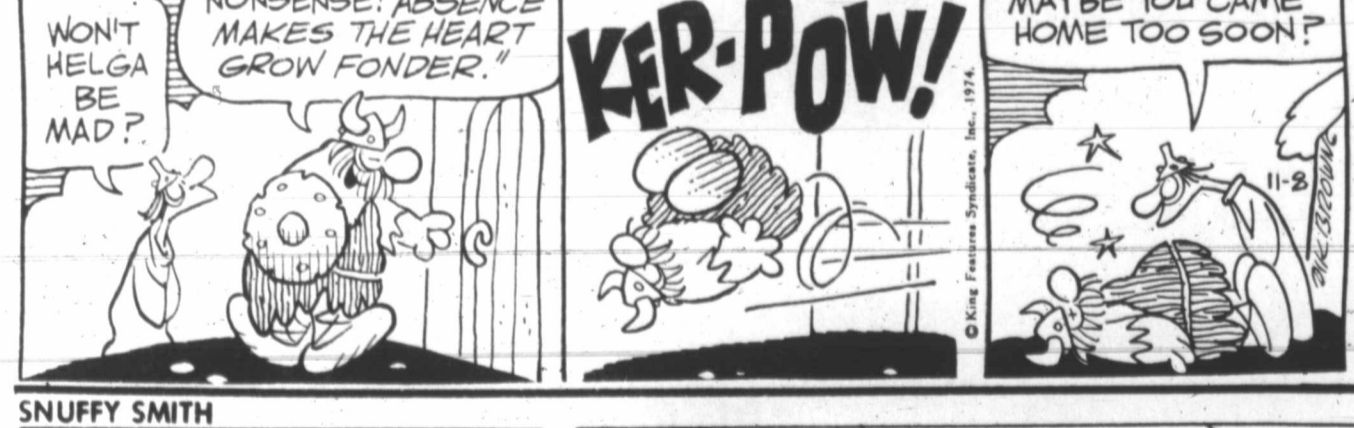

TB Affects More Than Lungs

By G.C. THOSTEON, M.D.  
Dear Dr. Thosteon: Is there any test whereby a person may be checked for presence of tuberculosis in parts of the body other than the lungs? I am under the impression that tests used for the lungs will not designate its presence elsewhere.  
My husband had a tumor removed from his wrist and a biopsy indicated that it was caused by the tuberculosis germ. It had been treated at first as bursitis, arthritis, strain, sprain, etc., until the fingers began to be drawn out of position and the tumor became evident.  
He made a remarkable recovery and has been taking Isoniazid pills three times a day for nearly two years. Now the doctor says he may stop the medication. How can he be checked in the future to know if tuberculosis is present in his body? Our doctor is rather vague on that. Is there any set time a person should take Isoniazid? — E.L.S.  
You are correct in that chest X-rays or other tests of the lungs will not show whether the germ is present elsewhere. But Isoniazid is extremely effective in suppressing the germ when properly used — as it evidently has been in your husband's case, so I would not be inclined to worry much about it. The one sure test (aside from the lungs) is the one you mentioned: biopsy. Taking a bit of tissue from the suspected spot and examining it in the laboratory to identify the germ. Should trouble develop anywhere, then another biopsy would ascertain whether it was a tuberculosis lesion or some other condition.  
The lungs, of course, remain the spot most frequently attacked by the tubercle bacillus; it can settle anywhere else, but infrequently. Not so many years ago, before we had the right drugs, those cases could be bitterly difficult to combat.  
So thank your stars that your husband encountered this now, not a couple of decades ago.  
Isoniazid is used on a moderately long-term basis, from one to two years, and it has the property of being carried all through the body's tissues, so I think you should place considerable confidence in your husband's safety after that treatment.  
By the way, you may possibly have had in mind the "skin test" for TB. It can show only that there has been an invasion of the body by the TB germ. From now on, your husband's tests will show positive, but you already know that there had been such an invasion. However, the test does not show whether the germ is active.  
I hope this gives you an insight into why your doctor was "vague" about further tests, but I hope it also will allay the worry with which you seem to be burdened.  
Dear Dr. Thosteon: My husband has asthma and emphysema. He quit smoking five years ago but chews tobacco continuously. Our son is a chemistry student and says the nicotine from chewing tobacco is absorbed through tissues in the mouth and is harmful because it gets into the blood stream. What is your advice? — B.L.  
The problems of smoking or chewing tobacco are quite different. It is true, of course, that nicotine is absorbed from chewing, but at least the chewing does not further damage lungs which already are damaged.  
Note to Mrs. F.S.: Hypoglycemia (low blood sugar) may be a forerunner of diabetes, but that is a far cry from saying that it will lead to diabetes.

