TREASURY INCOME FOR FISCAL YEAR OVER 2 BILLION @

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3 (P)-The treasury reported today its income for the fiscal year which began July 1 passed the \$2,000,-000,000 mark November 1.

On that date \$2,007,393,652 of the \$6,650,410,000 receipts estimated by President Roosevelt for the complete fiscal year had been collected.

Expenditures by November 1 amounted to \$2,624,835,822 of the \$7,345,655,000 estimated for the year by the president. The first of the month also saw the public debt figure above \$37,000,000,000 for the first time since the treas-ury released \$300,000,000 of inactive gold in mid-September.

"THE PROFESSIONAL THIEF," edited by Edwin H. Sutherland; (University of Chicago: \$2.50). Here is probably the most discouraging book printed this fall, and one of the most irresistible. It is edited by Edwin H. Sutherland from a manuscript by a thief called, for no reason much. Chic Conwell. The title is "The Professional Thief," and the book is in no sense one of those "gosh what a bad boy

The author is dead. He was paid a small weekly wage to write his guidebook to thievery from a fund controlled by the sociology depart-ment of the University of Chicago. The university was not much in-terested in Chic's reform—he had reformed, however, and amusingly enough he had gone into "personwork," where his experience at handling people in the old days made him vary valuable to his em-

But what Chic was paid to do was to tell all he knew about the profession of thievery.
