Deep Wells In Big Lake Must Conserve Gas

Railroad Commission Issues Order To Run Tubing

AUSTIN, Oct. 31. (AP)—Operators of the seven Big Lake field oil wells in the 8,900 foot pay were ordered by the state railroad commission today to shut in their wells until they have been properly tubed or a market provided for excess gas used in the production of oil.

The Big Lake field is in Reagan county on University of Texas lands. The deep wells are owned by two companies, in both of which Continental Oil company owns a large share of the stock.

The shutting of the shut-in order was as follows: "Both said group No. 1 oil corporation and said Big Lake Oil company shall shut in all wells now producing from the deep pay horizons keeping same entirely shut in from Nov. 15, 1930, until there shall have been provided a pipeline or other adequate market for the utilization of such natural gas as shall be produced in the orderly operation of said wells or until such wells have been properly and scientifically tubed so as to conserve and prevent all waste gas from escaping from said wells."

The order was made applicable as a means to prevent waste of gas, both to the seven existing deep wells and to all new wells, the commission stipulating that all new wells be properly fitted before being brought in, and that no new wells be run until a market for the gas had been found.

The companies were ordered to report weekly to the oil and gas supervisor of the commission details of the progress of work on the tubing and instructed the supervisor to report to the companies in the event they did not show "due diligence" in the work.

Without attempting to say how much gas has been wasted in producing from the deep pay, the commission found that more than thirty billion cubic feet of natural gas had been produced since the first well was brought in, "a large part of which was unlawfully wasted."

The market value of the gas figured in heat units, would equal \$3,000,000 the commission found. In addition to such "enormous, profligate and unrestricted waste," the commission also found a waste in underground oil due to the exhaustion of the natural gas, the waste power for the population of a fine oil from the sands, and a waste due to storage of more than 5,000 barrels of oil per day.

"It is evident, and necessary," the commission found, "that the commission must take steps for the conservation of these great natural resources of oil and gas as are now being profligately and wastefully produced from the deep pay horizon."

The nearest the commission came to estimating the waste was by stating that the amount of gas being wasted if connected to the homes of every family in Texas with all the gas needed for domestic purposes for approximately one year.

The order was the result of a hearing here at which the two operators in the Big Lake field were ordered by the railroad commission to show cause why they should not be included in the statewide proration order which went into effect August 26.

When that order was promulgated, the commission suspended the order as applied to the Big Lake field on the plea of the operators that they had never experimented with pinching the deep wells and were doubtful of the results.

They were given several weeks in which to make their efforts toward curtailment, but the hearing was called for last week when the commission decided those efforts had not been convincing.

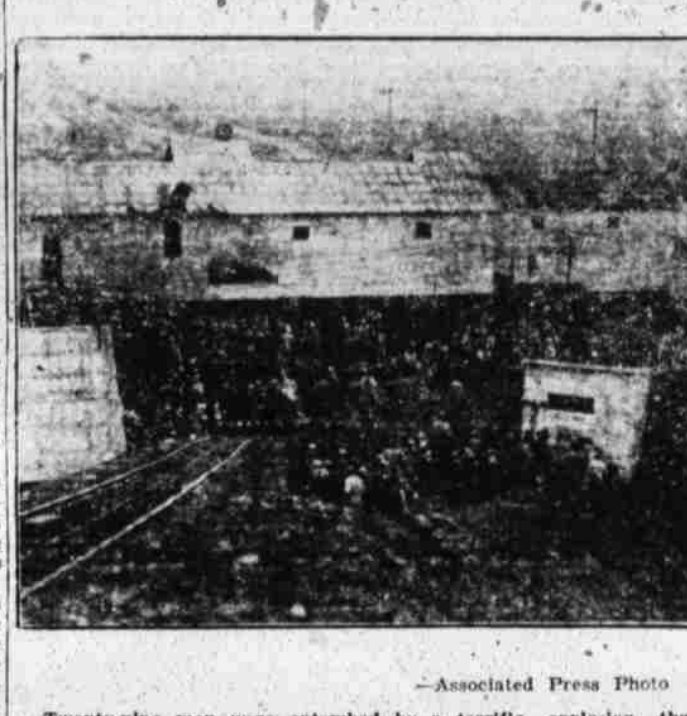

Sixteen Dairies To Begin Saturday Labeling Bottle Caps With Grade; Care Of Milk In Home Important

Beginning Saturday milk, produced by sixteen dairies selling products here will be allowed to label their products according to grade, as stipulated in the city's standard milk ordinance.