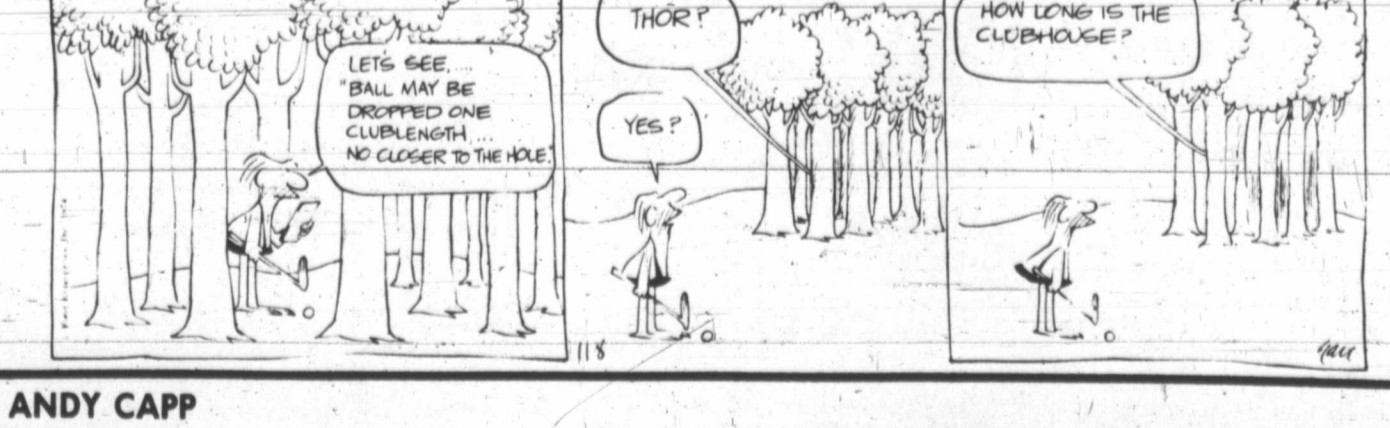

# Bears Upset Would Eliminate Longhorns

When the Longhorns left town they were in just as good a shape as they had been before they arrived, but while they were there they certainly came down with a bad case of the frights.

Dear Consumer

Don't Buy 'Pie in the Sky'

Getting rich quick is a thought many of us dream about. But we know it's not a realistic thought — and certainly not an idea that will help us make wise investments.

If you are considering investing money, you should know that the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) has issued this warning: Consumers should beware of get-rich-quick schemes.

Specifically, SEC is trying to educate us in the tactics of promoters pushing fraudulent stocks and bonds. Often, such promoters will be selling questionable, off-beat securities that are not even registered with SEC. Some promoters promise you will make a fortune overnight, but in reality you may lose your savings. Such losses have been suffered by many persons — including those who are smart and knowledgeable about financial matters.

We were lucky last winter. Although fuel was in limited supply, the weather over the most heavily populated sections of North America was mild. Result: Demand for heating oil, natural gas, coal and electricity was only marginally greater than supply and we squeaked through the season with some discomfort but no really serious danger.

Will we be as fortunate again? "Nope," say some of the old-timers I've talked to around the country. "We won't. The husks on the hickory nuts are thicker and tighter than they were last fall. The leaves are falling later this autumn. The squirrels have bushier tails and the farm animals are growing heavier coats. Besides, this past summer was a real stemwinder—hot and dry in most places—and a hard winter always follows a summer like that."

On the other hand, a second group of down-home weather prophets figure just the opposite. "The first frost was an early one," they say, "and that means a mild winter. Besides, the woolly bears (hairy caterpillars) around here have a big wide band of brown on 'em... and that forecasts gentle weather."

