

CHAMBERLIN IS SENT MESSAGE BY PRESIDENT

Bellanca Plane Lands Near Berlin Out Of Gas

MISSED GOAL BY DIRECTION

American Ambassador Flies to Greet Airmen

NEW YORK, June 6 .- A new long-distance flying record of approximately 3,790 miles was hung up today by Clarence Chamberlin and Charles Levine when they landed at Eisleben, Germany.

The former record of 8,610 miles was established by Captain Charles Lindbergh. Lindbergh.

Chamberlin and Levine traveled more slowly than Captain Lindbergh, but their flight was 180 miles longer. They landed at 5 o'clock this morning when gasoline ran low and motor trouble developed.

Taking the air again, the fliers made a brave attempt to reach Berlin, but apparently lost their way in the cloud banks and came down again in a marshy field near Klinge, about 70 miles southeast of the capi-

In alighting, the propellor hit the earth as the wheels settled into the ground. Further progress was impossible. The plane had traveled 120 miles from Eisleben and if it had headed in the right direction would have landed in Berlin. It is believed the aviators will fly here tomorrow.