Jimmy Williams, city inspector, announced that ten dairies here qualified to sell Grade A and six to sell Grade B milk.

Two pasteurization plants also are ready to qualify for Grade A, he said. On the cap of each bottle of milk sold by these dairies will be the grade and whether it is raw or pasteurized milk.

Total daily output of the sixteen dairies qualifying is about 3,500 quarts from 250 cows.

Sanitary conditions in pasteurization plants also are inspected regularly. Pasteurization does not make dirty milk clean or pour milk rich, declared Williams. It reduces the bacterial count in milk and is regarded as an additional factor of safety and the best method of obtaining milk on a large commercial scale.

Only Grade A and Grade B raw milk is used by pasteurizing plants. "While the production, pasteurization and handling of graded milk is carefully supervised by the city health department," said Mr.

Wild Oil Gusher Calls Oklahoma Guards To Duty

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 31. (AP)—Adjutant General Charles F. Barrett today ordered several units of the Oklahoma National Guard to assist civil authorities in policing the fire danger area surrounding the gigantic Number 1 Stout well, flowing wild on the southeast edge of the Oklahoma City wholesale district.

The guardsmen were to proceed to the area as soon as they could be mobilized at the three armories of the city.

They were to be commanded by Lieut. Col. Turner Roark. The outfit called were A, G and D and Service companies of the 17th Infantry; Battery B of the 19th field artillery, and medical and ambulance units of the 120th infantry, a total of about 500 men.

The order issued by General Barrett was flexible, permitting the addition of more men if necessary. The guardsmen were directed to report to Sheriff Stanley Rogers of Oklahoma county, who asked the aid of the military.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 31. (AP)—Flowing an estimated 60,000 or more barrels of oil and 100,000,000 cubic feet of gas daily, a wild gusher at the southeast doorstep of Oklahoma City threatened residence and business districts today. The fire hazard led to closing of schools, "breakfasts," churches and public buildings.

Chief ranger of fire in great clouds of gas which cling to low lands surrounding the well. As a low southeast wind sprang, huge masses and towering districts with oil, rapid fire requirements were enforced in homes south of Seventh street. Hopes of retaining the fire hazard rested with incessant wind.

The well, Number 1 C. E. Stout of the Morgan Petroleum company, is located on the Canadian river bank just east of the city limits, less than a mile from the heart of the downtown shopping district.

"Extreme police power" in enforcing no-fire regulations over a danger area two miles square was to be exercised by state fire inspectors under State Fire Marshal C. R. O'Neal.

Oil men said that because of its location the gusher was far more dangerous to the city than the Mary Suddik, which attracted national attention last spring by blowing high for 11 days.

Every fireman in the city was on duty, roads in the north end of the city gusher field were blocked and train traffic in the vicinity of the well was restricted.

Taking personal charge of the derrick crew at daylight, Fred Morgan, president of the company, directed efforts to control the gusher. Efforts were being made to remove master valves, ripped open last night and cut away by men preparatory to installing a "Christmas tree" that would control the monster. No night work could progress, due to the strict no-light rule.

The well's roar could be heard nearly everywhere in the city. At times it was almost deafening downtown and on the east side the knocks of firemen weakening residences south of Seventh street added to the restlessness in virtually every home in the affected area.

Negroes living in river bottom flats fled their homes as the erupt from the gusher, unstemmed by earthen dykes, poured into the river.

Six city schools were closed today, liberating 2,350 pupils until Monday. Great pockets were being blown from the ground in the southeast part of town led to closing, city superintendent of instruction J. R. Barton said.

Streets and roads for a mile around the well were closed. With only a slow wind, which shifted southeast after sunrise, low-lying gas clouds intensified the fire danger. As the wind changed from the west to southeast, the business district received a light oil spray. A wind strong enough to sweep away the gas was hoped for.

A foundry worked all night making the "Christmas tree," huge iron tool which, through a series of tates and valves, should hold the well. It will be ready about 11 a. m. It is believed the "tree" must be lowered from the derrick top.

AMARILLO, Oct. 31. (AP)—More than four hundred representatives from every town along the proposed Texas & Pacific Northern Railway, Big Spring, to Vega, and Amarillo met J. L. Lancaster, president of and G. O. Bateman, vice president, and other Texas & Pacific officials here today at luncheon as guests of the Amarillo chamber of commerce in heading up movement for the proposed line.