So I guess you pay your money and you take your choice this winter when it comes to backwoods weather prophets. But there is one cold, hard scientific fact that seems to support the individuals who predict more than ample snow, sleet, ice and storms for the months ahead. There has been an unusual increase in sunspot activity ("storms" which flare up on the surface of the sun) in recent weeks. And—woolly bears or not—that usually portends a turn for the worse in the earth's day-to-day climate.

## Congress Clings To Mailing

WASHINGTON — Congress always seems to have difficulty reforming itself.

This year it declined to get totally involved in campaign finance reform, rejected a well-thought-out restructuring of its outmoded committee system, and couldn't see the point of including itself under the terms of the Freedom of Information Act.

And the House's so-called reform of the congressional franking (free mailing) privilege, which is getting its first test in this election season, similarly appears to leave things pretty much "business as usual" on Capitol Hill.

For years, congressmen have flooded their districts with "newsletters" once or twice before election day. Mass mailings, such as the newsletters which extol the virtues and hard work of those seeking reelection, are carried through the mails at no cost to individual congressmen.

Then in 1972 several elections challengers had a belly-

ful of this abuse of the frank, which was intended to permit congressmen to communicate with their constituents about official business. A dozen lawsuits were filed and a few victories were scored against congressmen.

The message to the Congress was clear: either reform franking abuse or the courts will do it.

So the House (the Senate doesn't have the "Postal Patron" form of mass mailing addressing, which is the favorite means of abuse) spent 1973 drafting a "reform" law that does little more than make the abuse appear less blatant.

For example, the few congressmen who were interested in functional reform wanted mass mailings banned during the 60 days before primary and general elections, but it was watered down to 28 days.

As could be expected, scores of congressmen waited until the Oct. 10 mailing deadline before depositing their bags of newsletters at the post office. This naturally caused a

backlog, which the congressmen knew would result in many newsletters being delivered to voters much closer to election day than the reform law intended.

The House also created a bipartisan commission to render advice to congressmen on the frankability of planned mailings and to handle complaints from citizens, who were barred by the new law from filing court suits unless the commission fails to consider their complaints.

The commission this year was asked by less than a fourth of the House membership to approve intended mailings.

"I think it's a fair assumption that some stuff that we haven't seen has gone out under the frank that shouldn't have," observed a commission official in a bit of understatement.

Furthermore, the commission, which is not the most widely publicized operation, has received only 19 complaints from citizens. All were decided in favor of the congressmen.

## Investment Chatter

NEW YORK (UPI) — Harris, Upham & Co. says it feels the elections, which were of such benefit to the Democrats, will have "little short-term" bearing on the stock market although they will have longer term implications. It notes that historically the Democrats have been "the spending party," but adds that it doubts "rampant spending will come at a time when the (current) unusual

inflation is itself so rampant in trend."

Fraser Management Associates says the stock market rally early last month "is more significant than any other rally this year." The company adds that the "retracement" of the rally to date indicates that "we are in the initial stages of a bottom reversal process" and that "we should expect future tests of

the recent turn which bottomed out below the 600 level of the Dow in the first few days of October."

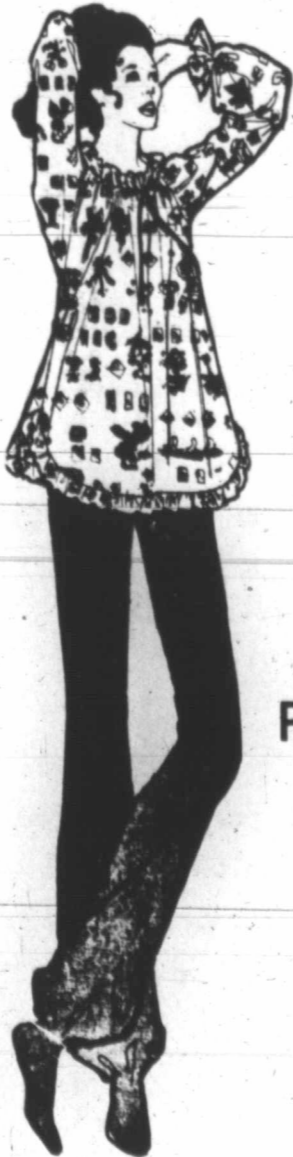
