New Building To Cost \$47,850 When Completed

The contract for the new hospital was awarded to the Sharp Construction Company Wednesday. The consideration was \$47,850, and the contract calls for completion within ninety working days.

The ground was broken by Mayor F. P. Reid at the corner of Kingsmill Ave. and Gillespie St. Friday afternoon, Members of the city council and many citizens witnessed the breaking of the ground.

The building will be constructed with brick. A stone facing will decorate the front of the building. Besides a large charity ward, the hospital will contain thirty-three private rooms and two hospital wards that will accommodate twen-

SEASONABLE DAINTIES

FOR those who enjoy all kinds of game, the following will be appreclated:

Jugged Hare. Take one large hare, one-fourth pound of fat bacon, one and one-half teaspoonfuls of herbs, six small green onions, one tomato, a tablespoonful of felly, the juice of half a lemon, two tablespoonfuls of flour, salt to taste. and one pint of stock. Cut the bacon into pieces and cut the hare at the joints. Fry the bacon, and fry the pleces of hare in the fat. Put hare, bacon and onion with half a tablespoonful of ham chopped, one-half tablespoonful of herbs, one tablespoonful of chopped parsley, half a grated lemon rind, one teaspoonful of sait, a quarter teaspoonful of pepper, a dash of cayenne, three chopped mushrooms and two eggs. Mix all well, lay inside the bare and sew up. Place strips of fat bacon over the back of the hare and roast one and one-haif hours. Fifteen minutes before taking add the current jelly. Take up the hare and make a sauce by thickening with flour and butter mixed.

Egge Shirred With Sausages. Prick six sunsages all over and place around the edge of a baking dish and cook until crisp; pour off the fat and cut the sausages into inch pieces; break three eggs in the center of the dish, pour over two tablespoonfuls of fat and set in the oven to cook oggs. Serve from the baking dish.

Baked Apple Blices. Core apples before peeling, then cut after the apples are peeled. Place in a well-greased baking dish, giving each dies plenty of room to be removed rhen baked. Sprinkle with sugar, a bit of butter and a thick grating of autmeg. Bake and baste with a bit of hot water to start with, then with the Juice of the apple. When tender serve one silce with the meat.

Apples as sauce, in salad, fresh as fruit, to be eaten from the hand, baked in ple and pudding, the apple is the best of all fruit.