The visiting delegations are led by Attorney John P. Slaton of Hereford while Mayor Ernest O. Thompson of Amarillo presided at the banquet.

The meeting is designed to coordinate work and crystallize uniform sentiment for the road all along the line.

President Lancaster said: "We are here to listen. Our drive has been made on the basis of public necessity and convenience. It is now up to the people along the proposed line to say whether or not they want us."

American Seeks to Reconcile French And Italian Views

ROME, Oct. 31. (AP)—Hugh B. Gibson, United States ambassador to Belgium, said in an interview today that the "Italo-French conversations toward naval disarmament were continuing and that results might be achieved."

The envoy declared he had not come to Rome as a special appointee of President Hoover to aid in settling the naval differences of France and Italy, as had been reported, but said he merely was here as a member of the preparatory disarmament commission of the league of nations.

"As a member of the commission," he said, "I wanted to see the other members and talk over the Agrippa business with them before the commission meets within a few days."

PARIS, Oct. 31. (AP)—Hugh B. Gibson, American ambassador to Belgium, who long has played a prominent part in international disarmament conferences, was a front page personage in the European press today because he is striving to bring France and Italy together on their naval agreement.

Premier Tardieu has frankly explained to Ambassador Gibson France's position and Premier Mussolini was expected to Rome today to give the Italian side.

France, it was learned in official quarters, is ready to make concessions on the naval problem without, however, admitting the principle of parity, the rock upon which Franco-Italian negotiations has struck.

If Ambassador Gibson carried any message to Premier Mussolini from Premier Tardieu, it is believed here to be that France has no desire to isolate Italy and that on the contrary she hopes through a binding naval accord to establish friendly and helpful relations in all domains.

In official French quarters it was generally said that the word "parity" appeared to have been unduly emphasized, particularly as France believes that Italy would not see any necessity of building up to the size of the French fleet.

### U. S. Production Of Petroleum Shows Decrease

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31. (AP)—Production of petroleum in the United States during September was estimated by the bureau of mines today at 70,777,999 barrels, a daily average of 2,366,000. This was 40,000 barrels a day less than August and 549,000 under the daily average production for September last year.

The decline was reflected in a contraction in stocks on hand of all petroleum products. These were estimated to be 77,500,000 barrels on September 30, a reduction of 7,319,000 in a month.

September's output of gasoline was 27,822,000 barrels, an increase of 9 per cent over 8,100,000 barrels. Gasoline stocks on hand at the end of the month amounted to 28,234,000 barrels, 2,270,000 less than any month's production.

Most of the decline in crude production took place in Texas. The output in California, Oklahoma and New Mexico was practically the same.

### Howard Ginnings Nearing 10,000

The number of bales of cotton ginned in Howard County since the season opened is nearing the 10,000 mark this week. Total ginnings up to Thursday night, with no report received from one Big Spring gin, was 9,902 square bales.

The total for Big Spring was 4,765. This does not include the ginnings of one concern, Coahoma gins and Knott gins brought the total to the 10,000 mark.

The following reports were given: Big Spring gins, 4,765; Cooperative No. 1, Coahoma, 705 round bales, 51,750 square bales; Cooperative No. 2, Coahoma, 409 square bales, 3,272 round bales; Guitart Gin Co., 718 square bales; Community Gin, Knott, 826 square bales; Cooperative Gin, Knott, 1019 square bales, 422 round bales.

### COUNTY AGENT'S CORNER

Howard County Farm Agent

A group of young Howard county farmers have conducted some very successful demonstrations this year in improved practices with farm stock and livestock and the record of their demonstrations is coming in rapidly. It appears that the percentage of records turned in to demonstrations conducted will be larger this year than last in spite of adverse conditions. The fact is the boys are doing a finer and higher type of work this year. Doubtless demonstrations with crops and livestock were conducted by all club boys this year that caused older folk to take notice.

Hubert and Marvin Hayworth, F. D. Rogers, Stanley C. Lewis, Williams, Eugene (Bill), S. P. Brown and others are making net profit of \$75 to more than \$100 on five acres after paying \$15 rent on land. Not many adult farmers can produce this kind of record in Howard county this year.

Here are several boys who are not satisfied with good jobs of producing feed crops this year but have demonstrated that cattle bred in Howard county can be fed properly and profitably on Howard county feedstuffs for the market. They may also feed Howard county bred and fed cattle to Howard county people.

### 'Heads Up' Playing At Ritz Tonight, Is Rogers - Kane Hit

Motion pictures designed to appeal to particular classes of society will be produced in much greater numbers shortly and will aid greatly in the progress of the film industry, according to a belief expressed at Paramount's New York studio today by Gene Gowing, well-known director and stage actor.

Gowing, who acted in "Conrage" during its two seasons on Broadway and found leisure between engagements to organize the professional Players club of Philadelphia and direct the Cape Playhouse productions at Dennis, Mass., has the principal message role in "Heads Up," recorded with songs and dialog by Paramount and playing at the Ritz Theatre tonight at a special Hallowe'en party beginning at 11:30 o'clock, with a cast embracing Charles Rogers, Helen Kane, Victor Moore and Margaret Brown.

"The advent of sound has paved the way for 'class pictures' with intense but limited appeal," he declares. "Daring has opened an immense new field to pictures, but also has made it more difficult to give each production a universal appeal. Audiences demand something more today than is the fact action which characterized silent pictures, but they do not demand the same things."

"Therefore," he continued, "it will be unquestionably more and more necessary to produce pictures appealing particularly to the intelligence and others which will be mainly emotional. This specialization will allow directors the same freedom they now have on the stage and will permit innovations which have been avoided in the past because they might spell financial failure. And the 'flop' of a gigantic revenue or musical comedy entailed the loss of millions of dollars."

The class picture, Gowing contends, will depend on characterization and dialog rather than on lavish settings. It may, he thinks, be produced with comparatively few and inexpensive sets. This would be following the lead of the Little Theatre Movement, where serious drama often is performed with the barest minimum of scenery and change of sets. The growth of this movement attests to a real demand for thoughtful pictures, Gowing points out.

Such specialized productions would serve as experimental laboratories for new ideas.

Let us suppose you have some of these left-overs in the refrigerator:

- 1 broiled meat cake, 1 spoon oven baked beans, 1 serving cold roast pork or veal, 1 spoon cooked spaghetti, 1 serving cold broiled or baked ham, 1 spoon apple sauce, 1 serving cream of tomato soup, 1 sausage cake.

Now for some successful ways to use these left-overs:

Meat Cake With Tomato Sauce Pour a small can of cream of tomato soup over the meat. Allow to simmer until the sauce is thick and rich, adding a few drops of onion juice and a small amount of thickening, if desired. Serve with hearts of lettuce and French or mayonnaise salad dressing.

Oven Baked Beans with Poached Eggs Heat the beans, then place them on a slice of buttered toast, and top with a poached egg. Serve with whole wheat bread and fruit to make a well-balanced luncheon.

Roast Veal or Pork Salad Chop the meat, season well with salt and pepper, and add an equal amount of shredded cabbage, or celery. Moistened with mayonnaise salad dressing and use as filling for a stuffed tomato salad, or mound attractively in a nest of lettuce.

Spaghetti with Bacon Fry several slices of bacon until almost crisp. Drain off almost all of the fat, add a spoon of cooked spaghetti, and cook until the spaghetti is heated through. Serve with a green salad.

New Yorker Chef Gives Soup Suggestions of Interest

By ETIENNE ALLIO, Chef Hotel New Yorker, New York City

Soups holds, and deserves, the honor of opening the evening meal in thousands of American homes. Then a perfect soup there is no more delicious dish. There is a poor soup—watery and tasteless—there is no more ruinous prelude to what might have proved a thoroughly soul and appetite-satisfying repast.

To avoid the disaster of a really poor soup is not difficult. Fairly good results are easy to attain. But to prepare the perfect soup? That is indeed an art which calls for all the housewife's skill in the choice and mixing of ingredients, and the use of seasonings. It is, however, an art which offers as its reward the heartfelt appreciation of all the diners at her board.

Potage a la Creme d'Epinards—Carefully wash and stem one-half peck of spinach. Cook in double boiler until tender, being sure that the water is boiling before putting the spinach in the boiler. Rub through a colander into a saucepan. Add two cups good stock Season with salt, pepper, one teaspoon sugar, a pinch of macer. Bring quickly to the boiling point. Stir in one tablespoon butter rolled in one teaspoon flour. Cook one minute and remove from fire.

Potage Longchamps—Drain one can of peas into a saucepan. Add two slices of onion, three cups chicken stock, and one and a half teaspoons sugar. Bring to a boil and simmer for one-half hour. Blend in a saucepan, one tablespoon flour with one tablespoon melted butter. Pour in slowly, stirring all the while, the pea mixture. Bring to boiling point, then remove end put through strainer. Add one cup milk and a few sprigs of fresh mint. Reheat, keeping mint in about five minutes, after which it has had an opportunity to impart its delicate flavor. Add one-half cup cooked vermicelli and season with salt and pepper.

Potage de Carottes—Wash scrupulously and slice thin, twelve medium carrots. Place in saucepan with two tablespoons butter.

Green peppers are an excellent, though often neglected, dish for the quick supper. Stuffed with corn, oven baked beans, cooked spaghetti or left-over meat, peppers will provide a pleasing variety for the main dish. And only a cream soup, accompanied by another vegetable and a crisp salad, is necessary to complete a delicious, well-balanced meal.

Below you will find a few simple menus that demonstrate the possibilities of stuffed green peppers as appetite arousers, and as short cuts for the busy home maker these brisk fall days.

- Cream of Pea Soup Crackers, Green Peppers Stuffed with Oven Baked Beans, Creamed Cauliflower, Combination Fruit Salad, Pumpkin Pie.

Baked Peppers Stuffed with Ham and Chili Sauce Creamed potatoes Prescribed Sweet Mixed Pickles Quick Cole Slaw Chilled Fruit Cups Small Cakes

Baked Green Peppers Stuffed with Corn Pudding or Creamed Corn Corn Pudding or Creamed Corn Egg Pudding with Sauce

Green Peppers Stuffed with Oven Baked Beans: 6 large green peppers; oven baked beans; buttered crumbs.

DESSERTS can be made attractive and nutritious without costing much and they should be planned as part of the meal because of the energy food they provide in the form of sugar.

Odds and ends of fruit, a little custard and some whipped cream—all of which may be left from other meals—make a delicious and economical dessert. So also do many other combinations which can be concocted from left-overs.

There are the fruit gelatines, whips and sponges which can be made from ingredients you are apt to have on hand—apple sauce, a few prunes left from breakfast or some canned apricots—and the necessary staples such as sugar and gelatine, with the addition of eggs for sponges.

How Is Your HEALTH?

Edited by Dr. Iaco Galadston for the New York Academy of Medicine.

BRONCHITIS From the nose down to the minutest air cells (spores) in the lungs, the respiratory tract is lined with a sensitive lining known as the respiratory mucous membrane.

The membrane becomes swollen, red in appearance, and there may be local heat and pain. There is also a plentiful secretion of a thick, or watery substance, commonly termed mucus.

The inflammation usually starts at one point, and if unchecked, tends to extend. In the more serious conditions, the entire respiratory membrane may become involved.

The name given to this inflammatory process depends upon the area involved. If in the nose, it is called rhinitis; when the larynx is involved, it is called laryngitis; and so on.

In bronchitis, the mucous membrane of the bronchi is inflamed. The bronchi are those hollow branching tubes which lead from the wind pipe to the small air spaces of the lungs.

Supreme Court Will Review Small Bill

AUSTIN, Texas, Oct. 31 (AP)—The state supreme court yesterday decided to review the Small land bill, passed by the last legislature over the veto of Gov. Dan Moody, which was designed to fix title to dry river and creek beds in owners of the land they traversed.

The court granted a writ of order in the case brought by the state against C. W. Bradford and several hundred other land owners along the north fork of the Red river in Gray and Wheeler counties. The third court of civil appeals has held that under the Small bill owners of the land through which the river bed ran were entitled to it. Private Economies In "Hard Times"

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE MONITOR. "BAD TRADE" is too often represented as if it were an ingenious arithmetical expression devised by officials who prepare statistics of imports and exports, and totals of unemployment. But what it actually signifies is that men, women and children are going short in a small measure or in a great one.

The new information consists of data about retail trade conditions furnished to the Bang of England by some 150 great departmental stores situated in 50 different towns in Great Britain. It shows what people of all classes were buying and not buying in the month of August. In every respect—in necessities and in luxuries—the public bought less than in August of last year.

Some allowance must be made for the fact that the weather was unfavorable and that there had been some drop in retail prices. It is possible that three weeks of incessant rain suffice to explain the fact that the decrease in the sale of boots and shoes was less than the decrease in the sale of any other commodity.

People had less to spend. It is instructive to know how they economized. The biggest decrease, strangely enough, was in the purchase of "boys' wear." It is particularly easy to accommodate poor boys with other people's castoff clothes? It is less surprising to learn that the music and "sports and traveling" departments come next on the list of those which report severe economizing. Naturally, women cut down on fancy drapery, down by 10.2 per cent, and on piece goods (9.2 per cent) and on "women's wear" generally (8.2 per cent). The luxuries were sacrificed first. The necessities last, the decrease on "food and perishables" being 5.8, or less than on any other articles except boots and shoes.

But it would not be fair to conclude from these figures that "bad trade" means mainly deprivation of luxuries, and little deprivation in necessities. It means a general curbing of all desires, and a general curbing of all desires, and a general curbing of all desires.

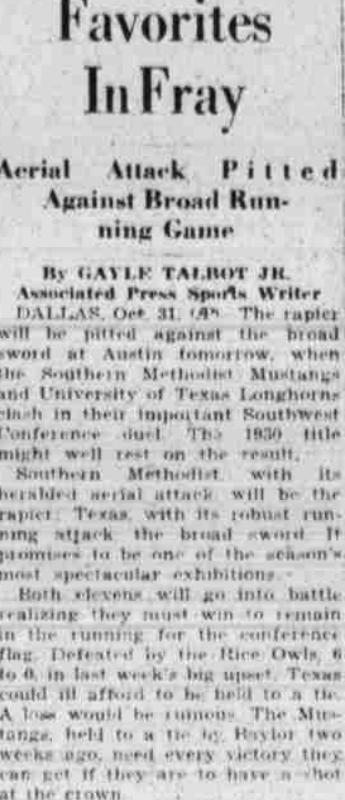

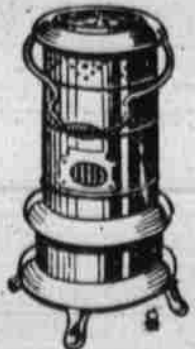

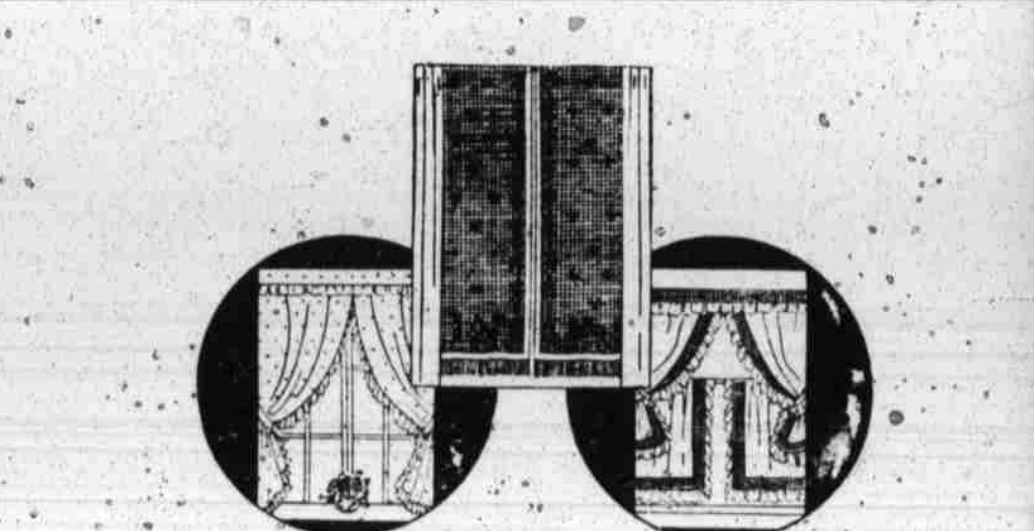

State Supreme Court Might Meet At Any Time Under Amendment

AUSTIN, Oct. 31.—(AP)—On the theory that half a loaf is better than no loaf at all, lawyers here submitted a constitutional amendment to be voted upon at the November election providing that the supreme court may sit at any time during the year. As originally proposed, the project was to enlarge the court to nine members, providing they should sit at any time during the year. This amendment, however, was defeated, and the amendment redrafted minus the plan to increase the court membership. At present the court has a three months' summer vacation—whether or not it desires the full three months. Many times, all members of the court are out of the state at the same time, preventing any session and quickly an important case. Senator Thomas B. Love of Dallas introduced the senate joint resolution by which the amendment was put to a vote. It has the approval of many lawyers, and according to the steering committee of the legislature boosting all amendments to the constitution.
